Campaign Promies Given by School Youth Day Candidates

Campaign promises from "Moose-kaw" candidates for teachers to "Tonsley" in the administration of city funds range through the Twin Falls high school grammarian Wednesday afternoon as junior high students campaigned for city office. The students will take over administration of the city government on Youth day, Nov. 6.

Ed Henick, representing the Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of Youth month in Twin Falls, opened the political rally by pointing out the freedom American youth have to hold free elections. He compared the American's right to vote with the lack of this right in other nations of the world.

One city commissioner from each junior high school grade will be chosen in the election being held Thursday. To aid two more commissioners to fill the board of commissioners to the proper strength the students will elect two commissioners at large to represent all three classes.

The four candidates for the two commissioners at large positions are Norman McClure, Kay Pettysgrove, Kathy Swim and Annie Westergren. Candidates for the city position from each class are Dick Mungler and David Mann, seventh grade; Dale Criss and Betty Davis, eighth grade, and Danny Davis, ninth grade.

At the end of the rally Clarence Parker, a teacher, discussed letters of application for city appointments. He said that they should be positive. Students will be selected as city manager, policeman, fireman, city engineer and other positions on the basis of letters.

Traffic Safety Problem for Children On Bicycles Is Three-Point Dilemma

By HARRY ARNOLD

The traffic safety problem of children on bicycles—increasing with the city's growth—appears to be a three-pointed dilemma between parents, school and police, with each of the three feeling it is the responsibility of the other two to take corrective action.

But most of it seems to fall back on the parents.

A Times-News survey of all schools in Twin Falls reveals excellent work in teaching bicycle traffic safety along with instruction in other types of safety. Most of the schools have safety patrols to help with enforcement.

As with the motorist who is a model of good driving only while a police car is in sight, the old saying, "Out of sight, out of mind," applies particularly to young bicyclists.

School principals, proud of the good work of their safety patrols, admit other youngsters break about every rule in the book a block away from school and the safety patrol's jurisdiction.

The school officials almost unanimously suggest more enforcement of traffic laws, but also strongly the need for cooperation from parents. The principals with disciplinary problems of their own fully appreciate the enforcement difficulties facing police.

Police, too, find cases of parents fearful of street traffic. Many parents instruct their children to ride on the sidewalks. But officers report pedestrian traffic on sidewalks is almost as heavy as it was 15 years ago.

However, Police Chief Howard W. Gillette points out the only serious injury involving a bicyclist in recent years was the case of a woman struck by a young bicyclist riding on a downtown sidewalk.

The police chief and Traffic Sgt. Matt Vics recognize the safety training work done in the schools. They lack of home training and lack of cooperation from parents are a part of the problem.

Some idea of the size of the problem is given in City Clerk Constance J. Lester's report of 1,000 bicycles licensed here. A better idea can be had by inspecting the bicycle parking area at the school.

An outstanding improvement in parking bicycles has been made at Washington school as part of a program to teach better bicycle use. The school safety patrol, which meets A.A.A. standards, who is active in meeting the traffic safety problem.

Last year, the patrol's 44 sixth-graders began training for patrol duties in the fifth grade.

When patrol captains brought up the bicycle parking problem, principals at bicycled without stands would be placed in racks, and those with stands to be lined up in a designated area.

Supt. A. W. Morgan is calling the attention of other public school principals to the Washington school plan. He is a member of the National Safety Council's local chapter

which appointed him to head the school safety committee.

The superintendent is especially concerned with traffic violations by young bicyclists. "If they are riding with bicycles now," he points out, "they can be just as serious as they were in a few years."

He said the school safety committee action should be taken by the safety council. He pointed out that parents who are not properly disciplined by police or school officials. He also cited the damage which can be done if children riding a ressemblance toward outside authority.

Chief Gillette, also a member of the safety council, holds similar views. He cites police action several years ago in which youngsters riding bicycles found their bicycles impounded 10 days or two weeks.

