Sweet's Furniture Store Plans Opening of Enlarged Quarters

A greatly expanded Sweet's Furniture store will be opened formally Friday and Saturday after two months in the process of construction and remodeling. Expansion of the store in the 200 block of Main avenue east, increases the floor space from 20,000 square feet to more than 32,000 square feet. Larger displays and stocks of furniture are possible. The new space is "bigger and better" than occupied by Safeway stores. The remodeled front of the store is 100 feet long and includes five numbered show windows. The width of the store makes departmentizing possible on a scale which could not be achieved in the older and smaller store. Two main doors are included in the frontage. The main floor is divided by semi-partitions into three departments. One displays living room furnishings, one provides space for appliances, accessories and office space and the other displays floor coverings. BOISE, June 1 (P)—Gov. C. A. Robins today proposed that Ada County Prosecutor James W. Blaine ask for a grand jury to investigate the department's purchasing agent, liquor law enforcement and insurance. A letter from the governor to Blaine and a statement from the prosecutor followed a prepared statement by Clarence Saunders, removed last February as a dealer of the liquor law enforcement department.

Truman Seeks Congress' Okay Of Large Fund to Rearm West

WASHINGTON, June 1 (P)—President Truman asked congress today for \$1,222,500,000 to carry forward the work of helping free nations rearm against Russian forces striving to "provoke the whole earth with the mantle of totalitarianism." He requested not only an additional \$100 million to expand the existing arms aid program a second year but also \$1,122,500,000 for a new program to meet "Soviet probes for weak spots" anywhere.

3 More Enter Idaho Races; Total Now 48

BOISE, June 1 (P)—Three more candidates entered the crowded Idaho political picture today, boosting to 49 the total number of announced candidates for the Aug. 8 primary. Newest hats soaring into the ring are those of State Sen. Harry Wall, Lewiston, for the Democratic nomination for first district congress; Seth F. Harger, Idaho liquor dispensary owner, for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, and Frank Langley, Boise attorney, for the Democratic nomination for state senator.

Three Persons Burned as Truck Loaded With Gasoline Explodes

PAUL, June 1—One person was burned seriously and three others received minor burns or shock when a gasoline truck making a delivery exploded at 3 p.m. Wednesday, skyrocketing the tank 100 feet in the air and spewing 300 gallons of gasoline over the buildings and equipment at the Art Hansen farm two and one-half miles southeast of here. Hansen, who was standing next to the truck when it exploded, was showered with burning gas. He was rolled in quilts and blankets to extinguish the flames and rushed to the Rupert general hospital. His physician reported he sustained second- and third-degree burns on his back and arms, but was in "rather serious" condition. Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Hansen, his parents, ran to the scene from their home a short distance away when they heard the explosion. They received minor burns from sparks thrown from the flaming blimp. Judge to Appoint Lawyer for Old Ex-Police Judge Held on Morals Count at Jerome

JEROME, June 1—Richard C. Vickers, a former police judge and a former police desk sergeant, is being held in the Jerome county jail in lieu of \$500 bond on a felony charge of committing lewd and lascivious acts upon two minor boys. He appeared yesterday before Probate Judge William B. Comstock to have the bond set over to district court. Vickers waived a preliminary hearing, acting as his own attorney. The complaint was brought by police Chief Fred Abrams and Sheriff Pat Burns. Their week of work over the weekend was disrupted by the arrest of Vickers Saturday. The officers said Vickers' actions in connection with a number of school-age boys came under their attention a short time ago following a complaint by the father of one of the boys. Abrams and Sheriff Burns said correspondence with California officers revealed Vickers had been in a state institution. They stated Vickers maintained he entered the institution voluntarily. The officer then said the investigation is continuing. Vickers was police desk sergeant until June 1, 1949 to March 1, and police judge for a month after that. More recently he was employed as a bookkeeper in a nearby town.

Appropriated For City's Use

Twin Falls city appropriations of \$1,222,500 for the 1950-51 fiscal year were approved in the annual appropriation ordinance passed by the board of commissioners at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday in the city hall. The commissioners also held an open meeting on the annual 20-mill tax levy for the general fund. No one appeared to protest or ask questions about the levy. The 20-mill tax will bring \$180,000.

