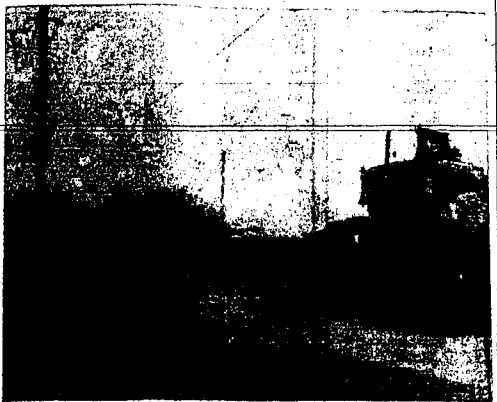

Teachers Say Tots' Queries Get Technical

TWIN FALLS, Sept. 27 (AP)—A little knowledge of an atom bomb and a nodding acquaintance with the "red" are more helpful to today's kindergarten teachers than the rules for a round game of drop-the-handkerchief, according to Amy Hostler.

The pretrial and three parts set is much more worldly than it used to be, she says, and the world being what it is today, a kindergarten teacher just has to be prepared to settle some red hot international issues in the sand pit.

Hostler is the dynamic director of the Mills school, a college which trains girls to teach in nursery schools and kindergartens.

"The children who are 4 and 5 years old can spell out the heads of lines," she said, sitting at her desk. "So they ask their teacher what a Korean is and then they want to know why people fight. That last question stumps statement," she added. "So you can imagine how confused a kindergarten teacher gets trying to give a child an honest answer."

The real poser came up in a kindergarten last year, when a student teacher was asked, "what is an atomic?"

"Just try and answer that one without destroying a child's illusions about mankind," said Miss Hostler. "You definitely believe teachers and parents must take the time to meet four years of questions in the next four years, so children will feel that they're being included in our adult world."

Children spot planes, Miss Hostler also pointed out, like they used to pick out different automobiles. Even splitting atoms is a subject likely to interest a kindergarten scientist, providing the overtures adults discuss it.

To try and help their 300 girl students understand today's children, the Mills school employs a childcare psychiatrist.

On the mechanical side, Miss Hostler said, "we've been talking about sending away for all the government pamphlets on atom bombs, and also adding a course on different types of plants and other technological advances."

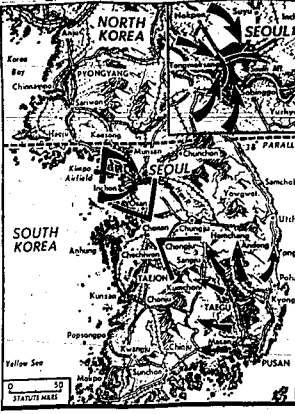



Broadhead, young Minidoka county farmer, whose farm is considered one of the most outstanding under the present purchase program of the FFA in this area.

Broadhead operates a 40-acre farm southwest of Rupert, and although he has farmed there only since the spring of 1941, he already has proved himself to be an outstanding farmer and dairyman, Gardner said.

Gardner was born in the house where he now lives 23 years ago. To be a farmer was the natural thing. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Earl Broadhead, were pioneer farmers in this area and, at an early age, their son decided to be a farmer. While working in FFA projects, Broadhead bought the two registered Jersey calves, the basis for his present dairy herd.

After graduating from Burley high school, he went into the navy, where he served for almost two years. During that time, he married Corn May Garner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Garner, pioneer district farmer. Their son, Randall, was born March 1, 1943.

His potatoes produced 250 sacks per acre, and his sugar beets went 2 1/2 tons per acre, which is considered exceptionally good for beets in this area. His dairy cattle help to maintain the fertility of the soil.

From the two FFA calves, which he purchased from a Provo, Utah, dairy, the dairy herd has built up to 14 milk cows, 11 heifers and calves, and one registered Jersey bull. The bull came from a Center-Ville, Utah, dairy and has an outstanding record of high-milk production in his ancestry.

The milk produced on the Broadhead ranch is sold to a dairy. The young farmer has put in extra equipment to meet grade A requirements but within nine months he paid back the extra expenditure from the additional money received as extra premium for grade A milk he produces.

Broadhead is secretary-treasurer of the South-Central Idaho Jersey Breeders association, a member of the Idaho Hired Improvement association, and is listed in the Hired Employment registry.

His cows have been high producers in the local cow-testing acquisition. Broadhead attributes the high milk production to his good stock, giving the cows good care, such as adequate shelter and a covered manger, and the feeding of balanced rations. Milking the cows at regular times is important, too, the maintainer.

Broadhead also believes that keeping up pasture is important. He mows and phosphates his pasture every year, during the fall, a practice which is not done by many farmers. He attaches importance to pasture upkeep, because "if you make more money per acre from cow pasture than from any other part of the farm," he said.

Gardner pointed out that Broadhead's pasture carries 27 cows per acre, an exceptionally high carrying capacity. The average here is two cows per acre, for irrigated pasture. Along with fertilizing, the use of an improved pasture seed mix recommended by the University of Idaho, is credited with this unusual carrying capacity.

