# Truman Warns Russians, Offers Asia "Partnership" Backed by Might of U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—President Truman set the world stage today for an unprecedented counter-offensive to Soviet "peace propaganda." He offered a full "partnership of peace" for all Asia, backed by United States military might. The state department's "Voice of America" bombarded every reachable listener with a constant repetition of Truman's warning to the peoples of the far east that Russia is trying to turn them into "colonial slaves of a new imperialism."

And the President left for the Russian politburo a bold and blunt reminder that the United States will not stop short of war to resist aggression and preserve "our free way of life."

"What we want is a partnership for peace with all the world," Mr. Truman told a cheering audience. "We want peace but it must be a peace founded upon justice. That American policy is as old as our republic and it is stronger today than ever before in our history. And with God's help we intend to keep it that way."

"The crowd applauded vigorously as the President declared that the United States will not stop short of war to resist aggression and preserve "our free way of life."

## Legion's Commander Says UMT Is Only Hope for U. S. Survival

"The only possible chance for survival this country has is universal military training," Eric Cooke, Jr., newly elected national commander of the American Legion, told an overflow crowd Wednesday night at the Legion hall.

"If we are to protect our security and the security of the world, we must have trained men ready at all times," Cooke said.

The national commander, elected last week in Los Angeles, has embarked on an 18-state tour of the country to stamp for universal military training and other mandates given him at the national convention.

## National Legion Chief "Detained" at Border

Eric Cooke, Jr., national commander of the American Legion, was stopped at the Idaho-Kentucky border south of here shortly after 10 a. m. Wednesday by State Patrolman S. J. Bays, Jr. Bays asked him for a passport to enter Idaho.

T. W. Stivers, Twin Falls, commander of the Legion's fifth district, was quick to hand the passport to Cooke, all 110 pounds of it. The youthful war hero national commander is on route from the national convention at Los Angeles to national headquarters at Indianapolis.

## French May Get 6 Billion Military Aid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—High U. S. officials said today France is likely to get up to \$6,000,000,000 in American military aid during the next three years.

An American plan to allocate up to \$2,400,000,000 of existing funds to the French is just a "first installment," these officials said.

Additional billions will be needed to build up an army of at least 20 divisions by the end of 1952. This reportedly is one of the goals set by military planners to help strengthen western Europe against communism.

## Area Harvest Boosts Valley Job Openings

## ROK Reports Red Capital Is Entered

TOKYO, Oct. 18 (AP)—South Koreans said tonight their troops had fought into Pyongyang, doomed and nearly deserted—red capital. But there were indications the report may be untrue.

Two hours after the radio at Pusan said South Korean troops had entered, a field dispatch reported marine pilots still were attacking enemy targets in close support outside the city. The dispatch, filed by AP Correspondent O. H. P. King after a flight over the capital made no mention of friendly forces inside the city.

## 700 Bodies of North-Korean People Found

HAMHUNG, North Korea, Oct. 18 (AP)—The bodies of 700 North Korean people, including some teenage youths—were found today near a big modern prison here, they had been murdered by the retreating communists.

The new horror widened the river of blood left in the wake of the red armies fleeing the allied advance. More than 1,000 atrocity victims have been found in liberated areas today.

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 18 (AP)—Greece halted all rail traffic across the northern border with Bulgaria today to stop the departure of military troops across Greek soil.

Governmental and destitute Pomaks, a Moslem minority group in Bulgaria, used mostly on foot, although they have been ousted from their tiny Bulgarian farms, Turkey will not accept them.

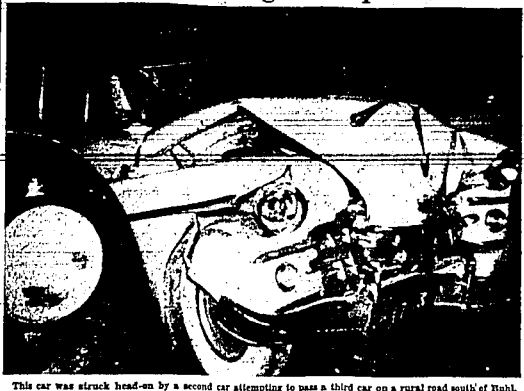

**U. S. Tiremen Are Expecting Cut in Rubber**

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—The makers look for a crackdown on the amount of rubber they can use. Many of them contend the government is cutting back rubber use before there's any need to do so.

