'Ghost of Guam' Called Back To Active Duty Tour in Navy

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 28 (AP)—The Yankee sailor who lived the Robinson Crusoe while surviving on Japanese-occupied Guam in World War II has gone back to the fleet.

Duty George Hay Tweed, now 48 and a navy veteran of 22 years, has been recalled to active duty after two years as a state-side land-lubber. He returns as a chief electronics technician.

Originally, Tweed may be assigned to the far western Pacific, where he once was known as the "Ghost of Guam." The name came from a wreath-like island fugitive from a feared enemy.

When the Japanese overhauled the U.S. fleet after Pearl Harbor, Tweed eluded capture. He was the only American to survive there until the stars and stripes again were hoisted over the island.

With the aid of natives, he managed to stay alive for 33 months. He slept in caves and moved his hideout when enemy patrols came too close to his jungle trails. Four years ago, Tweed was rescued on the natives. He sent a new automobile to Antonio Artero, who had fed him for more than a year while he hid from the Japanese.

WASHINGTON—American involvement with China, the United States' policy of anti-communist defense alliance has become extremely serious since Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur's resignation as commander in chief of the United States forces in the Far East. A declaration that the United States will give no military aid or advice to the Chinese forces on the mainland as a result of our active military cooperation with the Nationalist government in Formosa, and the fact that the United States is not to furnish Formosa with arms, munitions, and other military supplies, has become over-shadowed by the fact that Dean Acheson is finding it difficult to get the United States to join the United States of America and Formosa in a formal, protective pact, designed to prevent the Korean warlike from expanding into a global conflict.

POWERFUL 'BIG LIE'

Russia's most potent weapon throughout the world is the "big lie" which it has used to replace it with a dictatorship of world communism is neither its overwhelming military strength, its atom bomb nor its geographical position. It is the BIG LIE. It is the same weapon devised and used so successfully by Nazi Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels, but greatly refined and given variant currency because Stalin has at his command not only Moscow's own propaganda experts, but those in numerous countries and thousands of secret agents and credulous dupes within all non-communist nations.

The big lie's success depends upon one thing: one thing only—constant, never-ending, hammering repetition. If no contradictory voice is raised, so much the better. How successful the red propagandists have been in this is shown by a recent discussion with the members of a group of 10 Austrian journalists now touring this country under the auspices of the American Friends of the United Nations. These men, outstanding in their field, are highly experienced, with more than average education and culture. They have been in the United States for some time and they came here with certain ideas about the United States that puzzle an American. For instance, during their week-long stay in Cleveland, they watched operations in a large brokerage house. Some of them were amazed to learn that our big corporations have literally millions of stockholders, most of whom are ordinary people in work-a-day jobs like themselves.

As one of them put it: "I always thought that a few big shots—10 or 20, maybe—held the stock and grew rich on the profits. Well—you see, we get so much of that communist propaganda."

The visitors also were impressed with the degree of culture and democracy in this country. One of them wisely spoke of the fact that there are few American communities too small to have a public library. One suspects here the "big lie"—that Americans are barbarians, concerned with nothing more intellectual than grubbing for a dollar. The visitors had also heard that the Chinese are an American wonder how naive a grown man can be. But these Austrians are not naive—far from it. They just heard too much of the big lie and not enough of the truth. And if they swallow the big lie, how easily must it go down with the average European man-in-the-street and the ignorant peasant?

Now, do Americans who are naive. We are naive enough to believe that because we are naive, know how things are here, everybody else knows it. We are naive enough to believe we have never known the truth, without stopping to reflect that the most naive of nations is the one that has Moscow-serving propagandists.

Experience with these Austrian newspapermen makes one realize that the Russians can be naive and stupid in propaganda and walk off with the pot. It underscores once again the vital necessity of expanding and improving our propaganda agencies to the point where they can out-propaganda the masters of American-style democracy and the big lie will be retired from Russia's arsenal as an obsolete weapon.

