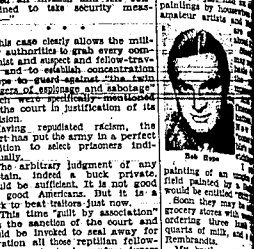

WASHINGTON, July 18 (Special) — Ever since the Russian loaded their first atomic bomb, Pentagon officials have been haunted by the fear of a sudden sneak attack on the continent.

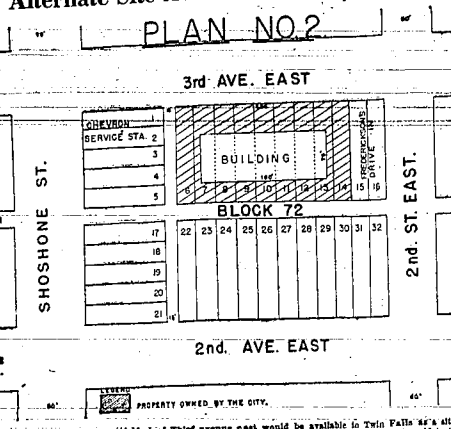

Second Plan for City Hall Would Use Land Situated Nearer Center of City

Editor's note: This is the second in a series of three news columns dealing with a site for a new city building in Twin Falls. Following publication of the last article concerning the Times-News editorial, a letter was received from the city of Twin Falls which stated in substance that the city would not accept the site of the new building on the 300 block of Second avenue east. It is pointed out that the Third avenue east site is one and one-half blocks nearer to the business district. It is situated two blocks closer to the city park and other public facilities such as the court house and city library.

Cost of the property on Third avenue east would be \$40,000, the same amount offered by Gateway Stores for the property on Second avenue east. The area of the first site, located on Second avenue east and already owned by the city, is 44,750 square feet as compared with 28,125 square feet in the site on Third avenue east. The city hall and adjacent facilities would occupy approximately 25,000 square feet.

One of the principal disadvantages of the site is that it is located near Shoshone street, one of the city's centers of traffic congestion. Before the city could sell the property on Second avenue east to purchase the alternate site on Third avenue east, an election would have to be held to get approval of voters. Cost of such an election has been estimated at about \$500.

Apparently the site on Third avenue east has no marked advantage over the site already owned by the city.

Utah Town's Loss in Fire Is \$275,000

HELPER, Utah, July 18 (AP)—Damages from an early morning blaze which threatened the entire business district here yesterday have been estimated at \$275,000. Firemen and volunteers from Helper, Price, Pragerston and Bunkley fought the blaze for more than three hours before bringing it under control. The fire completely gutted two buildings and extensively damaged a third. Ten establishments were put out of business.

A Fireman Stricken
Helper Fire Chief Louis Martinelli said more than 100 firemen and volunteers responded to the call and three were treated for smoke exhaustion. Occupants of all buildings escaped without injury. The Diamond building housing the Diamond hotel, the Diamond club, the Kiva club and the Diamond cafe, and a building owned by the Helper State bank were destroyed by the blaze.

The Progressive market, adjoining the Diamond building, was damaged extensively and 30 of the 32 rooms of the Avalon hotel in the building were rendered useless. The top floor and roof of the building was a complete loss.

Rain Gave Help
At the height of the blaze when winds threatened to spread the fire throughout the town, a heavy rain damped down roofs of adjoining buildings, lessening fire threat. The blaze was discovered at 1:25.

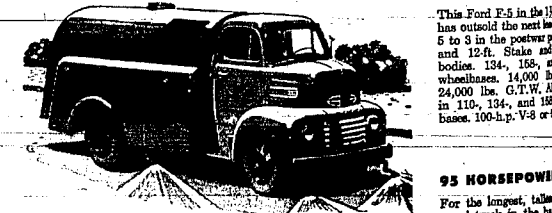

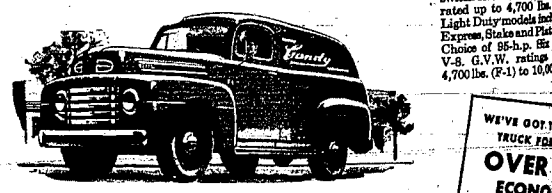
