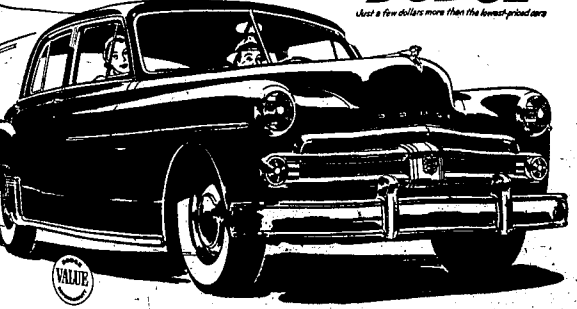

Bankers Urge Fight Against U.S. Inflation

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP)—The nation's bankers have recommended a plan financial aid to fight inflation.

The need for higher taxes, strict control over credit, a reduction of consumer purchasing power was stressed by the banker officials at the 75th annual convention of the American Bankers Association.

"Under no circumstances must we permit their symbolization of an evil force in the world to be hallowed and glorified by any semblance of martyrdom."

Any soldier will tell you the overall military position of the Korean communists is hopeless today. Their chief supply line from North Korea has been cut and their main army is scattered between two good-sized U.S. and National forces.

But they probably have at least one good fight left. And a fair chance exists that they even might attempt a limited offensive. As every human knows, a wounded animal is capable of lashing out with great ferocity.

Adolf Hitler taught the allied general a lesson near the end of World War II. He had broken out of our Normandy beachhead. Patton's tanks were being pushed across France and the sea opened near Dunkirk at that moment Hitler assembled every soldier he could scrape up and struck one mightily down low. His offensive is known in the history books today as the battle of the bulge and coming as it did at the Christmas season when allied hopes were high, it dealt a hard blow to our morale.

The Dwight D. Eisenhower general thought the situation advanced out in 10 days or two weeks, but not until the Germans won many successes and inflicted heavy casualties, particularly on American troops.

The strategy the communists have is that they are on the defensive and they know it. They have abandoned hope that they can push into the south. Their only chance is to win a big strategic battle as possible on our troops, dig into well fortified positions and try to keep the war into a winter stalemate.

The article said the Baltic wall will include a triangle of fortified islands designed as an "Oblivion of coast" and possibly a series of islands for added missiles on the island of Osel, outside the bay of Riga.

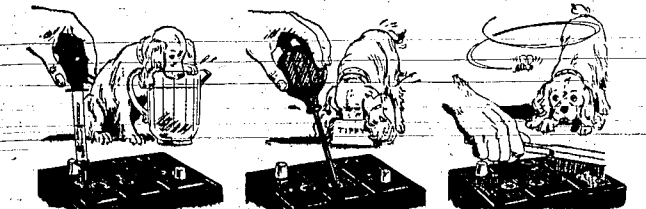

Bright Spots Gleam in Yellow Sand Where Injured GI Spat

By HAL BOYLE
 GOSWELDERE, WY. (AP)—A small supply truck trundled up to the Naklog river, south of a ruined city called Warwasan.

It was the day after the 24th infantry division had stormed back over the river on the long return route to Seoul.

This dawn crossing had marked the first really successful attack by the American eighth army after 80 straight days. During those days it had defended the front line under the leadership of Gen. Walton H. Walker.

The supply truck was loaded with heavy action belts and needed gasoline. But at one point the road it paused with the courtesy of the battlefront to pick up a solitary, hitchhiking soldier.

He was a private first class and he looked like a tired battle straggler lost from his company.

He was a stocky youth of about 22 with blue eyes and a stare that could have sold cars "the thousand-yard look." It is an expression men often get after sudden battle shock or long exposure to danger.

The private's face was pale beneath his tan. He wore stained dungarees and had no helmet over his fatigue cap. He carried neither weapon nor canteen, and that was unusual too, in a fighting zone.

He climbed laboriously into the back of the truck. As it swung slowly on up the heavy road he sat down wearily among the gasoline cans next to another hitchhiker—Sam Price, an associated Press correspondent.

Price, who served in the marines in the last war, had crossed the river crossing the day before. He was on his way up again to go over the Naklog and get the first news story of how the attack was faring on the other side of the river.

The two soon fell to talking. The private was nervous and kept clutching his sides with both arms as he spoke. He said he was one of the engineers whose job had been to steer the assault boats that carried the doughboys across the Naklog.

"I was in the second wave," he said. "They shot up our boat with machineguns and it went down. Then a mortar shell hit in the river by the end it seemed like the water was squelching me to death."

The private held his chest and was breathing painfully and spit the side of the truck. He shook his head when Price said that he was a doctor.

"I looked out and I guess I would have squeaked if some of my buddies hadn't pulled me into another boat," he said. "Don't remember

anything about the next 12 hours, except standing in a slow line somewhere. Then I came to in a hospital.

When the truck halted to let him off, he climbed slowly down. He gripped his chest, bent over and coughed and spit between his widespread feet.

Then he straightened, said "So long" and walked off to rejoin his unit.

