The army said the locations, which already have necessary facilities, are among those that have been approved tentatively by the office of the chief of army field forces, including: Portland, Ore.; Seattle and Tacoma, Wash.; Boise, Idaho; Fort Douglas, Utah; Salem, Ore.; and Billings, Mont.

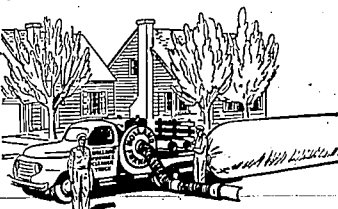

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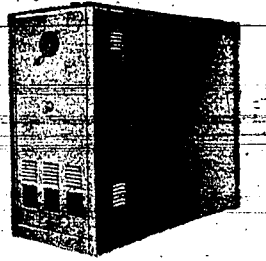

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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — A revolutionary change in the strained relations involving management, labor and the government has been reflected in recent editorially published letters on the part of the industrialists and union leaders.



Although the various proposals are still in the disarray, a successful conclusion to the several schemes now being proposed has been reached by the industrialists and union leaders.

Politically, it might imperil the system under which Franklin D. Roosevelt, by a narrow margin, virtually transformed the American Federation of Labor, the railroad brotherhoods and the Congress of Industrial Organizations into an arm of the Democratic party.

There could be a bulldog profit for the Truman administration, however. The President could agree that any arrangement guaranteeing a high level of employment and a high level of wages is one of the policies of the last 10 years.

BLUEPRINT—Nevertheless, consummation of these plans would amount to an alliance of labor management and the politician, and he would tend to end organized labor's dependence on White House favoritism and congressional action.

It is not strictly accurate to say that the letters are not a blueprint for a new era. Rather, each group seems to have begun to toy with ideas of a workable and productive peace separately and independently. However, as the blueprint and the program, the need for a more cooperative movement becomes clear. It tends to draw together.