President Opens Pay Tax Files to Gambler Probes

WASHINGTON, June 1 (P)—President Truman today promised to open the confidential federal income tax files of gamblers and racketeers being ferreted out by senate crime investigators. Sen. Estes Kefauver, D. Tenn., chairman of the senate investigating committee, said after a White House call the President gave his committee "a full go-ahead, with full access to the confidential files in the crime investigation. It requires an executive order by the President to open tax files to the investigators. Kefauver said the executive order is in the works now." Kefauver said Mr. Truman made no reservations whatever in his promise of assistance for the committee. He said the President also promised the cooperation of any government employe in the probe.

34,151 Tallied as Boise Population in 1950's Census

BOISE, June 1 (P)—Boise's preliminary census count shows a population of 34,151, Dewey Ross, district census supervisor, said today. Ross said this figure was the official preliminary announcement, subject to a final official figure from the director of the census in Washington. He added the preliminary figure was "substantially correct" and subject to a margin of error of less than one-tenth of one per cent. Ross estimated an additional 20,000 persons lived in the area immediately adjacent to Boise and that the total for the Greater Boise area would be about 55,000.

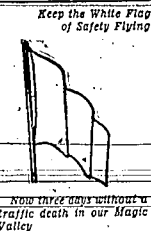

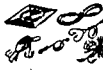

Cost of Cold War - Can we afford the cold war? A lot of people say we can't, that the Marshall plan, heavy defense outlays, help to the far east and point four aid to backward lands are just too much for us to handle.

Paul Hoffman, head of the economic cooperation administration, has a different answer. He says we can't afford NOT to fight the cold war.

In a recent Washington speech packed with cold sense, Hoffman laid the issue out plainly. As they emerge from his comment, the choices before us are these: To knuckle under to Russia, to reach a fair agreement with her, to continue the cold war or to undertake a shooting war.

And Hoffman seems to share the widespread official pessimism in America over chances of a sound agreement with the Kremlin. He stresses that Russia decided to fight the cold war even while World War II still raged and she was our comrade in arms.

What are people talking about when they say we can't afford this \$15,000,000,000, this \$20,000,000,000?" he asks.

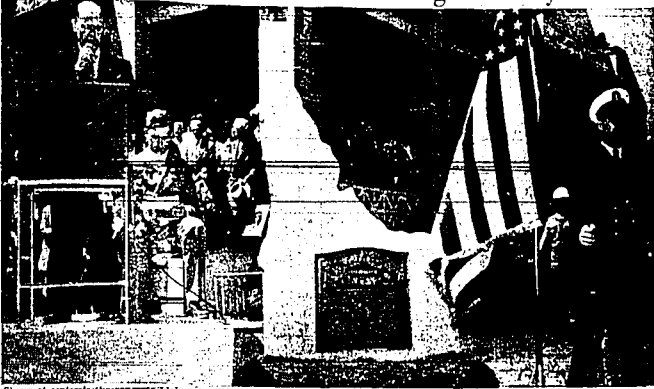

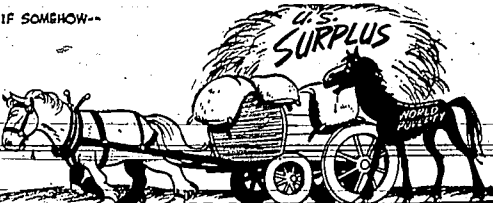

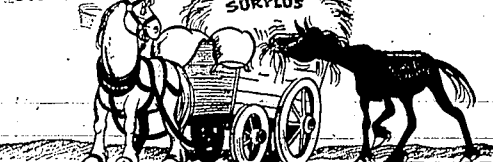

\$270,000,000 Still Remains In NSLI Till

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—Just \$270,000,000 remains to be paid in national service life insurance benefit money to veterans and survivors of the first "special dividend" retroactive.

That's not much when compared to the \$2,337,618,649 already paid. But it may take about as long to get rid of all of the last \$270,000,000 as it did to distribute the billions already disbursed, because almost all of it involves the veterans administration claim procedure, most of which must be processed by hand.

Sample Cases
A "problem case" could involve almost anything, but here are a few major samples:
1. Suppose a veteran had three or four different serial numbers. The last three digits of a serial number determine how quickly each veteran gets his dividend—the lower the digit the quicker the payment.
But a veteran who had more than one number might easily have had more than one policy. Working up the policies with the numbers, so the veteran gets full payment, could cost a fortune.

