Research for Polio Vaccine Nearing Goal

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 6 (AP)—The tedious job of grouping viruses in a search for a vaccine against polio is halfway to completion.
The University of Kansas medical school is doing the work here.
Three other universities are working on similar projects sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The others are the University of Pittsburgh, the University of Utah and the University of Southern California.



All are trying to find out how many kinds of polio viruses there are. These viruses are tiny particles indistinguishable from each other in microscopes.
Three kinds are known. Before a safe vaccine can be made, medical science has to know whether there are more.
The difficulties are almost incredible, as shown by the work assigned here.
Just One Method
The only method is to take a sample of virus from a proved human polio case and then to test it on monkeys. In two years the Kansas

Korea's Fight Said Tougher Than War II

WITH FIRST CAVALRY DIVISION, Korea, Nov. 6 (AP)—Korea was being tougher than the second World war in the Pacific, according to the opinion of military engineers who went through both campaigns with the first cavalry.

"Compared with this war, Korea had a war last time," said Maj. Russell J. Wyllison, Galesburg, Colo. "Certainly from an engineering standpoint this was a much worse."

In's Campaigns

Wyllison was with the division during its Admiralalty Islands and Leyte campaigns in the last war. Now he is acting commander of the eighth engineer combat battalion.

"To me—I've never seen anything like this before," said Sgt. Charles C. Cooper. "I hope I never see anything like it again. I guess it was bad because we had to pull back and we never had to do that in the last war."

5-Year Term

Kopper, whose home is at Hot Springs, Ark., was with the first cavalry from 1914 to 1918. He was acting commander of the eighth engineer combat battalion during the Admiralalty Islands and Leyte campaigns and was hit in the leg by shrapnel during the assault on the coast of the Pacific river in the battle of Manila.

During the last war, Wilson said, the engineers had some fighting to do but they never were committed as infantry by the division commander. During the Korean fighting the cavalry division committed its engineers as a regular infantry. Men in the thick of the fighting on 11 different occasions for periods of three to seven days.

One-Third Casualties

One company of engineers, battling as infantrymen from the beginning of the fighting until the end of the fighting, sustained a 33 per cent loss of men. The more than 100 men in the company included all the company officers.

In the last war, Wilson said, only one officer in the whole engineer battalion was wounded. He was hit by a sniper.

Municipal, State Employees to Get Benefit Coverage

BOISE, Nov. 6 (AP)—Atty.-Gen. Robert E. Smylie has advised William Hughes, Lewiston city engineer, that extension of social security benefits to Idaho state, county and municipal employees may be "in full operation, not later than the end of the first quarter of the new year."

Smylie said Idaho was the first state to apply for benefits coverage under the new amendments passed by congress this fall and "as a consequence there is no precedent for determination of several questions."

Smylie said "At first blush it appeared that a constitutional barrier might exist which would make participation by the municipalities a difficult problem. However, mature research has indicated that this difficulty can be resolved favorably by early institution of the social security program."

He added that the "language of the federal act seems to me to be unnecessarily complex, but a solution to the problem is in sight."

Colorado Capital's Coffee Prices Dip

DENVER, Nov. 6 (AP)—Housewives are taking coffee home from groceries at prices ranging from 11 to 21 cents less than the wholesale price of a month ago.

The pound price of coffee in the state capital city has plunged to from 25 to 44 cents a pound, according to grocery paid 85 cents a pound to wholesalers.

Pupil's Longing for Live Doll Almost Kills Girl of 5 Weeks

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6 (AP)—A schoolgirl's longing for a live doll to play with after classes all but caused the death of a 5-week-old baby.

Play Janet Lee Mann, missing for two hours, was found in the trailer end of a truck which was about to be burned for its scrap metal content.

Police said only the whimpering of the baby saved her from the junk pile, which already had been drenched with gasoline.

The baby's mother, Mrs. Eleanor Mann, said she placed Janet in a buggy outside their home. Soon thereafter she discovered the child was missing and called police.

Patrolman William Diehl learned that a 5-year-old school girl, during noon recess, had taken the baby from its carriage and stowed it away.

Diehl eventually traced the trailer to a junk yard several miles from the Mann home.

The baby's safety assured, Mrs. Mann wept.

