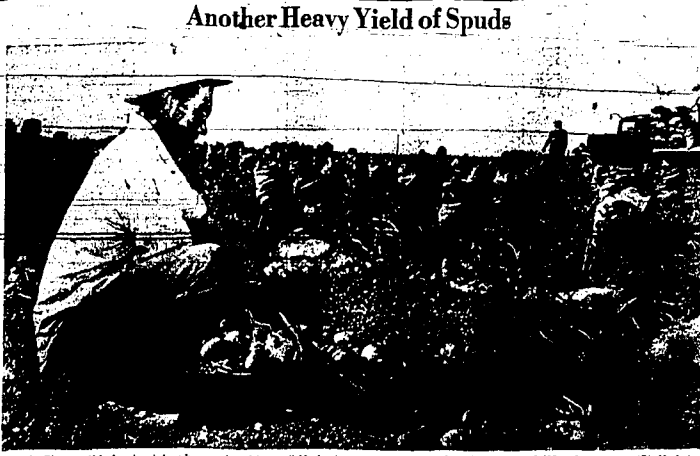

Comet Return Is Marked by Quicker Time

An announcement read from the Harvard observatory, the distribution in the Americas for astronomical observations, states that Dr. Leland E. Cunningham of the University of California has found on recent photographic plates definite indication of the periodic return of the famous comet Encke.

All messages are entirely stellar, but the motion fits so perfectly that identification is almost certain.

No Flaming Apparition

Now let no one envisage an apparition soon of a flaming comet with a brilliant head and hairy tail dragging "across" the jagged stars "through" the entire width of the heavens. The comet is now very far below the horizon, its visibility although it has been seen by the naked eye, has not been seen since 1923. It has not appeared in its own right.

Found by Freuchen

In 1810, Johann Bode, the German astronomer, was so playing on a faint comet found in the previous year by Pons at Marseilles. He calculated that it had an orbital path around the sun and completed a round trip in about 3.3 years. This and still has the shortest period known for any comet.

He suspected this was the same object that had rammed our part of the great spaces in 1765, 1793 and 1803.—Although Encke was not the discoverer, the mathematical work he did on it soon gave his name to the celestial visitor.

Seen Each Time

This comet has been seen repeatedly at every one of its returns since it was first discovered. It has been seen at least 20 times and it is expected that it will be seen again in 1936, 1938 and 1940.

When nearest the sun (perihelion) Comet Encke is only 30 million miles from the sun, which is only 1/40th of the distance from the sun to the earth.

Time Decreasing

The striking characteristic of this comet is that its time for a round trip seems to be decreasing slightly each time it goes around the sun. The movement of most comets can be calculated quite accurately from the effect of the gravitational pull of the sun and the lesser disturbances caused by the various planets.

But after all known forces have been taken into consideration, Comet Encke sometimes is early in arriving at perihelion by as much as two and one-half hours.

Causes Suggested

To account for this speeding up, astronomers have suggested various causes. The one most commonly offered is that the comet must be encountering some resisting medium such as streams of meteors along its path.

At first thought it would seem that such resistance would cause a slowing rather than a speeding. But by well-known laws of mechanics, this causes the comet to get nearer the sun and have a shorter year.

In about 100 years the comet's average distance from the sun decreased 250,000 miles.



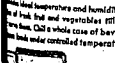

Problem of Interior Decoration Nears In Construction of New T. F. Hospital

Hospital officials these days are beginning to have that harried look of the little bride whose new home has advanced far enough for her to visualize the rooms and worry about how she'll decorate them.

Construction of the new Twin Falls county hospital has progressed to the point where outside walls, roof, and windows are in and the interior walls are going in. It's no trick now to see where the plumbing fixtures will be or where the electric outlets will be installed.

Like the confused little bride in the skeleton of her new house, hospital officials are pondering such questions as: What colors shall we make the walls? What drapery fabric shall we use? What kind of finish do we want on the furniture? We use gray here, can we use yellow there?

