**India Discovers Self-Rule Has Many Drawbacks in Operation**

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—India has lasted three years of independence, and there are signs that the state may be getting a little sour.

The man in the street rejoiced when the British left in 1947. His own people were in power, at last, after centuries of foreign rule. There was much talk of more rice, better pay and new houses.

The common man is no better off now than he was. He gets no more to eat. It is much harder to find a place to live. When you walk at night through Delhi you pick your way among the bodies of ragged people who sleep by the thousands on concrete and dirt because they have no other place to stay. An estimated 20,000 lire wander and wander on sidewalks and stairways, in alleys and doorways.

Hundreds of thousands of others are packed, sometimes 20 or more to a room, in tenements as shabby and filthy as rabbit hutchies. Broken-down, decrepit buildings, the city has never been so more better.

You see few fat men in India. Such basic necessities as rice and vegetables and sugar bring fancy black market prices. Only the well-to-do can afford meat. Unpasteurized milk, adulterated with water, and sold in grubby pails, costs almost twice as much as milk in New York.

Indians still are among the poorest, worst-fed, worst-housed people on earth. The people grumble that the government is not improving over the British.

The government, well aware that discontent breeds revolution, has mapped courses of projects designed to keep India from going the way of China. Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru has assigned top priority to the job of raising the nation's standard of living.

One of the biggest of these programs calls for the building of a vast network of river valley projects which would double India's electric power and irrigate 10,000,000 acres of land, adding about 2,000,000 acres of grain to the nation's annual crop.

But the plan, though grandiose on paper, is still largely in the blueprint stage and promises no large scale material benefits for years to come.

WASHINGTON—President Truman will ask for \$20 or \$15 billion dollars in annual taxes in his opening message to the November-December session of Congress on the economic program.

This amount will be in addition to the \$4,000,000,000 in income tax increases proposed in the Economic Recovery Act of 1950, which is now in effect.

Mr. Truman's proposed program is for both economic and military purposes.

The principal advocate of these burdensome taxes and out-of-control income tax increases is the President's economic advisor, Dr. Leon H. Keyserling, the youthful and radical economist.

Chairman Keyserling's reports to the President, Mr. Truman, are full of figures and statistics.

Mr. Keyserling wants to finance war expenditures for the next four years on a pay-as-you-go basis.

He wants no appreciable increase in the public debt, but he wants to raise taxes on the wealthy.

He also wants to raise taxes on the middle and lower income groups, and especially in Russia and the Latin American countries.

For political reasons, mainly the election of a Democratic Congress in 1952, Mr. Truman is asking for the raising of taxes and wage-price controls.

He will give out the bad news from the White House within a few days after next month's election.

### Utah Counties Spend \$13.06 Per Resident

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 6 (AP)—Utah's county governments spent an average of \$13.06 per person in 1949, according to the 1950 census, for a total of \$499,000, the Utah Foundation Report says today.

The foundation, an independent tax and government study organization, said that of the total, counties spent \$27,000,000 for general operations, \$17,000,000 for public safety and operation of hospitals, and \$15,000,000 for other activities.

"Expenditures by the foundation showed 30 per cent of the 1949 expenditures in Utah's 29 counties by county governments went for roads and streets, 22 per cent for general operation; 10 per cent for county hospitals and indigent care; 9 per cent for operation of sheriff offices; 2.5 per cent for aids to agriculture and livestock work control; 2.5 per cent for maintenance of buildings and grounds; 2 per cent for fire prevention; 1.8 per cent for debt retirement; and 1.3 per cent for miscellaneous classifications.

County revenue during the year totaled \$2,500,000 with property taxes as providing the largest single source of income—\$1,900,000. The foundation said that while Utah law requires detailed annual county financial reports, the compliance is not complete. Foundation experts said a major weakness in the system is the lack of uniformity in financial reporting systems by the county governments, particularly banks and insurance companies as well as public utilities.

### New Global Crisis May Speed Lengthy Alaska-U.S. Rail Link

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—The renewed U. S. determination to hasten its long-sought expansion may mean a railroad to Alaska.

Even before Korea, such a plan had passed the dream stage. Last October, President Truman signed legislation authorizing negotiations with the Canadian government for location of a railroad route across Canada to Alaska.