Some United States tiremen's stockpile of natural rubber will force tire makers to use a greater portion of synthetic than previously. It may even cheapen their product's quality. Some think synthetic production next year will pour out the great deal more rubber than the country needs.

**Cutback Is Sought**  
The national production authority wants to cut back the consumption of all new rubber—natural or synthetic—to 90,000 tons a month, and do it right now.

It tried to do that Sept. 1, but allowed so many pleas for extra rubber use that consumption is running at better than 105,000 tons a month, NPA says.

It believes 20,000 tons is the maximum the rubber industry can use and still leave enough for the government to stockpile for defense.

**"Hysteria" Blamed**  
"Hysteria, rather than reason" is how Harry E. Humphreys, Jr., president of United States Rubber company criticizes the government policy.

The more frantically the government buys natural rubber for stockpiling, the higher it will help send natural rubber prices and the further they will eventually fall," he warns.

By next year synthetic rubber production will be great enough to take care of all needs," he argues.

**McGrath Says U. S. Reds Aid Koreans**

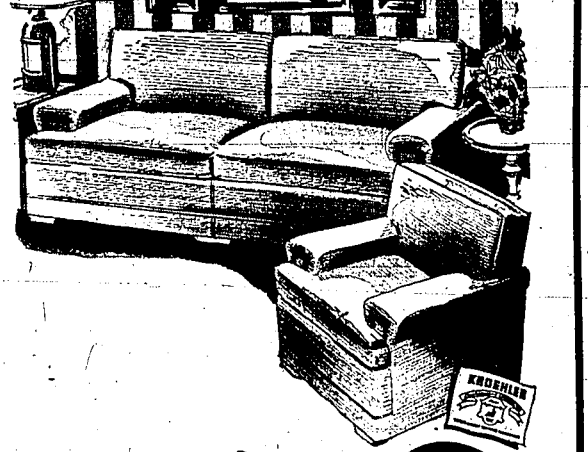

**Basques' Arrival Climaxes Long Wait, Battle With Officials of Two Nations**

A 5,000-mile flight over an ocean, and much of one continent wasn't particularly long for Julio Gutsosola and Antonio Espalosa, natives of the Basque province of Vizcaya, Spain. A few hours after they landed at Jolin field Tuesday night, they were ready to go to work handling sheep for Don Cavanaugh.

For Gutsosola, the trip was the culmination of 20 years of battling officials to get back to the United States. After working in the sheep industry here, he returned to Spain in 1920 to visit relatives.

Coming back here was delayed first by a discrepancy in his immigration papers, then the Spanish revolution and the confusion following that, and next this nation's restrictions. They were delayed at Madrid Oct. 8 for screening by Spanish officials.

For Cavanaugh, the arrival of the two Basques was the climax of a year of correspondence—a file of letters more than one inch thick—in trying to overcome immigration restrictions. He was aided by measures introduced in congress by Ben Pat McCarran of Nevada and Rep. Compton White of Idaho. Gutsosola and Espalosa, both 50, are married and each has seven children. They were neighbors in the village of San Agueda, and Espalosa in Carreir. Both farmed small tracts.

Living off the land, they escaped many of the hardships and shortage conditions characteristic of Spanish cities. In disposing of their farm products, they ate the best, sold the average and gave the worst to the government.

Both men enjoyed a smooth flight in good weather, leaving Madrid Saturday and arriving at New York City on Monday. They visited Basque in New York City before departing for here Tuesday morning. Both men, particularly Espalosa, were impressed by the vastness of the United States.

Here, they were greeted by Cavanaugh and a number of Gutsosola's relatives—his brother, Vicente Gutsosola, sheep foreman on Cavanaugh's Clear Lakes ranch; a nephew, Henry Bilbao, Twin Falls, and three nieces, Mrs. Claudio Mendola, Mrs. Gene L. Glenn and Mrs. Rose Sofia, all Twin Falls, and families. They were honored at a dinner at the Glenn home Tuesday night.

Gutsosola brought his relatives a number of gifts—reflecting hours of patient handwork—a centerpiece crocheted of thread fine as gold, silver, handknit sweaters and bedspreads, John J. Dresser, of Placerville, as well as jewelry and delicacies of their country.

