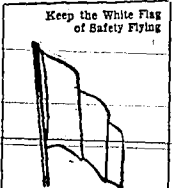

Radiation Is Measured by Small Gadget

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—A cheap, simple "dosimeter" to show quickly whether a man has had too much atomic radiation, was given to reporters by the army today.

It consists of a flat metal box like a tiny electric case. It has a film packet the dentist uses to X-ray your teeth and a night metal chain to hang it around a soldier's neck like his identification "dog tag". The army said it was made and produced for less than \$1.

An army spokesman said all troops will be equipped ultimately with the new device, and that it also may be used in civilian defense.

The film develops itself almost instantaneously when pulled out of the little metal case. If it has been exposed to gamma rays, which the army spokesman described as "very high energetic X-rays," the center strip of the film turns light.

The dosimeter was developed by the Polaroid corporation, at Cambridge, Mass., under the sponsorship of the army signal corps engineering laboratories at Fort Monmouth, N. J.

The film packets will cost about five cents each, the signal corps said, and new ones can be inserted in the cases after each exposure.

The army said steps are being taken to start production of the device for military use but that large quantities will not be available for at least six months.

SYDNEY, Nov. 16 (AP)—Australia has long been a Pacific-Pacific ally, and a Pacific pact that includes the United States will also get both many people here and in the Pacific area beginning to think of a new era of peace.

Feeling in the capital, Canberra, Australia, may use the limited peace treaty talks as a basis for other words, this is what the Pacific countries might agree to. Japan having some armed forces in a Pacific pact or some other guarantee will guard against a possible aggression.

Deep-Rooted Fear
 The Australian people have a deep-rooted fear of the Japanese. It had long before Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor. They have been looking to this big country to settle millions of Japanese to settle millions of Japanese from their over-crowded islands. And Australia is determined to keep them out.

But the Australian people have been long for the Pacific pact. They want to see Japan for its role in the Pacific. They will support Japan's entry into international society, but only on the condition that it is the most of people.

They want to see a power organization of veterans, want to see a completely new organization. However, does want an armistice treaty.

Not in Accord
 The British and Australian ministers for external affairs, Percy Spender, went on record as opposing Japan's entry into international society. Spender says Japan "does not quite accord with the wishes of the Australian government."

Spender's statements were directed at the U. S. policy of giving a measure of increasing measure of responsibility to the Japanese government. Spender recently has been some of the most vocal in the world in opposition to the Japanese.

It is as far as can be seen here he is opposing the Australian policy that these should be an orderly working-out of the Japanese problem at a formal peace conference rather than a general relaxation of control.

Expert Urges School Revise In Filer Area

FILER, Nov. 18.—None of the school buildings in Filer school district is adequate and no thought of replacing them should be given, Dr. Ray M. Barry of the University of Idaho maintains in his report on a survey of the facilities in the district.

Barry, for the current enrollment, Dr. Barry said, extra facilities should be added immediately. Whether this should be done on a centralized basis or not, he added, is up to the taxpayers.

Dr. Barry recommended that the Filer school, with only 14 pupils, be abandoned and that the people should consider abandoning Poplar Hill school as well. He said that the Washington school building is inadequate, its rooms too small and it should be abandoned although it has an enrollment of 60 pupils.

To do these things, he continued, the district should have a new elementary school and a new junior high school. The latter, he added, should be made as an addition to the high school and should contain six classrooms, a music room, a gymnasium and a cafeteria.

All of the elementary buildings in the district except that of Hillier and Victory should be replaced, he continues, and five acres of vacant south of the school should be purchased for a new Filer elementary school. Central school should be abandoned and site sold as soon as the new elementary school is completed.

If the Marco school is to be abandoned, the district should purchase the site and erect a new structure on the site.

The principal also recommended that the office of the school superintendent and high school principal be located on the same site and the superintendent be rented down in Filer until such time as more suitable space is available.

The university educator made his report at a public meeting in Filer Tuesday evening. Very few persons attended.

Bureau Plans Will Benefit Water Users

DENVER, Nov. 16 (AP)—The bureau of reclamation will concentrate on facilities for getting water and power to water users instead of building big dams during next year's construction program.

This was indicated yesterday by Chief Engineer L. N. McClellan in his annual address construction bulletin, a forecast of construction and invitations scheduled for the period ending next June 30.

The larger expenditures are for canals and electric transmission lines, a sign, McClellan said, that irrigation water and power from reclamation reservoirs soon will be reaching more farms, homes and industries.

The bulletin lists 305 miles of canal, 1,344 miles of transmission lines and 401 miles of lateral and pipe distribution systems. Bids will be asked on 41 canal and distribution systems and 28 transmission lines.

Most dams small to be started are small ones, designed for river regulation or flood control.