Specifically, the bill calls for a survey for a railroad to Prince George, B. C., to Fairbanks, where it would connect with the Alaskan railroad.

"What would be the cost? Nobody has made a recent estimate. However, in 1942, when the Japs were crunched on some of the Alaskan Islands, the American army engineers made a quick survey and placed the cost at \$200,000,000. Military supplies now go by steamer, by plane or via the Alcan highway, a relic of the last war. A railroad would be the most direct and could carry the largest cargoes the fastest.

It means connecting Quinal and Prince George by rail. A fast 38-mile bar-and-railway, will allow the gap between Vancouver and Quinal. A rail extension from Prince George north and to the west to Fairbanks would mean more than 1,000 miles of track but cost less, say it wouldn't encounter too many geographical difficulties. The road would follow what is known as the Rocky Mountain "branch," a valley-like stretch of land on the west side of the Rockies. The weather's mild, too, to allow all-year passage.

DES MOINES, Oct. 5 (AP)—Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, New Rochelle, N. Y., has been re-elected to a two-year term as president of the United Lutheran Church in America. It will be his fourth consecutive term.

Dr. F. Epling Reinartz, also of New Rochelle, was re-elected secretary, an office he has held the past four years. Henry Baier, Upper Merionide, N. J., was re-elected treasurer.

The election took place during the opening session of the 11th biennial convention of the ULCA, which opened for a nine-day convalescence yesterday.

A highlight of the opening session was reception of the New Jersey group as the 32nd constituent synod of the ULCA. Five associate synods in foreign countries were received as affiliated churches.

They are located in Argentina, British Guiana, Japan, and Liberia.

## Gooding's Efficient, Modern Volunteer Fire Department Celebrates 40th Year

GOODING, Oct. 11.—It isn't the extra money a man makes that prompts him to join a volunteer fire department. It is not that much as it is that he likes to fight fires. That and a feeling of his responsibility. It has been those two chief activities in a natural "fire-eater" and risks his life and hurt every time the whistle blows.

Other qualifications are standard. He must be of legal age, a resident of the city or town in which he wishes to serve, own his own automobile, be of good moral character and in good health.

At least that's the way it works in Gooding whose department has maintained a membership record of 40 years. The Gooding volunteer fire department does not seek recruits. On the other hand, Fire Chief W. D. Crocker said, it always has a waiting list much longer than it is able to use.

There are 15 members in the Gooding department. The chief is the only one on a regular salary and he is on duty 24 hours a day. The members are George Anderson, Ernest Leland, Elmer Johnson, Cleveland Johnson, Charles Legg, Francis Markitt, Jerry Markitt, William Oakley, M. L. Roberts, Charles Smith, Keith Tester, Carroll Tester, Gene Wright and Arnold Wood.

The first volunteer fire department in Gooding was organized in 1894 with Fred Bush as chief. Fred Bush was the second chief and Harry came next in line serving continuously for a number of years. Others who have served in that capacity are Harley Cropper, Tom Sawyer of Gooding, Herbert Churchill and Crocker.

M. L. Roberts has been a member of the department for 23 years. E. L. Sutton, "Sol" Solomon and Harry Levy were instrumental in the organization of the Southern Idaho Firemen's group.

During the last year the department has made 40 runs, 20 within the city limits, 20 in the rural area. All "big" fires in which the department assisted the range fire fighting crew.

The department in Gooding has a mutual assistance agreement with Wendell so that each city can use all its equipment on both city and rural, while the other department "stands by." Two men are not on duty in the station—they either truck is called and if help is needed after they have left they will stand by. Wendell members have assisted twice in recent times. They can bring a truck with it to Gooding in 10 minutes.

Members of the Gooding department are trained for "big" fires. Crocker said. He believes that the fire fighters of a fire are worth the next two hours.

When a "call" comes in to the station, the man on duty, usually Crocker or Charles Smith, captain, touches the button to blow the siren, marks the location on the call board

and in 16 seconds the truck is rolling out of the station.

Members of the department place a code call to the telephone office to learn the location of the fire and then they have their hoses or work to go directly to the fire. Men are alerted for that hour on a fire fighting job and it thereafter for the whole area and it per call in the city.

There are only 20 code calls—one for each location of the fire—two fire companies, Clint Oakley. At night each member is called from the station in case one may not have heard the siren.

