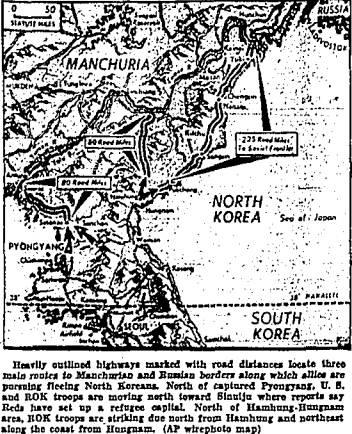

Cables Snapped
 "No sooner was it on the ferry than the mooring cables snapped. There is an 18-foot tide differential in the river that creates an 8-to-10-foot current. It took hold of the ferry and off it floated downstream. Besides the crew of five surprised tankmen several charged engineers and about 15 frightened South Korean laborers were aboard."

Bobbing and dipping as it acknowledged the orders of a parade crew, the waterborne tank rode majestically down to the mouth of the river into the estuary and out to sea.

Passes Enemy Posts
 Along the way it passed a shoreline and several small islands still held by the enemy.

The startled reds took a long-unbelieving look at this unusual target and then joyously began banging away at it with mortars and machineguns.

"Our men weren't much afraid of being hit themselves," said Westburg, "because they could hide in the tank or under it. But they did worry that the rubber boats might

be punctured. A Sherman tank wouldn't float much better than a 27-ton tank."

Search Organized
 Word of the runaway tank had been messaged back to headquarters. An air and surface search was organized immediately.

Westburg set out in a small utility plane and finally sighted the tank, "a little out to sea. Before a navy tug could arrive to recapture it the sea decided to return the fool-toeless ferry itself."

"It floated through his estuary and up the river still bobbing in the wind. The estuary reached its mouth and the tank was carried out to sea. But that gave away their position to some marine fighter planes."

Freedom Appeal 'Sale' Is Given Top Priority in U.S. Fight on Communism

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—General Clay, director of the Berlin blockade, has announced that the United States will give top priority to the "Crusade for Freedom" appeal in its fight against communism.

General Clay, national chairman of the Crusade for Freedom, said today that the United States will give top priority to the "Crusade for Freedom" appeal in its fight against communism.

"The strength of free people now stands against aggression in Korea is so very great that we can outlast and triumph in a cold war no matter how long it lasts," he explained in a voice so quiet yet so confident that it was easy to understand why the frustrated Russian provocations in Berlin.

"Then he added: 'But if war does come, I have no doubts we can win that war.'

General Clay is national chairman of the Crusade for Freedom, a grass roots movement to carry an understanding of democracy to people behind the iron curtain.

"My real reason for giving as much time as I can to the Crusade for Freedom comes from the conviction that the real issue is between democracy and communism—not between the United States and Russia," he said.

Leaving slightly forward for emphasis, he added: "Our duty is to reach the hearts and minds of men with the appeal of freedom—making them see freedom such as we cherish as the best heritage for their children."

He paused, then said: "But while we are doing that it is also our duty to remain strong—always to remain strong."

On United Nations day, Oct. 24, a freedom bell will be presented by the Crusade for Freedom to West Berlin. It is now en route to Germany on a ship which brought displaced persons to the United States.

"West Berlin is behind the iron curtain," General Clay said. "These people have gone through terrible privation and have resented communism. They deserve encouragement from us."

"We believe—the West Berliners have been consistent in their desire for freedom."

"That is not to say that their meaning of freedom is the same

only that bell can be silenced by the force of Russia."

The record of the last five years gives us reason to hope for a democratic Germany, he believes.

"By keeping the bell there in Berlin, we can hope other freedom bells can be made to ring further east as our Crusade for Freedom becomes more effective," he said.

"It seems to me that the Soviet government has attempted behind the iron curtain to develop the belief that the United States has ulterior purposes in Korea. They have appealed to every racial instinct, crying Asia for the Asiatic, that case, our placing this freedom bell in a country where we are in occupation is an excellent refutation," General Clay added.

Local Display Scheduled for 1951 Mercury

The 1951 Mercury automobile will go on display Thursday at the Valley Show - Mercury dealer show.

The new car is similar in exterior appearance to the 1950 Mercury with the principal changes being a new grille and front-end trim, new rear fenders and quarter panels, new bumpers and an extra-large rear window.