PEACE—The basic of the common aim is full production at wages high enough to support mass consumption of the national product. 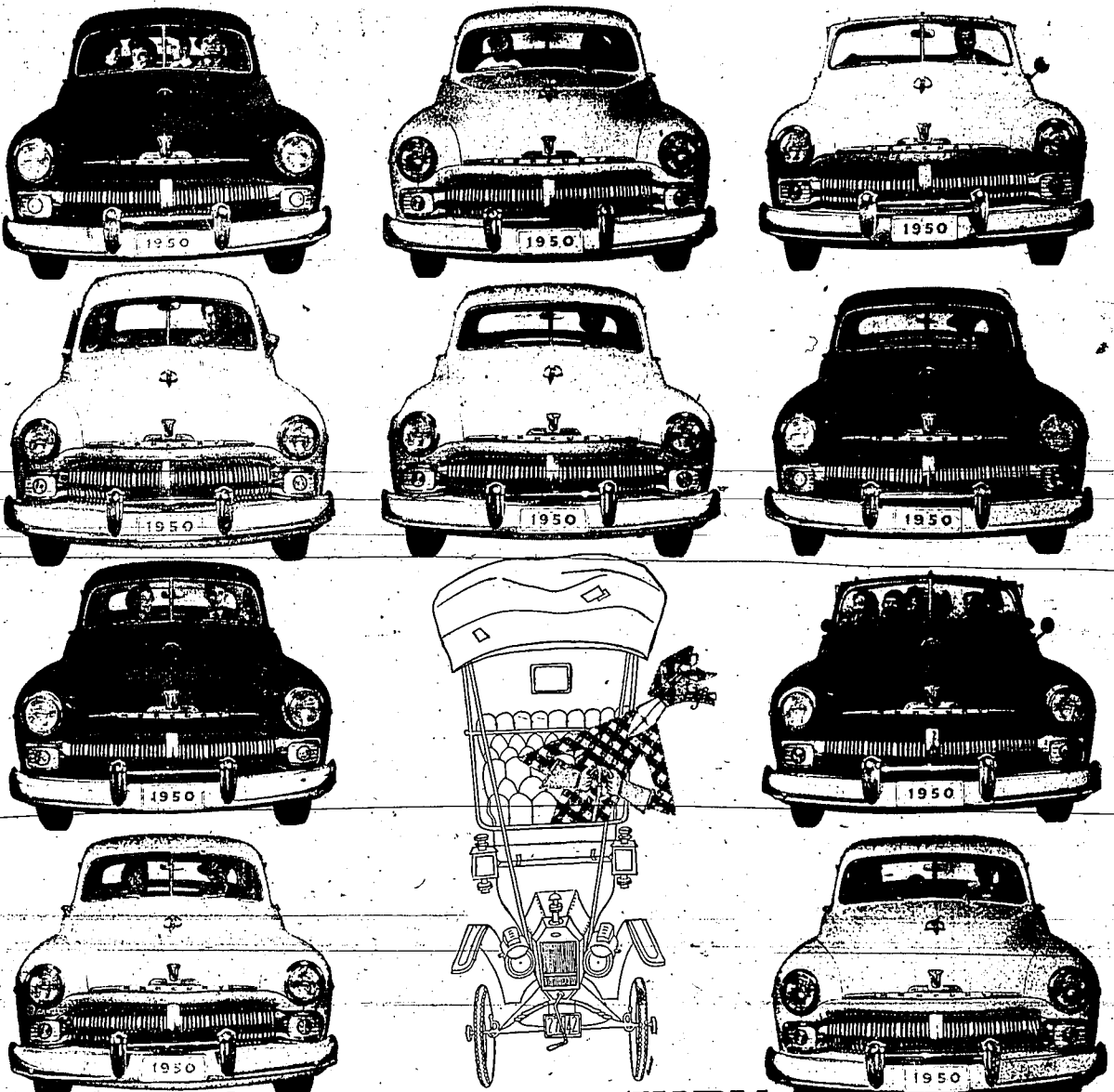

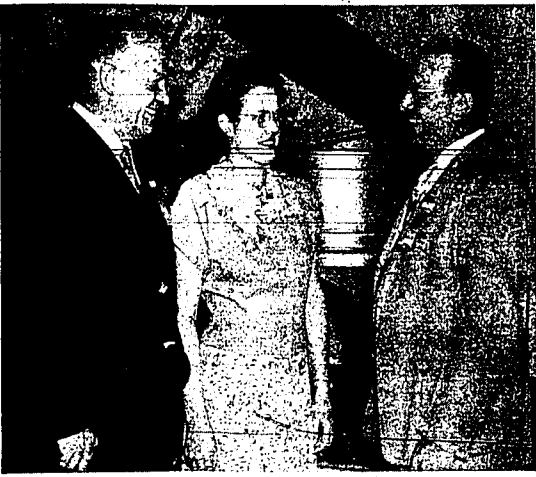

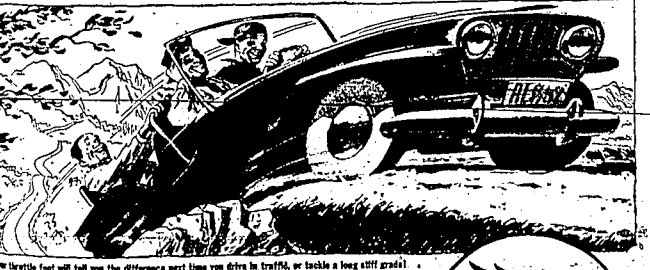

What Is U. S. Stake in Korea's War? UP Tokyo Manager Tells His Version

(Editor's note: A complete story on what is at stake in the Korean war will appear in the afternoon edition of the Times-News. This and other pertinent questions are answered in the following report by the author, returned from Tokyo by special messenger.)

