Labor Leaders Hold Discussion at Doctors' Meeting

Leaders Answer Queries Doctors in Forum Meeting

Wendell H. Hubinger, president of the Southern Idaho labor union, and five Twin Falls labor leaders who discussed problems and policies with 30 Magic Valley doctors Tuesday at a forum meeting here.

Hubinger, George Crowder, president of the local union, and five labor leaders answered queries of the doctors in a forum meeting Tuesday at length and brought definite results from the speakers. It was their opinion that labor definitely is against importing the type of government which now exists in England. They also felt socialism would bring about the complete destruction of unions.

Although unions now definitely do not want to enter politics as a group, they might if the government should try to destroy unions, one of the speakers added.

Bringing the discussion down to the local level, the doctors were concerned—whether—unions—shops—difficultly appropriate. They were assured that unions, in cooperation with employers, have an adequate apprenticeship program which provides on-the-job training and classroom instruction.

The speakers pointed out that the program is important in providing skilled workers and that the unions are interested in providing on-the-job training and classroom instruction.

When asked if set wage scales destroyed incentive, one of the speakers reminded the group that union scales are the minimum pay

and highly productive workers can get additional bonus pay.

The projects include: Mountain Home, Ida.—\$3,200 for water facilities costing \$77,100, and \$1,800 for sewage facilities costing \$44,200.

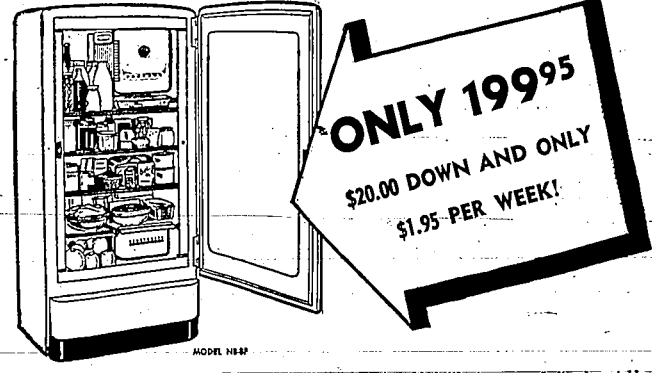

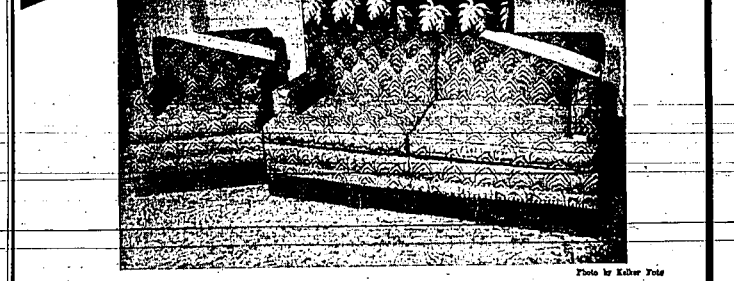

Acheson Cites Need For West Defense Union

DALLAS, Tex., June 14 (AP)—Peace-loving democrats would keep their military, economic and political ties with the world war is to be averted, Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today in a speech on U. S. foreign policy. Acheson said last night war could come if the communists spread their vigil. But he said dropping an atomic bomb on a major city as a preventive measure was "unthinkable."

Acheson said Russia has set up a military machine far beyond the reasonable requirements of defense and is using it to frighten weak nations into siding with the communist bandwagon.

The Soviets are using their armed strength as a "poisoned bludgeon to intimidate the weak, and it does constitute a very real and growing danger to the Soviet leaders . . . they will be tempted to make use of military force as an instrument of their policy," he said.

Acheson's speech, sponsored by the Dallas Civic Federation and the BWU community union, was made before a swelling audience of about 2,500 persons at the McFarlin auditorium on the campus of Southern Methodist University.

Acheson was guardedly optimistic. "War is not inevitable," he said, "but the responsibility lies with us of solving our problems without resort to war and to exhaust every possibility that effort. That is what we intend to do."

Crop Growth Retarded by Dry Weather

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—Dry, cool weather during most of May retarded Idaho crop growth, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.

