Formosa Talk Of Reds Held 'Propaganda'

Dollars to doughnuts that the Chinese communists are talking through their hats about taking Formosa, or the island of Formosa, is a serious threat and the U. S. government is force-pressed.

The demand for Formosa is a threat, that the United Nations order U. S. forces out of the area is, of course, just so much propaganda inspired by Moscow.

The United States has the Pelipen issue and the demand right now purely for whatever contribution it might make to Chiang Kai-shek's campaign in the security council.

It is noticeable that the demand is filed simultaneously with a dispatch of a complaint against British conduct around Hong Kong. The communists are merely trying to divert attention from the great power-entreaty that is being held a bit of aggression in Korea as the world has seen since Stalin and Hitler decided to Poland.

U. S. Awakened

It took the proof of communist aggression in Korea to make the United States up about Formosa. The first was ordered to protect the island, and Chiang Kai-shek was told to pass his air attacks on the communist mainland, primarily for the purpose of seeing to it that the Korean incident did not spread into a general far eastern war. Now that the decision has been made, however, and that communist strategy is clear, the chance that the United States will ever again leave Formosa open to invasion by a possible enemy grows more and more remote.

Prior to the Korean business the American defense line in the Pacific was more or less theoretical. Today it faces actual military aggression, and as long as that threat exists the line cannot be yielded.

Learned Hard Way

American learned the value of Formosa as a military base from the Japanese, the hard way. It is a key to the Philippines, and from the B-29 base on China, which would be the launching point for much of our atomic strength in the event of a war with Russia.

American policy about Formosa has been willy-willy because it is in the hands of the national leader, Chiang Kai-shek, who enjoys no high standing in American official circles these days.

But General MacArthur made it plain long ago that he considered it a key point. The situation is so much more crucial now that anyone seeking to overthrow him on such a point would be accepting an unbearable grave responsibility.

For the United States' ability to invade the island under present circumstances, it is not that serious.

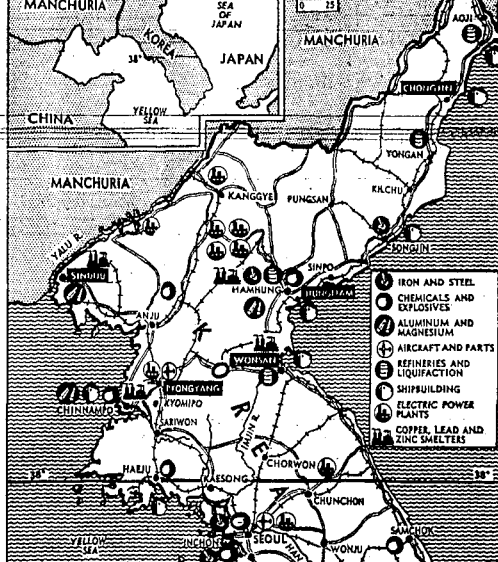

Governorship Aspirants Set Road Priority

POCATELLO, Aug. 26 (AP)—Improved Idaho highways will be a primary objective of the state's next chief executive.

Idaho Farm Bureau federation directors at a meeting here Friday received pledges from both Republican and Democratic candidates for governor that they would place highway needs at the top of their program should they be elected in November.

The two, Len B. Jordan, Republican, Grandville, and Charles E. Wright, Democrat, Rupert, addressing the Farm Bureau directors along with four candidates for national office.

Others speaking were Herman Walker, Republican, Payette, candidate for the six-year U. S. second circuit; Claude Burenshaw, Democrat, Rexburg, candidate for the four-year senate post; James H. Hawley, Jr., Democrat, Boise, and Hamer Budge, Republican, Boise, socialist district congressional candidates.

Jordan declared highways as the state number one problem, mainly because the system was 20 years old and is now obsolete. He also went on record as favoring a higher tax on license of heavier vehicles using the state roads.

Long-Range Pledge

Wright also stressed the need for a long-range road-building program, pointing out that people are not planning that job could be done in two or three years. He emphasized that he would concentrate his efforts upon economy and efficiency in government.

Both candidates spoke briefly on the Brannan plan and socialized medicine—and all expressed their interest in the CVA.

Oppose All Socialism

Walker also opposed to all three plans "and any other socialized scheme which would put the government into private business."

Burenshaw indicated he did not like to commit himself as favoring one plan or another. "I may change my mind as the time place before they are ever voted upon for a person to take a stand," he observed.

He explained he opposed the CVA because "it removes political functions of government."

Favors Price Supports

Opposition to all three plans was voiced by Budge. He went on record as favoring price supports, because "the nation's economy is geared to the plan."

His opponent in the November election, Hawley, declared he didn't believe the CVA was the right way to handle the power problem facing the state.

D. Worth Clark, Democrat, Pocatello, U. S. senate six-year term candidate, also was asked about the morning session but was expected to confer with the farm board this week-end.
