(From Page One) He may have a fractured leg and arm, hospital attendants said. The seriousness of his condition prevented immediate determination of the extent of the injury.

They said he was traveling north at the time of the wreck and the road was clearly marked with cones. Mrs. Mary Deary, 37, of the motorcycle, which landed in the road, was estimated at 42.

Mrs. Deary was struck down by a 1935 sedan driven by Donald C. Rush, 34, route 1, Twin Falls. Rush's auto had crossed the Fourth street intersection traveling south on Second avenue east. The injured woman apparently was in the crosswalk when the accident occurred.

The driver told police he noticed the woman in the crosswalk as he approached the intersection, but said he had to stop for a motorist and failed to see her until she was in the street as he crossed the intersection.

She told police she watched the car approach the intersection, but thought she had time to cross the street and failed to watch the car as it was nearly upon her. Attendants in the car checked her condition when she was brought to the hospital and she was pronounced dead.

Leaders Back Truman's Act On Korea Aid

Franklin D. Roosevelt in London—"I cannot see what the President Truman could have done. The United Nations called upon us and I think everyone should cooperate."

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in New York—"The best chance for sustaining world peace was to take a firm stand, and when our government bowed to make a compromise with the government of South Korea, there was no recourse but to do what President Truman did and did."

Harold Stassen, former governor of Minnesota, in Washington—"When the President, whoever he is, comes to make a compromise with the government of South Korea, there is only one thing to do and that is to back up the commitment. I back Truman's commitment of American forces."

Philip Murray, CIO president, in Cleveland—"I am a wholehearted supporter of President Truman's course of action in the Korean peninsula. It is the duty of all American Communications Workers to support it."

6 Screen Writers Are Ruled Guilty

WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—Three Hollywood writers were convicted of contempt of congress today for refusing to say whether they ever had been communists.

Two of them—Albert Maltin and Alvah Bessie—were sentenced to one year in jail and fined \$10,000 each by Judge David A. Ladd. The third writer, Paul J. Fox, was fined \$10,000 and sentenced to 180 days in prison.

Less than an hour after Maltin and Bessie were sentenced, Fox was sentenced to 180 days in prison and fined \$10,000. The three writers, Fred Leland, Edward M. Carr and Paul J. Fox, were charged with contempt of congress for refusing to answer questions about their alleged communist connections.

France Can't Aid In Korean Battle

PARIS, June 29 (AP)—A French foreign office spokesman today said France will not aid in the Korean battle to American combat efforts for South Korea.

"The French government realizes the responsibility of the American people," he said in a statement. "We will continue to contribute to the American effort."

The spokesman said the French government has no objection to the American effort to aid in the Korean battle, but that it will not provide military aid.

Navy Buttons Up, Prevents Casual Visits

NEW YORK, June 29 (AP)—The navy buttoned up on all coasts today.

By order of the chief of naval operations, casual visitors were not permitted at shore stations.

The chief of naval operations said that shore stations are being closed to casual visitors as a result of the Korean situation. Civilian visitors to shore stations were not permitted at shore stations.

The naval order said that while casual visitors would not be permitted, normal visiting would be permitted in instances where conditions justify such exception.

"Until further orders general visiting will not be permitted on board ships berthed at shore stations," the order said. "Visiting on board ships at anchorages or at commercial or municipal pier will be controlled by responsible senior officers in such a manner as to eliminate possible damage to ships."

"Control of visiting will be permitted only on board ships not berthed at shore stations, and such visits will be controlled by the commanding officer of the ship."

26 Paratroopers Safe as Carrier Crash Fatal to 4

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 29 (AP)—Twenty-six paratroopers on a night jump from a C-47 transport plane last night a few minutes after it crashed and burned, killing four crewmen.

The bodies of the crew members, who apparently tried to bring the plane back to its base with one engine, were found in the wreckage about 20 miles from where the troopers landed. Their names were withheld.

The 11th airborne division at Fort Campbell, Ky., where the paratroopers were stationed, sent trucks to bring them back to the air field where they had been scheduled to jump.

The twin-engine C-47 aircraft crashed on the 21st troop carrier, 204th troop carrier wing, taking part in a night maneuver.

