WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—Defense sources said today that national defense spending for the 1952 fiscal year is being planned around a \$13,000,000,000 figure but may be far higher by Atlantic pact commitments.

These informants said the armed forces "regard" the \$13,000,000,000 as a "best case" figure, based on a calling for the 12 months from July 1, 1951, to June 30, 1952.

The 1951 defense budget now before congress started at \$12,500,000,000 but congress could increase it to more than \$14,000,000,000.

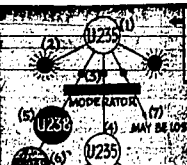

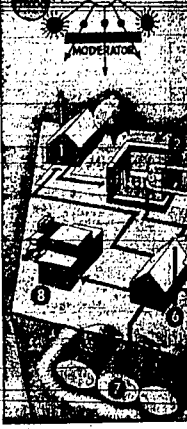

# 'Breeding' Atomic Fuel May Prove Forecast



Atomic pile reaction starts with exploding atom of U-235 (1). It blows up into atoms of lighter elements, yielding heat (2) and fission neutrons (3). One neutron breeds up another atom of U-235 (4), keeping chain reaction going. Second neutron lodges in useless U-238 atom (5), changing it to useful plutonium (6). Third neutron (7), usually lost, escapes into useful plutonium.



At present, the only way to produce atomic fuel is to breed it from uranium. This is done by using a neutron to split a uranium atom, which releases more neutrons. These neutrons are used to split more uranium atoms, creating a chain reaction. The process is controlled by moderators and control rods.

Speaking at Princeton, Md., President Truman forecast the possibility of vast peacetime uses of atomic energy for agriculture, industry and transportation. He spoke as the atomic energy commission is spending some of its \$90,000,000 budget to design and build a new atomic pile near Arco, Idaho, to test a theory that atomic fuel can be bred from uranium.

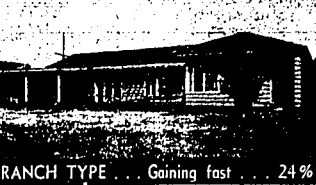

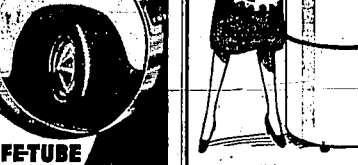

### Cultivation Is Declared Best Weed Blocker

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 23.—Cultivating frequently weeds cheaper and more efficiently than any other method, says C. I. Seely, weedman at the University of Idaho.

The cultivation works seeds out of the soil fairly fast at the same time old plants are being killed. It leaves the ground much clearer. Complete clearing is not recommended by cultivating. It will result in the first few crops yielding above normal, Seely explained.

**Sure Path to Eradication**

"Weed cultivation is the sure path to complete eradication," he adds. "The less expensive chemicals such as 2, 4-D are merely controls and weeds soon come back unless the chemical has worn off.

"Chemicals such as sodium chlorate and carbon bisulfide which give eradication are too expensive for large areas and must be used on small patches. But weed cultivation must be done right and timed to the day in order to get good results."

**Times Advised**

The best time to start is immediately after harvest in fall or after the weeds start growing in spring, Seely says. When growth starts in spring is the time for first

It announced today that a plastic coating will be added to 2,000,000 pairs of these boots left over from World War I. This coating is designed to take a good polish and make the boots more resistant to water.

# Children Capture Muskrat at Favorite Sport, Digging Holes in Ditch Banks

By STAN KOESTER

Seven children on Alexander street trapped a muskrat at the favorite sport of the species—digging holes in irrigation canal banks. The muskrat, after a vicious fight for freedom, was captured and died later of injuries received in the scuffle. The animal was trapped in a covered ditch in front of 261 Alexander street.

The capture came about incidentally. The South Park children lost a ball in the covered ditch in front of the Curtis Williams home, 271 Alexander street. The next day, Red, a Labrador retriever and neighborhood pet, put his nose to the end of the pipe and began to raise quite a rumpus.

Mr. Williams flushed water through the drain and out came an animal, not a ball. The children quickly closed off the pipe under the driveway with boards and began filling it with a garden hose. The muskrat began to come to the top for air. On one of his trips Art Hoffman, 13, 278 Alexander street, caught the animal with a shovel and flopped him up on dry land.

It was placed in a box and kept for the admiration of the neighborhood. The children planned to keep it through one day for show purposes then turn it loose. However, the muskrat died at night. Cause of death was either a surplus of water in its lungs or a concussion from a tap on the head administered by Art when he flushed the muskrat out of the pipe with the shovel.

