### Council Okays Agreement for Water Studies

An agreement for a survey of the Twin Falls water system and a contract to rent a street roller were approved by the city council in a brief session Monday night.

The commissioners entered a contract with Burns and McDonald engineering-contractors to make a complete survey of the present water supply and distribution system in order to determine the need for increasing quantity and quality of city water. They will consider also the possibility of digging wells to supplement the present supply.

Will Submit Analysis  
The engineers will complete their survey in from 30 to 50 days and submit a detailed analysis of improvements needed and what they will cost. The contract calls for a maximum price of \$1500 for the survey, Arnold E. Cross, street and public improvement commissioner, pointed out the company offered to do the survey last year. The contract was tabled. The survey will start within two weeks, according to the contract.

The city rented a five-ton street roller from the Burns and McDonald contract for \$400. The city also will pay freight charges on the power driven roller and accept all responsibility for it.

H. Ballenger, street department superintendent, told commissioners the machine weighs five tons and the rollers are filled with water to weight it eight tons. The machine has dual controls on each side of either side of the steering.

The board of commissioners discussed arranging a program for the first night of the city's fireworks, June 21, in conjunction with the first use of new street lights along Main street and the Shoshone street. The commissioners decided to turn the arrangement over to the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce or similar organization, boosting the stampede.

The ordinance permitting land owners to construct lateral sewers at their own expense was read for the second time.

Nineteen building permit applications and other license applications were approved.

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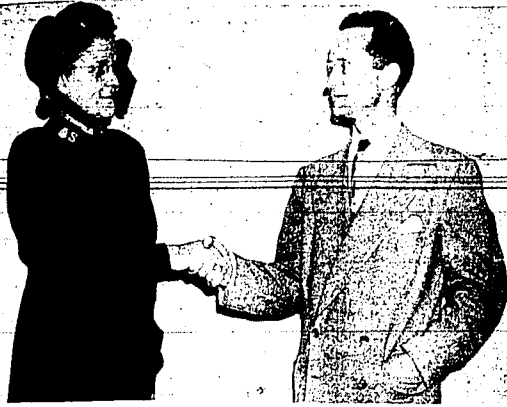

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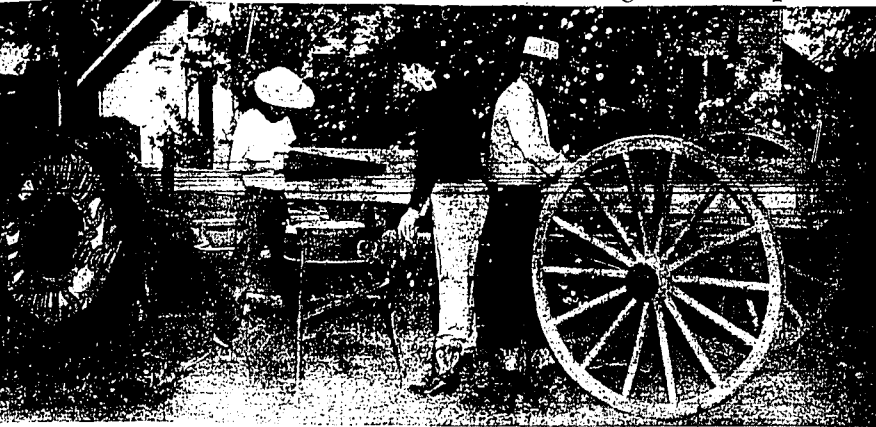

### C. of C. Aims Road, Floods, Fire District

CAREY, June 13—The June meeting of the Carey Chamber of Commerce was held Thursday evening, with several important business matters being brought before the group for consideration.

The chamber went on record as favoring recommendations by the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce to the Idaho Falls Board of Public Works through which the Jackson route Idaho Falls, Carey, and Gooding highway passes, until to have this highway recognized as U. S. highway.

It was pointed out that a highway recognized as a U. S. highway receives routing through travel agencies and other information stations and this increase results in better up-to-date and brings business to the towns served.

**Flood Control Made.**  
Another motion was made and passed to form a committee on flood control. Letters exchanged between many engineers, congressmen and local residents were read and it was agreed that follow-up measures on flood control are imperative at this time. Recent flood disasters are a matter of considerable concern.

