

## Indicted on Three Counts by Grand Jury

June 21 (7)—An investigation of four state defendants by an Ada county grand jury continued today after three indictments against former State Purchasing Agent A. Boyd.

Boyd is charged with three counts of grand larceny against the state. The charges are based on previous complaints, previously filed by State Prosecutor James W. Blaine. Hearings on the charges were postponed pending action by the grand jury scheduled to be held today.

The charges are: 1. Grand larceny in the first degree, in violation of the provisions of the Idaho penal code, in that he unlawfully converted to his own use and the use of others, the property of the state to the value of \$14,818.33.

2. Grand larceny in the second degree, in violation of the provisions of the Idaho penal code, in that he unlawfully converted to his own use and the use of others, the property of the state to the value of \$10,000.00.

3. Grand larceny in the third degree, in violation of the provisions of the Idaho penal code, in that he unlawfully converted to his own use and the use of others, the property of the state to the value of \$10,000.00.

## 'Compromise' On Farm Aid Passes House

WASHINGTON, June 21—The house today approved, 235 to 81, a compromise bill to provide \$100,000,000 in extra money to support farm prices.

The bill was passed on a roll call forced by Republicans who objected to a session dealing with controversial topics in the presence of committees which might interfere with American farm price programs.

Senate approval will send the bill to President Truman for signature.

The bill expands the authority of the commodity credit corporation from \$475,000,000 to \$575,000,000. It also contains a compromise provision of a senate proposal to require the state to purchase a certain amount of farm produce which is getting government support under control programs.

## Waters Roll Over Large Idaho Area

The swollen Kootenai river crashing through two major dikes in a northern Idaho valley today flooding 3,000 acres of rich farm land.

The latest overflow shortly before noon. The district behind the levee has 2,100 acres of crop land. The first dike went out with a roar at 4:30 a. m. today. The water rolled swiftly over 300 acres of land behind that barrier. The snowed river has now broken through six dikes. A small emergency levee gave way earlier today, letting water into a residential area north of Bonners Ferry. The residents of 17 homes had been evacuated. Two more are in danger of being flooded there.

Flood control officials now estimate 2,000 acres of land are under water—10,000 acres flooded yesterday.

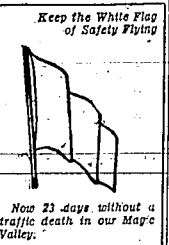

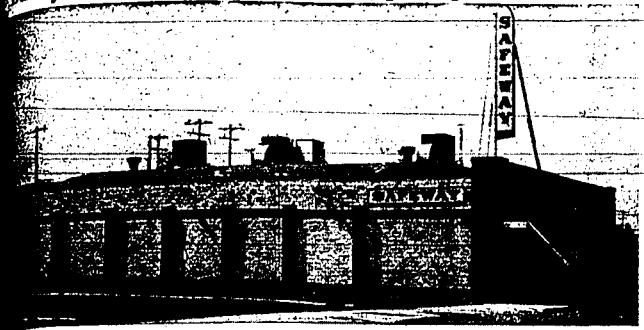

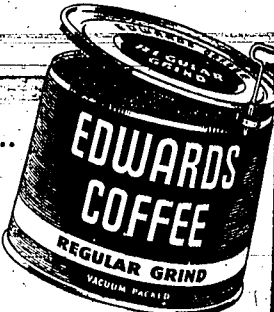
