The accident occurred when the car, driven at high speed south on McMillan road, reached a sharp turn which is not barricaded and plunged over the canyon rim to the creek bottom, 60 feet below. The car was demolished.

The condition of the bodies upon the arrival of police and sheriff's officers indicated all were seated in the front seat. The driver was pinned to the seat by the wheel protruding against his chest while the other two were thrown partially out of the car.

According to Donald Harney, Kimberly, who arrived at the scene of the accident immediately following the crash, the car carrying the three men had passed his vehicle three miles east of Twin Falls on U. S. Highway 30 at a speed estimated in excess of 80 miles an hour, nearly doubling the normal speed of the road.

After passing, the car driven by Perkins suddenly applied brakes, spun around in the center of the highway and retraced its course until reaching McMillan road, where it turned south and continued to Rock Creek canyon.

### Judge to Rule On Tax Levy Suit in Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 28.—District Judge Hugh A. Baker will issue a ruling Monday morning on a demurrer filed by Cassia county commissioners on a suit seeking to add a one mill levy for school administration funds.

The suit was brought against the commissioners by the Cassia county board of education as a point of legal argument between the two boards.

**Claims Levy Necessary**  
The education board claims that one mill levy against all Cassia county property is necessary to raise additional funds of about \$10,000 for school administration.

The suit seeks issuance of a mandate compelling the county commissioners to place the levy. The commissioners' demurrer claims no cause of action is contained in the suit.

**Request Refused**  
Commissioners had refused a request of the education board to impose the levy. The school district is reorganized.

Herman Holke is representing the education board. Adonis Nielson, Cassia county prosecuting attorney, is representing the commissioners, who also have retained B. T. Lowe as special counsel.

### New Naval Plane Crashes Into Sea

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—One of the navy's new A-1 attack bombers, big enough to deliver the atom bomb, crashed into the sea off Guantanamo, Cuba, yesterday during a takeoff from the carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The navy listed two crew members as missing—Lieut. Condr. David Paulson of Norfolk, Va., and Ensign Edward Barrett, chief aviation electronics man, also Norfolk. The third crew member, Ensign E. A. Decker, escaped with minor injuries.

The crash occurred less than a week after the navy announced that planes of this type had completed trial landings aboard the Coral Sea. They weigh more than 17 tons unloaded and are the heaviest ever to land on a carrier.

Cause of the crash was given as engine failure or "loss of boost" or both.

The French government wants the smallest possible German units to be used in a European army, under a European defense minister, who would be responsible to a European assembly.

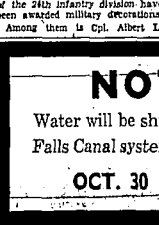
Urges Substitution

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—President Truman asked the nation today to observe Armistice day, Nov. 11, by paying solemn tribute to Americans who fought on foreign soil for liberty. He also asked prayers for peace.

He directed in a proclamation that the flag be flown on all government buildings that day "in recognition of past and present efforts and sacrifice toward the end that international hostilities may be ended forever."

He said although the world again is saddened by strife and bloodshed after two world conflicts—our faith has grown in the ultimate fulfillment, through international effort, of the promise for which our heroes fought and died."

### Meat Production Boost Predicted In Western Area

BOZEMAN, Oct. 28 (AP)—The population of the 12 western states reaches the forecasted 30,000,000 by 1955, a large increase in western meat production is needed.

William M. Folk, head of the department of agricultural economics of the University of Idaho, quoting a U. S. department of agriculture report, said such a population would require another 1,200,000,000 pounds live weight of meat animals annually for western markets.

He said slaughter of commercial meat animals in the 12 western states has nearly doubled during the last 23 years. He said slaughter expanded from about 3,600,000,000 pounds live weight in 1916. Population has grown from 16,000,000 to about 25,500,000 in that time, he said.

