## Truman Challenges Russia To Agree on 'Fool-Proof' Plan to End Arms Race

FLUSHING MEADOWS, N. Y., Oct. 24—President Truman challenged Russia today to agree to a "fool-proof" disarmament plan so the United Nations will be free to wage a worldwide "war against war."

The United States and other free nations, Mr. Truman said, will continue to build up their military forces as insurance against aggression until there is unanimous agreement on "international control of atomic energy and the reduction of armaments and armed forces." He warned that the United States and her western allies will not be lured into laying down their arms by "paper promises" of peace and disarmament.

The President spoke before a special plenary session of the United Nations general assembly on the fifth anniversary of the founding of the U. N.

He left the door open for east-west negotiations and observations, a reference he did not expand but said the free nations have learned the hard way that negotiation alone will not preserve peace. Armed strength is needed, as well, he said, to resist aggression.

With delegates from Russia and her iron curtain satellites in his audience, Mr. Truman said the United States and other free nations are maintaining vast armies which pose "a constant threat to world peace."

He said the plan must be based on unanimous agreement. He said no plan could work unless it included every nation, but he said he had no doubt that the United States would lead the way.

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## Two Are Sought in Connection With Slaying of Montana Man

HAILEY, Oct. 24—Two persons, one a 14-year-old girl, are being sought by police in connection with the slaying of Leroy Reems, 55, Manhattan, Mont., whose body was discovered late Sunday in a gravel pit south of Bellevue.

The girl, believed to be the daughter of the dead man, is Alvida Reems. The other person being sought is Merle Carroll Williams, 23. Both the girl and the man were with Reems in Idaho Falls when Reems made purchases there for a Nash automobile.

The girl is described by police as being five feet, five inches tall. Police say she weighs approximately 100 pounds and has "dirty blond hair."

Williams, police said, is five feet nine and one-quarter inches tall and weighs 170 pounds. He has dark hair and blue eyes. When last seen he was wearing a dark jacket, a trucker's cap and boots.

They are believed to be driving a 1950 Chevrolet coupe with a Montana license plate.

According to Blaine county officials Reems ran the Mining Security Office in Manhattan for some time and also worked for the railroad. Recently he had been engaged in doing odd jobs.

## Famed Jazz Singer Al Jolson Succumbs

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24 (AP)—Al Jolson, the veteran jazz singer who was the first U. S. star to entertain troops overseas in World War II and the Korean war, died unexpectedly last night with a quip on his lips.

"Hell, Truman had only one hour with MacArthur. I had two."