In speaking on the importance of fire fighting to a fire-fighters' convention "when we go to a fire we don't know how many lives may be in danger. The men on the street can get out of the way but the men in the fire may not be able to escape."

"If people would only give five to ten dollars and the volunteer firemen who are making their own property to protect others. It would make things easier for the men."

The city of Gooding purchased a new fire truck and one in 1937. The fire station was built the same year. In the rural fire department was organized and another truck, while one, was purchased.

The fire siren blows once for fires in the city and twice for rural fires. The department is equipped with modern fire fighting equipment it can obtain. Crocker said a small unit is needed to precede the large trucks, to sort of clear the way for the big trucks. The car could carry fire saving equipment and small fire extinguishers. A small dry powder extinguisher is carried on the trucks and in police cars in the city.

In naming some of the latest equipment Crocker praised the new dry powder extinguisher. He said Crocker freezes firemen, water drowns them but dry powder is harmless and even can be breathed. "The dry powder works with water. It is recommended the small four pound size for home or office. It is depended under pressure and causes no damage such as is caused by water or other types of extinguishers."

The air-pick is another modern piece of equipment. It gets the firemen into a hole in a wall and sets him right to the source of the fire safely. It keeps the fireman comfortable and confident while working under tough breathing conditions, supplying cool, refreshing air even when the going is rugged.

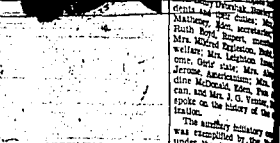

### Senate Crime Probers Scan Capone Gains

CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (AP)—The senate crime investigating committee sought to learn today whether the old Capone gang has rebuilt its empire into a nationwide "syndicate" ruling gambling, vice, narcotics traffic and other racket.

The committee, headed by Sen. James McFay, D. Ill., opened two-day secret sessions in the U. S. courthouse where Senators Al Capone was sentenced in 1931 for income tax evasion.

McFay, who arrived here from Washington early today for the hearings, a non-union committee agents had served 20 subpoenas on mobsters, minor hoodlums and others who might have information to give the senators.

He said they "hope to serve about 40 more."

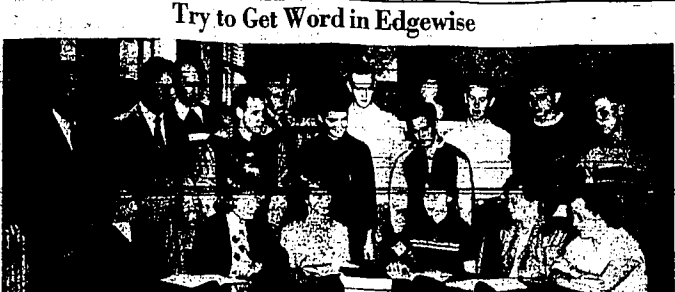

**North Koreans Find Red Rule Worse Than Jap Occupation**

YANGYANG, Korea, Oct. 5 (AP)—Some North Koreans in this first Asian town certain city to be liberated say their communist bosses were worse than the Japanese. But the northeners liked the red policy of redistributing the land.

The Japanese rule went out at the end of the war. Then came the Korean communist rulers to this town of 10,000 just north of the 38th parallel.

These people who lived for five years under the communists don't easily forget the fear they knew. But Chai Byong Il and the others seem to be doing their best to overcome it.

"They have begun to criticize their red rulers. While it is the way of the orient to get on the bandwagon, this criticism takes some time to get to a people who cannot be sure the reds will be back soon."

Chai said about life behind the iron curtain is to eat on the floor of his eight-by-eight-foot room on a Yangyang side street.

He was in Japan when the war ended. The smugglers who brought him and his family back landed in North Korea. "The communists would not let them go into South Korea because Chai's wife was a northerner."

Chai went to work cooking for the Yangyang Communist party headquarters. He cooked for about 60 young party workers who had been trained in Pyongyang, the communist capital. Yangyang was a prefectural (provincial) capital.

### Drop Noted in Idaho Income Tax Receipts

BOISE, Oct. 5 (AP)—Idaho income tax receipts showed a \$200,463.31 drop during the three months ending Sept. 30, compared to the same period in 1933.

And state tax collector P. O. McNeil says for a continued decline in total income tax receipts.

State income tax revenue dropped to a total of \$1,277,200 for the three-month period.