The committee is headed by Harold Ellsworth, chairman, and includes Oris Durfee and Allen Pyrah. These men will advise those whose properties have been inundated by flood waters—to write the appropriate sources of their particular losses and efforts.

**Fire Control Sought.**  
The group also went on record as favoring an organized fire control through contacting the county and D. E. Adamson, who has explained the advantages of such a district and outlined procedure of putting the plan into effect.

It was stated to purchase fire equipment could be obtained by leaving not to exceed eight miles in a district per \$100 valuation. The district, to be feasible, would cover six to eight miles from a central point and be designed not only to put out fires but to control their spread to other buildings.

**Advantage Cited.**  
Adamson also pointed out that fire insurance rates automatically would be decreased following the organization of a district.

The chamber again will attempt to interest the townspeople in incorporation plans. A motion to incorporate was defeated last fall. Millard Meznar has been appointed chairman of a committee to investigate residents who will be in the proposed incorporated area. Assisting him as committee members are Leonard Howard and Howard Getz.

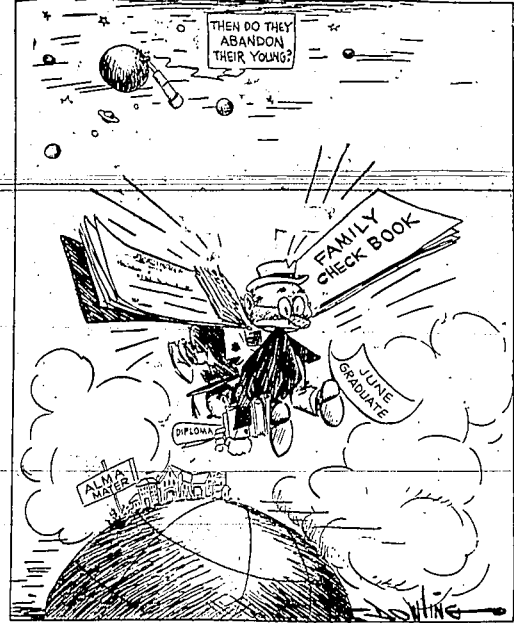

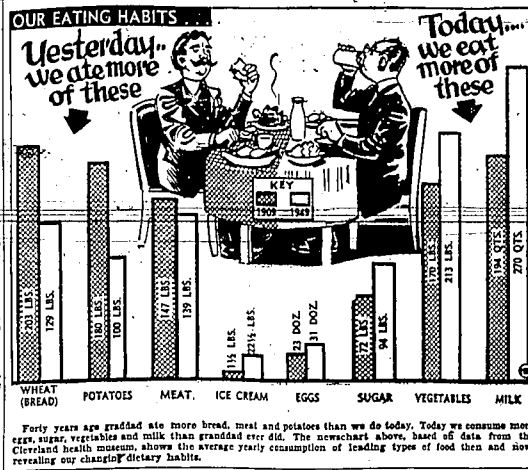

**USAF Begins Full Tests for New Fighters**

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The air force begins extensive tests this week on buzz-bomb jet "penetration" fighters to determine the best one for attacking deep in enemy territory. The planes are the McDonnell XP-88, the Lockheed XP-90 and the North American XP-55A, a modification of the "Sabre" which holds a "burst" speed record of 570 miles per hour. All three planes, larger than present jet fighters, have swept-back wings and speeds close to that of sound. Designed speeds are secret, but have been estimated from between one hour to more than 700 miles an hour, depending upon altitude. The XP-88 and XP-90 are about the size of twin-engine transports. Each has two J-34 turbojet engines and a takeoff weight of 20,000 pounds. The XP-55A is larger and more powerful than its predecessor, the all-purpose Sabre.

PAUL, June 11—Evan Elliott, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Elliott, has the unusual project of raising baby pheasants. He accepted 125 chicks from the state fish and game department, two weeks ago. So far he has had good luck, losing only four. Department officials told him the normal fatality is 40 per cent. Although the little fellows are only two weeks old, they have started flying, and Elliott is covering the top of their pen in the department's new program, children signing up for the project. He has raised 112 baby pheasants—50 are 2-1/2 to 3-1/2 weeks old. The child furnishes the feed. The first food given the young birds is turkey starter mash.