2. Suppose a veteran applied for his dividend in 1945, but never left the VA where to send it. That has happened and it means the VA must track him down, get an address for him.
3. Suppose a veteran died at a time when his name was a "lapsed" . . . that is, he had stopped paying premiums on his policy.

State Laws Delay
If he left a will, then the dividend goes to his heir or heirs. But if he died without a will, the person or persons acting as the dividend must be picked from all his relatives according to state law. Each state has its own law on what happens to estates of persons who die intestate.

All dividend checks are mailed from VA district offices and the VA central office in Washington has no faster to show how far the job has progressed.
But veterans themselves, here is the latest tally:
Checks have failed to be just over \$4,000—over \$200,000—over \$1,000 a day are going out now.

Last January when the paying job started, this was more than \$1,000,000 a week and the work was done by special punch-card machines.

Ignore Poisoning Petitions, Pleads Bonneville Group

IDAHO FALLS, June 1 (AP)—The Bonneville Sportmen's association today urged Idahoans to refuse to sign a petition calling for an animal poisoning act.

Eddie Pedersen, president of the Bonneville group, made the appeal to 1000 voters following circulation of a petition by the Idaho Outdoor association, Boise, to abolish the act.

The petition was mailed in east Idaho by Dave Drasil, secretary of the outdoor association.
The Bonneville Sportmen's association can "definitely point to many splendid results of the predator control program which has benefited sportsmen and others."

He listed a marked increase in sage grouse and antelope and a "broad benefit to sheep men. Loss of sheep to coyotes are practically negligible as a result of the poisoning program. Predator control."

He declared the cost of removing one coyote from the state by poisoning is approximately \$100.

Legislator Gives Highway Data to Jerome Chamber

JEROME, June 1—John Hohorst was the speaker at the Wednesday meeting of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce. Hohorst, state representative of the Jerome county and speaker of the local house, told members why he favored abolishment of highway districts.

He explained that 27 counties in this state have three districts and the other 23 do not and never have had. The new bill would not abolish three districts but would create a more equitable basis for distributing state funds for roads.

Representative Hohorst said the old law districts with poor roads have never had the chance to improve them because the money is apportioned on a basis of car registrations and gasoline tax collection. If there are no cars in the districts, they receive no money for enough funds.
Jerome county has exceptional success with the highway administration but this is not the general rule with some cities and towns added.
The new bill will provide the payment of highway funds collected by the state to be paid out on a road mileage basis, which will regulate the burden.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1 (AP)—Western public health officials were told Wednesday that polio is about as common as chickenpox and the public should know it and stop being fearful.
The Gaylord W. Anderson, Minneapolis, scoffed at public apprehension over medical reports showing there are any more cases. He pointed out that more cases are reported because diagnosis has improved.
"Polio-myelitis is about as common as chickenpox or measles," he said. "You've had it and I've had it, but it's only one in a few cases that becomes serious."
He told the convention of the western branch, American Public Health association, that the "cause of polio under five years are getting popular, but more adult cases are likely."
The federal bureau of Indian affairs' health director suggested the government should try the "cause of polio" formula for improving the health of Indians.

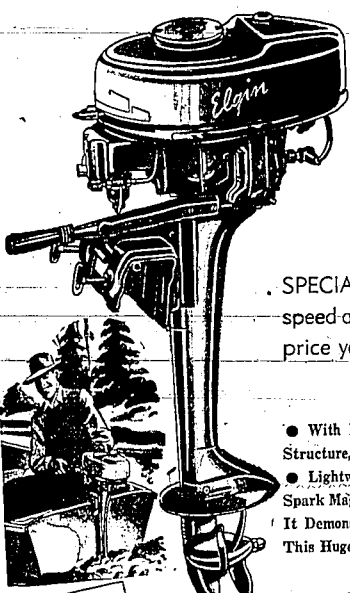

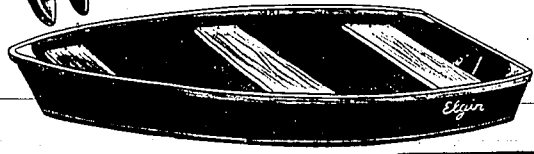

Anglers Await Opening of General Fishing Season

The time Magic Valley fishermen have been waiting for will roll around at 4 a. m. Sunday and will be just an early hour to some it means the opening of the 1950 general trout season for ardent anglers. License sales indicate a record turnout for the season that ends Oct. 31.

