**'Welcome Mat' Set Out For Taylor in Alabama**

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 10 (AP)**—"The welcome mat" was laid out in front of Birmingham city jail for Idaho's Sen. Glen H. Taylor today. Taylor stumped the invitation. 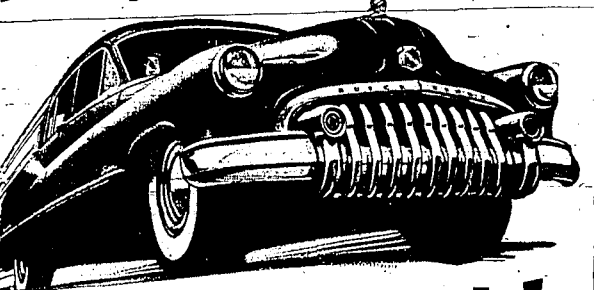

### TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—A "war" against the American people is being waged which it is said to be in the infancy showing that it is to be a grim one.

"I don't know," says a "senior" heard all about Washington these days.

The main fact is that the present controls and the new one are not a matter of degree for the kind of a struggle the United States has engaged in. More is necessary.

**SAMPLE** Present controls are just a sample. They are just a warm-up for things to come, regardless of what happens in Korea.

If the people have been deceived, it is not the result of plotting by some one party. It is one of those things that result from a rather special set of circumstances and the way democracy works in critical times.

For a long time it has been apparent that what we call "controls" now would not be sufficient. But with the critical moment of a war, one-third of the senate facing reelection, was necessary to act. And President Truman did not insist on all the controls his administration wanted.

**BLAME**—Neither congress nor the president are to blame. While we elect leaders in a democracy and those are expected to be a few years ahead of the people in their knowledge of the world.

For either Mr. Truman or congressmen to have taken too far ahead in the matter of control would have meant the end of their political careers.

They were on a hot tip. If the President did not look for some control, he would have been in a bad way. For country operates, there would have been danger that, by Nov. 7, the need for controls would have been so great that the voters would have reacted. This might have led to a shambles among the political fortunes of the present members, Republicans as well as Democrats, and those Democrats who supported Mr. Truman, either incumbents or aspirants for jobs held by Republicans, would have been slaughtered.

**COMPROMISE**—On the other hand, if the administration and congress had not agreed on a program of control, their positions would have been equally hazardous. They would have reacted violently against the control program if they had not agreed on it in an effort, if not to please the voters, at least not to ruin them.

As the situation develops, a large number of congressmen would have an opportunity to get home and talk to their constituents—and see how they vote—before committing themselves to any program.

**REALISTIC**—Once the elections are over in the way that will be mentioned in the opinion column, most administration workers, more realistic in view of the situation at home and abroad, will say that the controls that are now being put on congress, but to control that Mr. Truman now has power to impose on congress, are "depend on Federal reserve board action."

The FRB, being somewhat less sensitive to political pressure than the Federal Reserve Board, will be the morning after the election. The fact that this consumer credit passed the \$300,000,000 mark in August is the reason for this. However, it is at least possible that the White House will suggest that a turn of the screw on credit before the elections might interest some administration officials as a satisfactory, with possible repercussions on Nov. 7.

**RENDS**—Once the elections are over of the way, action looking toward controls of prices and rents can be taken.

You really don't get surprised that what happens, because you read it here. A program for new rent controls is being prepared and will be in effect before the program is completed. If the program fails, Mr. Truman, he will present it to congress shortly after it reconvenes. He will have the support of the administration, the congressmen go home and new ones come in January. Price controls seem like a certainty. Congressmen will be expected to support them. They will be expected to support them and they want the rise in prices checked.

And with price controls, there will be a strong effort to control the cost of living. When the controls are imposed to such a step, no one knows how to make price controls stick without fixing the price of a man's coat.

And more effective controls on new housing, which is the subject of the article, priorities and allocations. Merry Christmas!

Now that their North Korean adventure has misfired, the Russians are going into a contemplative mood. It is not as if we had been clear that the Berlin blockade was a failure.

Jacob Malik, Russia's representative on the U. S. security council, matters something about east and west getting together to talk peace. Moscow is very anxious to see this year at the U. N. general assembly.

It is hard to see how the west can contain itself for joy at this wonderful turn of events. But wait—think back over the past five years. Remember how many times the Russians have uttered that magic word "peace." Remember, too, that in every case they demonstrated by unmistakable word and action that they didn't mean it.

In conferences in the west, they made it painfully evident that their minimum terms for peace called for a surrender and sacrifice by the west that it could not possibly make in safety. And there was no profit in Moscow's Moscow terms it would stop grabbing. You'd have only the Russian word, which is like owning an acre of air.

Despite these many brutal disappointments, despite the fact that Soviet claims have thousands times times contradicted the professions of peaceful intent, there are still important men in this world who perk up in hopeful anticipation every time the Kremlin loses out that word "peace."

This time, the Russian "peace" feeling—"This time, they really mean it." But how naive and simple can you get? How blind?

It makes one wonder—whether even a major war engineered by Russia would be convincing. Obviously the Korean war didn't do it. The faith of these men in Moscow's intentions.

Fortunately for the free world, that once Russia puts on the "soft" act, a few less countries are taken in by it. Cynicism toward the Kremlin is spreading. This time, France, which has as much to lose as any nation by another war, indicates it no longer will have any truck with the standard Russian facade.