The 5-year-old, crushed and trembling with fear, Mann was consoling. "I'll buy you a nice doll," she said, "and then you'll never again try to take away a live baby to play with."

Juvenile authorities took over, but Mrs. Mann said she wished no charges lodged against the girl.

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Doctors Aver Transplanted Kidney Good

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 (AP)—A dead woman's kidney transplanted into a comatose woman's body June 17 is functioning, the surgeon who performed the unprecedented operation has reported.

The kidney, he said, is "working" and he actively is below par. However, he added that conditions are "unusually withheld" until there is more evidence of the permanency of the graft.

The operation that may bring medical science to a new frontier, the successful transplanting of human organs, was reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Man, 'human guinea pig' Mrs. Howard Tucker, 44, reported she feels "fine" and is able to carry on her usual household activities. Ten weeks after the operation she was able to take a 30-mile automobile trip to attend a convention. For a week she participated freely in banquets, dancing and other convention activities.

"I hope the operation will mean something to the medical profession and to other sufferer elsewhere," she said in an interview.

The doctors said other investigation in this work have reported there is no fundamental reason why organ transplantation should not ultimately become a practicable undertaking.

"At this stage the matching of donor and host is not completely worked out," they said, "but efforts to match more closely donor and host by tissue typing are being made with excellent results by workers at Presbyterian hospital in Chicago."

In the kidney graft, the doctors made an effort to match tissue. The donor, a 49-year-old woman of the same blood type and physical build, had died 13 minutes earlier from a kidney disease.

Mrs. Tucker was suffering from a progressive polyarthritis kidney condition that had destroyed 70 percent of her left kidney and made her right kidney 90 percent useless.

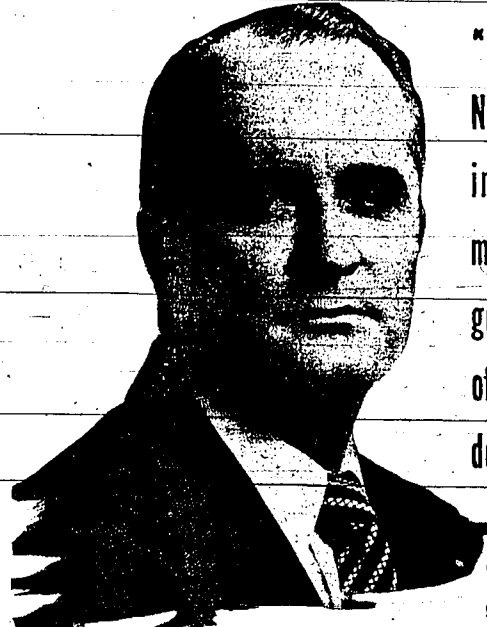

Relief Nears For Battered City of Seoul

SEOUL, Korea, Nov. 1 (AP)—Some hungry Koreans may get happier and those who are cold may shiver even less, but authorities say warm meals and blankets are just around the corner for the 1,000,000 or more civilians in devastated Seoul.

Nationals free in this Korean capital until authorities can determine who is able to pay for food. Then money will be collected for a relief fund to purchase most needed materials for civilians.

Food Comes First

"We are interested primarily in getting food to the hungry," Marshall W. Shubacher, Los Angeles, national welfare officer of the Korean civil assistance command, told Associated Press.

He said free rations will be provided later in other badly damaged cities.

Seoul is having difficulty obtaining enough rice and other food due to inadequate transportation.

Shubacher cited one example of this. It took three weeks, he said, to unload 200 tons of rice—two barley and half rice—from one ship at the port of Incheon. Some of this all-important cargo never even reached Seoul by rail and some by barge.

Clothing Needed

With winter fast approaching, two other needs are blankets and warm clothing.

Shubacher described relief operations as not a very happy picture at present but I think it is breaking down now.

One of the first measures was precautionary—to prevent epidemics in the shattered capital.

"It would be safe to say more than 1,000,000 have been immunized now," reported Dr. W. H. Critchton, Eastling, Kent, Eng., of the world health organization.

Powerless to do anything, the Korean doctors who formerly practiced in Seoul are still here. Some have hoped that the remainder were killed or taken north by the communists.

Three provincial hospitals were about 50 percent destroyed. Private hospitals were wrecked. Only 100 civilian ambulances remain in Seoul.