As the truck pulled away, Fred glanced at where the private had stood. In the golden dust gleamed several bright drops. They were red.

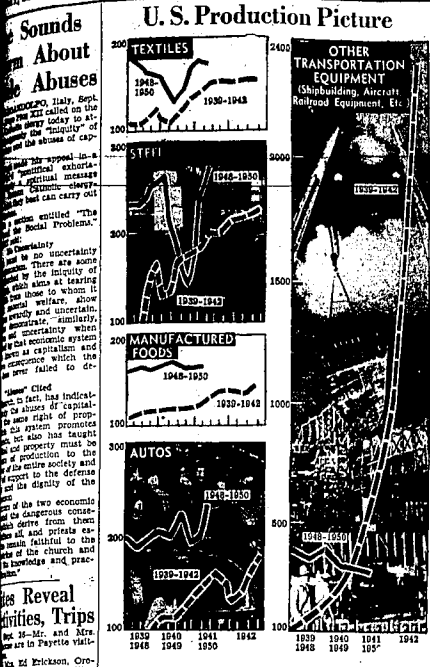

Plans on Prices Spark Strife for Red-Held Vienna

VIENNA, Sept. 23 (AP)—Communist demonstrators rioted in the heart of Vienna today and thousands of workers in Russian-controlled industrial plants were reported to have struck in protest against government plans to raise prices along with wages.

The hard-core of some 500 communists gathered with a mob of nearly 2,000 in an attempt to break through a police cordon thrown around the Austrian chancellery.

While workers from Russian-operated plants outside Vienna poured into the city, Soviet authorities barred the entry of police reinforcements summoned by the ministry of interior.

Draft Chief Sees No Need for Men in Older Bracket

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 (AP)—Gen. Lewis B. Hershey said Monday he believes President Truman's goal of 3,000,000 men in the armed forces can be reached without drafting men over 25 years old.

The U. S. draft chief also said he doubts that the draft-age—now set at 18 through 25—will go to 45 as it did in World war II.

That he emphasized that the prospect to train America "will last a generation."

Hershey said the manpower pool of 1,600,000 classified as "ok" would give 500,000 before next June 1, and he predicted that draft boards will be dipping into the 18-year-olds before the end of this year. Youth is not being drafted now, he said.

Hershey gave his views in an interview copyedited by U. S. News and World Report, weekly news magazine.

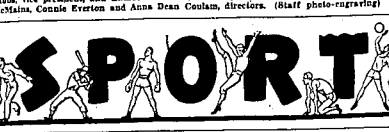

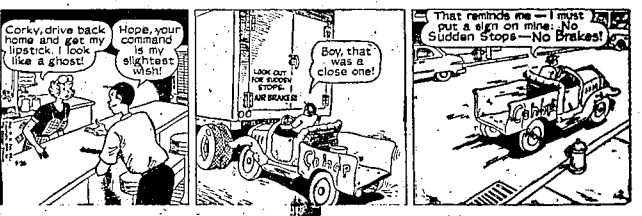

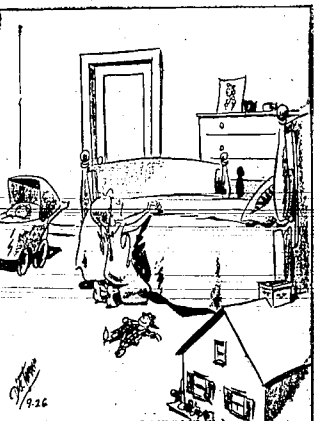

PORT NELSON, B. C., Sept. 10—Forest fires burned over 50,000 square miles of northeastern British Columbia today, threatening several communities and threatening to cut vital communication links with Alaska.

"Local Canadian air force planes flew over the fires after sighting on between Port St. John and Port Nelson. He said the blaze extended over an area 400 miles long and 300 miles wide.

"Literally burning up"

"Northeastern British Columbia is literally burning up," Lawson said. "The flames covered an area the size of the state of Minnesota along the Rocky mountain foothills. Smoke floated 2,000 miles to eastern Canada," weather observers said.

"Fire fighters said only a good rain could halt the spread of the virgin timber.

"One fire advanced within a mile of the Fort Nelson airstrip, a stop-over for planes flying from the United States to Alaska.

"Town Harrowed"

Fort Nelson was surrounded by fire and blanketed by dense smoke. Radio was the only method of communication with the town of 250 persons.

"Forty persons were evacuated from an army post at mile 80 on the Alaska highway and a telegraph repeater station at mile 100 was burned out," the RCMP said.

"Roadblocks were thrown up on the Alaska highway. The wartime military road led through the heart of the flaming area.

Seizure Is Fatal To State Girl, 15

CAMBRIDGE, Sept. 24—Mary Beattie Shelburn, 15, died of a heart attack late yesterday while participating with the local high school band. The student died before medical aid could be summoned. Corporal A. O. Jones said no inquest is planned.

Mrs. Beattie Shelburn was the daughter of Mrs. Glenn E. Sharp, Wester. Two brothers and one sister also survive.
