N. N. Forces Fight Off Red Attacks as Chinese Aid Grows

SEOUL, Korea, Sunday, Nov. 5 (AP)—United Nations troops, forming a solid new battle line in North Korea, fought off renewed attacks Saturday from a revitalized Korean red army bolstered by Chinese communist forces estimated to equal three to six divisions. An American officer said South Korean army authorities estimated that six Chinese communist divisions had entered Korea from Manchuria. The statement came shortly after other American officers announced that the Chinese division was battling the forces in northeast Korea and elements of two other Chinese divisions were fighting allied forces in the northwest.

Two Farmers See Airplane Before Crash

AMERICAN FALLS, Nov. 4.—Two men in Arbon valley in southern Teton county have reported that they saw an airplane crash before it crashed after it had disappeared.

some relationship to his wife's political activity, he says. With all the times he left her at home for weeks and weeks while he sought his own interest in active politics shown by his wife might be "the way of getting even," he adds.

Phosphates in Idaho to Help Uranium Need

(From Page One)
uranium content of the Idaho phosphate deposits is because the area was several million years ago by sea water at an excellent depth for producing the deposits. Further west the waters had deepened and furnished sea to shallow.

Survey scientists claim there also are unexplored possibilities in the phosphate ore of central Idaho, California, Oregon, Washington, Colorado, the Carolinas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Actually, Idaho still produces less than 10 per cent of the nation's production of phosphate. The phosphate and the post-war growth has been phenomenal. Florida turns out 90 per cent and Tennessee 10 per cent.

Uranium is about as plentiful as tin. But present mining operations are so expensive only the highest grade ores have been mined. It is now estimated that the amount of uranium production must now be diverted to the manufacture of atomic bombs. The estimated increase in uranium production can be put to peace-time uses, as in the case of the sandstone which is produced near the four-state intersection of Colorado, Utah, Arizona and New Mexico.

U. S. Snubbing Most-Powerful Peace Weapon, Club Warned

BUNLEY, Nov. 4 — "The most powerful, but least-used weapon for peace, is prayer," Imre Kovacs, Hungarian-born American, told Bunley-Rupprecht and Park club members Thursday night at South Idaho College of Education auditorium.

The lecture, also attended by the college students, was considered one of the most outstanding in the history of the club. Kovacs told of the tragic history of countries bordering the Danube river in Europe. Most now are under domination of communistic governments.

The speaker likened the Danube to the Snake river, which he said need never run red if the people are alert and guard their freedom. The spreading of "hate" propaganda is one way communism infiltrates into a country, he said, and many subversive groups are writing down denominational interests to work for the Christianity they all claimed," Kovacs said.

The communistic freedom of religion, but give it with strings attached: That the clergy carry out the orders of the state; that the theological teachings be in accord with the state teachings, and that special orders for church meetings be given by the government.

"If you take religion away from a people they make their own; so communism has become a religion," Kovacs said. "The religion that people are willing to die for is the one which will finally conquer."

Kovacs warned that U. S. people take their religion too lightly. "The communists promised to make the Balkan people citizens instead of subjects," Kovacs said, but the people live in constant dread of losing their lives. Regular elections are held, when the people can cast their votes "for" or "against" the party in power—but no one dares to vote "against."

Kovacs urged his audience to vote on Nov. 7.

"If you don't vote, you cast a

vote anyway—you cast a vote for Moscow," he warned. Communism teaches people to dig up the venom of the past and to hate. But if given one generation, we could teach them to forget hate," he said.

"There must be a revival of the religion of 'love' instead of hate," Kovacs said, with the strongest weapon "grace" on our side.

The next dinner-meeting will be held Dec. 4. Joe Ramsey will give an all-color motion picture story of the Okaloosa swamp in South Georgia in his lecture, "The Land of Trembling Earth."

Kovacs spoke to the senior high school students Friday morning at a general assembly.

Rescued Hunters Plan Attempt to Get Vehicles, Equipment Left in Mountains

CHANDLERMAN, Nov. 4—Nov. 4 that they have been rescued from the heavy snow in Idaho's prime hunting area.

