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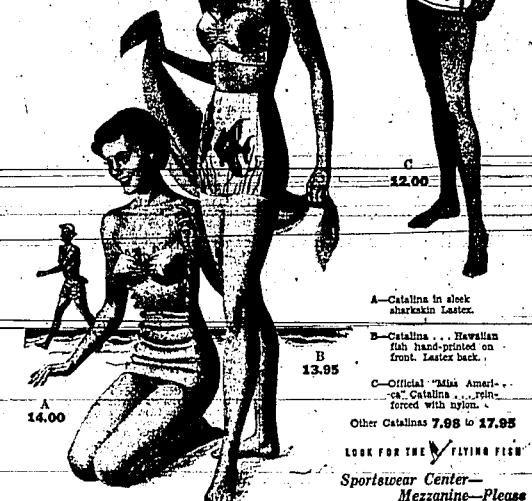

Watering Sandy Soils Subject Of Special Show

GOODING, June 11—Superintendents of the North and Wood River Soil Conservation Districts will conduct a special show on the conservation service and the soil conservation service are cooperating to hold an irrigation demonstration June 27 on sandy soil in the Wendell area. Time and place will be announced later.

Boyd Pries, soil conservationist with the local office, stated two experts will make the demonstration. They are WATNE FRIDGEN, irrigation specialist, and R. O. Peterson, irrigation district superintendent. To be demonstrated are principles of good application of irrigation water. Various water holding capacity and equipment will be shown in ditches and corrugations. Water requirements and water holding capacity of sandy soils will be measured. Furrow systems of different sizes will be set to show the largest non-erosive stream possible.

The length of run, water penetration and the time the water needs to be left on the field will be determined for the particular field. Cross-sections of the irrigated furrow will be dug out to show the pattern of soil.

Today persons who are a little too late, he and many others who were inclined to minimize all the suspicions about Russia, are trying to make amends for their short-sightedness.

How much more must we learn about Russia's under-hand activities to convince us that we have no place for communism in this country?

What more will it take for us to realize that this is the most serious threat which we must face realistically?

How much longer will we permit ourselves to be misled by those political opportunists who would close their eyes to what's actually going on under our noses?

In the forthcoming elections, the people of this country should regard communism as one of the main issues. Any candidate who shows the slightest indication of being in sympathy with compromise with communism should be rejected absolutely.

It's all too serious a matter for this country to be taking any more chances.

Structure and roof of the new hospital building were completed Saturday and brickwork on the building was laid up to the third floor level of the building.

Mr. O'Leary, superintendent of the hospital, said the building will be completed by the end of the month and ready for patients by the first of August.

Progress Made

The brickwork section of the building is being laid up to the third floor. The main wing has been installed and the third floor is being laid up to the remainder.

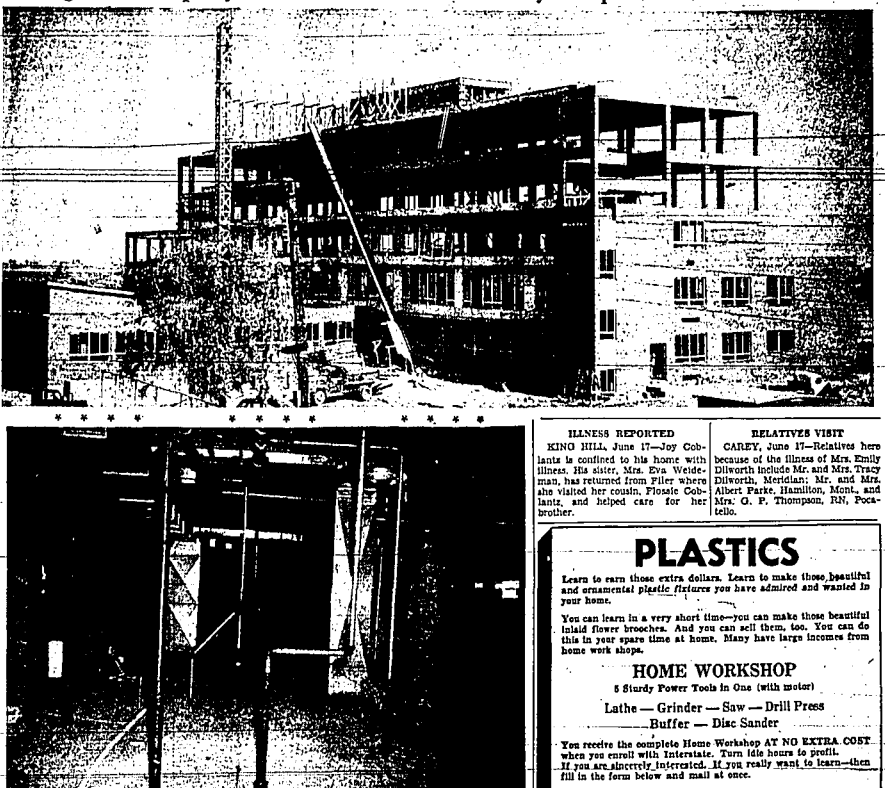

Bonds Voted in 1948

The new hospital was first authorized to be built at a cost of \$2,250,000. The necessary bond issue was approved by voters Nov. 9, 1948. Plans were approved in October, 1948, and work on the structure began in the spring of 1949.