Congress has authorized the Fallas dam, American Falls power plant and West Side pumping unit, all in Idaho, but has made no appropriations for them. If supplemental appropriations are passed soon after Jan. 1, McClellan said, bids will be asked for them.

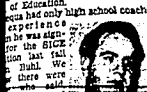

Coming to heavy heights of 25,000 feet, with her feet still planted on the ground is a daily occurrence for the 31-year-old corporal, the first woman to complete the altitude chamber technician's school. She did it mostly because they told her she couldn't, she said.

New Crew Member

Now a crew member at the altitude chamber at Mitchell air force base, where she took her training, she can't understand why the air force made such a fuss over letting her take the course.

"You'd have to be an awfully good pilot after that. I don't see why it makes any difference whether you're a man or a woman," she said. But pilots must have training in the altitude chamber, a recreation room which can simulate conditions at altitudes as high as 30,000 feet.

Now that she's a technician, Celia McLaran takes her turn with the male crew members in various sections of the chamber, sometimes staying inside the chamber with the men who are testing altitude reactions, sometimes staying in the pump outside the chamber, and sometimes acting as a nurse, to note the reactions of crew members.

Huge Grand Coulee Canyon to Start Filling With Water Soon

Huge Grand Coulee Canyon to Start Filling With Water Soon

COULEE DAM, Wash., Nov. 16 (AP)—In a few months, for the first time in 50,000 years, the huge Grand Coulee canyon, a dried-up course of the Columbia river, will start filling with water.

The canyon will hold a lake 27 miles long, two to five miles wide, and up to ninety feet deep—the largest artificial lake in the world. The dam, now being built by the Big Bend country of Washington, 85 miles by 65, with a goal of 14,000 families where now there are almost none, crumbled lava rocks and sand.

This project is an example of the curious and unpredictable events coming out of science. The idea started more than half a century ago. It was then visionary as diverting part of the Columbia river into the Grand Coulee, a 1,000-foot high-walled canyon the Columbia cut when glaciers dammed it in the last ice age. The river now flows hundreds of feet lower past this canyon mouth floor.

Science figured a way to do the irrigation, not by diversion higher upriver, but by building the present dam, which by-product electric power will pump Columbia water up some 600 feet above the old river bed and into the canyon.

The dam, before any irrigation has started, has changed the industrial economy of the entire northwestern United States. As the world's largest electric power plant, and part of a five-state electric network pool, the dam has brought in basic industries—aluminum, magnesium and caustic soda. It brought atomic energy in the form of plutonium made by the huge Hanford engine works lying near the southern border of the irrigation district. It spread electric lines and shipbuilding.

The dam's top is a two-lane highway, nearly a mile long, with a new lighting scheme. All light comes from electric lamps concealed inside the dam.

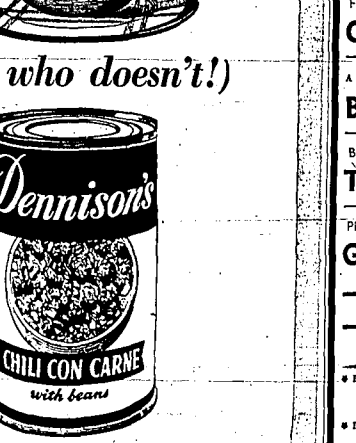

Doctor Says Nation Short Of Physicists

Doctor Says Nation Short Of Physicists

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 16 (AP)—One of the country's foremost atomic experts has declared that the nation has fewer than 350 nuclear physicists and even fewer capable of designing machines for putting atomic energy to work.

For that reason, Dr. Lawrence R. Hafstad said, the atomic energy commission is viewing cautiously proposals to hand private industry the job of developing reactors to turn atomic energy into electrical power for civilian use.

World Cause Disruption

"Nothing would cause more disruption in this program," Hafstad told the American Petroleum Institute, "than an irresponsible uncontrolled proselytizing of key persons."

Hafstad is director of the atomic energy commission's division of reactor and development. He defined an atomic reactor as "a slowed down and controlled atom bomb explosion" in a machine designed to convert atomic energy "into useful forms."

Being Built

The commission is building four special reactors, including two for submarine propulsion, and "several

of them . . . are well along the road toward completion." But none of them is designed primarily for civilian power purposes. Hafstad traced a long list of technical, economic and security factors which make "the civilian power problem a tougher one than the atom bomb problem" was in the beginning.

Basin Project Adds to Data On Irrigating

PROCESSED, Wash. Nov. 13 (AP)—The Columbia river irrigation project, the northwest's largest, is bringing in agricultural discoverers even before irrigation starts.

The basin, in central Washington, 60 miles by 40, will be watered from a great artificial lake, the Grand Coulee, to start filling in a few months with water pumped from the Columbia by the Coulee power dam.