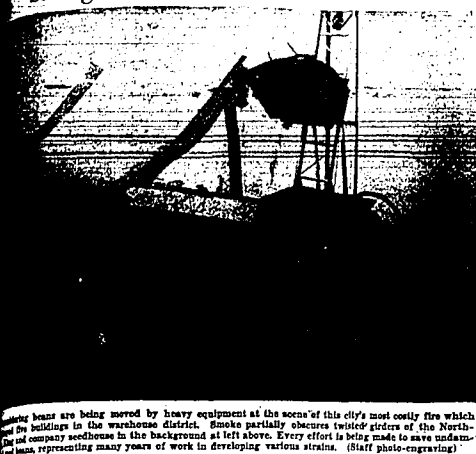

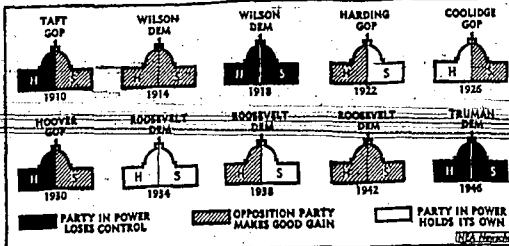

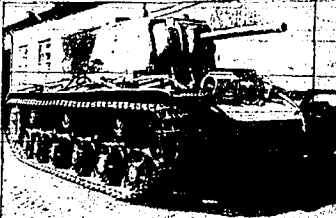

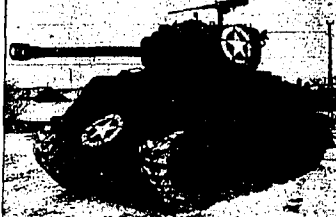

Korean War Tactics Fan Bitter Feud Between Experts on Merits of Tanks

By DOUGLAS LARSEN WASHINGTON (AP)—Reports of new types of very heavy Russian-made tanks in the Korea fighting brought out into the open a long, bitter feud among armor experts over the relative merits of U. S. and red tanks. There are many tank experts in the U. S. army who have felt that America has always been on the wrong track in tank development and use. They claim, and most experts admit it, that Russia has always led everyone in the development of tanks, and that the U. S. today does not have a heavy tank to match the red Joseph Stalin III which was first used in the battle of Poland in 1945 and which is now obsolete. U. S. experts who have made the decisions on what kinds of tanks we needed have laid emphasis on maneuverability, speed and good mechanical workmanship in their construction. Russian emphasis has always been on heavy armor, heavy tanks and a lot of them. Russian tanks have always been notorious for their deceptively crude outward appearance and the crowded, un-

set up a highly efficient field maintenance system which helped to overcome this difficulty. Those who have made the decisions on our tank policy, however, have some strong arguments on their side. They point out that the ultimate outcome of a war is the important thing. As the U. S. conceives warfare and has planned for it, the heavy tank alone is not likely to be a deciding factor. It is still to be proved in Korea whether or not the airplane and anti-tank weapons are a more effective weapon against a tank offensive than a lot of big opposing tanks. 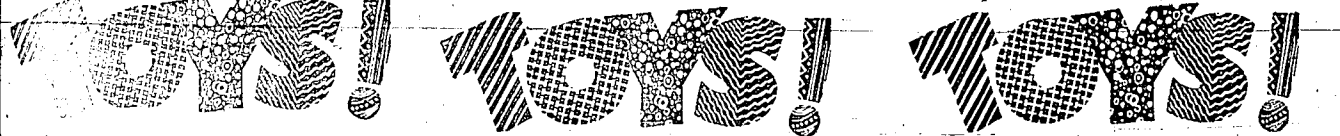

### Group Plans Improvement In Libraries

SEATTLE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Plans for expansion of library facilities throughout the Pacific Northwest were announced here Monday following a meeting of the library association of the Pacific Northwest library association.

Mrs. Cathina Zimmerman, president of the association and the committee "perfected a plan for the establishment of modern regional library systems throughout the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana and the province of British Columbia.

Mrs. Zimmerman, who is Washington state librarian with headquarters at Olympia, said the expansion of facilities will be brought about through the establishment of regional centers in the strong, existing libraries.

These centers she said, will make it possible for the libraries of the entire region to have access to large pools of books and other materials, as well as professional assistance.

Mrs. Zimmerman said the plan will be presented to a large public meeting to bring about its financing. Among those attending the two-day meeting here were Mrs. J. M. Thompson of the University of Idaho library and Marjory Heywood, field librarian of Washington state library at Olympia.

### Wide Range of Issues Facing Voters of 34 States on Nov. 7

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The poll tax, new civil rights, and pay raises for state legislators are issues confronting the voters of various states in the Nov. 7 election.

A constitutional amendment on the South Carolina ballot would eliminate the controversial poll tax requirement for general election voting for male citizens.

South Carolina is one of seven states still having such a tax.

An equally controversial proposal is up in Georgia. There, a constitutional amendment would extend the county unit system of voting to the general election.

Outside the south, three states are proposing in the civil rights category. Arizona has an initiative measure to prohibit racial segregation in public schools. Idaho has a constitutional amendment to grant full citizenship rights to Indians.

Those states also have an amendment to extend voting rights to Negroes and to deny the status of citizens to those who are not citizens of the United States.

