Smoke and Steam Make Eerie Pattern at Fire

Fire Guts Seventh Warehouse; Losses Exceed \$1,500,000

Total losses in the destruction of seven warehouse district buildings since Sept. 22 probably exceeded \$1,500,000 Tuesday afternoon when fire gutted the large building occupied by the Zion Wholesale Grocery firm and the Ralph Harris Moving and Storage company. The Zion firm had the largest stock of groceries in this area and a preliminary estimate of its loss by Manager Lyle Williams was \$400,000. Harris was unable to estimate the loss in stored household goods but the value of canned goods stored with him was placed at between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

Previous fire losses included the Globe Seed and Feed company warehouse, went up in flames. Actual losses not expected to exceed the estimates. Loss estimates do not include damage to railroad crackage and cars, telephone and power company poles lines and transformers, various industrial machines in the various buildings, smoke damage to neighboring buildings and a variety of related losses.

The Northrup, King and company loss first was estimated as close to \$500,000 and although final compilation of contents has not been completed, the loss figure is expected to be increased from \$100,000 to \$200,000. Quick spread of flames characterized the three warehouse district fires and the Roxy theater building fire during the same period. The theater building loss was estimated at \$300,000.

The Zion firm apparently started the fire at 10:30 p. m. in the interior of the building behind the Harris office. A 26-inch masonry chimney stack, located in an adjoining building owned by J. J. Whitehead and occupied by the Gem State Paper company, was a 25-foot section of the chimney in the 200 block seventh avenue north, occupied by Harris firm for storage of goods owned by the J. E. Beall Co. (Continued on Page 16, Column 4)

O'Mahoney Says Demo Records Refute Businessmen's Criticism

Answering Republican critics of the Democratic administration, Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., Tuesday night said the "record denies everything businessmen say about the new deal being bad for business." On matters of foreign policy, Republicans in and out of government agree with the Truman policy, he added.

Senator O'Mahoney addressed a Democratic rally at the high school auditorium attended by between 400 and 500 persons. He arrived in Twin Falls nearly one-half hour late for the program.

While the audience waited for his arrival, O'Mahoney—Democratic—officially announced that he would be re-elected in 1952. He was introduced and D. Worth Clark, "candidate for the six-year term, spoke on the present foreign policy.

"The New Deal election will determine whether we shall pursue the path of progress or put out the path of reaction," Senator O'Mahoney began after making his way to the podium. "The present administration is being criticized by the Republicans on all counts. It is the picture first he told his audience we have achieved the highest standard of living of any time or country."

During the criticism of the administration for "letting the fields, he read the text of a paper written by Abraham Lincoln which was the legitimate object of government as doing for the people what they cannot do for themselves. He also read O'Mahoney said: "In all things the people can do separately for themselves, the government still has a part to play."

"In two sentences, the senator continued, "Lincoln wrote the platform for the new deal and the new deal." Public power, reclamation, social security and federal insurance of bank accounts are things people could not do for themselves, he continued.

These things are called socialism, "because of the fact on the part of those who do not understand the future of humanity rests in the hands of the government for the masses of the people." Roosevelt offered private power companies have a part to play. (Continued on Page 16, Column 4)

Experts Laud Work of T. F. Fire Fighters

Fire experts here from out of town in connection with the recent disastrous warehouse blaze, praised local firemen for doing a good job. However they blame the local department for not having the facilities to crush such big blazes.

"They point out the local department has neither the manpower nor the equipment to cope with blazes the size of those which have destroyed seven structures in the warehouse district since Sept. 22."

"Asbestos tiles and spray nozzles are two items they listed as necessary to protect highly trained firemen from the heat while getting to the seat of a fire quickly before it spreads."

Assistant Fire Chief Robert Bopp pointed out the local department has every nozzle but said they are of little use when the fire has spread to proportions reached in recent warehouse fires.

He said that Capt. Leonard Madsen said there was plenty of water pressure at the three warehouse district fires. Nine lines of hose were used to fight the fire in the Zion Wholesale grocery building.

AEC Negotiating on New Atom Industry in Idaho

(WASHINGTON Staff Correspondent)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (Special)—AEO Chairman Gordon Dean today confirmed at a press conference that the negotiations with the American Chemical Company, St. Louis, Mo., are actively negotiating on a plan to start an entirely new multiple-use atomic power industry in southern Idaho. First news of the negotiations was reported exclusively in this Times-News Monday.

Dr. C. A. Thomas, Monsanto's executive vice-president, has proposed that his concern be permitted to construct a nuclear reactor in southern Idaho with its own funds. The reactor would produce both electric power and plutonium. The concern would use the power in refining aluminum for the Ureco plant and sell the plutonium to Ureco. "Mr. Thomas," Dean said, "has submitted to us such a plan. We had a meeting with him two weeks ago at which we discussed it."

