Mr Arthur Rule Cuts Top Reds

TOKYO, June 6 (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur outlawed Japan's 24 top communists today. A few hours later Communist party headquarters began burning its secret documents.

MacArthur's directive permitted the Communist party to continue functioning but outlawed the 24 members of its central committee from any further party propaganda or public activity.

Others Warned

The directive was invoked against the committee under the occupation law barring a revival of Japanese militarism. Japanese officials said the Communist party continued agitation also would be purged.

Japanese and American quarters said the move probably would lead to outlawing the entire Communist party in Japan. The Communists apparently felt the same way. They piled newspapers in the compound behind party headquarters, alerted them to the purging and set there only a few hours after MacArthur's action was announced.

Five Solved

Among those purged were seven members of the central committee, including six in the house of representatives and one elected member of the House of Councilors.

MacArthur's order, contained in a letter to Prime Minister Yoshida, does not outlaw the Communist party as such. The party can continue to exist but must carry on as a legal political organization.

Brig. Gen. Courtney Whitney, one of MacArthur's chief aides, said the list of purged communists could include as a study group and could study anything they pleased so long as they do not take any further action.

They were banned from all public relations work and from all party directives, which prohibits public relations and ultra-nationalists from setting up public disorder and agitation.

22 Missing, 37 Rescued, 5 in Downed in Plunge

MIAMI, Fla., June 6 (UP)—Thirty-seven men who survived a charter plane crash into the sea last night were rescued by the U. S. Navy today and five of the 22 missing men were found floating dead near the rescue scene.

A merchant ship reported sighting five bodies a few hours after the destroyer Sauley plucked the 37 survivors from the sea this morning, messaged coast guard rescue control here that it had found the bodies and was standing by to await the Sauley.

Hope for the 22 men still missing was fading. They were believed to be dead or drifting helplessly in jackets, close to death.

Rescue Crew Continued

After 48 hours rescue operations continued under order to cease at midnight tomorrow if further search proves fruitless.

A coast guard cutter was sent to relieve the Sauley which picked up the survivors and a coast guard plane spotted them at dawn.

The rescue included Capt. Joe E. Bowers, 42, and two other crew members and 36 of the 41 Puerto Rican charter bus and driver who were on the plane on Saturday.

The plane had left Miami for a flight from San Juan, Puerto Rico, to New York.

Rescue Message

The rescue message from the plane, received at 11:30 p. m. June 5, said the plane had "run out of fuel." Continuing coordinated search for the plane was ordered on June 5.

Survivors picked up in the morning by the Sauley were taken to the Coast Guard cutter, which was dispatched last night, Puerto Rico, to New York.

The pilot's belief that the missing passengers had life jackets aboard the plane was confirmed.

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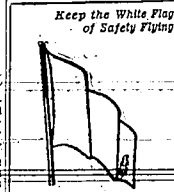

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Procedure on Study Abroad Given by VA

Procedures for veterans who wish to study in foreign countries, were outlined Tuesday by Arthur Helwege, Magic Valley veterans administration center representative.

He pointed out that more than 5,000 World War II veterans are studying in 40 foreign countries, nine of them behind the iron curtain. Most of these veterans must leave the country in which they are studying because little classroom work is carried on in other languages.

Before a veteran can get VA approval for study in a foreign country he must first get the approval of the college or university in which he wishes to study, he said. The best procedure is to correspond well in advance with the foreign university, outlining educational background and familiarity with the language. Only after the school has accepted the veteran should application be made to the VA, Helwege said.