But the similarity ends there. Where the bride is thinking in terms of 10 or 12 yards of drapery material for her one picture window, hospital officials have to think of an estimated 4,000 to 5,000 yards of draperies for four floors of huge windows on the south side.

Just like the bride's somewhat harassed husband, the hospital officials were at hearing the expense within the strict budget. Buying electric light bulbs for the new hospital's 437 rooms is an small item at \$1200.

The same holds for covering 40,000 square feet of floor space, or buying bedspreads and other linen for 101 beds, or washbasins for every patient's room.

But with the help of detailed advance planning, hospital officials are working out the answers to the problems of getting a soon-to-be-completed building ready for occupancy. The overall color scheme was decided upon this week, according to Stup. J. C. McElvray.

The contract linoleum paint color to white and five others. Hospital board members eliminated green, almost standard color for hospital rooms. In an experiment to get away from anything suggesting a coldly institutional appearance, in certain lights green can make a room look sickly, hospital officials feel.

About 80 per cent of the patient's rooms have big windows on the south side. The architect, Fisher and Fisher, Denver, suggested a dark color over the wall supporting the big windows. The dark colors chosen are Caribbean blue and cocoa brown.

In combination with one of these colors, the sidewalls will be either lime yellow or Normandy gray. Instead of white, the ceilings will carry the color of the sidewalls.

Deciding an impression of warmth and friendliness, hospital officials have chosen cocoa brown for two walls and the ceiling of the entrance lobby and Normandy gray for the other two walls.

Corridors will be yellow or gray. To fit in with the suggested color scheme, drapes will be a solid natural color, slightly off white. Floors will be a black marbledized asphalt tile throughout the new building except for quarry tile, a ceramic product, in the kitchens and a dark gray terrazzo in all operating delivery and treatment rooms. The terrazzo flooring is about 95 per cent completed.

Metal furniture will be used, the color varying with the type of room. The second floor, which will be used entirely for maternity cases, will have dusty rose and shell as its furniture color. Nursery basinettes will be in ivory color.

Yellow was chosen for the third floor which includes a pediatrics department for 24 children. Furniture on the fourth and fifth floor medical and surgical wards will be dove green and gray. Silver mist is the color selected for furniture in private rooms.

In the private rooms and the surgical floor generally, a new type of bed will be used. Its height can be adjusted from the standard hospital height to the same height as is found in ordinary home beds. No longer will a patient in his later period of convalescence have to call for a footstool for getting in and out of bed.

McElvray said the national concern supplying the furniture plans to take color pictures of rooms in the new hospital. The pictures will be used in its national advertising next year to illustrate how homelike and cheerful a hospital room can be.

Among communication features of the new building are a direct telephone line to the fire department as required by the state department of public health, and an audio-visual system to enable a patient not only to flash a call light for a nurse but also to call her over an intercommunication system.

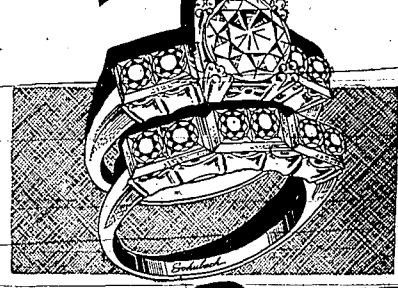

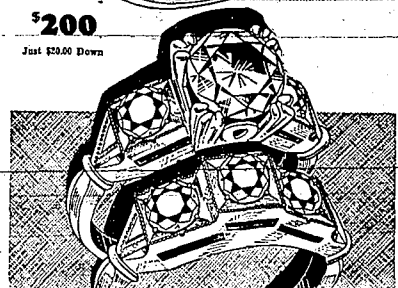

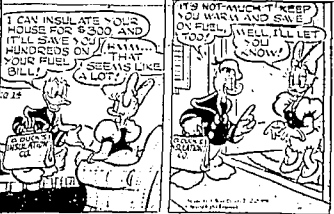
