Human Asks Cooperation by Army in Girding Forces

TWIN FALLS, July 26 (AP)—President Truman told congress today the American economy could stand the strain of the Korean war with full cooperation from industry, labor and the military to boost production, cautioned consumers to buy normally, and urged that any inflationary wage demands. Such "unity in our economic affairs," he said in his mid-year economic report, would preclude the need for direct controls over production, wages and prices. He and his economic council rejected the arguments of men such as Bernard Baruch that those rigid controls are needed now.

The report also recommended that Mr. Truman gave congress four specific recommendations, all of which had been made public previously.

The first was a large program to promote industrial expansion, to be financed by a new program, credit control authority, expansion of the federal reserve system to promote industrial expansion.

But he warned this program is not all that will be asked of the American people. He said that the government should use its power to coordinate production and distribution of goods and services.

Proof of Russ Help-in-Korea Never Shown

By HARRY FERGUSON, The Spokesman Staff Editor

Everybody knows the Russians are helping the North Korean forces with the proud air of a victor who sees his own score in a winter touchdown in the homecoming game. Everybody knows there is a fine communications system between Moscow and the Korean communist capital of Pyongyang.

But how can you prove it? One of the Kremlin's major successes has been the way it took charge of this war and yet never allowed the outside world to get one shred of direct evidence that it was in any way involved.

One Never Found: Ever since the fighting started on Korea every time a communist plane was shot down, they have lifted the wreckage aside, confident that inside they would find the body of a Russian. They never have. Every pilot who has been shot down has been a North Korean.

All prisoners have been North Koreans. One North Korean was questioned on the battlefield the other day by a United Press correspondent. He had seen some Russian planes. Yes, the Russians had infiltrated the North Korean lines. They were about two Russians to a regiment, but that's all he knew about them. No American has ever seen a Russian officer in Korea.

Indirect Evidence: The indirect evidence the Russians are in charge of the war is overwhelming. No factory in North Korea could manufacture those big communist tanks that had every red offensive.

Nor is any North Korean plant capable of turning out the Y-4 fighter planes and the MiG-15's which have been doing air support to the communists. Artillery and light arms are other products beyond the limited productive capacity of Korean factories.

Tactics Reveal: But it is on strategy and tactics that Moscow's hammer blows reveal the deepest imprint in the Korean war. The important clue to our strategy is the fact that after an attack following a familiar pattern, fight not out to the end of the war. You drive hard at the middle, throw out flanking columns and then begin to infiltrate.

But in this case it is always North Koreans, not Russians, who are doing Stalin's bidding. Stalin has not given the world a chance to accuse him of leading direct aid in this war. In some future date, the United Nations formally accuses him of starting the war, he is in splendid position to raise his hands, look innocent, and say: "Who, me?"