Meanwhile, for the first time, a great irrigation project, and incidentally making discoveries for agriculture everywhere.

This land has been dry for about 600,000 years. For four years agricultural scientists have been experimenting with its six different types of soil.

The scientists use radioactive atoms, chemistry and trypsin of hundreds of varieties in the possible crops. Headed by the project station of the U. S. department of agriculture, agricultural experiment stations of Washington State colleges and the U. S. reclamation service, the latter water projects.

Reactor Story
The story is told by Harold P. Singleton, superintendent of the experiment station here.

Radioactive phosphorus is shorter-lived than the others used by plants. And, following this same radioactivity trail, how phosphorus after it gets into plants, passes along into livestock. And finally what the phosphorus does for the health of animals. Ultimately this trail will go to human beings who get their phosphorus from eating the animals and plants.

Radioactive Zinc
Radioactive zinc is used on some agricultural mysteries. A little zinc is necessary for good apple trees. Sometimes trees are in trouble because they get no zinc from the soil, yet they will take zinc from the same soil after alfalfa has been grown there. The basic scientists are studying zinc's relation to wheat crops.

Nitrogen fertilizer usually has to be plowed deep below the surface. But in the basin soil it can be scattered on top, and a harrow does the rest. With this kind of fertilizing, scientists jumped the production of alfalfa by 50 per cent and raised the amount of phosphorus in alfalfa by 70 per cent.

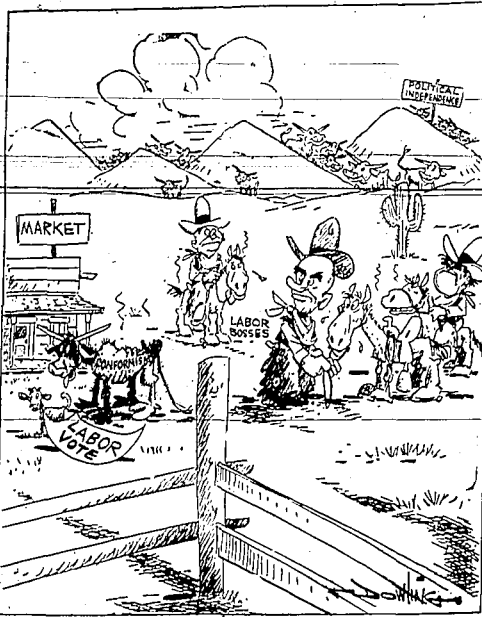

"Big Brother" China Changes Ways Since Reds Took Over

By HAL BOYK
WITH U. S. EIGHTH ARMY Korea and "Big Brother" China crossed over to help out "little brother" North Korea only after both became communist comrades—and "little brother" was losing his touch.

Before both became communists, the Chinese usually stayed at home, no matter who was backing Hiss's brother's eye.

This time China crossed the border and natural enemy such as Japan. It went against the will and hope of the United Nations, a new world organization which neither has accepted Red China nor invaded it.

A link in the chain of belief by American intelligence officers that communist nations are getting closer together in their network of military operations in the world.

U. S. forces killed only one enemy general officer in the campaign—at least, the only one the enemy has admitted. He was a lieutenant-general Kang, reported variously to have been a Soviet citizen, a captain in the Soviet army and a high officer in the Chinese communist army.

No general of the North Korean army surrendered or was captured. Only one senior colonel and two lieutenant colonels surrendered. None was captured. There finally were several mass surrenders of troops among the 15,000 taken prisoner. None gave up as units under command of their own officers.

The big guns either fled the U.N. advance under orders or later crossed U. S. eighth army lines, some in civilian clothing. A few are still trying to do that.

In the last week, two high officers of Germany and Japan either committed suicide, or surrendered in combat, or surrendered with their units. They fought as armies and gave up as armies.

It was Germany's Adolf Hitler killed himself. Red Korea's Kim Il Sung fled. What is the difference?

U. S. intelligence officers believe the difference is that the German and Japanese leaders had to kill themselves on principle or give up through failure because there was no "big brother" to offer refuge or help.

"They were basically nationalist," is the way one American officer put it.

"But the North Koreans have been jealously trained in Soviet Russia or China. They were taught by the international communists. They had a war in their own country, their goal was to pull back to the present communist country and work to begin it again. They put communism above country."

And, as the defeated North Koreans withdrew to reorganize, the Chinese communists crossed the border to delay the issue. The world thus faces the first big challenge of communism fighting in octopus defense.

This, say U. S. intelligence officers, essentially is based on one red country backing another red country—with the line of instructions coming from Moscow.