India's attitude is still with us. India, above all, seems bent on capturing the 1950 championship in the field of innocent bewilderment. India's men at the U. N. talk of another big war meaning to settle east-west differences. India's men at the U. N. talk of enjoying the cold war and is merely being stubborn in refusing to compromise with the Soviet union. Are the Indians talking about life on the planet earth?

Naturally the west, which by now is only bored by the replaying of the same old Russian records, will ignore India's childlike pleading for a bright fairy world.

Unless its resolve should weaken anew, the west will devote the time to getting the kind of defense which will prevent the Russians from overrunning Europe and the rest of Asia. That's the only peace effort that means anything these days. If in so doing, we compromise, the Russians will be glad to take peace might ensue. But our own strength will be our guarantee. Nobody ought to put a penny on a Russian promise.

**He finally emerged** when heavy enemy traffic slowed and there was no full moon to keep him from trading at night. He was so weak, he fell while trying to cross the road. He swam to a stream and drank the first water he had had since his capture went dry four days before.

**"That revived him,"** he got a meal of rice from a peasant, but, "he walked for two nights across the mountains. He said enemy troops were more numerous as he approached the Nakdong river. He couldn't get through a barrier of barbed wire."

**It was then he met** the young South Korean. On his advice Hicks hid out in the hills. The Korean hid out for several days.

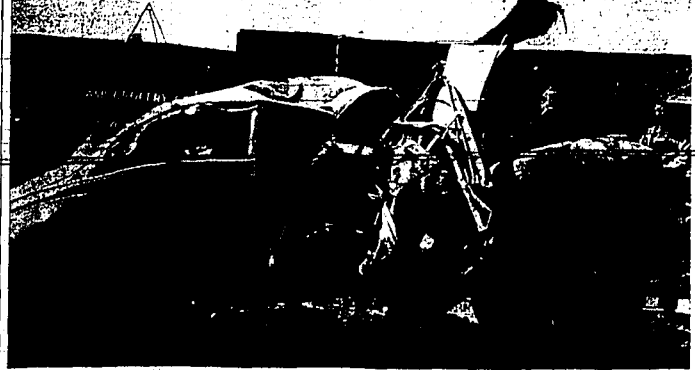

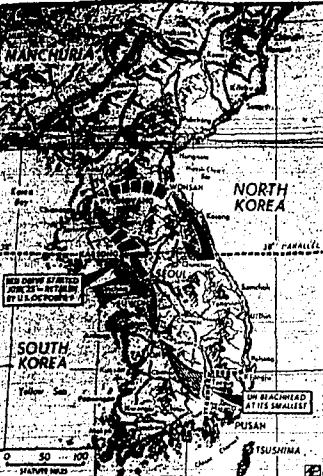

Today they received only one first place nomination. Notre Dame has finished no lower than ninth since 1924 and almost always has been way up during the season. 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### Legionnaires Stage Parade At L. A. Meet

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10 (AP)—The national American Legion convention called a halt to business sessions today to stage a mammoth six-hour parade designed to accent the prep. for continued national operations.

The stream of perhaps 50,000 uniformed men and women will include tanks, armored equipment and troops of the 11th armored reserve division, under the command of convention speakers against smugness over the Korean victory.

Traditional services will be without the traditional Legion pomp, music and drum. Plenty of color, snappy drill teams and some decorated legions and ancient locomotives, reminiscent of the 40 and 50 days, will participate.

Down town streets are closing in honor of the Legion. 50 are schools so thousands of youngsters can see the parade.

At the 32nd annual convention opening yesterday, speakers—former Secretary of Defense George C. Marshall urged the Legion to help "overcome vigorous opposition of small minorities" opposed to universal military training.

Major Gen. William Donovan, commander of the office for strategic services in World War II, described this nation's preponderant program as "an effort to compel the rest of the world to accept the peace—the only kind of peace we can get today, a peace by compulsion in the face of our atomic and power."

**Budens Speaks**

Lula Budens, former editor of the communists' Daily Worker and now a Fordham university professor, said recognition of Red China as the chief aim of Russia—would be "a tragic blow to American security, especially to the west coast."

**Harold Wilson**—Republican leader and president of University of Pennsylvania, sat with the Minnesota delegation but did not address the speakers.

Clay Nixon, Seattle, former commander of the Machine Corps League, told newsmen in a press conference that while President Truman has apologized for referring to the marines as the navy's police force, "he hasn't changed his opinion."

### Chief of AMA Believes Ads May Aid GOP

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 10 (AP)—Dr. E. L. Henderson, president of the American Medical Association and a lifelong Democrat, said Monday the association's \$1,000,000 advertising campaign against compulsory health insurance may help elect GOP candidates in November.

But the Louisville surgeon added, "we're against socialism in any form."

Dr. Henderson's comment came after he sent a letter to each member of congress, charging Rep. John D. Dingell, with "misuse of the congressional record for unethical purposes."

He topped a reprint of a Dingell speech in congress calling the advertising a "320,000,000 smear campaign."

**Fraud Claimed**

Dr. Henderson said the \$200,000 was a fraudulent figure released by Mr. Oscar Eving's office, the Federal security agency.

Dingell, in his speech to congress, said the AMA hoped for tie-in advertisements in the campaign "that may reach the staggering total of \$10,000,000."

Dr. Henderson said the value of the tie-in advertisements might equal the AMA's \$1,000,000, but wouldn't go above it.