**Unusual Spud Weighed**

The two men were farmers, not herdsmen. But Cavanaugh and many other shepherds have found that sheep are quick to learn, interested in their work and capable of doing a much better job with sheep than herdsmen of any other nationality.

In the words of Cavanaugh, "without the Basque herdsmen the sheep industry would go to hell." Other shepherds feel World War I would not have resulted in tremendous cut in flock numbers if there had been more Basque herdsmen in the country.

Sheepmen frequently outbid one another to secure the services of Basque herdsmen. Arriving in Cavanaugh, the going wage is \$200 per month plus subsistence, amounting to a total of \$275 in all.

He says the Basques are peculiarly adapted to living alone in the hills for long periods. And their ability to keep the sheep in the best condition is undoubted. During the course of Cavanaugh's efforts to bring the two men here from Spain, an eastern senator suggested he check Ukrainian living in the Ukraine. "What would I do with Ukrainians from the Urals when it was Basques from the Pyrenees I wanted!" snorted Cavanaugh. He and other shepherds were faced with the problem of how to get Basques able to come to replace those who were aging and dying.

He first applied for their entry a year ago through the immigration and naturalization service. He was stopped almost before he started because the regular quotas of Spanish immigrants were filled and would be for years.

Meanwhile the immigration service was starting deportation of Basques here about two years ago, whose visas had expired.

Cavanaugh and Nevada shepherds appealed to Senator McCarran for help. Immigration officials were ordered to resist pending passage of a bill providing for 200 Basques in this country two to three years to become permanent residents.

Later an emergency bill was passed to allow Basques to enter this country. But for every one who entered on an emergency visa, another was removed from the regular quota. The emergency bill was signed by President Truman on June 30. Cavanaugh said 300 to 400 Basques were needed in Nevada and 100

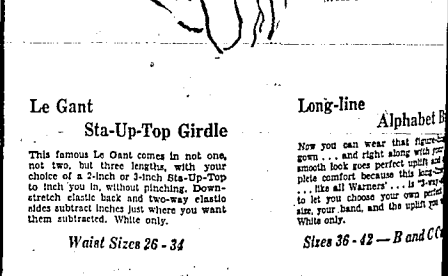

### \$1,080,000 Is Cut Off Fish, Game Agency

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Chapman, announcing reductions in his department's spending for the year ending June 30, said a \$1,080,000 cut had been made for the fish and wildlife service.

The overall cut in appropriations for the interior department, ordered by congress in the big 1950-1951 appropriation bill, were allocated among non-defense agencies by the budget bureau.

\$530,000,000 Minimum

Congress specified that total expenditures for all agencies be reduced by at least \$500,000,000.

Included in the interior department's cut are the following:

Bureau of Mines, \$300,000, split three ways: Reduction in control of fires program in inactive coal deposits, \$150,000; reduction to be applied against the production of excess coal at Louisiana, Mo., \$120,000; and the balance, \$130,000, to be applied against the general program for conservation and development of mineral resources.

4-Way Land Split

The bureau of land management, \$250,000, split six ways: Land clarification, \$25,000; management of grazing lands, \$100,000; and a cut of \$50,000 each for forest management, cadastral surveys for making large scale survey maps, soil and moisture conservation and building construction in Alaska.

Fish and wildlife service, \$1,000,000, split three ways: Management of resources, \$500,000; investigations of resources, \$450,000; and construction and land acquisition, \$50,000.

Geological survey, \$500,000, split three ways: Topographic mapping, \$300,000; water resources investigations, \$150,000; and geologic mapping and mineral resource appraisal, \$50,000.

Williams, Bonneville county coroner.

The accident took place on the evening of Oct. 10 on the intersection of the Tons and Lincoln roads four miles east of here.

Chopping down a strong Michigan eleven last Saturday, 27-6, for their third straight triumph, the unbeaten West's first place grip gained a week ago in the Associated Press poll.

Coach Earl Blaik's Black Knights, unbeaten in their last 23 starts, drew a total of 124 first place ballots among the 275 votes cast by sports writers and sports editors Tuesday afternoon. He may miss that remainder the reason. The Bruins went through a spirited conference Tuesday, taking up for their important Big Six afternoon clash here at 6 p. m. Friday at Lincoln field from the powerful Pacellian Indians.

