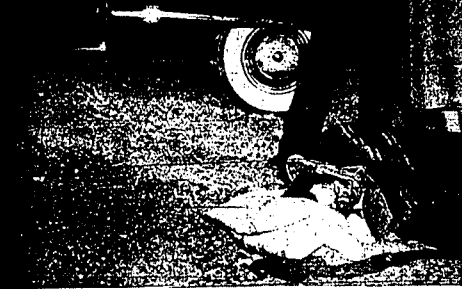

"Dealers" Listed

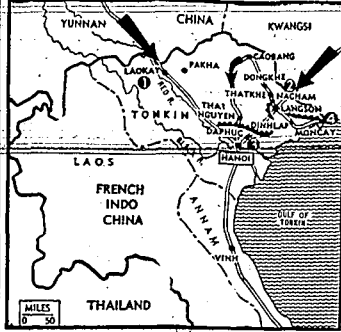
Detectives, amazed at the raid's success, said they confiscated bulging files listing football cards "dealers" throughout the U. S. and its territories, Canada, and several other nations.

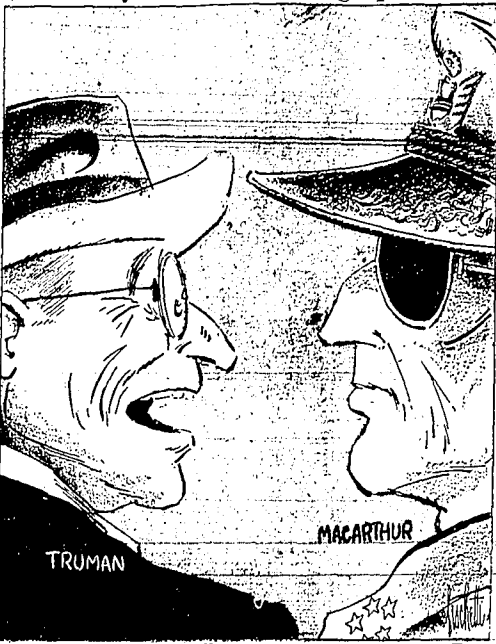

An executive order gave the coast guard power to control virtually every phase of port activity and eliminate and foreign shipping within U. S. waters.

Congress recently granted Mr. Truman authority to take such action whenever he considered—the national security endangered.

Under the law, the President—through the coast guard—can, if necessary, even seize the vessels of foreign nations within U. S. territorial waters and take whatever steps are necessary to prevent the sabotage of American ports.

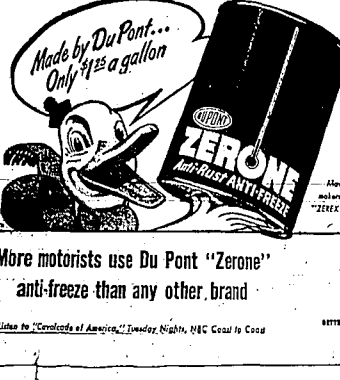

GI's Widow Gets Korean Cash, Letter

COLLINGSDALE, Pa., Oct. 10 (AP)—A widow of a GI who was killed in Korea was presented Wednesday with a check for \$100 and a letter from the American Red Cross which she had written to her husband's unit.

The presentation was made by publicist John Legerda representing the Red Cross. The Korean appeared in the magazine Tokyo edition Sept. 30 and said that she wanted to let her husband know that she was good and decent people in Korea as well as back home.

Writes to Tote McCormick, a private first class, wrote to his daughters, Rosemary, 6, and Joseph, 4, shortly before he was killed on Aug. 10. He explained to his children that he was fighting in far off Korea so that the little girls might live in peace.

Lawsuit Against Temple Is Settled

RENO, Nev., Oct. 10 (AP)—What promised to be a long, bitter lawsuit against Temple University in connection with the state of the late Dr. Theodosius Chace abruptly was settled out of court Wednesday.

The settlement came on the second day of a jury trial to hear Mrs. Chace's charges that Temple officials conducted a concerted campaign to get her father's fortune.

Doctor Chace, who died at Temple hospital last February, gave the university medical school \$1,400,000 in cash before his death and left most of the residue of his estate to the school.

The father bequeathed to only 63,700, four days after his death, a will in connection with the current suit.

Mrs. Chace contended that her father was insane in addition to being subjected to undue influence by Temple.

Segregation Law Upheld in Capital

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The District Columbia board of education has ruled that the capital school segregation law bans simultaneous appearances of Negro and white groups in public schools during school hours.

The vote was 3 to 1, with Board President G. Melvin Sharpe not voting. It was split straight down color lines, with all three Negro members voting no.

The decision follows the refusal last month of the executive high school principals to allow 12 white and two Negro actors to present a scene at the school from "Birth of Our Nation," a drama prepared for the capital's bicentennial celebration.

Wednesday's findings upheld the principals' decision.

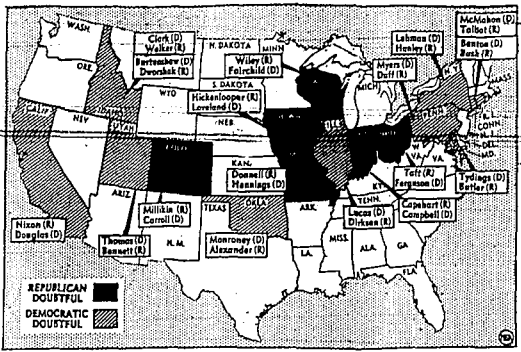
