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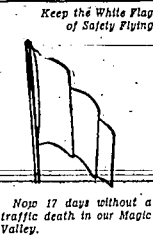
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Area Schools' Gains Viewed In Attendance

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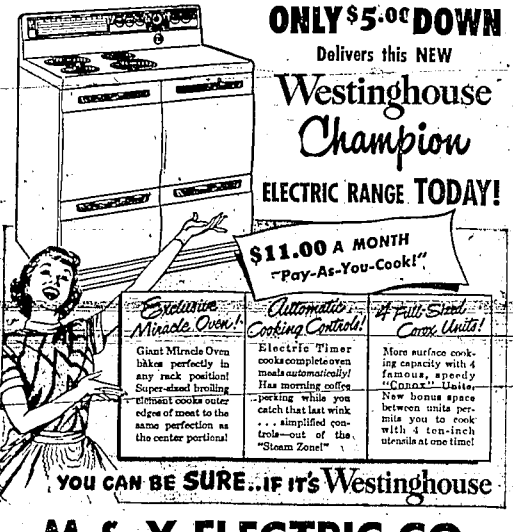

## Widely Traveled Ex-Resident Reports On Present Conditions Around World



On the continent and also spent some time in the British Isles. When called to serve in Greece, they moved through Europe, down through Italy and then shipped over to Greece.

It was but two months ago that young Skiles, being called on a special mission for the state department, left by plane, spending time in Tangier, Morocco; Lisbon, Portugal; the Holy Lands including Israel; Jerusalem; Constantinople, Syria; and Lebanon; Egypt; the newly independent Pakistan, Bombay and Calcutta in India; Bangkok, Siam; Hong Kong, the Philippines and Hawaii.

Skiles claims that, during the rush trip, he was able to fit in a few days of play in Hawaii, where he looks time to look up a few of his old navy acquaintances. Pearl Harbor is a gateway these days, he said.

Politically, Siam is an interesting country. He describes the people as nice, little, happy philosophers, which, unfortunately, makes them susceptible to changing their minds about who their friends are. Even though the people are an Asiatic people, they are very friendly at the moment. If neighboring India and China and Burma should turn, Siam would be hard to hold, Skiles believes.

In the Philippines, too, political stability is somewhat less than an

accomplishment. There are some indications that, if and when Formosa goes over to the City, these conditions, the movement will be stepped up in the Philippine islands, he said.

Continuing, he said:

"One of the most depressing impressions of the trip is the still high degree of tension around the Holy Lands. Working with the United Nations commission set up to handle the refugee problem there, our people are trying to get the displaced from what is now Tarshi Amnia into productive activity.

"It is difficult mainly because the Arab governments think anything they would imply an acceptance or recognition of the permanence of the displacement, which they refuse to do."

The Arabs believe they belong in Israel and are going back there, Skiles said. The Arabs think we are partly responsible through our back-

ing the Israelis, and hence we are not very popular there. The legation in Damascus was bombed the night Skiles and other officials arrived, an indication of nothing except the intensity of the feeling of some of the dissident groups, he related.

"Egypt is conducting a heavy anti-U. S. peace campaign, largely the result of recent uncomplimentary U. S. magazine articles on King Farouk. The press there is not entirely free, and it seems impossible to convince them that our press is completely different, that our government has nothing to say about what a magazine prints."

Skiles found many places extremely interesting, because they represented many different worlds. The Arab world and Hindu world were completely different and interesting.

Hong Kong, Skiles said, is quite a mixture of the Chinese and Continental British influence.

Skiles in Lebanon, is like a little bit of Mediterranean France in the midst of the Arab world, and Tangier, in Internationalized Morocco (the "government" is headed by an international committee of nine) is the most international of all.

It is the only place in the world where we still extend extraterritorial privileges, for example, Americans are tried by our U. S. consular courts rather than by native courts.

Camel's provided one of the modes of travel in the far east, and Skiles found them interesting and uncomfortable to ride and strong not only in strength but odor. The pyramids and Sphinx were interesting, but Skiles said that while Egypt is picturesque and unusual, it is a little piece for the Egyptians and not the native inhabitants.