In response to questioning, Dean said that "several more meetings" are planned to iron out difficulties involved in the plan. Indicative of AEO's great interest in the proposal was Dean's comment that a great deal of attention is being given to the plan by both negotiators. A reporter pointed out that Thomas as has he could produce plutonium for Ureco at a price cheaper than is now making it at Hanford, Wash. Dean said Thomas was not so informed of the situation.

The reporter added that "it seems to me that the government is set up on a kind of TVA to use as a yardstick on the production of plutonium for the Ureco plant. It is a very big money," Dean joined in the laughter but made no comment.

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Jordan Urges State to Keep Its Taxes Low

Speaking at a luncheon rally, Jordan said various sections of the state have tax incentives, facilities and manpower to attract new industries if they are not driven off by penalizing taxation.

Wendell Plant Cited
As examples he cited such industries as the new pulp mill at Lewiston, fertilizer plants around Wendell and Pocatello and mine developments in the Coeur d'Alene which he said "will increase the wealth of the state immeasurably."

Addressing a Glaxo county rally, he said the state must continue to support the United Nations, Republic of China and other nations.

Idaho's record of continued progress and prosperity speaks for the Democratic party in Idaho, James H. Hickey, Jr., Democratic candidate for governor, said at a luncheon in Boise.

Switch

NEW YORK, Oct. 25 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace said today that the United Nations should be reorganized without Russia. The Soviet Union refused to serve "the good faith" on a U. N. Korean commission.

Wallace, former secretary of President Truman in 1946 for criticizing the state and to keep them in a healthy financial condition, Len Jordan, Republican gubernatorial candidate, said at Pierce yesterday.

"Under U. N. leadership there should be an election, with no fear of reprisal by either side," he said. "Eventually, Russia will be given the opportunity to serve on the U. N. commission to Korea, and if she will not serve on such a commission in good faith, then the time has come to divide the world in two and re-empower the U. N. accordingly."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (AP)—The 12—North Atlantic nations, banded together for defense against Communist attack, might be able to create a bigger force and do faster than their military planners have hoped.

This prospect, cheering to a nervous western world, developed today out of the opening session yesterday of the military committee of the North Atlantic treaty organization.

It resulted, essentially, from three things: One, the U. N. plan for American Gen. Omar N. Bradley to the committee for action being taken in being an integrated land, sea and air force to resist any new military thrust by Russia or her communist satellites.

Draft Boards Told to Defer U. S. Miners

WALLACE, Oct. 24 (AP)—Draft boards will be instructed to defer men in the mining industry, Assistant Secretary of the Interior C. Girard Davidson said here Monday.

Executive orders from the Columbia basin industry committee—which opened its meeting here last week—have asked selective Service Director Maj. Gen. Lewis Herber not to take men out of the mines, as was done during World War II.

His instructions regarding deferment are on their way to draft boards.

Davidson said the government did not want a repetition of what happened during World War II, when miners were drafted and soldiers experienced in mining were loaned to take their places.

Davidson made his statement after delivery of a prepared talk at a banquet which formally opened the first meeting of the Columbia basin emergency committee. The statement was made in answer to Donald C. Calahan, who, speaking for the mining industry, asked that it be provided with manpower, materials and supplies in this emergency.

U. S. Firm Drops Interest in Suit On Bomb Patent

PASADENA, Calif., Oct. 24 (AP)—Dr. Gabriel M. Ghannini, Pasadena inventor, announced Monday that because of the disappearance of Dr. Bruno Pontecorvo, Italian scientist, the Ghannini-Ghannini concern has renounced its interest in a \$10,000,000 A-bomb patent.

Dr. Pontecorvo, who may have gone to Russia with his family, is one of seven Italian researchers, who in 1940 were awarded an American patent for certain bomb-making production of atomic explosives.

Dr. Ghannini, a former associate of Dr. Fermi at the University of Rome, had agreed that his concern, G. M. Ghannini and company, Pasadena, California, would represent the patent in their patent claims for which the Ghannini interest would receive a one-eighth interest. The company manufacturers secret instruments.

The Ghannini company last August filed the \$10,000,000 suit against the U. S. government in the court of claims at Washington, claiming damages under the patent for use of atomic products and bombs up to Aug. 1, 1946, when the atomic energy commission took over atomic patents generally.

Printers Receive Coast Pay Raise

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24 (AP)—Los Angeles union shop printers and officials of the International Typographical union have signed an 18-month contract, effective Oct. 15. It calls for increases of 43 weekly for printers, and an additional increase of \$2 weekly beginning April 1, 1951, weekly Secretary Henry Clemens announced.

The former scale was \$92 weekly for day work and \$170 weekly. The new scale makes the scale \$95 daily and \$102.50 weekly, both for a 37 1/2 hour week.

Notes Will Usher In Defense Plan

OTTAWA, Oct. 24 (AP)—A master blueprint to mobilize the resources of Canada and the United States for joint defense production will be formally ushered in by an exchange of notes in Washington Thursday, a government source disclosed Monday.