Notre Dame has finished no lower than ninth since 1941 and almost always been high up in the running during the season. For the first time in years not a single college has been ranked outside the top 10. The best the Irish got was a third. Their point total was 295. Army received 427 points to lead a field that included 47 colleges. Oklahoma wrestled second place from Southern Methodist, moving to one notch on the strength of its 14-0 victory over tough Texas. It was George 24th consecutive victory. The air-minded Mustangs slipped into third place—despite their 40-0 cakewalk over Oklahoma A and M.

The big three were followed by Kentucky, 5-California, 6-Oregon, 7-Texas and 8-Maryland, 8-Ohio State, 10-Washington. Notre Dame was not the only team to fall out of the top 10. The conqueror, Purdue, almost dropped out of sight, catapulting from 8th place to 11th. The 10-0 series did a dose of their own upset medicine when they bowed to unheralded Miami university of Florida, 20-14.

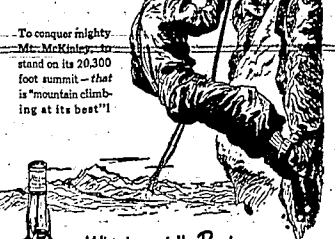

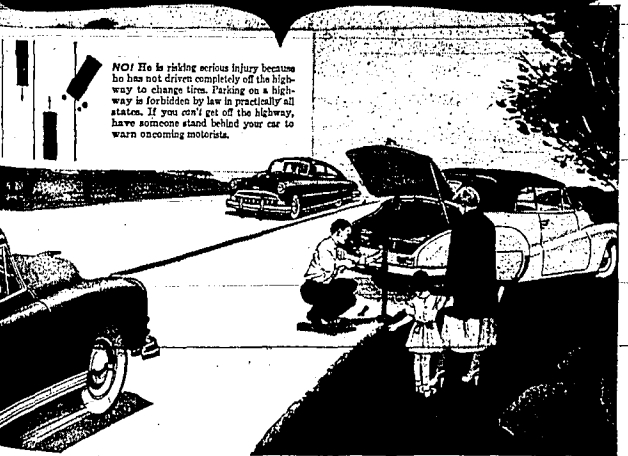

### PTA Speaker At Joint Meet Is Mrs. Hayes

"Anything that is American is acceptable in Japan," Mrs. John E. Hayes, president of the PTA National Congress of Parents and Teachers, told members of the Junior-Senior Parents' Teachers' association at a joint meeting with the high school auditorium Monday night.

Reviewing her recent trip to Japan, Mrs. Hayes pointed out that "anything American" includes comic books and some things of which comic books cannot be proud, and many others of which Americans can be very proud.

"We are proud of the quality of work done by our occupational forces in Japan," she said. The Japanese have great facilities in General MacArthur and are confident he will remain with them.

Mrs. Hayes said the PTA is recognized as an instrument for teaching democracy to the Japanese. The PTA has made many changes there. She pointed out that women now are allowed to accompany their husbands to take part in PTA meetings and that 100 per cent of the organization's members are men.

Illustrating the inherent honesty of the Japanese, she stated there are no door keys in Japanese hotels. For the first time, Japanese laborers on their own land, adding to their self respect, she explained. Large plots have been given to the Japanese to have bought the smaller holdings.

In visiting the way the Japanese treat their women, Mrs. Hayes became impressed with the way the people express the desire to be free. She also was impressed with the lack of prejudice and resentment toward the Americans.

"Throughout the world there are children and people who love children," Mrs. Hayes observed. "Perhaps the love of children may be the device upon which we may build the bridge of fellowship which will lead to peace."

Group singing of "God Bless America" led by Robert Mohr, opened the meeting. The invocation was asked by S. L. Crawford. With Mrs. Jay M. Merrill, president, in charge, the PTA dispensed with routine business. It was announced the senior high school open house will be held Nov. 8 and junior high open house Nov. 20.

Mr. A. O. Latham, membership chairman, announced 50 room mothers will launch a membership drive this week. Twin Falls has the largest PTA membership in the state. There were 1,000 members last year, stated Mrs. Latham.