Most of the countries visited during the trip are quite backward, Skiles believes, but are interested in becoming modernized. All a little bit of Mediterranean France in the technical assistance program when it gets going. It is the problem of working relationships of this prospective program with the government and other U. S. activities that Skiles has been concerned with. The program and operations are under the state department supervision.

Coming back to the United States after visiting so many "out-of-the-way places" was a pleasant experience, Skiles said. This problem of getting clean food was almost always present during the trip, and the return home brought regular meals, clean beds and most of all the feeling of being "free" which Americans enjoy and so few other people in the world know.

Skiles returned last fall from spending three years in Europe, first serving in a department, which helped distribute Marshall plan materials in Germany and later filling a similar position in Greece.

**NEW YORK** (AP)—Shirley May France, 31, is leaving tomorrow for a return bout with the English channel under the sponsorship of the N.Y.A.C. And this year, I hope to win.

I swam more than the channel distance last year on that day that they pulled me from the water. That's right. The channel is only 21 miles wide. But I swam about 30 miles.

The day I swam was one of the worst days any swimmer ever had for a channel attempt. The waves were heavy and the tides were strong. I kept being pushed forward and off course, instead of going forward. So, by the time they hauled me out, I had gone 30 miles.

I think I'm physically better able to make it this year. When I went into the water last year, I was about 135. Now I weigh 174. I'm 5 feet, 8 1/2 inches tall, in case you're curious.

That extra poundage will help me against the cold, which is the worst thing about the channel. When I was out last year, my hands were so frozen that a couldn't open them for an hour. As for the cold, I had a fever of 101.5. I was blue from the cold. That was because the waves had washed off the protective coating of grease.

Another reason for my confidence is that I've been swimming all winter. I was out with a sports shoe, giving demonstrations. I think the constant practice was a big help.

I'd like to be able to build a ranch-style house. My mother and I know a beautiful lot we've had our eye on for a long time, just right for a ranch house, too.

And, after that, I want to go on to teach physical education. That's always been my ambition. I finished one term of my junior year at Southern high before I left to join the sports show.

Next year, I'll be able to finish my junior subjects at the same time. I'll have to work a little harder, but I don't mind. I'll be all set to go on to physical education school in the fall of 1951. I've got it all figured out. I hope, eventually, to teach physical education, particularly swimming. I should be, I think every child should be taught to swim.

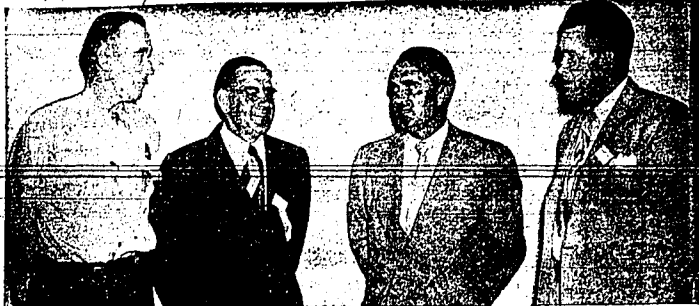

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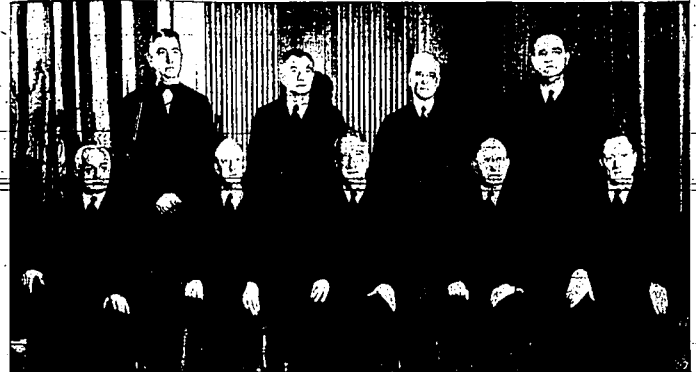

**FILER**, June 15.—Positive legislation to help solve the problem of crop surpluses through chermurgic farming was urged by Everett S. Koke, Twin Falls chermurgic farmer, at a meeting of the Filer Kiwanis club Tuesday.