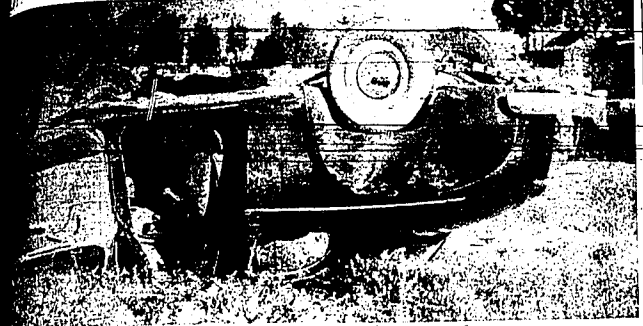

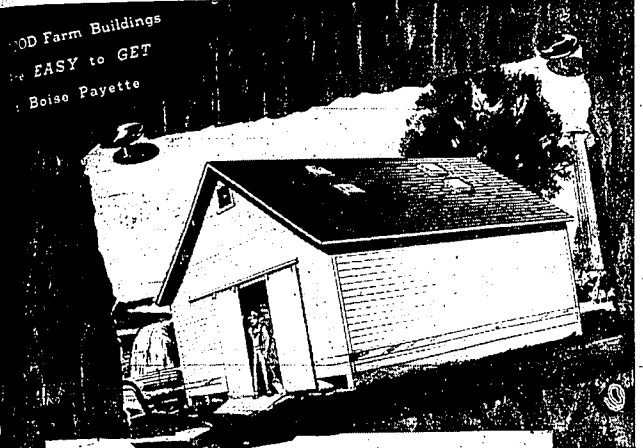

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—Irrigated crops have been slowed by cool weather in central and eastern Idaho and non-irrigated crops are short of moisture in most of the northwest and central eastern areas.

Minidoka County Agent W. Priest said the dryland spring grains were not growing because of lack of rain but irrigated grains were doing well.

Flourish on Beans
No reported signs of the beans which were damaged by the frost Sunday morning were being plowed up but others, sipped only slightly, were beginning to grow.

The dryland grain situation was much the same in Camas county as in Minidoka county. Camas farmers are discussing a rain making project.

Damage Heavy
Some hay is down and some has been damaged by rain. Heavy damage is heavy for the first cutting of alfalfa.

Flax grains are heading at lower elevations and spring grains are in the north.

Shipment of peas has started and lettuce is being harvested.

Short of Moisture
Lower ranges are short of moisture and cattle are being shipped to summer ranges. Early range lambs are moving in volume while best cattle are being fed longer.

The past week was the warmest of the season so far, the report said. Average temperature for the state was 24 degrees warmer than the previous week, but still was slightly below the season average.

Statehouse's Mail System Begins Soon

BOISE, June 29 (AP)—The state house central postal system, set up by the 1950 special legislature, will be ready for operation by July 1, the land commissioner Edward Woolley said today.

The postal system will be operated jointly by the land and public works departments. Homer Champlin, presently an employe of the land enforcement department, will manage the system.

Special Mail Speeded
The bureau of public accounts office has been moved in order that the central postal system may be installed in space adjoining the land office, Woolley said. A mailing machine, mail sorting tables, scales and a mail truck have been obtained. All incoming and outgoing mail departments and divisions housed in the statehouse will be handled through the office.

Woolley said some arrangements are being made for the department of public health to obtain mail such as blood samples, spinal fluid samples, etc., directly to avoid delays on Sundays and holidays.

The land commissioners were appropriated \$2,000 by the 1950 legislature to set up the postal system and the department of public works was vested with its administration. Woolley said \$10,000 of the appropriation is for a rotary fund for stamps, which will be repaid by the various departments.

Scouts Find Cooperation With Project

Public reaction to Boy Scout demonstrations of artificial respiration has been "generally good," Lloyd Robertson, Twin Falls district Boy Scout chairman, said Thursday. Scouts from three Twin Falls troops began the house-to-house life-saving instruction Tuesday. Nine other troops are scheduled to begin before the end of the week.

Robertson said there were a few cases where people told the boys they "just couldn't be bothered." However, our team of Scoutmaster Dale Hodges and Bobby Mueser, both troop 60 found two cases where people had been called on to give artificial respiration.

In one case a baby carriage rolled down a hill and dumped its occupant into a ditch. The other case involved a workman who came in contact with high voltage electricity. The Scouts learned efforts in both cases were futile. Robertson pointed out that two persons died possibly because the would-be rescuers did not know how to apply artificial respiration properly.

The present life-saving instructions being given in the Twin Falls and Pocatello areas are endorsed by the Twin Falls Safety Council. Boy Scouts plan to give instructions in every home in the next 10 days.

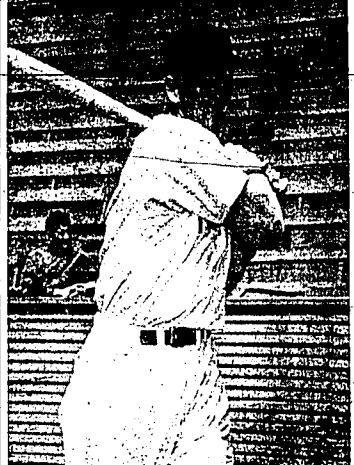

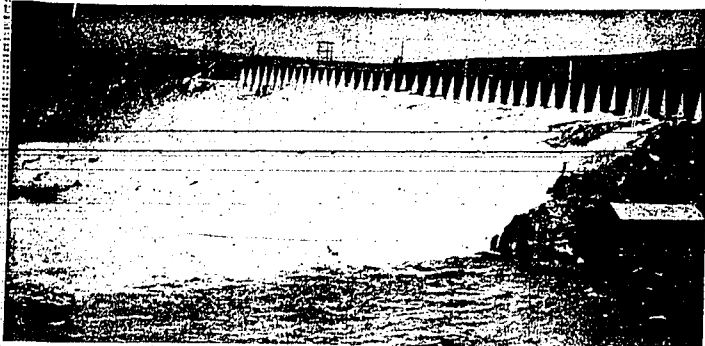

Present Flow at Milner Dam Exceeded Five Times Since 1926, Records Show

The 10,010 second-feet of water rushing through Milner dam Wednesday was a torrent which has exceeded only five times since records of the flow were started in 1926, according to R. H. Seymour, caretaker of the dam.