While plant growth was held back, few crops suffered serious damage from the low temperatures and drying winds that prevailed during much of the month. Hints since June have been heard of a milder, beneficent lull in the state.

The department forecast a wheat crop of 125,000 bushels of winter wheat and 162,000 bushels of spring wheat. A crop this size would be one-fifth smaller than last year's record production.

The indicated production of 7,800,000 bushels in north Idaho would be nine per cent smaller than average, but the south Idaho crop is indicated to be 28,000,000 bushels, which would be the fourth largest on record.

The department said soft fruits will be in short supply due to freeze damage and poor conditions at pollinating time. Hay condition is below average. May production of both milk and eggs was above last year's output.

100 Per Cent Buying Power Gain Forecast

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The committee for economic development (CED) said today prospects are good for a doubling of the real income, or buying power, of the average American worker in the next 50 years.

To do so, the businessmen's planning organization said, there must be found to keep production per man-hour up at the same level.

The CED offered a formula for boosting real wages to \$250 an hour in 1950, in terms of 1949 prices, as against the average workers' \$123 today and the average of 43 cents 50 years ago.

Stabilize Growth
Stabilizing industrial growth to avoid blighting recessions, increasing imports, and reforming the tax system to encourage risk-taking investment were among the recommended measures.

Success in raising real wages is in the main a matter of increasing output per man-hour, said the statement prepared by CED's research and policy committee and issued by the CED chairman, Martin B. Folsom, treasurer and director of the Eastman Kodak company.

"It is also a matter of keeping people steadily at work."
The three-fold increase in the buying power of the average worker has been built up in gains in productivity of two and one-half per cent a year. The output per man-hour has risen from 50 cents to about \$123, in dollars of 1949 buying power, the statement said.

"Future advances will not be rapid," CED said, "unless we have many important scientific discoveries, good management in industry, and wise public policy."
It found that the outlook for "rapid technological progress is good" in view of a "rapid increase in industrial research in the last decade."

Liberty Bell Replica Scheduled
 The Liberty Bell replica is being constructed at the site of the old bell in Twin Falls, Idaho. The replica is being constructed by the Glenns Ferry LDS church. The site is 120 by 200 feet and is located at Elmore avenue and highway 30 four blocks west of the center of town. The construction engineer, Luther Price, says: "We will use as much labor as possible from local members. Funds of the value of donated labor are matched with cash for the church. The church and the ward each will contribute 50 per cent of the total cost." The former church, a brick structure about 30 by 40 feet in size partially was destroyed by fire in November, 1943. Because of its poor location and the type of building, its repair was deemed inadvisable. At that time, arrangements were made for the use of St. Bridget's hall for a meeting place until a new church could be built. In 1947 when Bishop J. L. Jones moved to the Boise area, the ward was reorganized, with Arthur Carl Anderson as bishop, L. Wayne Jones as "first" counselor and Howard J. Brumble as second counselor. Frank Redford is chairman of the building committee which includes Mrs. Redford, Mr. and Mrs. Volmer Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Parley Harmon, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Owens, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Ingelbreton and Mr. and Mrs. Orval Thurman. During the past six years many activities have been utilized to raise funds for building the new church, including socials, banquets sponsored by the Relief society, a country store and carnival last January at which \$605 was raised and a program featuring the combined choir of the Boise wards. Expert Warns About Threats Of Dust Bowl

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., June 14.—Soil conservation expert Cyril Laker said he believes a return of the dust bowl conditions of the 1930s is "imminent" and that heavy rains could not prevent it unless farmers take extreme conservation measures.

Laker, regional director for the conservation division of the U. S. department of agriculture, said the present crop which will be harvested in August and September ranges from a "complete failure to barely worth harvesting" in the southern great plains area from Cheyenne county, Colo., down through eastern New Mexico.

"Every effort" needed.

"The return of the dust bowl is imminent," he said, "unless every possible effort is made to get production over the next 100 days. If people are going to suffer."

He pointed out that continued breaking up of soil had for world production since the start of World War I. It has seriously aggravated the soil blowing situation.

Laker estimated that at least 3,000,000 acres of great plains area of the great plains area has been plowed out since 1910, and said "around 60 per cent" of that land is unsuitable for further cultivation.

"Need summer crop."