As interested in the farm activities as his husband, Mrs. Broadhead, 22, keeps house, raises chickens, sews, and cans fruits and vegetables to the count of 200 quarts at least, for her family of three. Last year she and her husband re-decorated their six-room house, doing the painting and papering themselves.

Her yard is full of flowers, and to the east of the house are large sweeping willow trees. The trees were set out as small willows by Broadhead's parents years ago.

Korea-Bound Men Advised Fear 'Normal'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—GIs headed for Korea are being told it is normal to be afraid in combat and "bravery consists of going on in spite of that fear."

The War Relocation Authority is preparing for troop commands as part of a four-hour orientation course given men headed for the Korean war front.

"The men are told that the fighting is all about and how the GI probably will react under it."

"It is a fact that he is more worried about being afraid than he is of the enemy," the commander points out, "or course he will be afraid."

"Real and Normal"

"Every soldier has real and normal fears in combat. Fear is as much a part of combat as is danger."

"No normal man can face the war with the same feeling he has when walking through the woods on a sunny day. Remember, when you're frightened, the enemy is just as scared as you are when you're afraid."

"Bravery consists of going on in spite of that fear; the overcoming of fear, doing your job in spite of fear. That fact has been proved by millions of soldiers like you."

Confidence Boosted

The commander then goes into the confidence he needs and help him overcome his fear.

He points out first that the GI can trust his weapons, and that he feels secure in the knowledge that his squad, platoon and supporting units "will do their utmost."

"Second, he must realize that the odds of a battle are definitely in his favor; the picture continues. "Picture prices that even in the most fierce fighting relatively few people are killed. And the most aggressive soldiers fare better than the ones who are overly cautious."

Initial Paychecks Next Month To Feel Larger Pay Tax Bite

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (NEA)—Some taxpayers will feel the effect of the new increase in income taxes in their first pay envelope in October.

Generally, it will be a 20 per cent bigger bite, which results from the three per cent increase in the withholding rate.

For example, married man with a wife and two children will have \$80 deducted for taxes on a \$1000 salary.

Twenty-five per cent of the people will have the increased tax handled for them automatically as increased payroll deductions.

The other five per cent, farmers, businessmen, those self-employed and those who have filed a declaration of estimated tax for 1950 will continue to pay the quarterly amounts due under the old rate of 20 per cent.

If the new rate raises their quarterly payments they will have to settle up on the extra 1950 tax by March 15.

Those who filed reasonably accurate estimates of 1950 tax need not file an amended estimate. If you underestimated your 1950 tax by 20 per cent or more, however, you should file an amended declaration by Jan. 15 to insure against a penalty.

Actually the taxes for all of 1950 will be increased about five per cent, but in order to collect that in the last three months of the year, the withholding goes up about 20 per cent.

The 1951 tax is actually about 20 per cent more than the tax being levied the present increase. That means that the deductions starting in 1951 will be exactly the same as the ones which were started in October. This juggling of rates was done merely to make it easier for the bureau to collect the taxes.

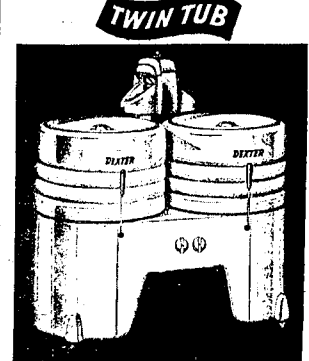

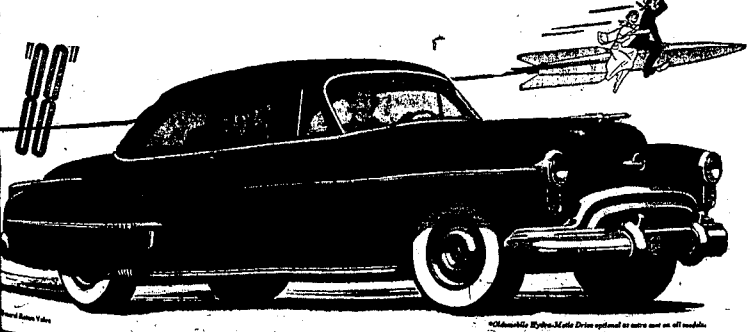

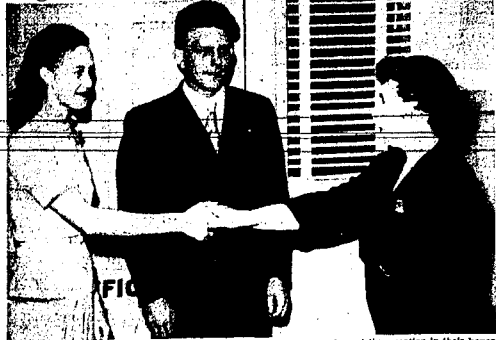
