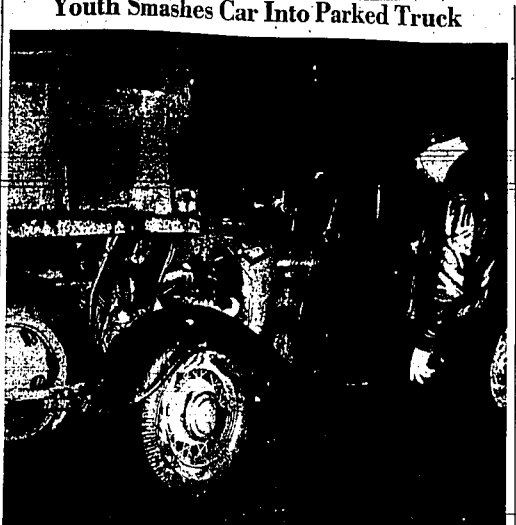

7-Point Farm Support Plan Given Grange

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 21 (AP)—A seven-point program to keep government aid and controls at a minimum and insure fair prices for farmers will be adopted by the National Grange's 41st convention this week.

The program, submitted by committee chairman Dorsey Kirk, Illinois Grange master, was released by Agriculture Commissioner Charles E. Dwyer.

The committee admitted that the international situation may require government control, allocation and rationing. It also insisted there is no single measure to solve farm problems.

Utah Grazing Stir Ended in 'Compromise'

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 21 (AP)—The Navaho Indians apparently will herd their sheep back across the San Juan river to their reservation, if a possible conflict with white livestockmen is averted.

This compromise settlement was reached during a stormy meeting of shepherds, livestockmen and Navaho Indians which began Sunday and ended Tuesday.

The Indians spoke of "ancestral rights" when they herded flocks across the river. But they then agreed on lands held by stockmen under federal or state leases.

Attorney Knox Patterson, representing the livestockmen, agreed to give the Indians a right of way to take their sheep from the state and federal lands. The move would probably take a week, Patterson estimated. This apparently satisfied the aroused stockmen from the Blending-Monticello area.

Chairman P. H. Maltby of the land board suggested the compromise after hearing that the conflict might flare into violence.

But there is another side of it too. Instead of making her feel 10 years younger, she can make her feel 10 years older.

She rides in a jeep splashing at five miles an hour through a mud street and sees a line of both sides by infantrymen. She can tell they are weary by the way their backs are bent.

As they plod along through the mud, some are bent more than others, depending on the burden they carry. It may be a new 35-inch book, a box of ammunition, a machine gun or a mortar base plate.

She feels amazed riding in the jeep while they slog along on foot. She hunches her shoulders and pulls down her helmet. She looks at the soldiers out of the corner of her eyes, not daring to look them square in the face.

Her jeep gallops ahead as it leaves the infantry behind and she sits up again. The jeep takes her to a town which has just been knocked out by artillery and air strikes.

She was cold. But now she is warmed by the heat from the burning houses and smoldering rubble. She is comforted by the thought no enemy is alive here—unless she could live in hell.

With this thought in mind, she decides to look her war-weary boys when she passes the infantry again on the return trip. She redoes her lips, rubs her helmet and lets her hair blow in the breeze.

This time the infantrymen see her all right. And she knows it. All first they don't believe it. Then smiles break the crust of dirt around the corners of their mouths.





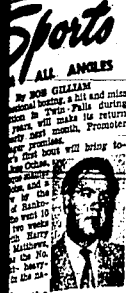

Turnover for College Coaches Starts Early

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—Ancient, religious scrolls discovered in the holy land give "proof" for the first time that Christ's coming actually was foretold before he came, a High Syrian religious authority reports.

They also reveal where John the Baptist may have got the ideas he propounded to the followers of Jesus, and the probable source of many biblical phrases common to the New Testament.

It is hoped that "soon" the latest interpretations of the ancient scrolls can be published, along with "the truth and the life," he said.

Similarly, the "Habakuk commentary" scroll reveals the prophet's in the book of Habakuk as applying to "specific historic events" instead of "vague mysticism," the archbishop said.

The archbishop, who brought several of the scrolls to the United States, said as the result of study of the Isaiah scroll it is regarded as indisputable fact that Christ's coming was foretold long before the event took place.

The scroll, which contains the entire book of Isaiah and verses surrounding it, was discovered by the British consul in Bagdad, Iraq. It was found in a hole in the wall of a building in Baghdad.

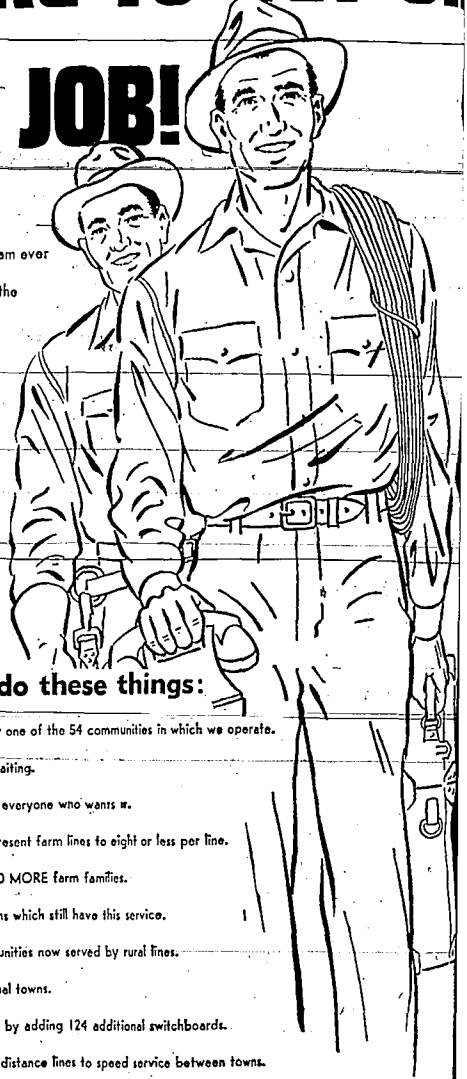