Robins Dedicates U. of I. Structure

MOBEOUV, Nov. 6 (AP)—Gov. O. A. Robins today dedicated the new agricultural science building at the University of Idaho. He continued his tour of the state's agricultural field of research—agricultural.

The governor lauded the university's agricultural research accomplishments and said the new building "has been erected as a monument to the progress of agriculture."

Ernie Bevin taught me something about that when I was with him at the ministry of labor. We went into a conference room which was being built for the ministry and they were repainting it dark green.

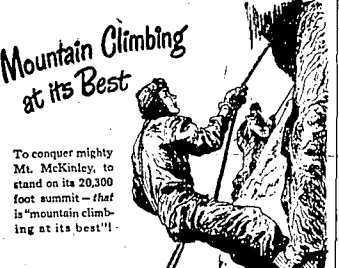

The national park service said 32,782,228 persons visited parks, monuments and other areas administered by the service during the travel year ending Sept. 30.

"We compare this with 31,848,190 during the previous year."

Leading attraction was the Lincoln Memorial in Washington with 2,042,873 visitors.

More than 1,000,000 visitors were reported for five of the national parks—great Smoky mountains in Tennessee and North Carolina, 1,746,294; Grand Canyon in Virginia, 1,292,111; Rocky Mountain, Colorado, 1,265,886; Platt, in Oklahoma, 1,164,043; and Yellowstone in Wyoming, Montana and Idaho, 1,109,925.

Of these only Yellowstone showed a decrease. Last year's visitors there numbered 1,132,518.

Popularly, the excess profits tax is supposed to take all or most of the profit out of remaining the nation.

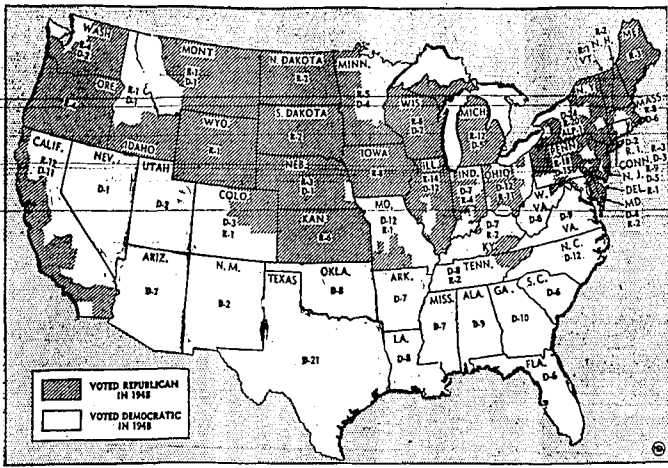
Businessmen, however, question whether it does. And they bring various charges against it.

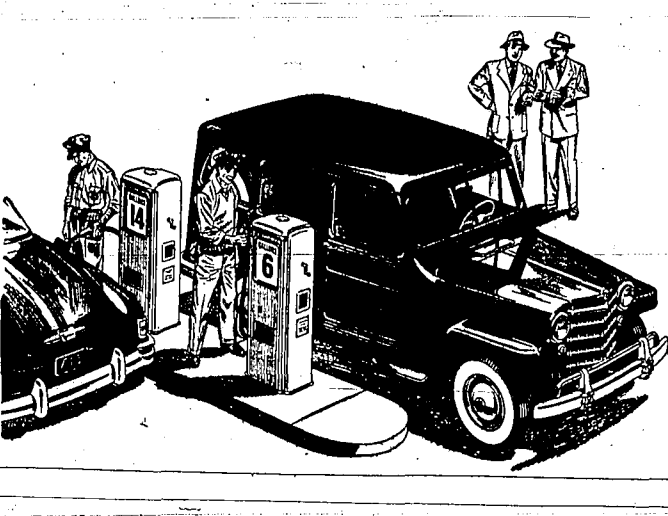

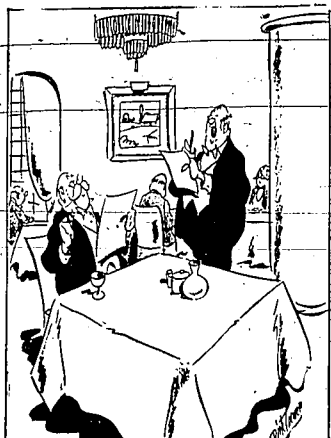