Other children aiding in the capture were Larry Hinman, 8, Dix Hoffman, 8, Earl Hoffman, 11; Dolores Williams, 13; Diana Williams, 7; and Sonny Williams, 5.

On-the-muskrat-problem—Henry Woodson, Twin Falls Commissioner, said the company is busy 12 months of every year rympting muskrat-damages in the canal banks. The animals dig into the banks, water flows into the hole and seeps through the other side.

Though the yearly damage cannot be estimated, repair crews fix at least one hole somewhere in the system almost every day, Woodland said. Most of the holes are discovered in the fall and spring, though the animals are busy all year.

The focal point of muskrat trouble is lateral silt of Hanesel where the most damage is found. Muskrat rats favor canals with slow-moving water.

Trappers work the canals collecting pelts. Loren Mitchell collected approximately 800 skins last fall and this spring. One day he trapped 25 rats in one day on the highland canal south of Twin Falls. The trappers are not paid by the canal company although a 20-cent bounty formerly was paid for muskrat tails.

Arthur Miracle, watermaster, said when the bounty was in effect trappers would bring in tails gathered around Snake river, causing the company to abandon its studies. Every fall, just when a farmer is ready to harvest his sugar beets, some muskrats will dig a hole in a canal, flooding the farmer's field, according to Miracle. Protests by farmers to the canal company are enough to make them hate the name of muskrat, according to Miracle.

## Sawyer Rule Gains Power By Revisions

WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—President Truman's new shakeup of the government is carrying the department of commerce to the highest peak of prestige and power it has held in its 47-year history.

Secretary Charles Sawyer yesterday became a superactive boss of the department's maritime affairs and, it is expected, to another program of reorganization.

Fast Responsibility When and if that happens, the drapper, grayish lawyer from Cincinnati—who walked into an sprawling \$300,000,000-a-year collection of bureaus two years ago this month—will be presiding over a \$2,000,000,000 agency with vast responsibility to see that industry and government get along.

Sawyer's rise, his subordinates recall, is the more spectacular because he took the job almost on a "hand-duck" basis. It was in May, 1948, when most politicians thought Harry Truman was washed up. His appointments were virtually going begging.

Let Law Practice Sawyer left a law practice in Cincinnati to take the government post. The secretary is publishing today his orders setting in motion the new, three-member federal maritime board and creating in his department a maritime administration.

To help in organizing the commerce department as the core of the federal transportation program, Sawyer yesterday acquired the experienced administrator, Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, as a \$17,200 a year "interim" ferryman.

**3-Dimensional TV-Hailed as Science 'Eyes'**

**CHICAGO, May 25 (UP)—Atomic scientists** have developed three-dimensional television "eyes" which someday may act as "eyes" for robots performing rescue and clean-up operations in atom-bombed areas, it was announced today.

An announcement by the Army's national laboratory here told of big advances being made by its remote-control engineering division to permit scientists to operate from a safe distance while experimenting with radioactive materials.

**"Important Step"**

It described the development of the three-dimensional TV system as an "important step in the development of equipment and techniques needed by scientists in order to protect themselves from radiation."

The new television cameras may someday act as "eyes" for "master arms" units with almost-human arms and hands which will be sent into atom-bombed areas rendered uninhabitable by radioactive materials, said Dr. E. Hull, director of the engineering division.

Scientists could control the slaves by viewing three-dimensional scenes set up miles from the atom destroyer.

**Many Possibilities**

Applications in weapons work may include handling of explosive materials and fire-arming of atomic bombs, Hull said. "Industrial applications will be suggested themselves, especially chemical plant operations involving toxic materials."

He said the next "series" of TV units were constructed by modifying standard television equipment. "You see the pictures on a single three-dimensional image."

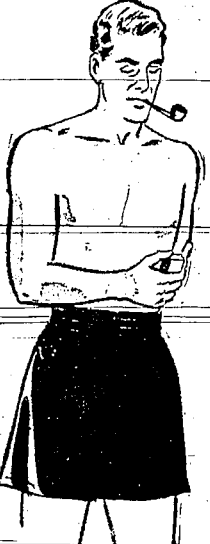

# Step by Step; Kremlin Cuts Envoy Offices

Little by little the Kremlin appears to be shutting its captive states in middle Europe away from whatever influence the war could spread in the area.

