GOV. DUFF'S VICTORY

We'll have to wait until November to learn whether Progressive Gov. James H. Duff's victory over Pennsylvania's Old Republican boss, Joseph Grundy, will be final and complete.

If Duff's personal choice for governor, John B. Fine, is elected in the fall elections, then Duff will have achieved what Pennsylvania governors ever attain. He will have held onto control of the state organization beyond the end of his term.

Slated to be a governor from seeking re-election. Others have tried to choose their own successors and thus hang onto power, but few have made it.

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On the basis of history, however, the odds go favor Duff. In 18 years he has captured the Pennsylvania governorship. The last time was 1934.

If Fine does come through, it means full state power for Duff. It breaks a barrier for a dynamic progressive Republican delegation to the GOP national convention.

There can be no doubt he will throw his weight on the side of aggressive leadership in the Republican national convention. In the primary he made Old Guard "Grundymind" the chief issue. He will be looking for a presidential prospect who reflects his own approach.

November victory for Fine will put Duff in the driver's seat no matter what happens to his personal content for the senate job of incumbent Sen. Francis J. Myers, Democratic.

Actually, Duff's personal choice for senate, James H. Myers, is a vigorous campaigner and is already plugging hard. Six years ago Myers won by a scant 23,000. But in 1948 the state plumped for Gov. Thomas Dewey by 180,000 to state his biggest edge.

Whatever the November outcome, the whopping 600,000 and 200,000 vote triumphs scored by Duff and Fine, respectively, are a resounding answer to Republicans who would profess their party should go. It's a reply that ought to be pondered well in high party councils everywhere.

POOL OF ATLANTIC POWER?

The 13 Atlantic pact countries stand at a crossroads. At their London conference the big question confronting each nation was: "How can we get an adequate defense without a military arm?"

Western European leaders are convinced that drastically lowered living standards for their peoples would be the inevitable outcome if each country goes to the aid of the balanced force of army, air force and naval units.

Some believe that even as allies they lack the economic strength needed for the sort of defense effort their military men consider desirable.

The European chiefs no longer see any point in discussing whether security or economic recovery should have priority. They think the two somehow must be achieved together. But how?

The plan now turning over in some leaders' minds is to create a giant pool of military and economic resources, which would be made available to all defense job might be accomplished if all countries were assigned just a part of it, with each the parts fitted into an overall pattern.

Thus France might be asked to supply land forces; the low countries some specialized combat units. Britain the tactical air arm, the United States the strategic air force and possibly the main naval strength. There might be a similar division of labor as to the output of munitions and other equipment.

British Canoe Tourists Stop Here on Trip

They tell they had enough money saved for the canoe trip.

They left Challis, Idaho, on March 16. Their trip was planned so that they could work around the snow-capped mountains into the Snake. Then they faced the entrance to the canyon at Lees Ferry.

Knowing that the river through the canyon they shipped their craft from Challis to Weippe, and then to a raft which took them 90 miles into the canyon. They were in the canyon two days and one-half days since they didn't move and explore river.

They had to go on the river for 80 miles to Weippe. The hike, on the rough trail along the river, was "quite rugged" and took them three days.

Their canoe was back into the water at Weippe, where they proceeded to a site at Maring to make a detour into Boise. Between Maring and Idaho Falls, Idaho, they had to portage at Swan Falls, Bliss dam, lower Salmon dam and upper Salmon dam.

They had "bad rapids" and made anywhere from 4 to 30 miles each day.

"We had been told to see a Mrs. Denardis, an Englishwoman, at 'Buhl'," Alforn explains. "I thought Buhl was a good break. They were portaged from a pickup truck at Mrs. Denardis."

They bought some new paddles, ropes and other supplies at Twin Falls Monday and prepared to get under way for Miller early Tuesday morning, knowing they were getting some of the roughest water of their trip between the falls and Miller.