The record flow for the dam occurred June 27, 1927, when 25,110 second-feet of water poured through the spillway gates. But that flow was a "flood," Seymour says. He explains that a dirt slide in the upper part of Snake river backed up a large amount of water. When the dirt obstruction broke, the backed-up flood rushed down the river.

The second highest flow of water occurred June 6, 1931, with 22,000 second feet of water. Other dates of high water were June 13, 1947, when 21,200 second-feet of water rushed through the gates, and April 24, 1944, and June 5, 1938, each with 18,000 second-feet of water.

Records were not kept before 1926, the year American Falls dam was built, because the river poured its waters into Milner reservoir without control. High water was the

rule during the spring runoff and no one worried about it.

A contrast to Wednesday's high water will be the small flow later in the year when the runoff is completed. According to Seymour the flow has a minimum of 11 second-feet in 1949, a flow that was entirely leakage. However, the dam normally releases about 225 second-feet of water to allow proper operation of Idaho Power company plants downstream.

The dam was not designed for water storage and works only as a diversion dam to turn water into the Milner-Gooding canal, Milner low-lift canal, Twin Falls canal and North Side canal. The water is backed up to a height of 45 feet above the original river channel to make the diversions.

The amount of land irrigated for 500,000 acres, the greater part of the entire irrigated area of Magic Valley. In addition to the water that is used for this land, there is enough waste water in the course of a year to fill another reservoir the size of the American Falls lake, Seymour says.

The dam was built from 1903 to 1905 with private capital and was one of the first irrigation projects built under provisions of the Carey act. The project is owned by the Twin Falls Canal company and the North Side Canal company and is operated by the Twin Falls Canal company.

The dam is earth and rock fill utilizing two river islands as part of its construction. Rather than having to build a dam across the entire width of the river canyon, engineers were able to fill only three narrow channels between the river banks and the islands.

According to Seymour, the Twin Falls canal is the largest irrigation canal in the nation which was designed as it exists today. He points out that California has a larger canal, but it is the result of California's outcropping their canals and adding to them as the need arises. The Twin Falls canal, however, was built as a large canal and has remained unchanged since it was built.

Uranium Find In State Said "Too Remote"

SPOKANE, June 29 (AP)—Uranium, an atom bomb ingredient, has been found in Idaho but the discovery is so remote it might not be worth mining, a geologist for the atomic energy commission said here.

The geologist, E. M. Thurston, said he couldn't give the exact location of the discovery until it is cleared by the AEC in Washington. He said it was found in a section of the Idaho batholith, associated with monzonitic, pyrite and pyrrhotite.

While Thurston minimized the current importance of the find, he said it might stimulate prospecting all the way from Mountain Home in southern Idaho to Avery in the northern part of the state.

He indicated the most promising source of radioactive minerals in the northwest is still the pitchblende deep in veins of the Sunshine mine near Kellogg. In the Idaho panhandle, it is associated there with hematite, giving it a red appearance.

Thurston spoke at a meeting of the associated engineers.

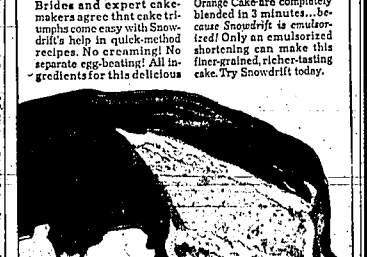

Either Doctor didn't know the word, or my pronunciation was bad, for every time I leaned forward and shouted the Arabic for "slowly," Doctor would counter with a mouthful of goldfish, nod and urge his steed to greater speed.

Doctor only scared the wit out of us when we were bolting along the road through the Syrian desert. It was not until we reached the mountains, with hairpin turns every half mile or so, that he gave us so many good bumps that all we needed to pass for gears were a wad of kumquat and a feather or two.

Soms men collect stamps as a hobby. Others go in for old coin collecting and putting with machinery. Doctor's hobby was passing cars on sharp curves in order to scare the drivers of oncoming trucks and buses. We came so close to half a dozen buses that the conductors, taking me for a passenger, tried to collect a fare. And once, so narrowly did we miss a bus, I unwillingly kissed an elderly mason sitting by the window.

After each brush with death Doctor would take his hand off the wheel, turn to us in the back seat, and give us a look that plainly asked for a compliment.