Flaheries men of the fish and game department report that pre-season surveys indicate a good carryover of trout through the season. The fishery is not non-complacent, promising exceptionally high water in some areas and normal runoff in light snow sectors.

Two new regulations are in effect this year. Except for the five northernmost counties, fishing hours have been instituted from 4 a. m. to 10 p. m. It is the first time fishing hours have been in effect. Mule Lake, Snake and Falls county are exempt from the hours a day.

The second regulation prohibits shipping of game fish over the line. Fishermen can still take a legal daily limit of seven pounds and one fish over the line.

The regulations apply in effect this year. The state will not fish the southwestern Idaho. Use of artificial lures is also in effect. The regulations are: chumming; use of explosives or transfer of young fish from one stream to another.

The game department had first word of caution. It advised fishermen to check with their local game warden before heading into fishing areas. The areas are reminded of trout from boats and in all lakes is prohibited in that portion of the Salmon river drainage above Bayshore bridge, except Stanley, Big and Little Redfish, Albusa and Pettit lakes.

Experts Note Rise in Meat As 'Seasonal'

CHICAGO, June 1.—Meat prices, following their annual spring custom, are going up. So far pork and lamb still are well below a year ago, but beef is higher. All are substantially above their seasonal low marks of a couple months ago.

Half a dozen reasons appear when meat and livestock experts state explaining the current rise:

1. There is a seasonal decline in supplies.
2. Producers are developing earlier marketing practices.
3. A late spring is maintaining consumer appetites for meat longer than usual.
4. Factory wage totals are rising, reaching a new high mark for April.
5. Hotels, restaurants and summer resorts are stepping up their demands in anticipation of vacations.
6. Prices of corn and oats continue to rise, making it less economical to feed livestock to heavier weights which would yield a greater tonnage of meat.

Ousted Mine Leader Back At His Work

CANTON, Ill. June 1 (AP)—Lloyd Eldred, who was ousted from his coal mine job, filed and quit as president of a United Mine Workers local when he tried to lead his men back to work during last winter's coal strike, was back to work today.

Eldred reported for work at the United Electric company, where he had heart mine lead here when he was ousted for his part in the strike. He resumed his old job as a \$21.90 a day shop steward at the strip mine.

It was the end of a 12-week forced layoff for Eldred. He had been fined \$50,000 by his union, ousted from his job as local 745 president, and laid off at the mine March 7. The fine was lifted last week, however, and Mine Superintendent Campbell said he could go back to work whenever he wished.

Eldred's difficulties with the UMW began last winter when he tried to lead striking UMW miners back to work.

When union took action against him, he charged that union President John H. Lewis used a system of "black lists" to keep men away from the pits, while publicly outright order telling them to get back to work whenever he wished.

Filed Charges
Eldred filed union labor practices charges against the union with the national labor relations board. A congressional subcommittee also has conducted an inquiry into the charges.

When notified last week-end he could return to work, Eldred said he had not done so until the NLRB completed its hearings in the case. He said he had changed his mind after talking with several conversations with NLRB officials.

Three brothers, Dean, Max and Harold Hansen, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Heber L. Hansen, Twin Falls, will be graduated from Stanford from Brigham Young university, Provo, Utah.

Following graduation Max will work for a master of oil and gas at BYU, Dean will work in California and Harold will go to work for the federal government.

Mr. and Mrs. Hansen and two other sons will leave Saturday to attend graduation exercises.

Hearing Slated on Grading of Beef

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The agriculture department will hold a public hearing at Chicago June 29 on its proposal to revise federal beef grading standards.

The principal changes relate to grading of steer, heifer and cow beef. They include:

- 1. Combination of existing prime and choice grades into one grade designated as prime.
- 2. Renaming the present good grade standard.
- 3. Division of the present commercial grade into two grades. One of these would be called good and would cover beef from high quality cattle that have not reached full maturity. The other would continue to be called commercial.

Council Opposes Hospital Action

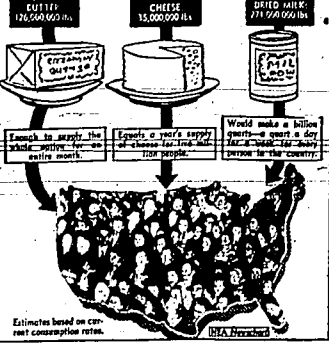

SALT LAKE CITY, June 1 (AP)—Indians from reservations in three states agreed Tuesday to institute action against the federal government for recovery of the value of 55,000,000 acres of land taken from them 80 years ago.