At whatever point they were to be picked up by a member of the Corps, the young Englishmen took to the water in an 18-foot canoe named the "Sea Leaf." It is powered by an eight-horsepower motor, which is a four-cylinder model.

Two pieces of equipment includes the motor, three cameras, a box of food, gear, sleeping bags, tent, pitching needles and a first aid kit.

Discovering that western river travel is not a luxury cruise, they made 12 to 14 portages with their 100-pound canoe and 40 pounds of equipment.

They say their fastest portage was around the Hanford slalom. When they approached Hanford they suddenly encountered an airplane in the river with "us," they explain. "We were jerked out of the river by guards armed with machine guns."

They traveled 10 miles with government transportation and thrummed back in the river at 4 miles.

In relating what has most impressed them on their trip so far, they said they were awed by the most rugged country they saw and the Magic Valley in the east.

The young men have a six-month visa to visit the United States and expect to make six trips in reaching St. Paul. Upon completion of their trip they will return to England and earn money for a "holiday" in England. After that holiday Alforn will return to Canada and they will have a bride from Paris, and Kervill will make his home in New Zealand.

But they won't forget their river explorations, Alforn says they have taken pictures, a few hundred film and moving pictures of the wild country and are keeping complete diaries. Alforn says the journal, which is bound in a book by the men so they can use the books to read, will be their treasure with them.

1950 Housing Law Changes Are Reported

Changes in the housing act of 1950 passed by congress, as they apply to veterans of World War II, were announced Monday by Arnold Helweg, Magic Valley county representative for the veterans administration.

Mr. Helweg explained that three laws are being re-regulated and are to be taken into effect by June 30, 1950. These laws are: (1) The law which gives to the widows of veterans who died in service or from service-connected causes a right to 50 per cent of the loan to which their husbands would have been entitled, provided they have not remarried.

Another change is that combination FHA and GI loans to veterans will be guaranteed as they apply to 1950. Helweg explained that these loans are more costly and less advantageous to the borrower than are the straight GI loans.

The law raises the VA's guarantee on "GI" veterans' home loans guarantee to 90 per cent of the loan to a maximum of \$75,000. Helweg explained that the VA will guarantee only 50 per cent up to a maximum of \$10,000.

The law also provides that widows of veterans who died in service or from service-connected causes are eligible for GI loan benefits in which their husbands would have been entitled, provided they have not remarried.

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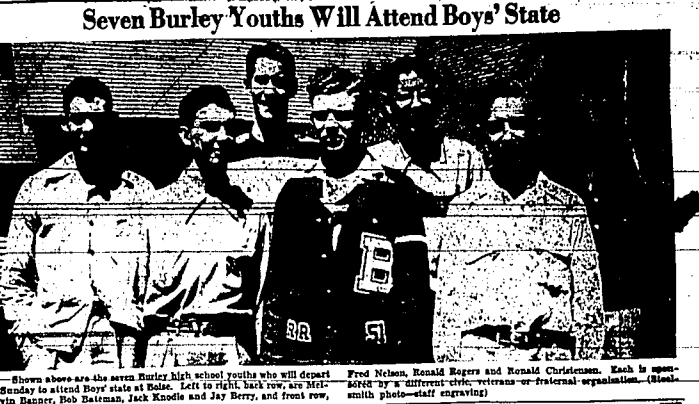
The law also provides an extension of the maximum time over which loans can be guaranteed, from 25 to 30 years, providing the veteran with lower monthly payments.

For the first time under the new law, the VA may make direct government loans at 4 per cent interest to eligible veterans in certain areas where 4 per cent home financing is not available from other sources. Veterans who get these loans must meet all the qualifications of a regular GI loan including credit and income requirements.

Requirements set by the new law provides that new houses must meet certain minimum construction requirements and that the VA will be eligible for sale to veterans under the GI loan program.

The law also authorizes the VA, in certain circumstances, to restore the guaranty title to veterans who have their entitlement to purchase property which later is taken by eminent domain, destroyed by fire or other natural hazards.

