

Dworshak Differs With Taylor on Views Of Columbia Valley Basin Account Plan

 WASHINGTON, May 21 (Special)—Sen. Glen Taylor argued that the Columbia valley basin account plan is essential to Idaho development. Sen. Henry Dworshak, however, expressed doubts over a few items, particularly a \$100,000,000 power credit from the federal government to the state to pay for the project.

Secondly, anything less than a full scale basin account will produce a uniform low power rate for Idaho. Areas with higher cost power plants, such as Hell's canyon and Labby, will be forced to pay much higher power bills, since we will have to pay the benefit of averaging produced at the earlier construction of Bonneville and Grand Coulee dams.

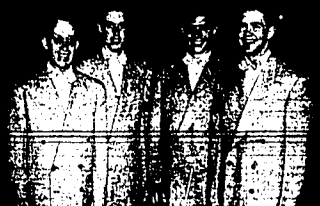

THE STATEHOOD ISSUE

Though they have largely unspoken, the main arguments in a Senate against statehood for Hawaii and Alaska are political.

Some senators simply don't care to have four more senators swelling their numbers. They fear the senatorial log would be a distinguishing argument.

This fear is especially acute among lawmakers from New England and the south, who foresee a smaller voice for their regions and a juster one for the booming west.

Not a few senators are cool to Hawaiian statehood because it would confer voting power on that territory's predominantly non-Caucasian population.

And because both territories are chiefly rural, certain big city lawmakers are chafing bringing them in as states. Their feeling is that congress already has too strong a rural coloring.

Furthermore, some Republicans think statehood would work to their disadvantage because of the way it would affect the balance of power in the Senate.

But if there is sincere promise in the congressional action, the old 15-territory may become a state, then all these political arguments are irrelevant.

HOW ABOUT PRODUCTION?

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, plans to campaign for higher wages and lower prices as a cure for unemployment...

In taking this line, Green is following the path thinking about the economy that unfortunately has impressed many labor leaders.

The actual workings of the economy are a bit more complex. Lower prices are indeed a desirable goal but they can't be pursued unless they are founded on lower costs.

Lower costs can be achieved in different ways. One is by selling more goods and thus reducing unit cost of articles.

A second route is to increase productivity—output per man—either by better organization of work, by improved methods and machines, or by greater individual efficiency among workers.

This is the path most businessmen must take to lower prices. With their costs cut, they feel reasonably safe in offering products at reduced figures.

When the market is thus built up, fair-minded businessmen will come out of the woodwork. But, except where wages have been shielded...

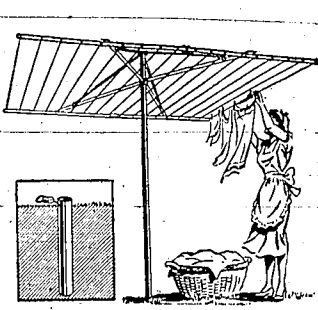

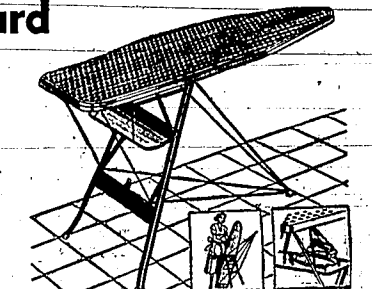

Wounded by Officer

The more than a score of youths resumed the fighting, brawling through the park and bowling over rollers in their path.

Cornell Williams, 16, a high school boy, was struck behind the ear by a bullet. His condition was listed as good at a hospital.

The second battle flared between the noses of special police assigned on a tip that trouble was brewing at the park.

Prospect park was the scene of a fight May 12 between white gangs in which 18-year-old James Fortunato was shot to death.

Vets Convert Insurance at Faster Tempo

Many veterans are converting their old term life insurance to permanent type policies available under national service life insurance laws, Arnold Kieker, Meads Valley veterans administration contact representative, announced Wednesday.

He said the number of World War I veterans who have converted their policies increased 140 per cent during the past year to 17,850. There are 5,000,000 NLI policies in force including the term policies.

Kieker explained that the premium rate for NLI term insurance is based on the insured persons age and the premium taken out remains unchanged through the term, usually for five years. He said contracts has authorized renewal of term insurance issued before Jan. 1, 1942, for an additional five-year term at the expiration of the original term. Renewed policies, however, carry a higher premium rate based on the insured's age at the time of renewal.

Term insurance may be converted to one or more of six permanent plans without a physical examination at any time, the VA official said. Unless converted or renewed it expires at the end of the term.

The premium rate for permanent policies is based on age at the time of conversion and remains the same for the life of the contract, he added.

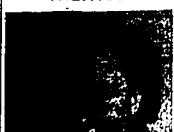

Trainer Learns Same Methods Needed For Instructing Children and Horses

A class of bright student horses started to school last week at the Magic Valley stables, Twin Falls, at about the same time boys and girls were finishing their schoolwork for the year.

But the difference in schedules is about the only fundamental difference about a school for horses and a school for children, according to Roy Larson, owner of the horse school.

"Our training methods are the same combination of patience, practice, psychology, coaxing, bribery and discipline just the school teacher or must use with children," he explains. Larson's students are three- and five-year-old horses, Tennessee walkers, roadsters and expected soon, some horses training in dressage or the "high school" of horsemanship.

Horses in these classes are show horses, beautiful and intelligent horses but high-spirited and indisciplinable. "No horse of this type are alike," Larson says. "The training for each animal must be worked out by trial and error to see what teaching methods give the best results."

Of course, there are problems horses in any training group such as Larson handles. He points out one is a "prima donna" when she "is taken to the barn and she fusses and demands her own way all the time," he explains. "She's an individual with her own ideas about what we should teach her."

But Larson is qualified to handle the most spoiled of horses. The son of a horse trainer, he was born into

"Turbo-Prop" Engines Put On 2 Planes

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—The navy is putting forward but fast-acting turbo-prop engines in two of its latest carrier-based attack planes, one of them rated officially as being able to carry an atomic bomb.

These developments were learned on good authority although neither the navy nor the air force would confirm them officially.

The power plant being installed in the navy attack planes is a 3,500 horsepower turbo-prop engine built for the navy by the Allison division of General Motors.

Engine Described
The Allison engine consists of twin turbines geared to a propeller, plus a turbine from which escaping gases provide additional thrust.

Weight Reduced
The department says also that the weight of the engines per horse-

power is less than half that of conventional piston engines. Together with other turbo-prop engines which have been and are being built, the development has raised hopes of greater fuel economy than that obtained with turbo-jet engines.

The letter, consisting of gas turbines plus an exhaust nozzle, require no propellers, are extremely light and develop great power at high speeds. Turbo-jets drive air force and navy fighters and also, at present, the B-47 medium bomber.

The new model navy attack plane in which the Allison turbo-prop engine is being installed have not yet been announced officially. One is a single-seater "boarder" which will be named the Skyhawk, and the other is the twin-engine North American NA-141. Previous models of both planes were equipped with piston engines.