The Hagerman hunters and one man from Buhl are planning to return to the area to retrieve all of the equipment they were forced to leave behind when the snow-covered fish and game department hauled them out.

The hunting party included Hagerman, Chandlerman, and one man from Buhl. When they went into the primitive area for elk and deer, they were met by one snow machine one pickup truck and a large truck they had camped. They had three horses and camp equipment.

Mr. Howard Conklin, the only man in the party, said they did not suffer from being marooned in the snow but the difficulty was in getting back home in Hagerman and her husband and 5-year-old son, Ronald, were three members of the party. The others were Hagerman, Chandlerman, and Miller's 11-year-old son, John, and Miller's sister, John, 74.

Difficulties for the hunting party began even before they left Hagerman. The rented truck developed motor trouble and was not able to start. Mrs. Conklin, her son, and Miller, sr., left in the pickup truck. Mrs. Conklin said she drove to the primitive area that night and camped at the Pike's Peak ranger station where they were joined by Chandlerman and the rest of the party. On their way the first day, Mrs. Conklin said, she lost her coat and expected to spend her hunting up abjectly. She said she found an "shepherd's" coat. However, she is saving her considerable discomfort during the following days.

On their way farther into the primitive area the rented truck turned out a bearing and was left behind. The party, riding the horse and driving the pickup and the automobile, made it as far as Silver Creek that night. Four men, however, using the horse and pack animals, they went deeper into the woods until they reached the head Johnson creek.

Upon their arrival at the head Johnson creek they discovered they had forgotten their bread and found two of the party, on horseback, harnessed to the vehicles for the additional supplies.

Unable to find any elk in one day's riding, the party returned to where known as the "trapper's" middle den to hunt deer. They shot three and packed them down to where they had left the pickup truck and automobile at Silver Creek. The following morning, Mrs. Conklin said,

there was six inches of snow on the ground.

Realizing they might become snowed in for the winter, the party started down the pass to where the snow was not so deep. It was getting all the time, Mrs. Conklin continued, and it wasn't long before everyone was wet to the skin.

Mrs. Conklin and Miller, in the pickup, tried to go on into Idaho City and had to turn back because of the deep snow. Conklin, who is a mechanic, then set to work trying to repair the bearing. Finally he was able to make repairs by fashioning a bearing from an aluminum cup. With the repaired truck hauled snow drifts for two days the party eventually reached the Hagerman ranger station. By this time the snow was 24 inches deep on the level and snow drifts were higher than the vehicles.

Regarding the futility of continuing with the motor-driven vehicle, Conklin and Miller, mounted on horseback, headed for Idaho City.

By the time the two men reached the Beaver Creek ranger station, Miller was tired. He stayed there and Conklin continued on alone to Idaho City where assistance of the fish and game department was sought.

Two days later, riding on a snow-sled, the party was brought out, still wet from the snow but not hungry or cold.

Decrease for Construction In T. F. Noted

An \$11,456 decrease in building permits was noted during October in comparison with expenditures during the same period one year ago.

Building Inspector Stuart van said Saturday.

All phases of construction during the month totaled \$298,027 in estimated building costs where \$209,293 is expended during October, 1949, he said.

Increased activity in new residential construction and in remodeling commercial buildings were in marked contrast, however, during the month just ended and the same period in 1949. Building permits for new residences were issued during October with estimated building costs totaling \$211,000. Thirty-seven permits were issued during the same period in 1949 with only \$168,500 being expended.

Fees paid the city on the 24 building permits issued in October totaled \$14,419 and only \$10,419 revenue was received by the city on the 37 permits issued during the same period one year ago.

Fourteen commercial buildings were remodeled during the month and with estimated costs totaling \$33,200 in marked contrast to the four permits issued during the same period in 1949. Expenditures of only \$3,300 were reported.

The city received \$41 in building fees for 14 permits issued during the month just ended and only \$15 for 37 permits issued during the same period one year ago.