Larger Bumpers - The grille change is toward wider bumpers to give the front end a more massive appearance. The bumpers, both front and rear, are the wrap-around type to give protection to the fenders.

The rear fenders - have been changed completely and extend to the extreme rear end of the car. Chrome quarter panels fill the space between the wheel-well and the bumper.

The rear window is about 30 per cent larger than in previous Mercury models.

Transmission Optional - A new automatic transmission, the Merc-O-Matic, is optional on the new cars. The automobile also will be available with the standard transmission with Touch-O-Matic overdrive.

Engine improvements in the new car include an increase of power to 111 horsepower, a more accurately balanced crankshaft, selective fit of all main bearings and a new camshaft which incorporates a new triple ramp on the exhaust cam and a longer quench ramp on the intake.

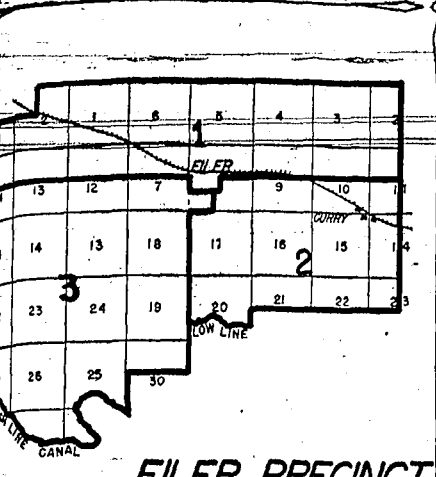

Refugee Russians Say 'Peace Mye'

Screens Red Bid to Recoup Prestige

By **RON DENNIS**
PARIS (AP)—Two high ranking Soviet army officers have taken refuge in the "peace mye" (peace mye) in Moscow and are giving authorities a highly interesting insight into Russian plans for the future. They assert the Russians will attempt to save face and recoup prestige by "peace mye" in Moscow.

Trade again is rolling in Moscow, they said, adding that the surge of "unreliable elements" has reached its peak in the red army command and may even extend into the politburo itself.

The presumption is that the two officers fled to escape such a purge, in most of the countries of western Europe, especially in southern France and northern Italy.

The Russians were firm in their belief that Moscow is not yet ready for world conflict.

This would seem to be in line with reports that Moscow is having increasing difficulty with satellite countries, including Mao Tse-tung's China.

Although the Russo-Chinese treaty was not yet delivered, Moscow has not yet delivered the goods to relieve the famine in central China. The Russians have thus far turned a deaf ear to Mao's urgent plea for help. They blame inadequate transport facilities for failure to keep their part of the agreement.

There has also been considerable criticism of the return of the dismantled industrial plant of Manchuria following the war, much of Manchuria's industrial equipment was carried away by the Russians as "war booty."

Nine months after Mao leaving, the Russian-Chinese relations are beginning to sour. The Chinese are bargaining with the Chinese over every piece of machinery they are requested to restore.

Manchuria is China's industrial base. Without it no serious effort can be made to develop Chinese resources.

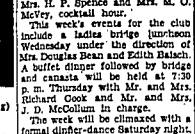

FCC Blacks Out First Illegal TV Station in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The federal communications commission has announced it has located and closed an illegal television station in the United States.

The station, atop a Pennsylvania mountain, was being operated by the tube division of Sylvania Electric Products, Incorporated, Emporium, Pa.

The FCC said the station is one of the country's largest producers of television tubes.

The explanation given by company officials for the unlicensed operation, the commission said, was that they needed TV service in their business but knew the two-year-old rules on TV broadcasting permitted only one station per area.

The FCC noted that unlicensed TV operation involves a possible fine of \$10,000 or two years imprisonment or both. It said "further proceedings will be taken" in this case.

Officials said Sylvania had started broadcasting about Sept. 1 from a \$7,000 transmitter on Whittemore mountain near Emporium, Pa.

The FCC said the station was rebroadcast in the Emporium area.

An FCC monitoring station detected the broadcast. The operation was shut down by order of commission personnel who visited the Sylvania plant.

Greeks Will Get U. S. Navy Ships

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The U. S. will give Greece a number of destroyer escort vessels as part of America's anti-communist program of arms aid to developing governments.