ANIMAL CRACKERS

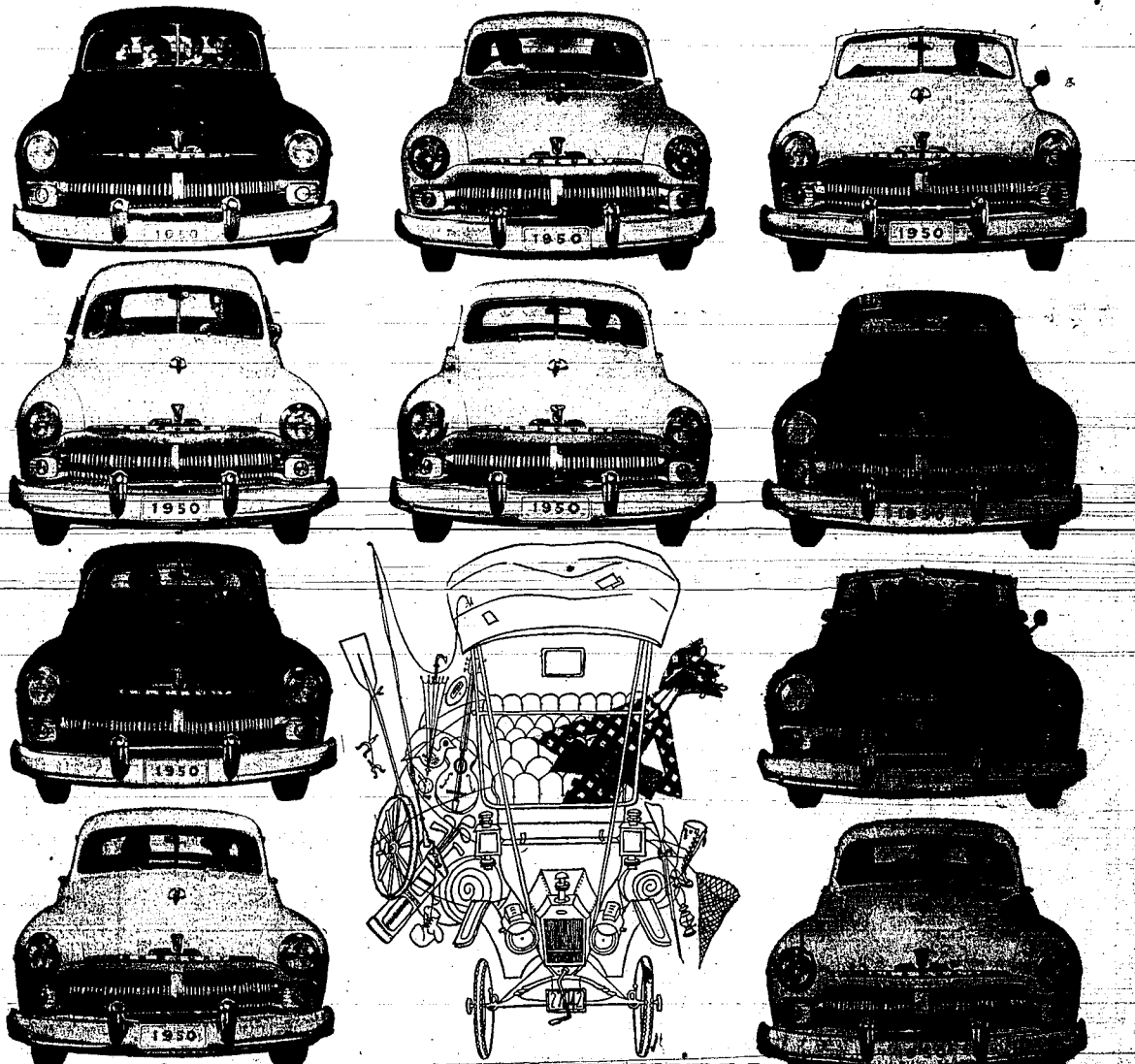

U. S. Officers Believe Army Needs Revise

TOKYO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Some high-ranking U. S. officers say they believe a radical change is needed in the organization of the American army in order to meet the requirements of the new type of warfare.

The officers, commenting in Korea during the course of tactics, when shortcomings were painfully evident, said they were of the opinion that they cannot be trained.

They were convinced that the army is being trained for the type of warfare that is being fought in Europe, and that it is necessary to revise the organization of the army to meet the requirements of the new type of warfare.

Court Sentences Teen-Age Killers

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 29 (AP)—Two teenage Waco, Tex., hitchhikers were sentenced to lengthy terms in the Arizona prison Monday for the second-degree murder of a traveling photographer who gave them a ride.

Superior Judge Francis Donofrio sentenced Earl Riddell, 19, to life imprisonment while sending Charles Opie, 16, to the state prison at Phoenix for not less than 25 years and not more than 40 years.

The youths were convicted after a two-week trial of shooting near Waco, Tex., 36-year-old Leo Angeles and Bobe photographer, near Waco, Tex. The jury of eight women and four men rejected a first degree murder charge and death penalty based by the state.

Ad Valorem Tax Levy Cut Slightly

BOISE, Aug. 29 (AP)—The state tax commission has recommended a slight decrease in ad valorem tax rates for 1935.

The commission set a total valuation for the state tax base at \$215,835,216. Of this amount, \$32,489,246 represents real and personal property, \$124,143,000 utility values and \$59,202,970 the subsequent personal toll for 1934.