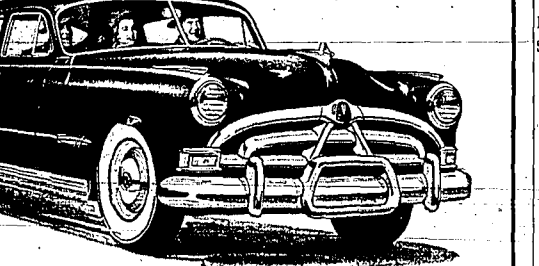

Editor, Times-News: I've been a little confused by the often-quoted statement that 90 percent of the Democrats, that Len Jordan hadn't been popular enough to carry the county over Calvin Wright in the primaries.

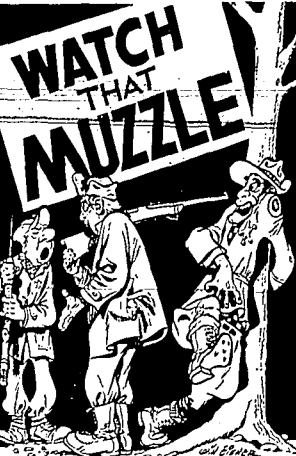

### Navahos Gain Praise as Top Field Workers



These seven Navahos and another who proved camera-shy are the fifth crew to be employed on the E. L. Goodman farm south of Murtaugh, who says the Indians are "by far the best field labor I have ever used." He was one of the original group hiring the Navahos in 1943.

### Navaho Indians Gain Praise for Work Of Past Five Years on Murtaugh Farm

MURTAUGH, Oct. 28.—"Navaho Indian labor is by far the best labor I have ever used," E. L. Goodman, local farmer, believes.

He has used Navaho hands on his farm three miles south of Murtaugh for the past five years. He was one of the first farmers in the area to employ use of the imported Indians in harvesting crops.

He praises them as being congenial and easy to work with. He adds they are steady in their work, although some are slow, and they never strike for higher wages. "Regardless of the type of field in which they work," Goodman explained, "they never complain."

The secret, he says, is friendship and treating them with respect. Friendship means more to them than money any time, if a choice has to be taken, Goodman said. And, it does—his part-by-housing his Indian workers on his farm and making an effort to become acquainted and win their friendship.

During the five years Goodman has used them as field workers, 42 Navahos have worked on his farm. Several of them have returned again and again, testifying to the high regard they hold for their employer.

The entire Goodman family joins in taking a special interest in their hired hands. Mr. and Mrs. Goodman correspond with some of each group that has been hired.

Not all speak English nor are able to write. However, the children of the Goodman family have taken great delight in teaching the Navahos to write their names and addresses and letters of the alphabet.

On a rainy day when field work has stopped, it is not uncommon to see Indians in the big kitchen of the family home. Mr. and Mrs. Goodman writing letters for them back to their families on the reservation and the Indians learning their letters.

In the fall of 1949 Mrs. Goodman assisted the Navaho women in making 12 skirts and learning more about proper cooking and cleanliness. "The women seem to appreciate highly the abundant supply of hot and cold water. Often they will wash their hair two or three times a week."

The men also gain. Goodman takes every opportunity to teach them to drive the tractor and farm truck, how to irrigate and the judgments of general farm work.

### Record Farm Income Seen In Next Year

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—The agriculture department predicted today that gross income of farmers will set a new record next year, but that their net income will fall short of the 1947 peak.

The department's bureau of agricultural economics said 1951 gross income is likely to be \$10,300,000,000, 13 per cent higher than the \$9,100,000,000 of 1949.

A flat 10 per cent increase would bring the 1951 gross to about \$10,000,000,000, just short of the 1948 record. But the bureau's summary stressed an increase of "at least" 10 per cent, and said outright that the new record-high is expected.

Another yardstick for measuring farm prosperity—net income—was not quite so favorable.

A net income increase of 15 per cent or more over 1950 was forecast, but the bureau said it still is likely to fall short of both 1947 and 1948. This year's net income was estimated at \$3,300,000,000, six per cent below 1948 and 23 per cent below the high of 1947.

Gross income includes what the farmer gets for what he sells, plus such items as the value of home consumed farm products, and estimated rental value of farm dwellings. Net income is what's left after the payment of production costs.

However, mainly as a result of the white-hot heat of public indignation stirred by revelations of the past few years, action is being taken.

