### Firm Is Sued On Insurance Policy Claims

Milton Lierman filed suit in district court Saturday against the Commercial Travellers Insurance company, Salt Lake City, claiming agents of the company misrepresented a policy they sold him. He seeks return of the payments he has made plus interest and \$5,000 punitive damages. In the complaint Lierman alleges Jack Rutledge and Leo Allen, salesmen for the company, fraudulently claimed they were selling a savings policy and not an insurance policy. He says they told him that after one year his could obtain all the money he invested in his policy plus two and one-half per cent interest. In addition he was to receive life insurance as an add-on feature to the savings policy. The plaintiff claims he was informed that he has been paying premiums on a simple life insurance policy having high premiums with a poor savings feature attached. He seeks the return of \$500 in premiums paid during the past two years, two and one-half per cent interest thereon and \$5,000 punitive damage. Smith and Jacob are his attorneys.

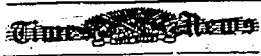

McCarthy Quits Baseball

BUFFALO, June 24 (AP)—Joe McCarthy, the most successful manager in baseball history, delivered his farewell address in characteristic blunt and straight-from-the-shoulder style today.

"When a man can't hit a club any more it's time to quit," he said. "That's all there is to say. The game is hard and weary and I'm tired of it."

This time it's for good, was the final statement from the man who, despite his overbearing and was a cold and hard figure. And as he bowed his head and left the clubhouse, he was followed by his former players and his defense.

McCarthy announced his resignation as New York Yankee manager in 1946 under severe pressure from Larry MacPhail but was persuaded to come out of retirement to pilot the Red Sox only a year and a half later.

"I'm really sorry to hear about it," said Tommy Hendrix, "but it is possible for me to make the grade in the minors. He taught me everything I know about baseball."

McCarthy's retirement ended the 14-year career of the manager who played an inning of major league baseball but who became its most successful manager in the minors.

### Latvians Brought to Hailey Astounded That Women Don't Have Field Work

By ROBERTA MCKEECHIE. HAILEY, June 24—A young Latvian, 29-year-old, arrived here this week after spending 23 days in training in a private car to reach a place that means to them, Hailey, also means liberty from constant supervision, the Latvians are especially grateful for the past five years, and the hope of a life as God intended that man should live.

The father of the family, Petelis Barkans, already absented to his native Latvia, June 23, at 3. Tall and spare, he has brown eyes which look earnestly and hopefully to the people he has fled from America. He has had 12 years of schooling, speaks English to some extent and Latvian, Polish, Russian and German fluently.

His wife, Gertrude, will be 26 this week. Slimly built, she acts with quick bird-like movements but with an air of decision. Her dark hair is pulled back for in a trim page-boy style. Margaret is blond and altogether lovely. She also is a great find about the cuckoo, is friendly to those persons who do not try to touch her and always is watched ardently by her parents.

They arrived in New York about the "General Hertz" with 123 other displaced persons from 10 other countries and of at least 10 religious faiths. They went by train to Ogden, Utah, where they were met by the Rev. and Mrs. Vernon Kendall, representing the sponsoring agency, the Community Pastoriel church.

With a wonderful simplicity, Petelis tells that he has no knowledge of the whereabouts of any member of the "General Hertz" family of five brothers and one sister. "Always I try to come to America," he says. "I have heard that Kendall and his church—in America everyone is rich," he stated. "Told there is a false impression.

on the part of Europeans and told there are Americans who are poor and destitute, he nodded his head approvingly. He appeared skeptical that people who can hold their heads high and look to any man as an equal, who takes auto-stained furs and refrigerators for granted, are not rich whether they know it or not.

An incident Wednesday morning typified the Barkans' reaction to America. They had rested and were ready to begin work at the Day Spencer ranch south of Hailey. Both Barkans were reported to be working and seemed unable to understand why they both were not required to work in the fields for the agreed wage.

Gertrude could not comprehend the field beside her husband, that she could stay home to care for the children. She had heard of a route from Ogden, Peter, advised, lines mentioned the large number of women in the fields. The lack of workers in those fields, she said, and the wife's comment was: "There is much work space in the desert, and took no pleasure in the barren rocky hills. 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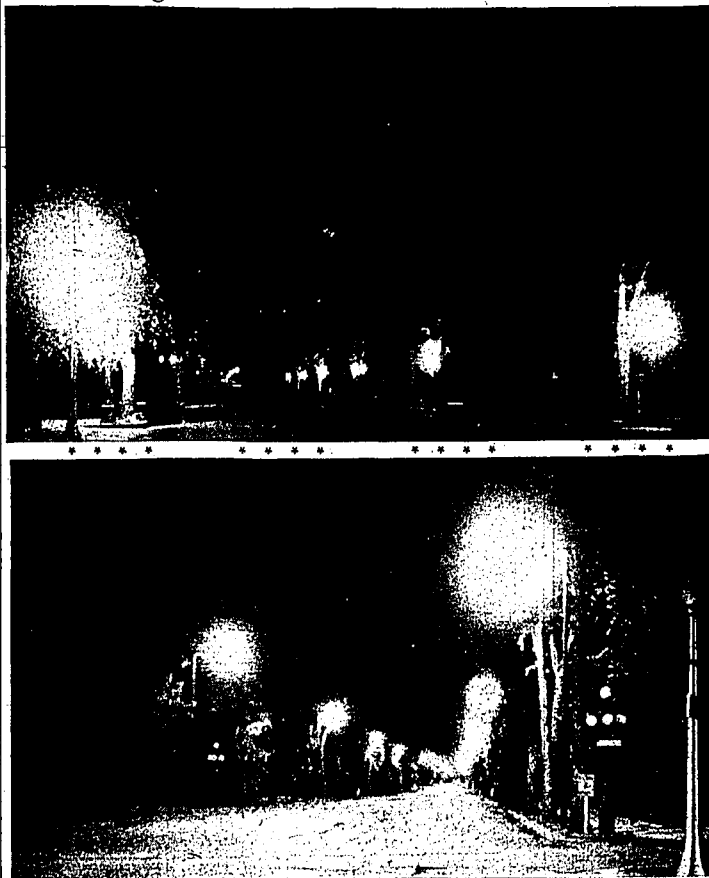

