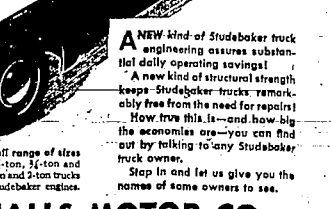

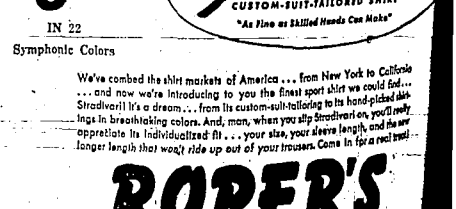

'Silent' Harpo Will Speak on Concert Tour

 HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 17 (AP)—For the first time in 25 years, Harpo Marx is going to speak before an audience.

Harpo is the mute, wild-wigged character who chased blondes in filmland's most famous brother act. Now he has gone to Hollywood to speak before a group of his admirers.

Harpo is embarking on a concert tour, he says he's going to talk. "I thought I'd do it this way," he said in a spacious Beverly Hills home. "I would be playing the harp and one of the strings would break. I'd say 'Damn.' That would break the silence and then I'd talk to the audience and explain why I never spoke."

The story begins a quarter-century ago when the Marx brothers were in vaudeville. They were doing a 25-minute sketch and Harpo had two comedy bits. One in pantomime, which drew a lot of laughs, and the other was dialogue, which didn't. So the brothers decided to lengthen the pantomime routine and cut out the other. Harpo never spoke again.

Reports have it that Harpo was once offered \$50,000 to say a line in a movie, but he turned it down. While this is dubious history, it adds to the legend.

Strangely enough, Harpo is the most talkative of the Marxes. He spoke enthusiastically about his pay tour. He will travel to 60 U. S. cities in 60 days with a show which is aptly titled "Harpo's Bazaar."

Among other things it will offer a metropolitan opera soprano and a pair of ballet men who lose around a couple of live box constructors.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 17.—Profit margins of newspapers have been narrowed by lagging advertising sales and falling circulation, says the controller of the Montreal Standard.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—The National Coal association disclosed Monday that John L. Lewis is serving notice on operators that his United Mine Workers is taking jurisdiction over all construction work around the mine.

The union promptly declared the move lacked "any significance." But the operators were apprehensive of labor building strikes were getting ready to fight.





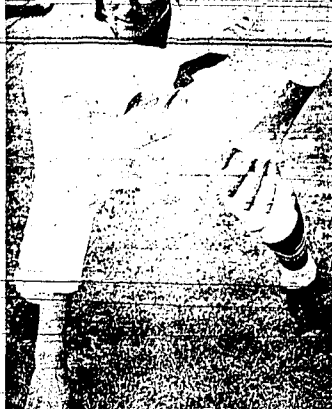