Trouble with underground rock formations delayed the construction general contract during 1949 and added greatly to the cost of construction. Coupled with the increased cost was the increase in building costs since the hospital plans had been approved.

It became apparent late in 1949 that the planned hospital could not be constructed for the \$2,250,000 provided by the bond issue and county property-holders were faced with a decision to place an additional bond issue—approximately a lower-top-hat.

Approves New Bonds

Voters decided overwhelmingly in favor of an additional bond issue of \$600,000 when they went to the polls for a special bond election Feb. 14, 1950.

The additional bond issue will be matched by the federal government under provisions of the Hill-Burton act for a special bond election Feb. 14, 1950. The remaining \$187,000 will be available after the new fiscal year starts July 1, if needed.

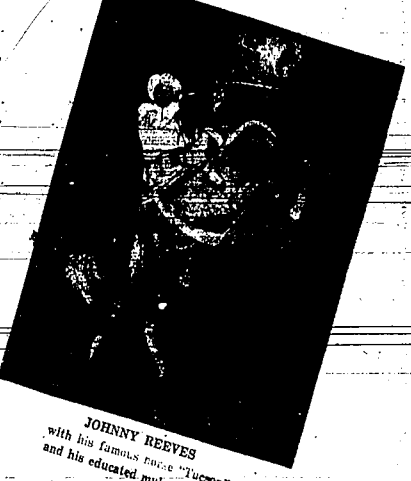

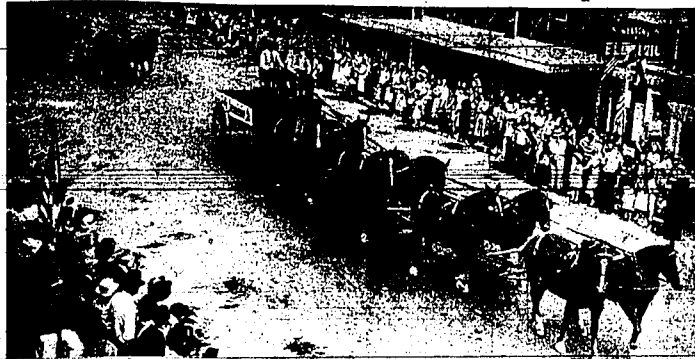

Is Text of Herbert Hoover's Talk on Debts, Deficits and Taxes for Jaycee Meet

Can taxes be increased to meet these deficits? The answer is, "No, unless the whole population can no longer buy enough food or clothes."

The real question is how far our people can be taxed and still have a decent standard of living. We can apply four tests as to whether the present can stand any more tax increases.

First. Because of the average \$1,400 annual taxes on the sheep families, a large number of them are unable to pay their taxes.

Second. How about the goats who have gross incomes of more than \$7,000 a year? The answer is easy. If the government confiscated their entire personal incomes, it would not pay the present federal deficit.

Third. One of the illusions of our times is that corporation taxes come from the stockholders. The reverse is true. The corporation people will realize that corporation taxes are passed on to the customers.

Fourth. Therefore, any substantial increase in taxes must come by bearing more from the sheep. The belief that even present taxes are so draining the strings of the people into the government is to undermine the jobs for the future.

Will deficits lead to more inflation? Financing government deficits by borrowing is continuing to increase money has only one end-inflation. This has been proved by a dozen nations.

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is to stop Senator McClellan's pessimism in his tracks. It is easy if he takes a holiday in new government services until the deficits are overcome. No doubt many are desirable. Most every family would like to add desirable things to its living. But getting them by borrowing money is the way the old government was run.

But the program which faces us in fiscal questions is deeper in American life than reorganization of the executive departments.

Unify the government hospital services so as to save \$100,000,000 of unnecessary construction now authorized; at the same time to better prepare for war.

Reorganization of the Executive Branch. The third way to reduce expenses is the more efficient organization and the cutting out of waste in the government on the lines proposed by the reorganization commission.

Through the cooperation of the administration, the congress, the citizens committee and such organizations as yours, we have already made substantial progress in these reforms of the executive branch of the government.

Major Reforms Bill to Do. We still have many major reforms to accomplish. They include our proposals:

To reorganize the whole civil service into an honest-to-goodness career service based on merit with justice and encouragement in promotion.

To put the budgeting and accounting of the government on a business basis. There would be many savings possible if the government could see itself in the mirror of an adequate accounting system.

To reorganize the postoffice into a modern business concern, with the management free of politics. With this reform and some increase in rates to special commercial users, believe it is desired of half a billion could be overcome.