Provisions to make GI loans easier to get for veterans are included in the new law, Helweg said.

Solons Eyeing GI Insurance To Pare Cost

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—Congress is taking a new look at the 10-year-old GI insurance law which has led to a sharp increase in cost down-future costs.

Some legislators are in favor of a new law which would give men and women entering the armed services from now on a new insurance plan. The new plan would be administered by the veterans administration, that would not be a part of the government's war effort.

A house sub-committee, headed by Rep. Porter Hardy, D. Va., has just completed four weeks of hearings which brought out opinions in administration of the present law which some committee members believe are a needless cost to taxpayers.

What Affect Policies? One thing is certain, any changes congress may make will not affect policies now in effect, except, perhaps, to reduce the amount of 10 cents a pound on walnuts kept out of normal marketing channels.

National service life insurance was established in October, 1940, by a rider to a revenue bill adopted without hearing and with less than three minutes of debate in either house. It was intended to last for 10 years, far more than any estimate made at the time.

Here are some of the "gimmicks" used by Hardy's committee: 1. The NSLI is a revenue bill, not a government bond which draws 3 per cent interest. The rate on government bonds is 2 1/2 per cent. The higher rate has cost the treasury an estimated \$20,000,000.

These and other features were established by "administrative interpretation" of the law. Some legislators think a re-interpretation might save money in the future.

Bringing into the Hardy committee his would favor a new law that would give servicemen free insurance, not only for the time they are in the armed forces. It would end automatically, without privilege of continuing, once they leave service.

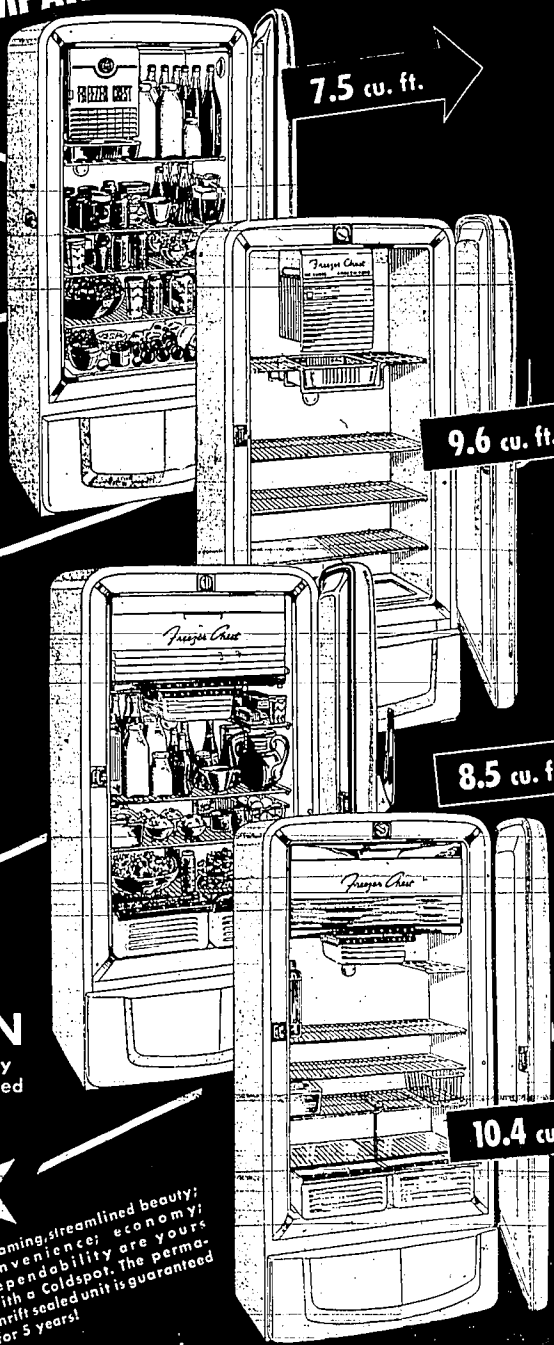
