## GOP Chief Urges Voice in Firing of 2 Aides

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Republican Chairman Guy Brydson today urged the GOP "fire news" in his party's emphatic bid for a stronger voice and leadership in the Republican advances in Tuesday's elections, declared the Truman administration was re-iterated in its conduct of the nation's affairs in general. The GOP national chairman suggested that President Truman change his "disgraceful course" and drop Secretary of State Acheson and Secretary of Agriculture Brannan from his cabinet. Meanwhile it was learned that the retiring Senator Vandenberg, R. Mich., expects to be on the job Jan. 1 when a new one may be sought to temper GOP fire. Foreign policy leader, C. C. Young, in a letter to the editor for many months, Vandenberg has a record of seeking to settle differences and to unite the anti-American from the north.

### Store Seeking Pay of \$1,003 On Man's Bill

In a complaint citing causes for four actions filed Friday in district court, G. O. Anderson's suing F. P. Givens, Butte, for overdue accounts totaling \$1,003.

A furnace, stocker and labor for installation in Givens' home are included in the first action. According to the complaint, Givens purchased the heating units on Sept. 26, 1949, agreeing to pay \$12.50 in 24 monthly payments beginning Oct. 1, 1949. Givens' installment was met, reducing the amount to \$762.00, which remains unpaid.

A \$125.00 balance remaining unpaid on an \$81 venetian blind account was the cause for the second action. The blinds were sold March 14, 1947. According to the complaint, only \$56.80 has been paid on account.

The cause of the third action is purchase of a shotgun and shells on Oct. 18, 1948. The purchase totaled \$110.10 for which nothing has been paid.

An unpaid bill of \$156.65 for merchandise purchased between April and Sept. 28, 1949, is basis for the final action. The merchandise was purchased on a 30-day sales contract and nothing has been paid, according to the complaint.

Givens agreed to pay attorney fees totaling \$100 if action was required to collect any portion of the unpaid balance on three of the purchases, the complaint says. The store asks eight per cent on the four separate unpaid bills or balances, attorney fees and all costs.

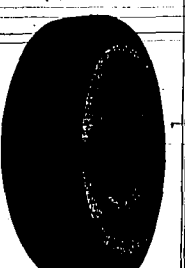

### Meteor Show Due for Skies In Next Week

By J. HUGH FREZZI  
Astronomer, Extension Division, Oregon State University, Corvallis.  
Those familiar with the history of meteoric displays of the past are to think of November as the month of meteors. This is doubtless due to the publicity which this spectacular event has attracted from the residents of North America on the night of Nov. 13.

The most brilliant show will stage toward dawn when it was reported that "the stars fell as thick as snowflakes."

Many competent scientists made observations. Professor Olmsted, of Yale, and others determined the radiant point in the constellation of Leo. Hence the name Leonids.

Some estimates high.

Some very high estimates were made, but the best, from a 15-minute count, gave an hourly rate of 20,000 over the entire visible sky. Europe missed the best for it was daylight there at the time of maximum display.

Mathematical work during the year following indicated a good return in 1944. It came, although it did not equal the previous one. At the peak of the shower the hourly rate was about 5,000 meteors. Shortly afterwards it was found that the Leonids move in the orbit of the comet which also appeared in 1866.

Follow schedule.

A splendid display of the same shower was observed in South America in 1909. This time the Leonids were observed in greatest numbers every 23 or 24 years. Some of the most brilliant meteoric showers in the history of the world were confined to the main sweep was pulled somewhat from the regular orbit since 1866.

1944 prospects.

Around 1939 and 1933 more meteors than usual were observed but in no such numbers as in the three preceding years. This year, shall we have a good display in 1944? Little calculation has been done in this date.

It is now well established that the Leonids are bits of cometary matter scattered all around the orbit of the comet which has larger bulges concentrated at the points where the comet comes nearest to the sun every 33 years.

In the last apogee between the more concentrated groups, there is enough matter to show about 20 meteors per hour under ideal conditions for a few nights each mid-November. At present the maximum is about 10.

The Leonid meteors are swift and bright in color. This year there will be no moon in the opening season of the Kansas legislature to which he was elected last Tuesday.