Utah, Oregon and North Carolina have proposals for legislative action. When an amendment in Nebraska is apparently aimed at laying the groundwork for one. Fish quotas would get \$500 annually plus \$5 a day expenses and travel allowance, as compared to the present \$300 a year and travel allowance. In Oregon salaries would be increased from \$400 to \$1,200 a session.

Utah will vote on an amendment to give the state superintendent of public instruction from the last of elective officials.

The Nebraska amendment would lengthen the legislative term from two years to four, and provide salaries for the unilateral members to be fixed by statute. They now receive a salary of \$1,164 for a two-year term.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson said Monday the United Nations victory over Communist aggression in Korea offered the free world an opportunity to devise "an international rule of law which would stop war."

In a statement for broadcast to American armed forces on the fifth anniversary of United Nations Day, Acheson added:

"I am very glad to report to you that the United Nations is now working urgently to insure that if there is a next time, the free world as a whole will be prepared."

### Production of Autos High as Sales Decline

DETROIT, Oct. 24 (AP)—Motor car sales are down but the industry is producing more cars than ever.

And automotive sources say there won't be substantial production cutbacks during the remainder of the year. Most industry analysts have forecasted that production in October production. The month's indicated total now is being placed at 783,000 cars and trucks.

That will bring this year's 10-month total output to 6,768,000.

Last week the factories built 151,164 passenger cars and 27,175 trucks to top the previous week's effort by nearly 11,000 vehicles. The week also saw Plymouth go back into third place in car output after running behind Buick since last spring.

### War Aftermath

#### U. S. Miners

WALLACE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Federal boards will be instructed to defer men in the mining industry, Assistant Secretary of the Interior, C. G. Davidson said here Monday.

Speaking before the Columbia basin miners' community which gathered for a meeting here last night, Davidson said the interior department has asked selective service Director Maj.-Gen. Lewis Hershey "not to take men out of the mines, as was done during World War II."

He said instructions regarding deferment are on their way to draft boards.

Davidson said the government did not want a repetition of what happened during World War II, when miners were drafted and soldiers inexperienced in mining were loaned to take their place.

Davidson made his statement after delivery of a prepared talk at a banquet which formally opened the 48th meeting of the Columbia basin tripartite committee. The statement was made in answer to Donald A. Callahan, who, speaking for the mining industry, asked that "if the government provided with manpower, materials and supplies in this emergency."

#### U. S. Firm Drops Interest in Suit On Bomb Patent

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Dr. Gabriel M. Giannini, Pasadena manufacturer, announced Monday that he has dropped his interest in a suit against Dr. Bruno Pontecorvo, Italian-born British atom scientist, the Giannini interest in the patent for his interest in a \$10,000,000 A-bomb patent suit.

Dr. Pontecorvo, who may have gone to Russia with his family, was one of seven Italian researchers, who in 1942 were awarded an American patent on certain basic procedures in production of atomic explosives.

Giannini, a former associate of Dr. Fermi at the University of Chicago, had agreed that his concern, G. M. Giannini and company, Pasadena and Springfield, N. J., would represent the seven in their patent suits for which the Giannini interest would receive a one-eighth interest. The company manufactures secret instruments.

The Giannini company last August filed the \$10,000,000 suit against the U. S. government in the court of claims at Washington, claiming damages under the patent for use of atomic products and bombs up to Aug. 1, 1946, when the atomic embargo against the Soviet Union was lifted generally.

#### Income Hit New High Before War

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—An upsurge of corporate profits to a new high was indicated Monday in the national income report which shows began after outbreak of the Korean war, the Commerce department said Monday.

The department reported that corporate profits last quarter had an actual rate of \$87,400,000,000—the after-tax figure was \$22,200,000,000—to reach the highest income rate to \$220,000,000,000 in the second quarter of 1946.

#### China Wants Vote On U. N. Position

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—Nationalistic China has proposed to affect an internationally-supervised plebiscite to help decide China's representation in the U. N.

The nationalistic recommendations were circulated as amendments to a Chinese draft resolution setting up new rules for U. N. representation of member states in which rival governments are operating.