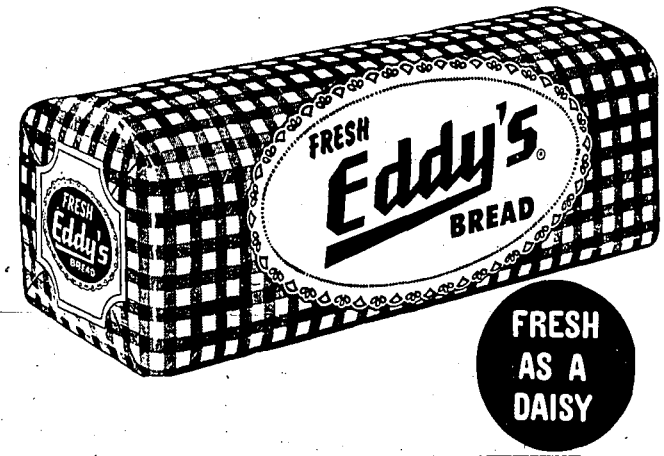

Senator Hints U. S. Debating A-Bomb's Use

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The United States never thought of its atomic bomb against the North Korean raid, but against the Chinese committee.

As Sen. Richard B. Russell, D. Ga., said this week, "If this is serious, we might have to use it."

An official close to atomic-military development said today that the committee's function was to advise against the United States, but would reasonably be expected to retaliate with our No. 1 weapon.

"We are not inviting attack, we never have invited attack," he said. "But if we are attacked with nuclear, it seems reasonable to suppose we will fight back with our biggest club."

Russell was talking of the possibility of A-bombing cities—"if things get serious enough." But there is one important segment of the army that is expected to be used in a potential A-bombing.

Heading this school is Gen. J. Lawton Collins, army chief of staff. He discussed last summer the possibility of developing an artillery shell with an atomic warhead.

The work, plus other technical uses of existing atomic weapons, is being speeded.

A-bombing in the past has been touted as primarily a strategic weapon against vital production or transportation centers. But some military thinkers on the subject can imagine plenty of circumstances in which it might be a tactical weapon.

With its large radius of almost total destruction—1½ mile for the obsolete models of World War II—the A-bomb, they say, could smash a dangerous bridgehead, stop a concentrated offensive, or wreck an intricate attack as it covered on a beach.

Proponents of the A-bomb as a first weapon stress that it would be more effective than massed artillery and, in the mathematics of war, was not too costly.

ATLANTA, Nov. 13 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson said today that the Chinese Reds' fight decision was directed from Moscow. Associated Press Tokyo Bureau Chief Russell Brines reported.

Having once started, Russia certainly will continue a program of "conquest and extortion to tear us down," said Brines.

"The veteran anti-communist propagandist addressed about 200 newspaper managing editors at the national convention of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association.

Professed War Brines said we already have seen the starting of a prolonged war in Asia. Even solution of the Korean problem would bring no peace, he said.

"Nobody in Russia considers China's intervention in Korea a serious decision. The Chinese have the same attitude as we have in Korea, to protect Korea," Brines continued.

Answer Korea "There might be an agreement with the Chinese or we might have to fight it out with them. The answer will not be clear for several weeks and possibly not until next spring."

"The communists hope to tie us down with a winter stalemate. The American people realize the war is not over—it has just begun. Russia hasn't lost a man yet. We can continue killing 100 communists for every American for many years, and still Russia would be winning."

Taft Will Ask Some Change For T-H Law

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft wants to amend the Taft-Hartley act before the 1951 presidential election.

He will take the initiative to change the act by the end of the congressional session. But Taft will not force the issue if it is likely to harm the party.

The bill would amend the act for reelection to the senate. It would amend the act in sections which he tried to change last year. Now he wants to get the job done.

Will Discuss Problem

He first will discuss the problem with Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore. Morse usually votes with administration Democrats. If Taft and Morse can find any common ground at all, the discussions will be extended to others.

Taft will want to know before he commits himself whether House Republican leaders and Senate Democrats in both the house and senate will go along. The Ohio senator is not sure he can find a road a mile wide.

He wants to know what is the calm consideration of some changes in the act which would be many others believe are desirable.

Doesn't Want Sit

It may not be possible to find common ground with Morse, the other Republicans and many Democrats stand. Mr. Taft will abandon the effort rather than vote a ligh within the GOP.

Taft calls the Taft-Hartley act "the bill of rights for labor" and the desirability of amendments. He would keep the basic principle of closed shop and against secondary boycotts.

Some Changes

His amendments would be along the line of the 21 changes Taft proposed last year when Congress rejected President Truman's demand for repeal.

The 21 included: dropping the requirement for an NLRB vote before granting a union shop; authorizing courts to permit government to sue as well as to sue unions in national strike emergency; making employers as well as unions take the non-communist oath; eliminating priority before the NLRB of complaints against jurisdiction strikes and secondary boycotts; retaining the closed shop but permit contracts to allow unions of vacancies and to allow unions reasonable time to fill them.