The blueprint will provide the means whereby Canada will earn enough dollars to buy American armaments through increased sale of uranium ores to the U. S., his source said.

Income Hit New High Before War

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—An upsurge of corporate earnings, a new high mark caused a sharp rise in the national income even before the boom began after outbreak of the Korean war, the commerce department said Monday.

The department reported that corporate profits before taxes hit an annual rate of \$22,300,000,000—the highest figure was \$22,300,000,000—to push the national income rate to \$22,300,000,000 in the second quarter of 1950.

Store Robbed of Narcotics, Cash

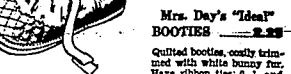

We were not benevolent visitors. It is assumed to be said that so many times as such Yankee traders were dealing in Chinese slaves in the western country and from India, South America. It is a new topic to me.

I will not attempt at this writing to review William Henry Chamberlain's new book showing how Roosevelt steered the matter into World War II and exposing in clearer detail the history of "unconquered" territories.

There seems to be no question of Warren Delano's courage for his part in the days of piracy. But his patriotism plainly was inferior to his greed. For Daniel Delano says he devoted the five years from late 1837 to 1841 to getting his again, in China.

By a strange but characteristic feat of logic, this Delano comes to the opinion that whoever believes Warren Delano was an opium smuggler dishonors the memory of President Lincoln, who appointed Delano as his special agent in Canton.

One reference disclosed in another book impugns the consular agent of Canton to the effect and all through the civil war.

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DR. MAXEY'S OBSERVATIONS

Men in positions such as that held by Dr. Maxey are inclined to discuss controversial issues rather delicately.

"It is my conviction that the great mass of American citizens still believes in this dream. The problem is not whether we should abandon this dream but whether we can give room for the struggle to live."

"Some are disatisfied and discouraged with the American dream and are looking for others—perhaps a bit more royal."

Unfortunately, some of these persons hold responsible positions in our government.

"That's a conservative educator's way of saying the same thing we have been hearing on all sides these days, and coming from a conservative educator, it's even a bit more significant."

But no matter how we say it, a thorough housecleaning to rid Washington of all those malcontents who no longer live the American way of life to their liking is the greatest responsibility facing our government.

"This should be the last country in the world to place the greatest emphasis on such defeatist objectives as welfare and security. If we will only respect our freedom, exercise our initiative and make the most of our natural advantages, there is no reason in the world why we should want for anything. It's far more courageous and honorable than sitting around, whimpering and waiting for some government handout."

criticisms for rural electrification, according to Senator O'Mahoney, but they said the farmer had all the electricity they could use.

The economic system of the United States is sounder and stronger and the fair deal was built to a higher level than ever before, he said.

Other Accomplishments
The administration has built up a record of economic accomplishments, O'Mahoney said, telling the group that corporate dividends and undivided profits for 1950 total \$19,000,000,000, more than three times the corporation income before taxes during any of the years between 1929 and 1939.

The record denies everything the communists say about the New Deal being bad for business, he added. The struggle for the control of the government is being carried on by those who have made their plea and are fearful of losing it, he concluded. The philosophy of Hitler—that there is not enough to go around in the world, he added.

Figures Cited
Citing figures which showed the national debt as about equal to the total gross production for 1949, O'Mahoney said increased production will pay the federal debt and expenditures by opening the door of opportunity for the masses and by stabilizing a high standard of living.

Peace and Economic Structure
Peace and economic structure strong enough to support peace are the objectives of the administration, O'Mahoney said, taking up the question of Republican criticism of the administration's foreign policy.

Federal Help Due as Mine 'Risk Capital'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The bureau of standards has a suggestion for the coal miners' struggle by Halloween practitioners.

Spread a protective coating of vasoline or oil over windows with a soft cloth and go to bed.

Next morning, wipe off the soap or crayon lines and the oil with hot soapy water or a chemical window-cleaning compound.

No effect, no scraping, the bureau said.

WALLACE, Oct. 25 (AP)—The federal government eventually will take over the function of "risk capital" in the mining industry, the chief of Oregon's department of mines predicted yesterday.

Ray Libby told the Columbia basin "mineral-intervenor" subcommittee meeting here that it was his private opinion that the government is "going far" in mining.

A. E. Wetlesen, chief of Spokane's geological survey office, said the northwest will be an important source of vital minerals in the present defense emergency.

Seek to Aid Industry
Wetlesen added that it was the objective of the group "to carry our work only up to the point where it will be taken over by industry."

Carl J. Trautman, state secretary of the Montana Mining association, said his state had produced over \$100,000,000 in mineral wealth since 1927.

He claimed Montana had an excess of power, while a southern Idaho electric reported a "lack of power" in his area.

Power Not Constant
J. B. Halffner, Bunker Hill and Sullivan manager, said some of the power supplied his plant is on an "intermittent basis," but has not been cut off yet.

The minerals subcommittee, appointed last March, is one of the panels created to assist in preparing a comprehensive plan for the development of Pacific northwest resources.