Thirty permits were issued for remodeling of residences during the month with estimated costs totaling \$27,500, well behind \$22,650 recorded during the same period in 1949. Increase of \$7,050. Fees received the city for this phase of construction during the month just ended were \$62, compared to \$94 during October, 1949.

The greatest decrease in building permits was indicated clearly in commercial construction. Estimated in this phase of construction during the month totaled \$23,000, in marked contrast with the \$92,500 spent one year ago and a decrease of \$69,500.

Four building permits were issued for this type of building during the same months in 1949 and but fees derived during the 30-period just ended totaled \$67 or only \$22 in October, 1949.

Building permits for 13 private garages with estimated building costs totaling \$6,200 were issued during October, 1949.

Two Nearest Planets Fade Out of Skies

By J. HUGH PRUETT
Astronomer, Extension Division, Oregon Higher Education System

The two planets, Mercury and Venus, whose orbits lie inside that of the earth, are not too nearby in the direction of the sun to be visible.

Mercury rises almost due east four hours before sunrise. Red Mars in the southwest for over two hours after sunset, and is still a fairly brilliant object, but because of its distance is not by means as strikingly Jupiter is gorgeous in the southern heavens all evening.

For the true stars and their groupings, let us turn around to the low in the sky we find the familiar Big Dipper, right side up as it is viewed almost always.

The entire figure is now moving eastward as an hour's watching will show. Our latitude in this famous sky figure never sets.

Well up in the northeast, bright Vega, the star of the Lyra constellation, is that region of the sky very close to Capella, is a small triangle of faint stars known as the Kikid.

"Night Light Group" Almost due east and well up in the heavens, the compact and compact stars making up the Pleiades dance mysteriously in the twilight to detect seven.

Directly below the Pleiades is a cluster of stars known as the sharp end of the letter toward the south. The lower branch of the reclining V is capped by the bright orange Aldebaran.

Bright Star in South Low in the heavens—almost due south—the bright Wega without is glittering in lone splendor in a region of the sky which appears dark because of the lack of other conspicuous stars.

Tracing straight up from the southern point of the horizon until we arrive very high in the sky, there should be little trouble finding the three stars—made up of four stars about equal in brightness to those of the Big Dipper.

Flying Horse's Body This, known as the Great Square of Pegasus (recent first syllable) is the body of the flying horse from which Bellerophon fell when attempting to ride to heaven.

Only a little west of the overhead point we find Deneb, the star at the top of the Northern Cross. At some distance below Deneb, the brightest star in the western sky is seen. This is Vega in the Harp of Orpheus.

Large Triangle As a considerable distance south of Vega, bright Altair shines. Named in the order of their brightness, Vega, Altair and Deneb form a large triangle in the sky.

November is the month of the famous Leonid meteors. They seem to radiate from the star-group Leon, the lion, and appear in greatest numbers about every 33 years. Spectacular showers occurred in 1799, 1833 and 1866. The best this year will likely be seen around Nov. 15 when early morning counts may reach 20 per hour.

British Housewives Still Stand In Queues for Rationed Goods

By PETER EDSON
LONDON (REX) — While the American housewife grumbles impatiently at the rationing of goods in the midst of apparent plenty, her British cousin has an exactly opposite opinion.

She never tires, she says, of being kept up by careful controls and subsidies that have not been lifted since the war. But she is annoyed, and carefully rationed or allocated.

Things are better now than they were during the war, of course, but rationing is still a fact of life. There still is a terrible housing shortage. Newly-married couples may register for new accommodations but the waiting lists are long. At present rates of construction, the applicants may not be able to move in for five or six years.

Rents still are tightly controlled in an effort to keep down the cost of living. The controls apply, however, only on new housing and on accommodations "rated" for tax purposes at 100 pounds (\$200) a year. And on all properties for rent, the landlords have found ways to charge extra for furnishings and the extra.

Every housewife must register with one store and buy her rationed foods there. On the foods that are allocated instead of rationed, the allocations are given to the stores whenever supplies are available, and the store divides up the supply. In this way the allocation of things like milk and eggs is greater than in winter. When no supply, no allocation.

