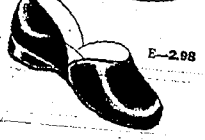

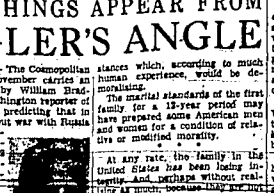

## Young Man, 32, Builds Livestock Truck Line Into \$350,000 Firm in 14 Years

When Bobco Wagner was graduated from Twin Falls high school in the spring of 1920, he didn't have enough money to go on to college. Instead, he started to haul livestock in a one and one-half ton truck. The concern prospered forward even during the war years, which he spent here. He says his main difficulty is finding men who can drive the huge trucks and who also can handle livestock. There are many men who can drive a truck, he explains, but few have any idea of how to load livestock and keep the animals in good condition through a long trip. Most of his employees have been with him for years. World War II took its toll among his men—three of them were killed in action. But Wagner is more concerned about the hazards they face on the highways. Some of his truck and trailer units cost as much as \$20,000, a small car can wreck 'em," he says. Gold stars glitter on a chart on his office, one dot atop for each month of non-accident driving by each man. But Wagner frowns as he looks at five other stars on the partially completed chart for this year. Three blue stars indicate accidents which are not chargeable to his drivers. His frown deepens when he looks at two red stars represent-

Wagner's trucks. Whenever the trucks roll, they are watched by safety engineers who are rated to check the vehicle's speed. The bridge is posted for 20 miles per hour for trucks and 25 miles per hour for autos unless there is a law enforcement officer in sight. The report also notes in this particular unit a top speed was 60 miles per hour and visibility was good. The report covers the condition of the driver, vehicle, width of road, road conditions and weather. Reports like this occur much of Wagner's time. As he moves restlessly from one detail to another, he gives the impression his business is his life. He is unmarried and came here from Indiana 17 years ago with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Wagner.

### Wagner Heartily in Favor of Valley's Traffic Safety Drive

With one-third of \$100,000 set aside on the highways of seven western states, Bobco Wagner has a vital interest in traffic safety. He is heartily in accord with the traffic safety program launched at the Magic Valley traffic safety conference in Twin Falls. He takes a grim view of traffic law violations either on the part of the driver or the vehicle. He is particularly concerned about livestock hauling trucks and trailers or on the part of other drivers. He also feels more highway patrolmen are needed in Idaho. He is strong in his opinion Idaho needs a stringent law requiring more than payment of a driver's license. He feels physical ability and driving ability should be required. As a case in point, Wagner said he knew of a recent arrival from California who can't drive a car but nonetheless now has an Idaho driver's license. In contrast he cited an Idaho trucking operator who neglected to meet the requirements for a driver's license in Utah. Wagner vows the need for more patrolmen and the need for a stringent law on driver's licenses as only part of the overall problem of traffic safety. "The damage is just as bad whether it's caused by dangerous equipment or dangerous driving," he comments. He feels the safety factor of equipment in Idaho is bad, and centers motorists who fail to keep their vehicles in safe driving condition. "What chance do you have if the axle is 'if yours driving at night, the car ahead of you doesn't have any tail lights and you're blinded by another car coming at you?' Wagner's formula for safer highways includes a better driver's training, more patrolmen and more inspections of equipment for safety. Echoing his view is his bookkeeper, Elmer Wilson, who has been employed by Wagner since 1920. "You know and I know dozens of drivers who are deaf, but have other defects, can't see well, are color blind—people who haven't any business in a car without restrictions. But they have licenses. That's what our drivers face on the highways."

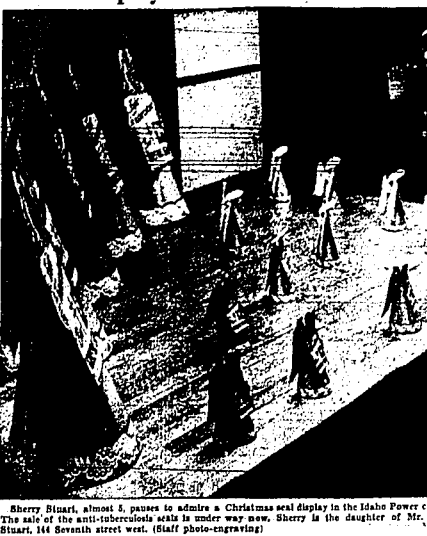

"I feel that seal purchases mean annihilation against one of 'Twin Falls county's persistent enemies because it means support of the help year-around campaign conducted by the Anti-Tuberculosis association," he concluded.

The new library books would not last long without replacement, the Eden American Legion auxiliary Tuesday opened the new library.

The previous public library in Eden was run by the City club. A woman's organization no longer had the assistance in Eden. The old library was located in what is now the sports shop. The new library occupies one room in the city hall.

While the city made the room available to the auxiliary, members of the chapter had to set the room ready for occupancy. Drapes were hung on the windows and trunks were washed to chase dirt and apply kalamazoo. When the room was ready, it was well suited and the volume moved in.

