## Big Gain Is Noted In Count

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Final official figures today of the 1950 United States population at 160,697,361, this census tally, taken every 10 years, reflect a gain of 1.5 million, or 1 percent, over the population of 159,190,000 in 1940. The gain is the largest in the 10-year period in the nation's history. The increase was 1.5 per cent.

California Gains Greatest—Total population gain was 1.5 per cent for Florida, and one house for Maryland, Michigan, Texas, Virginia and Washington. New York gained 1.4 per cent for 1940. Louisiana, Missouri, New Jersey, Oklahoma, and one each for Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee.

# President Resumes Work As Usual in Wake of Puerto Ricans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—President Truman carried on as usual today while Puerto Rican police seized the alleged boss of the two Puerto Rican rebels who attempted to assassinate the chief executive in his Blair house residence yesterday.

Unperturbed by the daring and abortive attempt on his life, Mr. Truman started off his day with his usual morning stroll through downtown Washington streets. While he went about his business without apparent concern, police and national guards in San Juan, Puerto Rico, arrested the alleged assassin, Pedro Albizu Campos, alleged mastermind behind the attempt on the President's life.

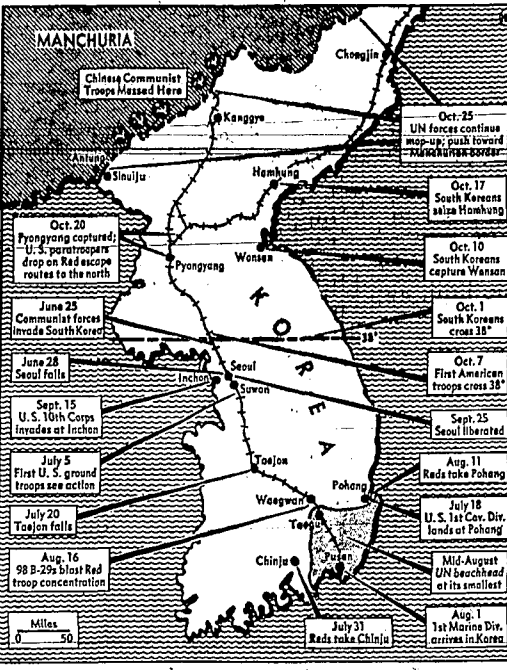

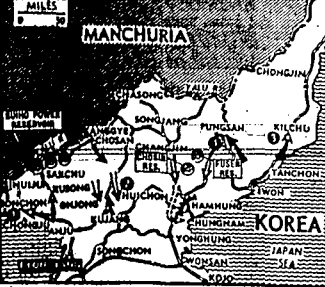

### Sheep, Cattle Raisers Feud Over Ranges

PORTLAND, Nov. 2 (AP)—Sheep ranchers renewed their long-time battle with cattlemen over range lands Wednesday. There were no showings from, but the arguments were hot.

The scene was in a committee session of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association pre-convention talks. It involved were sheepmen, from the western Oregon country where old-time cattlemen were so deadly, and government foresters who have the permits for use of public grazing lands.

His plan would incorporate most present Granger and Taylor acts, but also provide compensation for sheepmen when grazing permits are canceled or converted to other uses.

### Testing of Soil Is Sound Business, Farm Agent Says

GOODING, Nov. 2—Having soil tested will make money, County Agent E. E. Higgins said Thursday. It will save farmers from applying fertilizer when it isn't needed. It will bring greater profits when it is needed, he added.

In Gooding county, the greatest value from a soil test is in the use of phosphatic. Many soils are deficient as shown by poor hay growth and crops leaching through the fence for feed.

Because of the equipment and chemicals involved, it is necessary to make a charge of \$1 per sample to cover expenses. This has been approved by the commissioner and by the extension advisory committee.

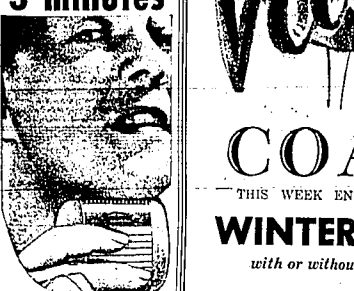
Representative samples should be taken from 10 or 12 places in a field and from the top six or eight inches of soil. All the samples should be permitted to dry in the air and then mixed. Approximately a pint of soil should be furnished for the test. Accompanying the sample should be the name of the farmer, location of the farm, crop history for four or five years in the past, the kind and amount of fertilizer applied and crop yields.

### Huge Captive Balloon Used Near A-Plant

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 2—A large captive balloon is being used by U. S. weather bureau employees stationed at the U. S. atomic energy commission's reactor testing station in southeastern Idaho to obtain detailed information about atmospheric conditions.

The balloon is one of a number of devices being used to get accurate records of wind direction and velocity, temperature, precipitation, and relative humidity.

Central Station A central weather observation station has been set up at the reactor testing station's central facilities area, and supplemental stations with automatic recording instruments have been established at Howe, near Atomic City, near Arco and near Terretion. Another is to be set up on the eastern edge of the testing station area near the southern border.

Instruments at those stations record temperature, relative humidity, precipitation and wind direction and velocity.