The police chief says the action cannot be taken by parents, and that the children's respect, confidence and good will toward the police department.

Impounding bicycles was extremely effective more years ago. In cases where youngsters were parking their bicycles on downtown sidewalks instead of in designated areas, two truckloads of bicycles were impounded and the children's traffic infractions were quickly spread among the juveniles.

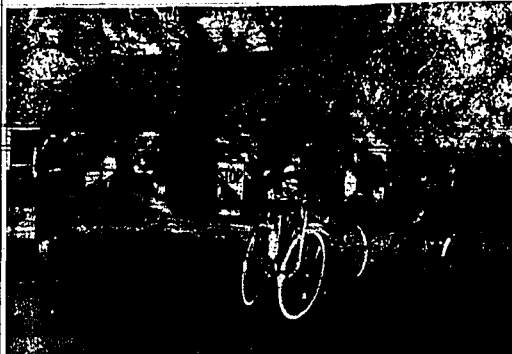

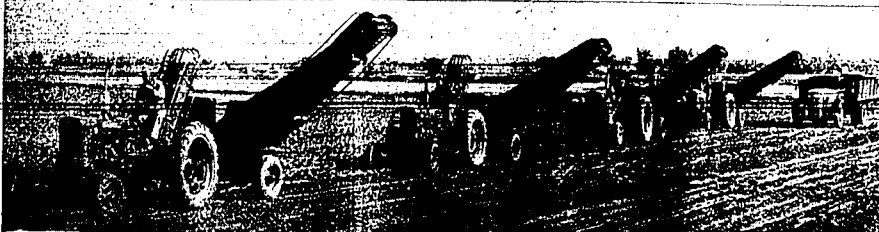

Jersey GOP Using Spuds In Campaign

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 26 (AP)—New Jersey Republicans are giving away blue—and what they call hot—potatoes.

The blue-dyed potatoes are part of the GOP congressional campaign effort to convince voters the national Democratic administration's "spud" potato program is wasteful and extravagant.

The Republicans have been mailing and passing out the potatoes throughout the state as an exhibit of the Truman administration's \$300,000,000 program of potato crop destruction.

Wrapped in cellophane, the blue potatoes carry a tag warning they are unfit for human consumption. The tag also informs the reader that:

"The federal government pays with your tax money \$1.85 per 100 pounds of these potatoes. After dyeing them blue, it sells them back to the farmer who grew them for 1 cent per 100 pounds, for use as fertilizer."

Some sent to Russia.

It adds that "the Stalin also got 100,000,000 bushels at that price—625 times the price that you, the consumer, pay for potatoes."

So-called potato wagons—sound trucks manned by GOP women—have been traveling around the state to pass out the campaign material.

The GOP state committee estimated the federal program has destroyed 40 per cent of the potato crop in New Jersey this year.

Potato Harvesters Needed at Rupert

RUPERT, Oct. 26—Howard Heninger, Idaho state employment service manager at Rupert, reports that because of clotty ground mechanical pickers did not work out as well as anticipated in this area.

As a result, he added, there has been more demand for laborers. At present, 80 to 100 more pickers could be used in the potato fields.

Heninger reported that the weather has been ideal, but that two more weeks of potato work still must be done. Laborers have been coming in from other areas where the harvesting is finished and have helped to relieve the situation somewhat.

While mechanical peel harvesters have been proving more satisfactory, Heninger says he is receiving calls daily for beet tappers.

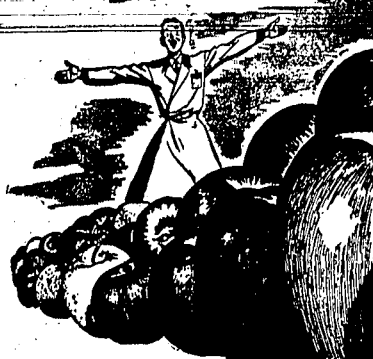
