# GI's in Korea Homesick for Japan Biletts

By DON WHITEHEAD  
WRESTLING AMERICAN GI'S IN KOREA, Sept. 30.—In World War II, the U. S. soldier learned to return home to New Orleans or to Texas—where his home might be. But in this case the GI's are homesick for Japan.

Most of the troops were called to Korea to fight the Japanese island empire to battle North Korean communists. Most of them had never seen in their lifetime or on one or two years here.

Boys Like Japan  
It wasn't long before the boys learned to like Japan. They were in their first love with an Allied enemy. They were well-liked and accepted easily. They were well-liked and accepted easily. They were well-liked and accepted easily.

Then suddenly they were pulled out of their new life in a different country and a stream of things that they see in Korea—the poverty and filth and primitive housing conditions—bring them back to the beauty of the mountains and beauty of Japan.

Japan Looks Good  
"I didn't know we had it so good over here in Japan," said one of the boys. "That country looks better to me all the time I'm here."

It wasn't only the war that gives Korea a bad name with the troops. It's the kind of food they eat, the conditions under which they live, the savage mosquitoes that rise out of the swamps at night, and the feeling that they cannot tell friends from foe among the natives.

War is a lonely activity business at best. But it seems even more dirty and more lonely for the troops here. They have a vicious army and it's not a vicious army that can be at the end of the war.

But it isn't a vicious army. It's an army that has known hardship and pain and still goes on fighting and pack back again. They can't see the end of the war.

Grateful for Streams  
The one big thing for which the GI's are grateful is that Korea's streams are lined with clear water. The GI's are grateful for the streams pouring down from the mountains. They can wash away the dirt of battle from their bodies and clean the filth from their minds.

In every stream, there are men bathing and relaxing for a short time from the strain of war.

Not All GI's Agree  
Korea is not all ugliness, of course. There is grandeur to be seen in the valleys. The central high fields are green and rolling. There are hills of green grass waving in the breeze.

But the fighting troops have little time to enjoy the beauty of the hills. They are hiding places of the guerrillas and red powder can conceal an enemy machine gun.

Unfortunately, the Americans will remember Korea long after the war. They will remember the fact that many brave South Koreans are fighting beside them.