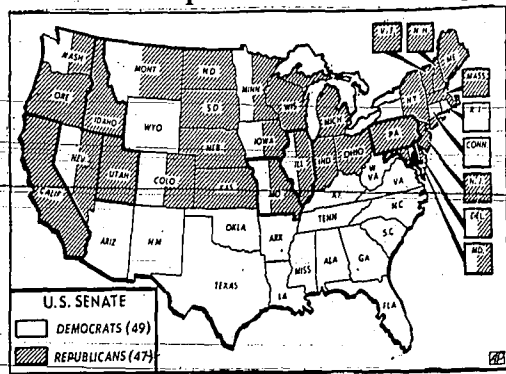

### Plight of Weary, Thin Georgia Boy Hints Korea Winter Effect

WITTE U. S. POW CAMP IN NORTH KOREA (CP)—Fred, thin Georgia boy stumbled into an American patrol a few days ago after six days in a reeking North Korean camp. He told in wailing accents words of Korea's winter—the new enemy of United Nations troops.

Pfc. Max Brandon, Moultrie, Ga., was separated from him when it was ambushed by communists in the Tokchon area about 20 miles from the city of Kummo on the Chongchon river line.

For six days he huddled the hills and was seen by North Korean recon rods who were hunting him.

One night his trousers and socks froze. For three days he ate nothing but his thing by munching ice from frozen puddles.

That is the beginning of the rigorous Korean winter in terms of suffering for one American soldier.

Multiplying Max Brandon's experience by several hundred thousand. And throw in the cold weather problems of aircraft, trucks, jeeps and all the other things that keep a modern army on the move.

For United Nations a group of forces collectively this is what the approach of winter holds.

It is the beginning of a generally along the northwest front now as the temperature "drops below freezing."

The north wind from the far Gobi and Manchurian plains is beginning to whip down through the North Korean mountain passes and drill its cold way across the best plains.

The hills which a few days ago were splashed with rain's vivid colors are turning drab and brown. Leaves from maples and poplars are falling.

The approaching winter is hardening the rice paddies and making them firm for tanks and heavy vehicles.

But it also reminds the army already perplexed by supply problems in this remote land—with need for such practical items as anti-freeze solution for radiators and lighter weight oil and grease for the thousands of engines necessary for movement and attack.

Not many officers here reckoned on a winter campaign in Korea.

The campaign of Seoul, followed by the relatively easy seizure of the red capital, Pyongyang, and the rapid thrust toward Manchurian border, convinced many the war would be over before Thanksgiving.

### Loans Available On Hay, Pasture Seed, PMA Says

Loans and purchase agreements on stored red clover, ladino clover, sweet clover, timothy grass and 24 other kinds of hay and pasture seed are available to producers, L. A. Wyble, chairman of the Twin Falls county production and marketing administration, announced Saturday.

He said loans at the support price can be secured on warehouse receipts issued by an approved warehouse. If no approved warehouse is available to the producer, loans may be made and stored on the farm by the producer, he said.

Support prices vary according to the kind of seed. Wyble explained. As examples he pointed to support prices of 35 cents a pound for common red clover, \$1.25 a pound for certified ladino clover, 12 cents a pound for sweet clover and 14 cents a pound for smooth bromegrass seed.

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### Washington's Liquor Sales Aid Research

SEATTLE, Nov. 11 (AP) — Every time you buy a drink of hard liquor in this state, you contribute a fraction of a cent directly to medical and biological research.

This drink money—\$600,000 this year—goes wholly to two great schools, University of Washington and Washington State colleges.

Buying drinks over the bar in Washington was not permitted until two years ago. Then a new law made single-shot drinking legal, and this law directed that all the license fees should go to the two classes of research. University of Washington gets 50 per cent, because it has the only medical school.

Administration Cost Deducted  
License fees range from \$1,000 to \$300. Expense of administration is deducted before the proceeds are delivered to science. Washington is the first state to allocate fees directly to research. In some other states liquor revenues go for research, but it appears that the Washington sum is larger than elsewhere, or soon will be.

Not an Excuse  
It would be a mistake to think that science can be used as an excuse for taking too many drinks. The number you buy does not increase the scientific revenue. The state and schools get only the license fees, regardless of how many drinks are sold—or how few. But the fact is that in some areas about a third of a cent from each drink goes to pay a \$1,000 license.

Already nearly 150 different research projects are supported wholly or in part by the liquor revenue. Several are on the effects of drugs, including search for ways to minimize people against becoming drunkards. No arrests are on the money—the universities can spend the money for any kind of medical or biological research they choose.

By H. D. QUIGO

WITH FIFTH CAVALRY DIVISION, Korea, 1950—Five men shivered in the early morning camp, five men in green fatigues and brown aviators.