Used up to 1,000 Feet The captive balloon, 10 feet long, is used to obtain information on temperature at elevations up to 1,000 feet. Thermodes determine the balloon's altitude, and a thermometer in the balloon transmits readings automatically to a recorder on the ground.

Weather conditions will play a large part in technical operations at the reactor testing station, as no operations will be carried on which, with adverse conditions, might possibly release radioactivity on the testing station area.

# Writer Finds Indo-Chinese Fight Is Fluid

BY ROBERT C. MILLER  
SAIGON, Indo-China, Nov. 2 (AP)—The fluid front of the Indo-Chinese war extends from the jungle-covered mountains of the Chinese border to the narrow cause of Saigon. Warriors in this country can a Frenchman feel safe at any hour of the day.

It is a fluid war fought at Saigon against a backdrop of culture and beauty in the midst of complete civilization. In the north it's a primitive war where men fight and die in a mountain wilderness far removed from streets and cities.

There, outnumbered French and local Vietnamese troops cling desperately to mud and rock forts which guard the vital roads and passages linking communists with French-sponsored Vietnam.

Airdrops and mistletoes often are the only means by which the French have been able to supply and maintain communications with these lonely border outposts. The roads have fallen one by one under the relentless pressure of communist forces pouring down the hills and jungles.

In Saigon it's a different war, but one equally bitter. Here along the boulevards and in the midst of Parisian-style shopping districts it is a war of terror. French-sponsored coolies, rickshaw boys, bellhop and waiters may be grenade-carrying members of the communist Vietnamese.

Seldom does a night go by that there isn't a bomb exploded or an assassin's bullet fired in the relentless fight against the French. The French seldom see their enemies in Saigon, for the rebels haven't enough strength here to mount an open offensive upon a city of 500,000. However, their underground army is large and the members are fanatical with the desire to kill Frenchmen.

# Road to Manchuria's Border Lies Narrow, Dusty, Uneasy

By TOM LAMBERT

WRITE U. N. FORCES NORTH KOREA UP—The road to the Manchurian border lies narrow and dusty and uneasy.

From Sinsuilo on the steel blue Chongchon river it winds across small valleys yellow with ripened rice. Then it climbs curving through hills beautiful with autumn colors. It runs east toward Kulsang along the Chongchon—Occasionally it retreats from the riverbank through passes gorged in some distant ice age in the mountain spine of Korea.

The road runs through undamaged villages. In these the shrill shouts of "maneuver" like 10,000 years ago—resound with the march of allied troops.

But in villages shell pocked or bombed and dying in flames, the greetings are less effusive.

"The road runs past the remains of the red Korean army—Russian-made tanks and trucks and guns and shells.

weapons moving north. In rear areas the movement is as rapid as the road—permits in forward areas it is tense. The enemy—not the road—sets the speed of advance . . . and sometimes retreat.

The road shows itself even where it cannot be seen. Around the curve and over the hill. A thin, powdery column of dust hangs in the cold sharp air, marking the route. The dust claps the throat and reddens the countryside. It lays a thin, reddish grey film on everything.

It is a poor road, a miserable road by American standards. It is a road-of-threat, dangerous and menacing to the men who must travel it like a prisoner marking off on a calendar the expiring days of his sentence. Americans mark off the miles they gain daily toward the border.

It is a road of promise, a beacon to peace. At the end of this road to the border, the doughboys believe, lies the end of the Korean war.

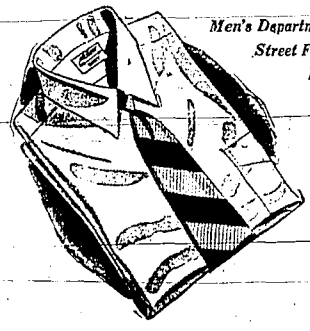

### Atom-Powered Subs May Be 'Wolf of Seas'

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—The atomic-powered submarine of the future will be a wolf of the seas that can prowl at great distances after its prey rather than wait for a spot for a victim to approach.

Further, the atomic submarine will operate on full speed under water and will be able to cruise for an unlimited time without refueling.

These are the predictions of R. A. Kesseling, of the Knolls-Atomics power laboratory, Westinghouse Electric Co., in a report of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

The laboratory now is designing and later will construct a shipboard atomic power plant for the navy.

Kesseling said the atomic powered submarine also will cut down the necessity of building great numbers of submarines, because those with atomic engines can do the work of many of the conventional type, whose range is limited.

He said this is extremely important in view of our submarine fleet of 120, compared with the Russian fleet of 400.

Kesseling estimates the first United States atom-powered submarine will cost about \$10 million.

He said it will use an atomic reactor, or pile, operating at high temperatures to produce steam.

The heat, in turn, will be transferred to the boiler to drive a turbine in a closed loop-pressure system, and thence to a boiler where steam will be generated to drive the steam turbines of standard type.

