NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Russia's Andrei A. Vishinsky declared today there can be no lasting world peace until the United Nations admits the Chinese communists and adopts a long list of other Russian proposals. Sen. John Sparkman, D., Ala., United States delegate, accused Vishinsky of trying to bog down the "bargaining of peace." He said Vishinsky had now made it clear that Russia would accept no program for world peace which did not comply entirely with Soviet demands. He said for the U.N. to bow to such demands would mean "a horrible act of capitulation without Soviet permission."

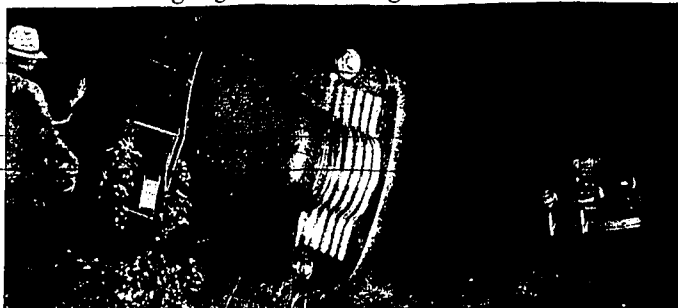

the effort to eradicate it, we use pagan methods which eventually lead us into a dead-end street of despair. . . . methods which make us morally like the thing we hate.

A man cannot overcome evil with evil; he cannot drive out Satan with Satan and be Christian. He cannot behave like his enemies, and help God to redeem them. Out on the prairie of Blackfootland I have helped to stop more than one destructive fire. The best weapon we had was the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Small barriers. When that was done successfully the main body of the fire was not able to leap over into new territory and the problem was solved. Now that is all right for fighting a prairie fire; but in the matter of public morality it will not work. In this field of human concern a man cannot successfully fight fire with fire because he will not only be spreading the fire, but he will also be spreading the fire that he has. To use the fire of evil does not stop evil; indeed, it always spreads evil. The earth gets more evil and not less of it because we stoop to evil methods.

Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world. . . . Now supposing we were illumined by the blackness of being we do exist. Is it not as simple as 2 plus 2 are 4 that we are no darkness in God-in him all there are the light of God unless it be that we let Him shine through us."

Christian strategy will not permit us to outbid the sinner or outdo the evil-doer. It does not counsel, "Be clever, be smart, do this in a corner, either go hang." It never says to men or nations, "Let us do this, let us do that." It commands, "Be ye faithful to the very end." I do not find anywhere in the message of the Master that a noble end justified ignoble means of reaching it. We are counseled to conduct our Christian campaign in a Christian way. When time be long before we find ourselves upon the very brink of global catastrophe, or upon the well-guarded side of racial strife, let's not be guilty of the sins we so vitally point out, and so genuinely dislike in others; but rather let us learn and let us use the strategy of the Savior, who that hath an ear to hear let him hear from the gospel of God; and he that hath an eye to see, let him see it for himself from the pages of the New Testament.

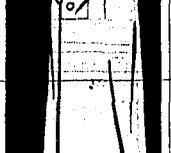

Pacific Northwest Faces Shortage of Power in Increased Need for Aluminum

By DAVEN J. FLAKOLL
WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (Special)—The Pacific Northwest, just recovering from years of electricity shortage, soon may find itself caught in another period of "brown out" and kilowatt shortage with no relief in sight.



It is such a crisis as does facing the nation will be the result of increased aluminum production.

Early this week national production officials announced a 25 per cent cut-back in use of aluminum for civilian consumer goods effective Jan. 1. It appears likely that future reductions in defense production needs will be an upward rather than downward direction, putting a further squeeze on aluminum and other strategic metals.

No formal decisions in regard to increased aluminum production have come out of the national security resources board, but it is a matter of public record that NEGRI, Boss W. Stuart Symington recently held several important conferences with leading aluminum producers.

Bonneville power administration officials this week admitted they have been studying the northwest power supply with relation to possible increases in aluminum production.

"Any expansion of the aluminum industry on the basis of firm power loads is more or less out of the question at the present time," one spokesman said. In other words there are no extra kilowatts in sight anywhere in the Bonneville area.

At present the Kaiser aluminum plant near Spokane, Wash., has a contract agreement for about 600,000 kilowatts annually from the Bonneville system—or nearly 40 per cent of the total firm output. It

also has the use of more electricity on an interruptible basis.

Two recent surveys in the wind may be significant indicators of what lies in store for northwest electricity users during the coming year.

First, Bonneville power recently concluded arrangements to put through an additional power line to serve the Kaiser aluminum plant.

Second, Bonneville power contracts with five private utility companies for sale of excess power through the coming year are drastically different from previous contracts.

Last year, for example, BPA committed itself to provide 211,000 kilowatts of firm power all through the year to these companies. This year, when contract negotiations came up for renewal, government experts refused to renew the firm commitments and the private companies finally settled for varying amounts of power, all of it on an interruptible basis.

In other words, if orders come down from top defense levels, BPA figuratively can divert almost every kilowatt of civilian use power to high priority defense needs. In practice, however, that is unlikely to occur. Current requirements will be deemed absolutely essential, and furthermore, water conditions are better than average so far this season which means a higher output of firm power can be squeezed out of the Columbia river system.

If aluminum production is increased greatly through private utilities throughout the area may have to fall back on high-cost steam generated electricity and make corresponding adjustments in their rates.

Hungry Horse dam in Montana will take some pressure off the power shortage when it commences operation in 1937. The dam itself, were it retrofitted into the Bonneville system, would provide only 101,000 kilowatts of firm power. Actually because of its vast storage capacity,

Hungry Horse will firm up another 400,000 kilowatts downstream.

Of Montana's 19,000 kilowatts an undetermined amount will go to a new aluminum plant now being erected in Kalspell by the Harvey Machine company. Commencement of production there may go a long way to close the gap in both aluminum and electricity provided, national defense needs do not take another upward flight in the meantime.