Recently congress approved a measure authorizing \$20,700,000 for a 15-year rehabilitation program for Navaho and Hopi Indians. Perhaps this will solve at least partially their sad plight.

In all other phases of community and family life, the Navahos are a neglected people. Some 63 per cent do not speak English, 80 per cent are illiterate. Average schooling in past years for Navaho children is barely over a single year and only one-third of the school-age children are attending school at this time.

Investigative reports to a shocked nation that the average Navaho family lives in a hogan built of logs or adobe. It has no floor but the earth, no furniture as we know it, no indoor or outdoor toilet facilities, no electricity and no convenient water supply. Water must be brought in cans for miles. As a result it is used sparingly.

All these things are not unusual to respond eagerly. They never seem to tire of learning and, like inquisitive youngsters, constantly ask questions to increase their store of knowledge.

All these things are not unusual when one remembers that some 40,000 Navahos—America's largest single Indian tribe—live out an existence on a sprawling, arid reservation experts say can support only 20,000 persons at a minimum economic level.

Their economic plight has received more attention during the past three winters, when it was discovered the Navaho and their Hopi neighbors were starving and freezing to death.

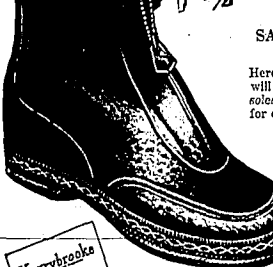

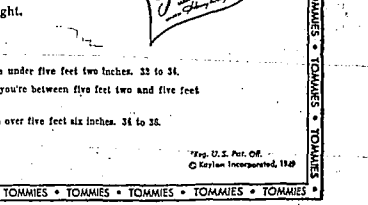
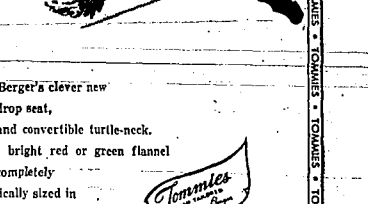

### College Plans First Private Atom Project

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The atomic energy commission announced today that the first non-government atomic "furnace" in the United States will be built at the University of North Carolina at Raleigh, N. C.

The commission emphasized that the project, known as a nuclear reactor, will be used chiefly for searching out specimens used of atomic energy.

Production Small  
It said that private operation of the reactor is permissible under the atomic energy act because it will produce less than one gram of plutonium a year, "an insignificant production rate in the manufacture of atomic weapons."

Use in Research  
The college pointed out that atomic radiations may be used for many purposes including treatment of disease and medical research. They may transmute one element into another or "even create entirely new elements."

It said that in theory, the heat caused by nuclear fission (splitting up of atoms) may be used "for any imaginable purpose" and one problem will be to find a practical means of using the heat.

### Radioactive Deposits From South Hills Start Chain Reaction for 3 Filer Boys

FILER, Oct. 28—Radioactive ore deposits in the Idaho Nevada hills might not be enough to make atom bombs, but at least they have set off a chain reaction in the minds of three Filer high school students. The reaction started when Mahlin Hansen, high school science instructor, turned over some ore found in the hills to the boys in his photography class. The ore might be used in the making of atomic bombs. The radioactivity could be photographed.

So the three boys in the class, Frank Morgan, Lawrence Rieder and Earl Kahlertsch placed various samples of the ore over weights and then put the weights on photographic film. After several hours the radioactivity of the ore was registered on the exposed negative.

The boys, usually interested in school only to the extent that most active and healthy boys are, suddenly became interested in science.

By the second day of the experiment they knew more chemistry than any junior chemistry class will learn all year," Hansen explained.

The students started their experiment with the carnotite secondary ore and dissolved this ore in an acid solution. Then they collected the precipitate which, apparently contained uranium.

radioactive materials are so extensive," the science teacher adds. "More than most students learn in a full-year course. With their reading on the subject their English language usage is bound to have improved. Another valuable educational factor is their new knowledge of scientific method. "Complete study of one field brings knowledge of other fields as well," Hansen says. "As for the commercial value of the ore—the boys have analyzed it. It is that the ore has come from many parts of the hills. Work and experimentation with the ore samples continues at the high school. Hansen isn't concerned with any commercial value the activity might have. "The value I'm looking for is in the minds of these students," he says. "Interest in the ore has given these boys an interest in knowledge and that is where the value is so far as I'm concerned."





# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Newcomers and tourists passing through MINDOKA COUNTY see the neat, orderly farms, abundant crops and evident prosperity and say, "What a nice place this is."

Few realize, as they buzz along on improved highways, the sweat and back-breaking toil which went into the desire to make it into those neat, orderly farms with abundant crops.

Memories dim as years go by and even persons who have lived in the county for some time are likely to forget the past.

This was the time of Willis Dunham, one of the county's earliest pioneers, who died Oct. 12 at HEYBURN. Shortly before his death, Dunham wrote a letter to A. C. DeMarey, RUPPERT, setting down some of his early recollections in Mindoka county.

Dunham, like many other persons 40 years ago picked Heyburn to become the "city" in Mindoka county. And, like those many other persons, his sense of direction was not good. Heyburn did not grow the way he and others expected.

Dunham spent the first 22 years of his life in Kansas, but, as he said in his letter to DeMarey, he wanted to find a place where he neither would be "drowned out" nor "drifted out." So when he heard that the government was about to open an irrigation project in southern Idaho he came west.

Dunham stopped at MINDOKA where the land office was located. There he met G. C. Beardsler, one area, who took him to Heyburn in a borrowed lumber wagon drawn by two white mules. On the trip over bumpy desert roads, Beardsler convinced Dunham that Heyburn was "the spot."

In Heyburn a man by the name of Frank Adams had started a newspaper, "The Southern Idaho Review," and to earn money Dunham went to work selling subscriptions. It was on one of these trips in 1905 that he met DeMarey for the first time. Jack Early handled the editorial end of the new newspaper. Dunham located his claim in September, 1904, and taught school that winter in order to get along. On one two-day week-end he built a shack as required by law. John Hyatt, he recalled in his letter, hauled the lumber from Mindoka. He Lewis built the 14-foot shack in one day with Dunham's help.

When the school term ended Dunham purchased a team and a wagon and, with his wife and children, moved out onto the Mindoka project. It took a week to make the trip by the way of Pocatello. Bagchebur, Dunham recalled, ran right up to the door of the cabin.

to meet their water payments to the government. In 1908 Dunham worked on the Mindoka project, on the Twin Falls project and on concrete work near JEROME. In 1909 he was a ditch worker at WENDILL and in 1910 and 1911 he was a carpenter on a crew building checks in the ditches on the south side. In the winters of 1910 and 1911 he worked on a bridge across the river.

And so it went for the early settlers on the Mindoka tract. They worked their farms as best they could—they tried to improve their claims but all the while they tried to take outside work in order to make money—was done. They did climb, but to those who reached the top, Dunham told DeMarey, it was worth the trip.

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### Two Big Bets Against Nation Lost by Stalin

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—Josef Stalin has lost two of the three big bets upon which he placed confidence in his "blue chips" after World war II.

Det. No. 1 was that the United States would suffer after the fighting ended.

Det. No. 2 was that the United States and the United Nations lacked the will to meet aggression with bullets as in former times.

Det. No. 3 remains undecided. Stalin's biggest bet of all is that the United States will spend itself into bankruptcy.

Stalin Blasted Proprietor Lenin himself stated the proposition that any capitalist democracy must eventually destroy itself by over-expanding. That is prime communist doctrine. If Stalin and Lenin are right on that, the loss of one bet and two will mean nothing.

If they are wrong and proved that our government is administered wisely, it is only a question of time before the democratic triumph over communism in hot or cold war or a combination of both.

Many People Fearful Americans who vote Republican or who vote Democratic but object to the high level of government spending are fearful that Stalin and Lenin are half right. Most of them hold that the spending level maintained by President Truman endangers the future of the republic.

Administration supporters scoff at those fears. They must concede, however, that Mr. Truman is a free spender. He has just wounded a corner hitherto unbreached by any other man. In five fiscal years plus the four months elapsed of the current one, the President had administered the spending of more than a quarter of a trillion dollars.