"It's up to all of us to get out and do something about the surplus problem," he told the group. "We should fight for legislation for more money for research and less for subsidies."

Koke explained his solution to the surplus problem at the meeting and in informal discussion after the meeting. He said he sees no reason why his chermurgic farming idea cannot help the economy.

"The potato problem alone would be very easy," he explained. "Chemurgically useful crops could easily replace the potatoes on many acreages which now produce surpluses."

He pointed out that the federal government spent huge sums on potato subsidies without indicating a solution to the surplus of potatoes. But only \$25,000 was spent on research in new crop fields and the appropriation is even less this year, he added.

The field scientific research can help solve the surplus problem both through finding chermurgic uses for present crops and finding chemurgically useful new crops. "All crops have chemurgic values," he explained, "and it only remains for science to investigate these crops.

performs scents and medicinal compounds.

He pointed out that there are thousands of plants he has not experimented with and many of them could be put to industrial use if science could help find the proper uses.

Koke explained that chermurgic farms can be started with little capital and traced his own projects as an example. He pointed out that, although small individually, a large number of these chermurgic farms could affect the national economy to the point of reducing surpluses.

He added that he is not like other chermurgic processors in Magic Valley and explained that the Twin Falls starch plant, making starch

### Leases Called On Phosphate Land in State

WASHINGTON, June 15 (Special)—More than 3,000 acres in the Montpelier area will be made available for phosphate leasing next month by the bureau of land management, the interior department has announced.

The sale will be held July 19 in the office of the director of the bureau—where a minimum bid of 50¢ per acre will be accepted.

Leases will be leased to qualified bidders of the highest cash amount an acre or fraction thereof as a bonus for the privilege of leasing under the phosphate provisions of the mineral leasing act, the bureau announcement stated.

The lease contracts set forth the following terms:

1. Minimum annual production of 6,000 tons per leased tract.
2. A capital expenditure of not less than \$20,000 for the smallest tracts. Some larger ones run up to \$50,000.
3. A royalty of 5 per cent of the gross value of the output of phosphate and associated products at the point of shipment. The royalty shall not be less than 25 cents a ton for strip mined or open pit ore and not less than 15 cents for rock extracted by underground mining.

### 'Electric Hoe' May Be Boon To Beet Men

PASADENA, Calif., June 15 (CUP)—A hoe with a brain was the latest labor-saving device offered to farmers today.

David Packard, Palo Alto, former Stanford football player, told the annual convention of the American Institution of Electrical Engineers of a robot hoe that thins out plants and weeds as fast as 20 agricultural laborers.

The electronic device, he said, worked successfully in thinning sugar-beet plants, and plans are underway to try the machine in cotton fields.

An electric "eye" operated by light reflections from leaves of plants and weeds, is adjusted so that it selects for chopping off plants at certain intervals or blades which are out of alignment in the row, Packard explained.

"One machine will cost less than \$5.00 and it should pay for itself in one season," Packard said, revealing that a new concern has been organized to manufacture it.

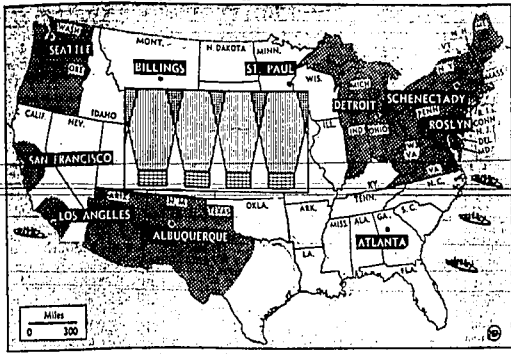

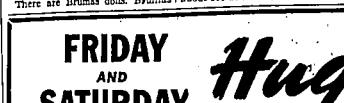
