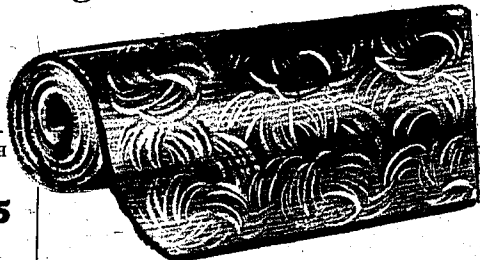

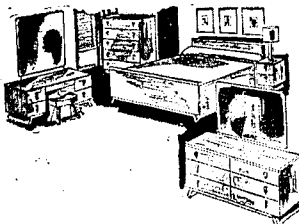

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# Cassia Division Special Deer Hunt Starts Thursday

Hunters throughout Magic Valley and other parts of Idaho will take to the south hills Thursday for the 8,000-permit Cassia division No. 1 special deer hunt, the largest special hunt in the state. Hunting will close Oct. 2.

A special group of 2,000 permit-holders will hunt in the same area in the Cassia division No. 2 special hunt from Oct. 6 to 20.

Deer are plentiful for the first hunt starting Thursday, according to officials of the state fish and game department.

Game department men estimate the deer herd in the south hills numbers over 10,000 and if it continues to grow, a kill of about 50 per cent is expected.

Crowder Davis, Twin Falls county conservation officer, reminded hunters that they must be out of the hunt area, regardless of whether they make a kill. Persons who fail to check out and out of checking stations will be fined \$100.

Davis said checking stations will be located on the Oakley-Hogerton road, near the mouth of the Snake river, and at the mouth of Indian Springs road near a creek. The latter check station is in the game department cabin. Big Cedar west of Oakley, Trapper Creek east of Idaho Falls and the letter road.

Checking stations will begin operation at noon of the day preceding the hunt opening.

Hunters must have their deer tags along with their license and a check for the license when checking at stations. Hunters are required to check out their tags to check out and receive a receipt for their tags before firing.

Hunters are advised to observe all deer danger signs posted in the forest, depict recent rains and hunters are urged to be careful and "practice" by having equipment and clothing in the forest. Hundreds of hunters were out on the hills last week, and light clothing when snow struck the hunt region.

Check stations are available at license vendors and also will be available at checking stations.