Final results could be that Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria will talk to the United States only through spokesmen at Moscow.

No one in Washington, and in particular at the State department, will stand for such a gloomy prediction. But state department people will acknowledge that over the past two years the communist governments of middle Europe have made it increasingly difficult for American diplomats to carry on their business.

Score Is Talled  
This is the way the score now stands: U. S. diplomats have left Bulgaria, and the Bulgarians have left the U. S.

Poland has demanded that the U. S. cut its Warsaw embassy staff of military attaches by 40 per cent. Czechoslovakia has demanded that we get 450 officers of our embassy staff out of their country.

Rumania wants us to cut our staff. Hungary makes the same demand. When a country makes demands like this, diplomats proceed to negotiate that they be met. But because of restrictions the Soviet satellite governments have thrown around the staffs we have had there, these cuts won't really amount to much.

Restrictions Vary  
The restrictions vary in the various nations. But all say that American diplomats can only certain distances from their embassies and that they must ask permission before they do. When they get permission they are followed by secret police.

Some of the satellite communists have been sent home. But even at this column is written a communist from the Hungarian legation could get on—mainly because of the way without any special permission—and go to San Francisco if he wished. Whether anyone would do this, no one in Washington will say.

### GM Pay Pact Termed Huge Bet on Future

NEW YORK, May 25 (AP)—General Motors is making a billion-dollar bet that the next five years will be fat ones for it. It will probably be its customer, to put up a sizable part of the money.

GM's dollars is what the big auto concern will pay out extra to workers in the next five years, under the conditions of the contract announced Tuesday. But certain "ifs" are attached to that.

Most of the billion will be paid out to you, the customer. If that will be included in the cost of the cars you buy—whether it be a new car, a hike in car prices, or just a cancellation of price cuts that otherwise might have come along.

**Cuts Possible**

But, if the next five years don't turn out to be as prosperous for producers as GM is betting, GM likely will curtail production, and its five-year wage bill won't be boosted by all of that billion by any means.

And, if the wage-pension pattern GM is setting proves hard for some of the little fellows who supply it with parts, there might be strikes there, and these could tie up production at the assembly line.

So, the five-year contract is no absolute guarantee of five years of labor-management peace in GM's overall operations, as some quarters are prone to "hall it."

**Well-Calculated Bet**

However, it is probably a well-calculated bet on GM's part. The auto giant apparently is counting on national income staying high. It appears to believe the free-spending era will continue for some time, and dangers of a sharp deflation within the next five years are slim.

It counts on a lot of money being around, a lot of employment, and more and more people wanting, and affording, new cars.

As for you, the car driver—if GM's betting on continued inflation is correct—the chances of substantial price cuts in autos are just that much farther off now.

And you might remember that at the same time the GM contract was announced, the tire companies raised their price and bid for more hikes to come. Gasoline prices have already risen in parts of the country. All in all, it takes quite a bit of the joy out of the Sunday joy ride.

### Solons Perk Up on News Of War Loot

WASHINGTON, May 25 (AP)—An oriental treasure chest filled with gold and precious gems, and in custody of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, has aroused the curiosity of congressmen.

An investigator for the house committee and foreign commerce committee has been assigned to the job of getting the details, particularly plans for disposition of the treasure, out of Mac's hands.

**Knowledge of Hearings**

A tabular chest from former Secretary of War Robert H. Patterson during unheralded hearings on legislation dealing with alien property and war claims.

Members had discussed the testimony today.

General MacArthur, Patterson testified, has the key to the chest and is awaiting order as to disposition of the treasure which Patterson said consists of "jewelry, precious items, gold and foreign currency." It was seized from the Japanese at the end of the war, but the committee does not know where the treasure got it.

Patterson said the treasure is in Tokyo. He did not estimate its value but committee members said it was sufficient to "pay a potentate's ransom several times over."

**Nazi Loot Discovered**

From Gen. Lucius Clay, former American military governor of Germany, the committee received some interesting information on war loot taken from the Nazis.

Clay testified the invading Americans seized between 200 and 300 million dollars worth of Nazi gold which was sold up through the nations claiming reparations from Germany. Russia was not one of them.

Clay estimated that "many millions of dollars" the value of property that had belonged to Hermann Goering, Hitler's Reichminister. It was turned over to Goering's widow and later was controlled by the German government when the widow was held to be a Nazi.