TOKYO, June 27—The United States, it was learned from its spokesmen in the Korean war, is supporting northern Korea, a communist puppet state which attacked American-supported southern Korea before dawn Sunday in an attempt to win control of the whole country.

Korea shook off the Japanese yoke at the end of the World war. It is to find that it had been cut in two by the United States and Russia in the Yalta agreement.

The dividing line was fixed at the 38th parallel of latitude.

Russian troops, already in Manchuria, occupied the northern half of the Korean peninsula. U. S. troops moved into the southern half. Each encouraged its own brand of democracy.

Under American sponsorship, the (south) Korean republic was proclaimed Aug. 15, 1948, with Syngman Rhee as president. The United States turned over the reins of government to the new republic.

Russia took the cue and the (north) Korean people's republic was proclaimed Sept. 12, 1948 with a communist government.

The United States and Russia withdrew their troops and retiring to their defense. They left behind diplomatic and military missions to locate the rival contestants.

The United Nations established a Korean commission to try and reconcile the two governments and set a democratic regime for the whole country. North Korea refused to let the commission enter its territory.

Thus the lines were drawn for the war, which exploded Sunday

down. And the United States and Russia for the first time find themselves helping governments they established fight each other.

The United States faces this dilemma:

If it openly aids southern Korea, a forcible war will result. It may be that the U. S. stands idly by, let the communists, either by force or by default, other friendly Asian countries now in the western bloc who have been counting on America for help.

A highly-placed source in Tokyo says southern Korea has about 10 days supply of ammunition. But the U. S. is already trying to remedy that by fitting in emergency supplies of munitions and other war supplies. Ships will follow with more.

The northern forces also were believed to be short of ammunition, gasoline and transport. But Russia and communist China stand behind them.

The best estimate here is that southern Korea can muster 14,000 men and north Korea, 118,000.

The northern forces comprise 97,000 army troops—10,000 security troops and 40,000 police. The southern forces comprise 90,000 army regulars and 43,000 police.

South Korea has great air superiority with several squadrons of the latest type Russian fighter planes and a couple of old Japanese Mitsubishi bombers donated by Russia. South Korea has 18 5-5 reconaissance planes carrying rocket launchers and 10 unarmed trainers.

The south has no tanks, but many American trucks and jeeps. The north has a regiment of light tanks, but is short on road transport.

Kuna told his audience he proposed any measure "which is going to take the government away from the people and hand it over to a bunch of bureaucrats in Washington."

He said this meant he opposed CVA and a Brannan plan and will continue to work against socialization of medicine and education.