These five were left, five of 164. Nobody else in the company was the original landing with the first cavalry division in Korea and stayed on, alive and unharmed.

There were 164 men in fox company of the fifth cavalry regiment when it landed with the division at Pohang July 18. Fox company went in the main assault.

The battle was like a scythe—Yongdong, Kunchon, Chongju, Wagonan and Hill 308, Shindoo and Hill 202.

Fox was the first company to cross and that spelled as an organized rifle company, although others had sent patrols across earlier. It appeared the attack company of the assault battalion.

Time and again it was drained of men. After Yongdong, on July 25, fox company had only 33 men. It was still up there. Then, by the time it attacked Hill 202, Sept. 15, it was down to 13 men again.

### Simple Method Used in Local Precinct To Speed First Tabulation of Results

When Twin Falls precinct No. 8 reported its complete vote total 45 minutes after the polls closed Tuesday evening, veteran election workers were congratulated in the precinct hall.

The election officials of the precinct had made a record of some kind for speed in reporting the completed count from a large precinct.

Precinct 8 was the first Twin Falls county group to report a complete count at 7:45 p. m., the earliest that election officials can remember for such a precinct. About 250 ballots were cast.

The election officials of the precinct credited their speed to a system developed by O. H. Coleman, one of the precinct judges.

According to Coleman, the secret of his system is that ballots are counted five at a time rather than singly. Most election ballot counters take one ballot at a time, keep their place on the ballot with a sharp ruler and take each office race, one ballot at a time. This means each page of the counting book must be turned once for each ballot.

With Coleman's system, five ballots are lined up carefully side-by-side and a yardstick is used to line up each office on all five ballots at once. The voters for that office on all five ballots therefore are counted at once and each page in the counting book is turned once for each five ballots.

By using this system election officials were able to keep up with their count as the votes came in through the day. However, Coleman admits they would not have finished their count so soon if there had been a last-minute rush at the polls before closing time.

When precinct 8 polls closed at 7 p. m., the only job left before a first straight ballot count for each party. All mixed ballots already were counted and entered in the books.

The group had sorted out straight ballots and counted a few that they went along on their mixed ballots. When they got a pile of about 50 straight Republican ballots they counted them and entered the votes for every Republican candidate, 50 votes at a time.

The same procedure was followed with Democratic straight ballots, but

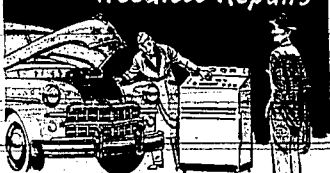

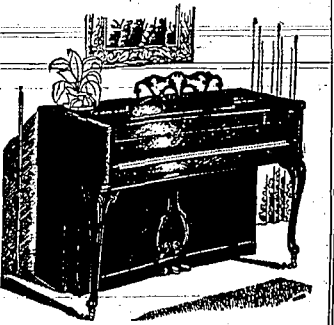

The school's department of mechanical engineering said it had developed a "magnetic fluid brake," which might replace the present types of automobile brakes.

The gripping agent in the new brake is a thin fluid, which becomes progressively more solid in proportion to the amount of electric current passing through it. The electric current from the vehicle's battery is controlled by a push button.

The braking fluid is a mixture of oil and iron dust, the school said. An electric current enters the fluid, it creates a magnetic force that causes it to turn the fluid solid. When the current is cut-off, the mixture of oil and iron dust returns to a fluid state.

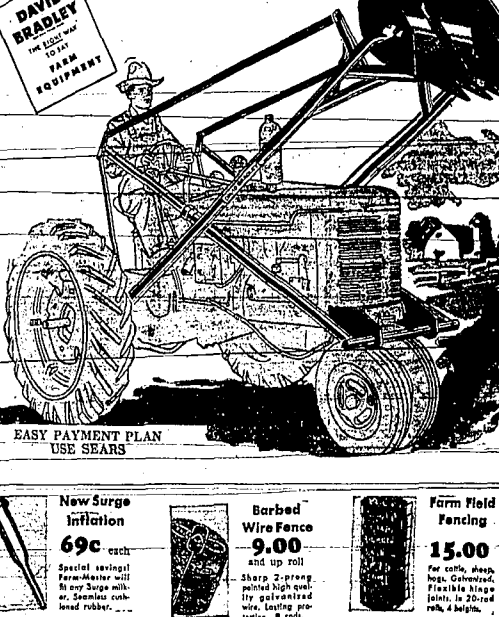
