### Basin Group Gets Plan for Power Boosts

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—A way to get additional hydro-electric power for the Pacific northwest by mid-1955 was outlined Wednesday before the Columbia basin inter-agency committee.

The committee was told an acceleration of multiple purpose dams and power dams could provide 2,000,000 kilowatts more than is planned under existing re-estimation schedules.

This would involve 37 public and private power projects in four states and Canada. The schedule calls for 7,427,000 kilowatts of power by June, 1955. At the work was speeded up the region could have 10,230,000 kilowatts of "peaking power" over existing output. These projects include those in which the committee recognized there are conflicts over numerous issues.

Special emphasis was given 23 projects where the committee noted there were no serious disputes. A speed-up of these would add 1,700,000 kilowatts by June, 1955, Dr. Paul J. Raver said.

The Bonneville power administrator, current committee chairman, reported no agency in the basin had been advised on what additional power may be needed for national defense. He said the accelerated program was an attempt to set up possibilities.

### Truman Held No Doubt on Aide to Drop

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 (AP)—President Truman today said he had no doubt that he would drop the cabinet if Republican members of the cabinet were to resign.

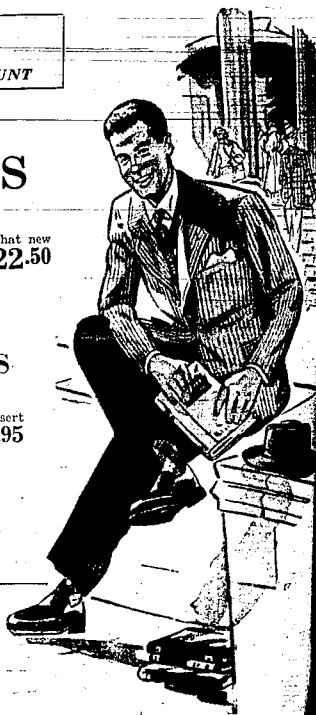