This was reported by a military assistance official. He declined to disclose the number of ships involved.

The gift to Greece will continue a program of naval arms aid under which 16 infantry landing ships and six landing support ships are now on their way to Indo-China.

New Fight Over Oath Is Looming

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23 (AP)—The University of California is the center of a new loyalty oath dispute.

At a tumultuous meeting of the university board of regents, John Francis Neyland, San Francisco attorney, said today the state-wide oath ordered by the recent session of the legislature "must be challenged" in court and by the university. The regents themselves took the oath, however.

Neyland is the regent who successfully led a year-long fight to force university employees to sign contracts reading "I am not a member of the Communist party."

The suit filed at the university's 11,000 odd employees had signed—except for 18 professors contesting the contract in court and a handful who resigned or were fired—the legislature passed the new oath requirement.

The new oath, which does not mention communism by name, must be signed before university employes are paid, and Nov. 2 is the deadline, State Controller Thomas Kuchel ruled last week. On Neyland's motion, the board decided to call a special meeting next Friday to decide a course of action.

Freedom Bell Will Ring in West-Berlin

BERLIN, Oct. 23 (AP)—The freedom bell which will ring Saturday at the top of West Berlin's city hall, where it will be rung for the first time Tuesday—United Nations day.

The bell, paid for by public subscriptions in the United States to a government-approved private group known as the National Committee for Free Europe, was designated as a "death bell" by East Germany's communist press.

The bell is inscribed in English: "That this world, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—a paraphrase of Abraham Lincoln's words in the Gettysburg address."

Its first peal will be broadcast around the world by western radio networks. Among those present will be U. S. Commissioner John J. McCloy, his predecessor in Germany, Gen. Lucius D. Clay, and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. General Clay, who will dedicate the bell Tuesday, issued a statement in New York City saying: "Berlin remains the one free spot behind the 'iron curtain.'"

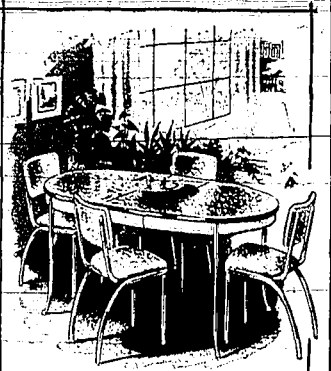

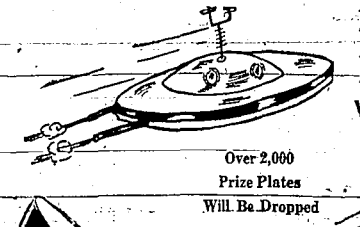

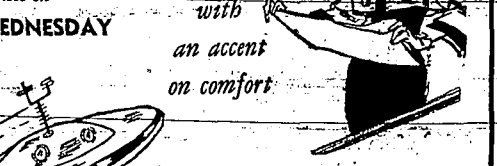

Southern Idaho Looms as Site of First Atomic Energy Application to Industry

By PAT MUNROE
 (Washington Staff Correspondent)
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 23—As the nation's first major industrial application of atomic energy would get power at a price attractive enough to venture its investment and the government would get its plutonium at a price cheaper than it is now making it, the plan "activities would be under way in the near future," according to a statement by the Atomic Energy Commission today.

Several months ago the giant uranium producer, the American Fuel and Chemical Corp., of Louisville, Ky., announced it will build a plant that would utilize the atomic energy as a source of power. The plant would be the first of its kind to be built in the United States.

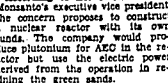
Monsanto's objective is to obtain a cheap source of electric power for producing elemental phosphorus from green sands of Idaho and Utah.

According to Dr. C. A. Thomas, Monsanto's executive vice president, the concern proposes to construct a nuclear reactor with its own fuel. The company would produce plutonium for use in the reactor but use the electric power derived from the operation in refining the green sands.

Dr. Thomas admits that atomic energy can not be used at present to produce power. The high price paid by the U. S. for plutonium, vital in the construction of atomic weapons, would bring the cost of the power to a very small figure, he says.

"However, there are ample phosphate deposits in our western territory but the deterring factor to industry is the lack of power for electric furnace operation."