"If farmers don't plant summer crops now, or as soon as they get any moisture at all," he said, "the dust bowl will be back."

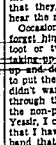
"Even heavy rains won't stop it unless the farmers grab the opportunity. If they don't the rains won't amount to anything at all. It might even make it worse."

Dust storms, he said, have been more severe this year than at any time since 1933. He estimated that 75,000 acres in New Mexico and 450,000 acres in Colorado had moderate to severe damage, and more than 300,000 acres were damaged slightly.

LONDON, England—If my feet had their way about it they'd never come abroad with me.

"They'd stay at home and do what they are accustomed to doing—nothing."



In the United States fewer miles per year than the average American driver covers in his motor car, and he does not know what I'm doing, and then I keep right on walking after that.

There are rewards, of course. During the 300 or more miles I legged it around London yesterday I saw the Tower, Westminster abbey, No. 10 Downing street, a lady with a monkey on a leash with a blue ribbon tied on its tail, every blessed picture in the National Gallery, and 4,000 Americans, all walking about as fast as I was.

Another reward was a case of plain old-fashioned stomach-ache. At this time of year there is scarcely a London corner without its fruit vendor and barrow piled high with cherries, pears, grapes, apples, and strawberries, adding a bright touch of color to the grayness of the city.

To keep up my cobbling strength, so I could keep pounding the pavement, I ate enough fruit to keep a family of crows alive for five years.

But the best reward of my walking came in Green park where I was privileged to hear the world's quietest brass band. There were enough musicians in brilliant scarlet uniforms on the bandstand, wielding a sufficient number of trumpets, trombones, brass horns, drums, etc., to have brought unrest to eardrums five miles distant.

But when I had advanced within 50 paces of the band, and could see that all the members were playing, about all I could hear was the shouting of the conductor as he tried to get his boys to play even softer.

U. S. Denies Butter Props Are too High

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Is the agriculture department supporting butter prices so high that it's violating the law?

The department's reply is "No, definitely not."

There are 145,000,000 pounds of butter—almost a pound for every person in the country—in the government's price support hoard. The average price is about 10-15 cents a pound.

Over 90 Per Cent

The legal question came up when a department bureau reported that the government's butter-buying last month had average farm prices for butterfat at 63 cents a pound or 91 per cent of parity.

The farm law provides that butterfat supports cannot be set higher than 90 per cent of parity or lower than 75 per cent of parity.

But officials who handle the program said there was nothing illegal about last month's operation.

Key Word

They said that "set" is the key word to the legal restriction on maximum and minimum supports. They explained that at the time butterfat supports were "set" at the beginning of the marketing season, they were fixed slightly below 90 per cent of the then prevailing parity price.

If the parity price should decrease during the marketing season the law does not provide for adjusting the support price downward.

Mystery Men Stir Town on Uranium Find

HOUGHTON, Mich., June 14 (AP)—Two mystery prospectors who vanished after locating uranium ore in a remote spot in Michigan, were said to have been seen in a nearby town. The men, who were accompanied by a professional prospector in the area, were said to have started digging for the supposedly rich uranium ore. The men, who were known where to dig, and the two men who started the whole thing simply had disappeared.

Asked for Tests
Frank Goodman, 41, who runs a sporting goods store and newsstand in his town, said the men, clad in well-worn army fatigues, showed up Monday and asked him to test some rock samples with his Geiger counter. He said the prospectors were bringing with them a Geiger counter for each rock. Goodman said, "One of them sort of smiled and dug around in his pocket and came up with a rock about five by four inches, the biggest one he had."

"I thought the counter was going to pop," Goodman said. "The needle fluctuated so much that it looked like one steady light. It just kept on buzzing and flashing without stopping."

He said the rock was "lots more active" than several radioactive samples from Colorado he used to demonstrate the counter.

Not Talking
"I told fellows they really had something," Goodman said. "I asked them where they got the rock, but they told me they just aren't talking. I asked them to wait until I could tell a reporter about them, but they said they didn't want any publicity."

"Then they just turned around and walked out of the station," Goodman said. "Not that I blame them much. I wouldn't want the whole town following me around either."

News of the discovery spread quickly through this town of 5,000 on the northernmost thrust of Michigan's upper peninsula.