Barbell remarks that the life paths of men follow strange courses over the face of the earth, and gives the example of Joseph Jefferson and Franklin Swift in Philadelphia. Jefferson was born in Philadelphia, traveled over across continents, and came to be buried in—San Francisco, a tiny village on Cape Cod. Swift, on the other hand, was born in Sanwich, but went out beyond the far horizon to become the great picker of antipolestian oil.

The other day I took my wife to the train to begin a long journey. All of the space on the train was sold, and there was a waiting list of others desiring to travel. Before the train arrived there was a cancellation which made it possible for my wife to get a seat. The train pulled out with full capacity and left some behind because there was not enough room. Some were setting off on long journeys, others were coming home on the same train.

If each could be content to stay where he is, there would be no need to travel and there would be just the same number of people in every place. But in every heart there is an urge to go, some go, and then they come back so they can go again. The throngs go on without cessation. Whence? Why? Whether?

There are those who tell us to plan our lives, and then work our plans. The ambitious ask us to hitch our wagon to a star and then set out to reach the post to which our reason is hitched. But none can ignore the fact that we often do not go where we started, and that we do not find what we expected when we get there. This is not the will of the disappointed ambition, but the interpretation of his providence of life.

But do things just happen? Not if we mean by that word that they came by no intelligent direction. Things result, but they do not happen. How then shall one find his way around in a world and in a universe like that? It is really easier than it seems.

There is only one thing to do. Just "lean God and keep His Commandments" then all else that should come into your life will come. Sometimes it will be according to your desire, some times it will come according to your dread. Sometimes it will come according to your plans, and sometimes it will come in spite of your plans. But it will always come either by God's appointment or by His permission, and by the time it reaches you it will fit into the program of your life in a manner that will work for your good.

It is not necessary that you should immediately see and know the plans the unexpected is to take, it is enough for you to know that it will find its place. Some men boast that

they are internationalists, but the obedient child of God is a cosmopolitan; for, being a child of God, he is at home anywhere in God's universe.

And the pathways that seem to make a meaningless maze are intelligible and consistent in that they all lead to Him. "If I live a holy life; shun the wrong and do the right, I know the Lord will make a way for me."

### Blind Buhl Woman Overcomes Handicap, Has Music Career

BUHL, June 24—Total blindness has proved only a slight handicap for Joyce Barnes. This same-blind girl, Miss Barnes has overcome this tremendous handicap and has succeeded in completing a college education and launching a life career of her choice.

She received her early education in the modeling school for the blind, being graduated with first honors. She then spent her 12-year tenure at the school she was aided by the use of the Braille system.

Following graduation from high school Miss Barnes decided to make music her life career and went to San Diego where she studied under Les Whitney. After several months of instruction from Miss Whitney she decided to enter the College of Idaho, Caldwell. This venture took courage as her books were not available at the college. Her success depended upon her ability to absorb material by careful listening, memorizing and employing the services of a reader. She was graduated with honors and participated in a number of extra-curricular activities.

She sang in the college choir and was honored with placement on the "Dean's List" her last two years. Placement on this list requires an average of better for the entire college course.

Her major was in the field of vocal music, which she plans to pursue as a life career. Following graduation Miss Barnes opened a studio in Jerome.

Along with her ability Miss Barnes has a delightful personality and has sung often for social and service organizations. Her ability as an apt teacher of voice was demonstrated when her pupil, Betty Gill, played, took first place in the district music competition at Burley in the solo division and top honors in the solo contest at Boise.

After waiting some time Miss Barnes was called to Pasadena, Calif., in January, 1940, to take a month's training to act as guide dog.

She had always wanted a dog, and finally obtained one from the Humane Foundation in Pasadena. Miss Barnes said, "We went to school at the end of the training period we were ready to come home together. Our first training was to get a practice dog and it was an unbelievable thrill when we met our dogs for the first time and knew they were to be our constant companions."

"My dog, has changed everything," Miss Barnes explained. "I have a greater sense of security and a world of independence now. Jerry is ready to go all the time and we really have a great time together. She is an apt student of