The Indians, 35 in number, conferred here with attorneys and Indian claims experts. Their claim will be filed, spokesmen said, on loss of Shoshone nation lands under treaties negotiated between the tribes and territorial governors. The lands lie in what is now northern Utah, southern Idaho and Nevada. The matter will be placed before the Indian claims commission in Washington, John S. Boyden, Salt Lake City, attorney, said.

Also meeting with the Indians were Ernest L. Wilkinson, Washington, and Orville Wilson, Elko, Nev.

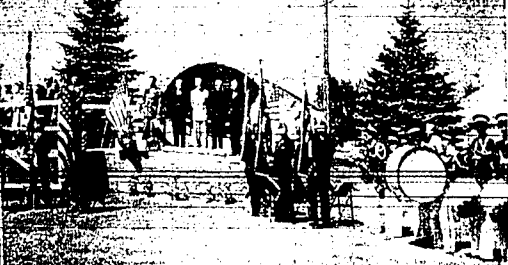

College President Cites Need of Vigil to Retain Democracy

BURLEY, June 1.—"There comes a time in the history of every nation when it must prove itself, and the time for America is now," R. H. Snyder, president of Southern Idaho College of Education, Allston, told a large crowd which gathered Memorial day for the annual observance at the Burley cemetery.

President Snyder, speaking on "Making Democracy Work," told his listeners "we are now living in a period of uncertainty and confusion and we need the same courage to make our democracy work that the fighting forces need on the battlefield."

"Today there are only two powerful nations in the world, while in 1914 there were nine nations recognized as powerful. In every case, those which have fallen since 1914 failed to make their government work, and that could happen here."

"Democracy is more than a way of life," President Snyder said. "It is a courageous spirit, a great moral movement that brings out the courage in people. The three dangers facing our country today are complacency, confused thinking, and failure to assume our responsibility as citizens."

During the periods of prosperity, there is too much complacency, Snyder said. Democracy does not work automatically, but must be preserved through constant vigilance. As for confused thinking, he did not know where we are going, he said, and there are too few willing to take responsibility in affairs of today.

"We must work as democracy, give our best, and train our youth intelligently," the speaker said, and he enumerated the factors which have made America great as our abundant resources, our intelligent stock, and the spiritual elements we possess.

William Robert presided at the service, and the Rev. Martin Crab, Presbyterian minister, gave the opening prayer. Mayor Joe Peters paid tribute to the living and the dead soldiers in his address of welcome, in which he traced the history of Memorial day from 1868, when it was first observed.

Following President Snyder's address, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, with Carrie Hilling as commander,

conducted their Memorial day ritual. Mac Martin read the names of 73 veterans who are buried in the Burley cemetery, and as each name was read members of the Cassia chapter of American War Mothers, Gold Star Mothers and VFW auxiliaries placed flowers in their memory. Also remembered were three Gold Star Mothers, who were buried in the Burley cemetery.

A firing squad from Burley national guard company, commanded by Capt. Norman D. Smith, gave the salute, after which Billy Newman played " taps." An ensemble, made up on Don Smith, Jerry Boveck, Gene Cottrin, drummers; LaVerne Siles and Helen Gochanour, flutes, and Billy Newman, trumpet, played "The Star Spangled Banner" and the Rev. Father Francis O'Driscoll, of the Little Flower Catholic church, gave the benediction.

William H. Thompson, chairman, led a committee of Legionnaires in placing flowers on the graves of all soldiers, and the Legion auxiliary, headed by Mrs. Kenneth Barry, placed poppies on the graves of the soldiers.

The memorial day program was arranged by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and the American Legion, assisted by the American War Mothers, Gold Star Mothers and VFW auxiliary. Participation paraded from the northeast corner of the cemetery to the bandshell, where services were conducted.

National spacemen assisted in directing traffic through the cemetery, and also directed car parking.

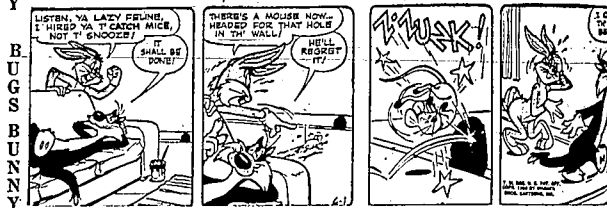