He added that Monsanto's proposal would provide a source of

cheap power "which would attract industry to make this large capital investment. Some calculations and discussions on this subject with my colleagues lead us to believe that such a plan is economically sound. Industry would get power at a price attractive enough to venture its investment and the government would get its plutonium at a price cheaper than it is now making it."

"More important, we will have an industry in their trying to cheapen costs, improve yields, designing low cost plants. Thus competitive progress is made."

"Several plants then would be producing plutonium. We would have dispersed, as we are told national interests of security require, one of our most vital industries."

Dr. Thomas proposes that Monsanto and AEC go into business together on a "partnership principle." AEC would furnish the uranium

for such an operation is phosphate fertilizer production, using the electric furnace method. In the power-short Idaho-Utah region that is rich in phosphate ore.

"The important thing about the building of such a reactor, important for the country as well as industry, would be that for the first time an atomic industrial machine would be built with the builder's own money."

Both Monsanto and AEC are saying nothing publicly about the progress of their planning. But an informed guess is that the deal will be closed within a year at the latest and that the project will be in operation by 1954, unless a year with AEC's intervention.

Tito Asserts Soviets Lost Face in East

BELGRADE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Premier Marshal Tito today asserted that the Soviet government has lost face in the East because of its position in the Korean war and its attitude toward the Chinese.

Not Quoted Directly
The three congressmen are Representative Philip D. Fox, HRD of Kentucky; Representative Charles W. Whelan, D. N. C., and Representative Battle, D. Ala. At a news conference, they declined to quote Tito directly but spoke of their impressions freely.

Here for a brief visit, the congressmen covered a wide range of subjects affecting Yugoslav-American relations but they focused particularly on three major points:

1. Yugoslavia's need for food because of drought, which American Ambassador George Allen has said may bring "serious starvation" to this country unless substantial aid from abroad. Only yesterday Yugoslavia requested \$10,000,000 in assistance from the United States.

2. Yugoslavia's quest for peace. The congressmen all said Tito emphasized that Yugoslavia is ready to go along with whatever United Nations decisions are made by the United Nations.

3. The effect of the Korean war on the general situation in the cold war between the east and the west.

More Buying Curbs Loom

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Presidential assistant John R. Steelman says that still tighter curbs on installment buying may be imposed by the government to combat inflation.

Steelman's hint at new restrictions came at the end of a day during which:

1. The national production authority (A) restricted rubber companies in their use of materials and (B) set aside for the defense program the entire production of stainless steel containing columbium.
2. The commerce department ordered a ban on all exports of molasses, a principal source of industrial alcohol.

Except for his reference to installment buying, Steelman made no specific mention of probable new control moves. But his broad terms re-echoed the administration's warnings that the American people face a time of sacrifice "for years to come."

Steelman said the vast mobilization program to rearm America will mean that millions of new workers will be needed, and he added: "Already in some areas there is a shortage of trained workers."

Military Leaders Of Treaty Powers Slate Conference

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Military leaders of the North Atlantic treaty powers met together here Tuesday to shape a strategy for their common defense against communist aggression.

From sessions of the subordinate committee of the North Atlantic treaty organization will come recommendations to the defense ministers of the 12 nations. Then, on Oct. 28, ministers themselves will meet in Paris to discuss them. It is hoped to agree on how many infantry divisions, ships and planes each nation will provide for the combined force—and how they will be used if any one of the treaty nations is attacked.

When Defense Secretary George C. Marshall holds the final agreement will mark the end of a policy as old as the United States. It will be a far step from George Washington's "peace with honor" to its true policy to steer clear of permanent alliances with any portion of the foreign world.

South Korea Has 9,643 War Dead

REPUBLIC OF KOREA ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Oct. 23 (AP)—The war against the reds has cost the Republic army 9,643 killed; 39,865 wounded and 28,771 missing, this headquarters reports.

These official figures represent battle casualties only. Some 1,000 other deaths and injuries have occurred through accidents and illnesses. The most serious losses occurred in the first two weeks of the communist invasion when the Republic troops were hurled back from the 38th parallel border southward. Since then the South Korean army, with the help of American advisers and equipment, has been building up steadily.

A spokesman said it now totals about 175,000 men, most of whom have seen action. Many Egyptian villages were submerged when the Aswan dam was built across the upper Nile.