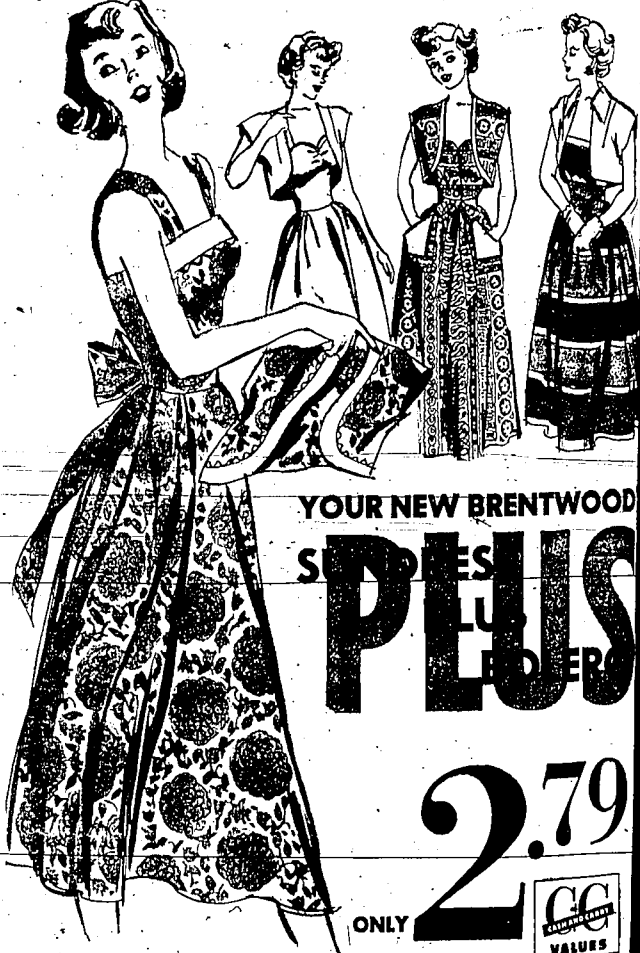

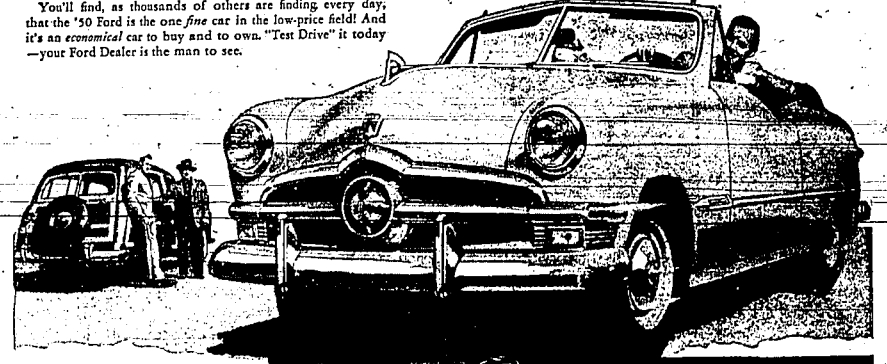

Congress OK Sets up Fund For Bug War

WASHINGTON, June 27 (AP)—Congress has voted \$2,000,000 for immediate use in fighting spruce bark beetle and pine beetle infestations in Rocky mountain national forests.

Final congressional action was separate acceptance of a conference committee report on a deficiency appropriation bill. The House previously had agreed to the \$2,000,000 beetle-control fund approved by the committee.

Forest service officials said they would be ready to begin the beetle fight as soon as the deficiency bill is signed by President Truman and the money actually is available.

The bulk of the \$2,000,000, Mason said, will be used to fight the spruce bark beetle, which has destroyed hundreds of thousands of acres of Engelmann spruce in western Colorado and is now spreading to other areas.

The remainder of the fund will be used against the pine beetle in national forests of eastern Idaho and western Wyoming.

The \$2,000,000 was a compromise figure, and considerably less than the forest service estimated it would need.

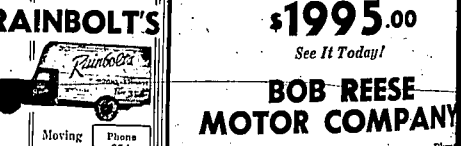

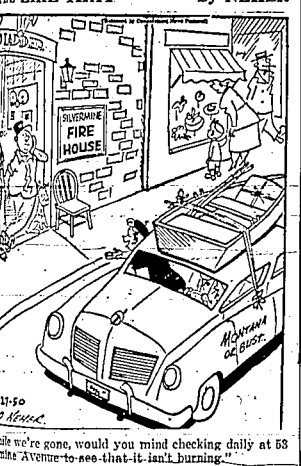

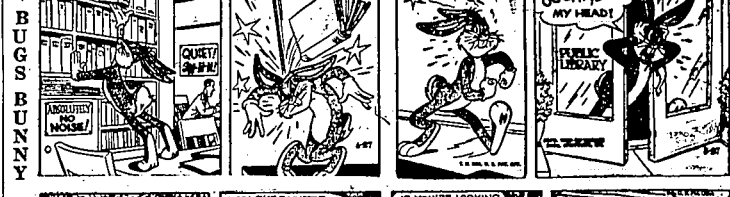