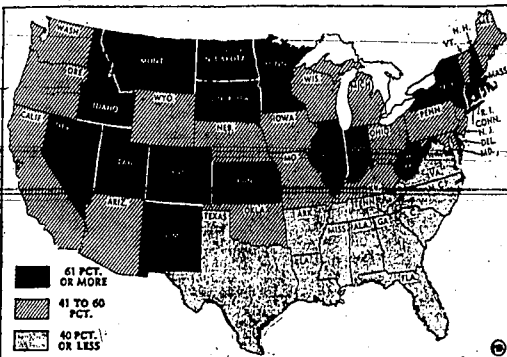

# 47 States Will Choose 432 to New Congress

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Party-state races next week will elect 432 members of the 80th Congress, 100 senators and 332 representatives to serve in the 82nd Congress.

The mid-term election is held in a general election last September, returning three Republicans to the House.

Election day is Nov. 7, and the new Congress will convene Jan. 3.

Next week's polling will determine control of the House to the Democrats who are in control of Congress as they have been with only a slim margin since 1946. The two years of Republican control were 1947-48, the 79th Congress.

Of 332 House seats, 200 are held by Democrats and 132 by Republicans.

To obtain house control in the new Congress Republicans must make good gains of 40 seats. The party alignment of the House is:

Democrats 200  
Republicans 132  
Vacant 2

Of 100 seats of house members in southern and some border states already has been completed by primary elections. In the remaining 232 seats, the party will be a formality for those nominees, many of whom are expected to win their opposition.

So the political complexion of the new House will be determined by the east, north and west. Republicans have their biggest hope in retaining the farm vote. Enough farm voters in 1946 to give President Truman a surprise election to the White House and a Democratic House and Senate to boot.

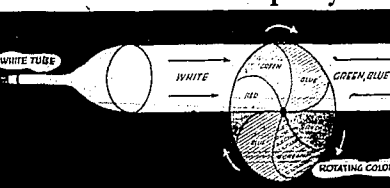

# Video Color System Approved By FCC Is Amazingly Simple

NEW YORK (UPI)—Here's how the CBS color television system works. It is a field sequential system. That is, colors change at each vertical scanning period of field. There are 144 of these fields per second.

CBS says its system is the only color system which can utilize electronic or mechanical means for color selection.

At the camera, a single image is produced by means of a lens on the light-sensitive surface of the pickup tube. A color filter, fully enclosed, is placed in front of the pickup tube and contains a series of color filters in the order of red, green and blue.

At the receiver, a color disk rotates in front of a cathode ray image tube. This disk also has red, blue and green filters and rotates at 1440 revolutions per minute. The disk is synchronized with the vertical scanning so that when the red filter is in front of the camera tube the red segment is also in front of the receiver tube. Since the color changes 144 times per second, the viewer sees only a smooth, steady color image.

CBS has developed an adapter—a box which, when attached to an existing set, permits viewing of color transmissions in black and white. And color may be seen on an existing set with an added color converter. This adds on tracks. When pushed in front of the set it will change four regular television stations in three cities (New York, Philadelphia and Washington) broadcast the color system simultaneously.

### Russia Can't Deny It Sent Help to Reds

Russia continues to deny she had anything to do with starting the Korean war, but evidence to the contrary is piling up over the battlefield.

United Nations observers have captured enough Russian-made war equipment to outfit a dozen divisions in 1950 and heard the roar of Russian factories.

The captured equipment included 31-propelled guns, howitzers, mortars and anti-tank weapons.

Foreign the Korean communists at their weapons is a subject the Russians never allow to enter into conversation. The question came up not long ago in the United Nations when American Delegate Warren H. Austin pulled out from underneath his desk a Russian "burp" gun, or light machinegun.

He explained it had been captured in Korea and he invited the other delegates to note that it bore a name saying it was manufactured in Russia this year. All the delegates except one agreed it was Russian. Jacob Malik, the Russian delegate, walked out when the report came around for his seat.

Outside of providing proof that such is the arsenal of international communism, the captured equipment will be of little use to the United Nations force. No ammunition was ammunition that fits the bore of Russian guns.

### Corporations' Profits Are Pouring Out At Record Tide; 51 Per Cent Over '49

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 (AP)—Corporation profits are pouring forth in a record flood—51 per cent greater for the last quarter than in July, August and September of 1949—under the shadow cast by threatened enactment of an excess profits tax.

The Korean war nearly added a snappy fillip to the earnings gain already begun. In the second quarter, before the war, profits were running 43 per cent ahead of 1949's.

But retroactive excess profits tax could whittle 1950's corporate earnings—now seemingly headed for an all-time record—below the previous record of 1948, when company bookkeepers do their final figuring in March, 1951.

A compilation made today by the Associated Press of the earnings of 488 corporations in all fields of business showed these totals:

1950 third quarter \$1,717,763,600  
1949 third quarter \$1,139,755,266  
Increase: 51 per cent.

Many companies this year took the increased 1950 taxes out of their third quarter earnings. Otherwise, the profits over the hot months might have appeared even larger in comparison with last year.

Taxes aren't the only thing that will make this year's earnings different from last. In 1949 many of the big companies did very well profitwise, but many smaller companies didn't do well at all. So the total corporation compilations for 1949 didn't give a fool-proof picture of business earnings. This year the increase is more of a down-the-line proposition.