The British ration list today looks like this: Butter, two ounces a week; Bacon, four ounces a week; Beef, four ounces a week; Eggs, two ounces a week; Lard, two ounces a week; Sugar, four ounces a week; Tea, four ounces a week; Tinned foods, two ounces a week.

The bacon ration has varied from two to four ounces a week, per person. The meat ration is one shilling a week.

U. S. Favors 10 Divisions of Germans for Europe Defense

By ARTHUR GAVSHON
LONDON, Nov. 4 (AP)—Diplomatic officials report the United States wants German-armed forces equal to about 10 divisions to help defend west Europe.

The informants said the United States would scatter German formations—each no greater than a division—right through the projected European army.

The 10 North Atlantic pact nations hope to man a defense line from the Arctic ocean to the Aegean sea with a combined force amounting to 10 divisions strong by 1952.

An overall American plan on the position, German troops should occupy in a European army if under study by the Atlantic alliance, along with a rival French plan.

The informants gave these details of the American proposal: The German contribution should be roughly equal to one division in every six or seven European divisions.

Germans would be used primarily in infantry, artillery and tank outfits.

German industry would be permitted to turn out light armament such as machineguns, carbines and so on, but no heavy armament.

The Germans would be prevented from forming any sort of general headquarters. Some sort of coordinating body might be allowed them to administer their dispersed formations.

Secretary of Defense Marshall outlined the American proposals in Washington Monday when the defense ministers of the 12 pact partners met.

They were submitted as a basis for discussion.

Several nations voiced misgivings about some aspects of the American plan. The strongest opposition came from French Defense Minister Jules Moch.

France, bitter-invaded by Germany since 1914, wants to apply every safeguard possible against an unlimited revival of German strength. She has announced she will agree to the use of German troops only if German formations fitted into a fused European army are held to battalion strength, perhaps 600 men. A division may contain 10,000 or more.

The defense minister assigned their military experts and the council of deputies to try to resolve the deadlock.

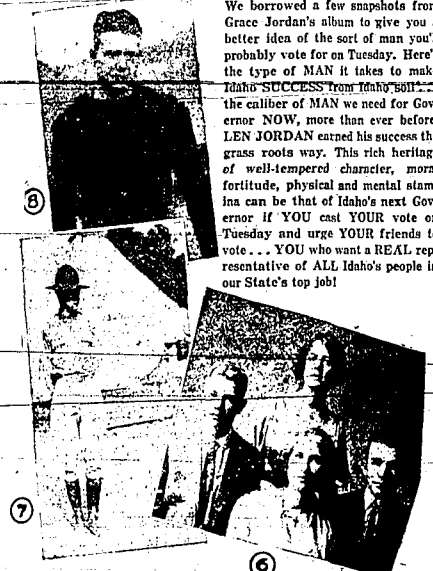

Russia's Air Force Set at 14,000 Craft

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—The navy has reported that the authorized strength of Russia's air force is estimated conservatively at 14,000 combat planes.

It added this estimate does not include Russian naval aviation, transport planes or trainers.

Replies Statement—A navy spokesman gave that explanation of a statement appearing in "Naval Aviation News," magazine of the navy's bureau of aeronautics. Exactly how much of such "authoritative" strength has been achieved, the navy official did not attempt to say.

The magazine, which is an official publication, put the Russian picture this way:

Have 14,000 Craft—The Soviet Union today is said to have an air force of upwards of 14,000 operations aircraft, including some jet fighters and TU-4 (B-29) type medium bombers.

Its strategic long-range bombing force is relatively small, although this arm appears to have been stressed in the Soviet post-war program.

Naval aviation is land-based, having no aircraft carriers from which to operate.

Figures Censored—"Naval Aviation News" said the Soviet concept of air power is clouded by censorship propaganda, and frequent reorganization. But because Russia is a land power, the magazine expressed belief that the primary purpose of Russian air power will probably be to back up