The increase for real and personal property valuation over 1934 was \$12,000,000. The equivalent value of utility values was increased \$1,000,000. Decreases were reported for personal valuation, sugar valuations and mine valuations. There was no comparison between this year and last for pig iron valuation. It is set at \$335,350 this year. Sugar valuation decreased from \$7,765,250 to \$2,712,820 and net mica profits from \$15,376,106 to \$4,793,887.

House Okays Ban On Slot Shipment

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The House today passed a bill to ban the interstate shipment of slot machines—except to states where they are legal—in a move to curb an estimated \$3,000,000,000 a year gambling industry.

The bill passed by voice vote. The senate has already passed a similar measure. The house version now goes to the senate for consideration of house changes.

ably will be about the same or slightly less than last year.

"Pacific coast sportsmen for a long time have urged that bag and possession limits be identical," Day said in a statement.

"This year we have agreed to go along with them on an experimental basis, to find out whether waterfowl conservation can be better served that way."

The hunting season for mourning doves in Idaho has been opened in eight additional counties.

"This open season for ducks, geese and coots included:

Pacific flyway — Idaho, Oregon and Washington, Nov. 3-Dec. 31; Nevada, Oct. 15-Nov. 3 and Dec. 4-29; Utah, Oct. 13-Nov. 3 and Nov. 24-Dec. 15.

The daily shooting hours: Ducks, geese, brant and coots—Same as last year, from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

Rails, gallinules, woodcock, mourning or turtle dove, white-winged dove and band tailed pigeons—same as last year, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, with certain exceptions.

On the opening day, including each first day of the year, waterfowl and coot may not be hunted before 10 o'clock noon.

The limits for geese in the Pacific flyway is six, same as last year, in any combination not exceeding two of Canada geese or its subspecies, white-fronted geese or brant.

The closed season on float geese is continued.

Wool ducks—Closed season for nine states, including Wyoming, Nevada and Utah.

Coots—Daily bag limit same as last year, 15 birds. Possession limits same as daily bag limits.

Rails—Not more than 10 in the aggregate of mall (other than snags) and gallinules.

GOP Leaders Grab Incident As Top Issue

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Republican leaders grabbed the attempted White House "muzzling" of General Douglas MacArthur as a top campaign issue today, and promised to "take it to the people."

The falling cry was sounded by Ben Owen, executive director of the administration for "ignoring MacArthur's services," said the campaign is shaped on ousting corruption and "communism" from the government. This is certainly multiplying the confusion.

Republicans generally regarded the MacArthur incident as a made-to-order campaign issue which would order campaign in the November congressional elections. That only concern was finding means to keep it alive.

For the GOP's purposes, the White House's attempted suppression of the MacArthur statement on Formosa could not have come at a better time. Only last night National Chairman Guy George and national vice president Eugene McCarthy "white paper" on far eastern policy.

The document, entitled "Background to Korea," accused the administration of opening up China and the far east to the communists. In effect, it told GOP candidates to make use of this issue in the coming campaign.

The heated controversy was touched-off when President Truman forced MacArthur to withdraw a statement on the future of Formosa which was slated to be read yesterday at the Chicago convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

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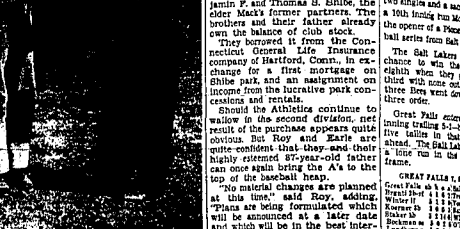

M'Arthur Still Facing Crises In Fifth Year

TOKYO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Five years after he arrived in Japan to sign the end to World War II, Gen. Douglas MacArthur again is at the head of allied troops fighting in what may be his last campaign.
The anniversary of his arrival in Japan is observed today in Tokyo tomorrow. Outwardly, it finds MacArthur's daily life not too different from what it was on the last anniversary.
The North Korean invasion has not created a war atmosphere in his headquarters. A few more lights are on longer in a few more rooms, that's all. What goes on in those few rooms is a different story.

Works Leager
As head of the United Nations forces in the far east, MacArthur occupies the same office he used at head of the occupation. His office hours have been extended by about an hour and a half. Apart from a few changes, his very strict routine remains the same.
But his long-range plans must have been affected deeply. MacArthur had planned to take a MacArthur daily life not too different from what it was on the last anniversary.
MacArthur, however, has said he will not leave until the peace treaty with Japan is signed and his task here finished. Now that the Korean war has given him a new task whose proportions are hard to calculate it may be a long time before he goes back to America.

When he does, he believes he will be remembered for the good job he considers he has done as peacetime administrator in occupied Japan. He has taken great pride in that job.