A grand opening was held Tuesday night. Mrs. Anita Mathers, president of the auxiliary, in charge. Deana West and Jean Watson, high school students, were librarians.

The new library will be open from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. every Tuesday and Thursday nights. The library is for high school students who will receive school credit for time spent reading books to the public. The 300 volumes on hand include fiction, non-fiction, children's books, magazines and newspapers as well as magazines and periodicals.

The harvest vacations in the various schools were different lengths and ranged from four days to two weeks. Mr. Eakin said that in Cassia county with all but Overland school reporting, the pupils earned \$18,200.64. In the same county, both high and grammar, pupils earned approximately \$15,000 in two weeks of work. DECEMBER second with approximately \$10,000 earned. Pupils at the Southwestern school earned \$4,680.41 and SALT LAKE grammar school pupils earned \$1,848.00. High school students earned \$3,727.

In BURLEY, \$4,700.20 was earned by 290 pupils. One room, with 21 workers, earned \$1,230.

Leland Baker, 12, BURLEY, earned \$105 in two weeks and Lynn Church and Charles Aikins, both Burley, earned \$10 each in the same period. Many pupils reported earnings between \$50 and \$80.

GOODING county school children earned \$23,323.04 during the potato harvest vacation. Of this amount, high school students reported \$15,049.40 and of the 231 students registered in the schools, 239 actually worked in the fields. The average earning per pupil was \$24.60.

Junior high school pupils in GOODING received \$6,014.49 for their work and grammar school children received \$4,202.04.

Lincoln county with its relatively high population compared with some of the other counties in the valley, reported earnings by school children amounting to \$21,574.58.

Employment in manufacturing industries rose 11.1 per cent in 1950, according to statistics of the Bureau of Economic Analysis. There were 17,700 persons added to the manufacturing payroll compared with 120,000 in 1949.

Manufacturing industries received an unprecedented amount of government orders and contracts which helped to stimulate production and employment.

Increases in employment were noted for:

- Chemical and allied products, 14.1 per cent.
- Food and kindred products, 11.1 per cent.
- Textile mill and apparel, 10.2 per cent.
- Transportation, 10.1 per cent.
- Other manufacturing, 10.1 per cent.
- Non-manufacturing industries, 10.1 per cent.

Decreases in employment were noted for:

- Stone, brick and tile, 1.1 per cent.
- Other non-manufacturing, 1.1 per cent.
- Other manufacturing, 1.1 per cent.

The total manufacturing employment in 1950 was 17,700 persons, compared with 16,500 in 1949.

### Postmaster Asks Address Accuracy and Early Mailing for Cards and Packages

Postmaster W. W. Frantz issued his annual appeal yesterday for correct addresses and early mailing of Christmas greeting cards.

The postmaster predicted that this year's flood of Christmas mail will break 1949's high, when a record 300,000 pieces of holiday mail were carried locally.

"Handling this huge volume of Christmas mail will tax postoffice facilities to the limit," he stated. "But we will get everything delivered by Christmas if we receive the full cooperation of the public."

Christmas packages for distant points should be mailed by Dec. 2, the postmaster advised. Christmas gifts for nearby points should be at the parcel post windows by Dec. 10.

Christmas cards destined outside Idaho should be deposited by Dec. 15, and cards for "nearby" points at least a week before the holiday. "Please don't hold up your mailings until these dates, however,"

Frantz pleaded. "Mail packages, especially, as soon as you have them ready."

He urged the peak Yuletide rush, the postoffice already has begun training extra mail clerks and carriers, setting up new sorting tables, providing reserve mail sacks, and overhauling delivery trucks. Even the postoffice pens are getting new points.

"Please stop in next week and purchase the stamps you'll need for your Christmas cards and letters," the postmaster asked. He urged purchase of three-cent stamps for Christmas greetings first-class. Cards may then be mailed, contain written messages, and can be forwarded or returned without additional charge.

Frantz also suggested, "Get a few airmail and special delivery stamps. Please also remember that Christmas cards are a part of your Christmas shopping that can be completed really early. It will save you valuable time in December, when the postoffice lines are long."

Frantz called attention to the non-operated machine in the postoffice lobby for the convenience of patrons in buying stamps when the regular stamp windows are closed. The lobby is open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. every day. Stamp windows are closed Sundays, Saturday afternoons and are open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

One-cent, two-cent and three-cent stamps are available at the machine. The postmaster reminded those patrons who do not wish to send Christmas cards by first-class mail that they must use two-cent stamps to send them by third-class mail airmail and one-half cent stamp-and-taglets.

"And there's not a stamp of that denomination in the building. The postmaster also advised early purchase of heavy-filtered, extra wrapping paper, string cord and printed fourth class labels for parcel post. He pointed out that fragile items must be cushioned individually in strong shipping cartons such as fiberboard boxes. Packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight and must not exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined."

Christmas seals and "Do Not Open Until Christmas" stickers should be placed on the backs of packages. "Some packages carry more stickers and labels than an average steamer trunk," the postmaster declared. "Keep the face of your packages clear for the address and mailing instruction if you want speedy delivery."
