Northwest Is Quiet As Chinese Launch Drive in Northeast

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—Eighty thousand Chinese reds on a new offensive were reported by United Nations forces in northeast Korea today. A curious lull fell on the battlefronts in the northwest.

Edward M. Almond told war reporters 6 to 10 Chinese divisions "suddenly" were in the north. Capt. Gen. William H. Walker's eighth army in the northwest was similarly told with 200,000 red Chinese at the outset of the communist offensive last week-end.

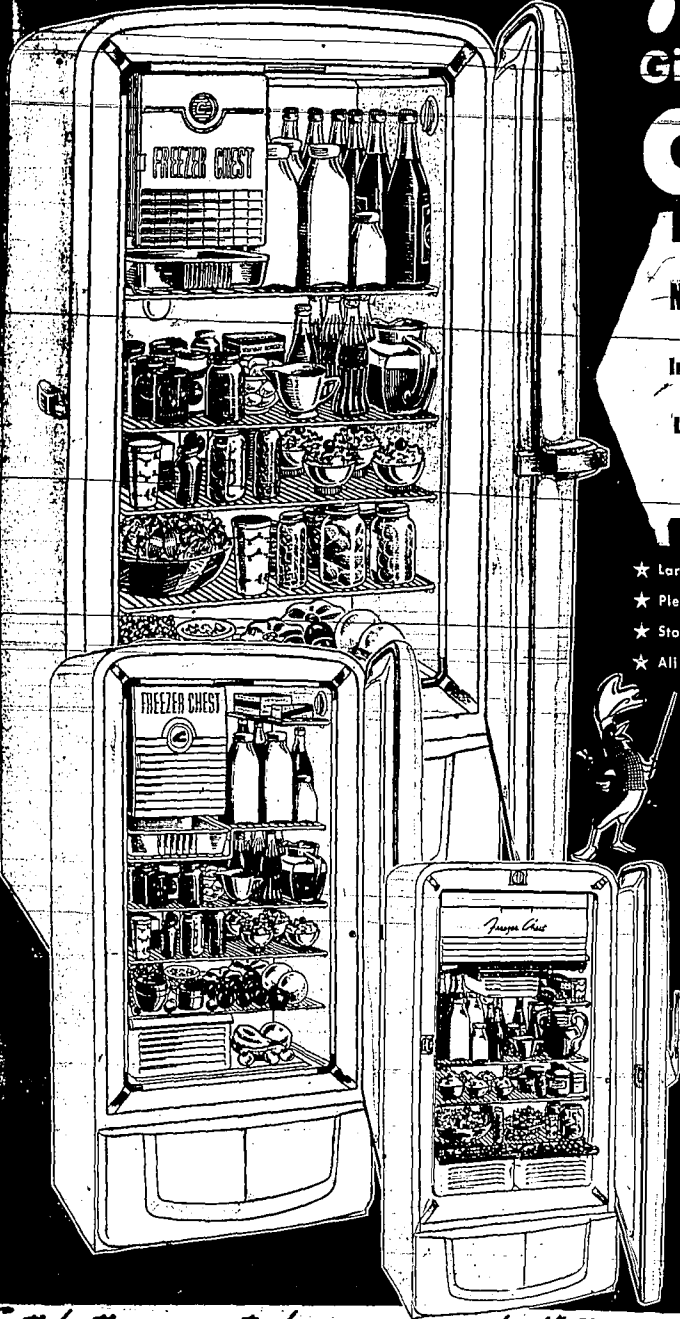

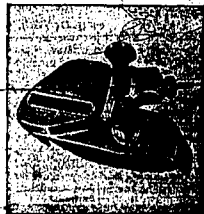

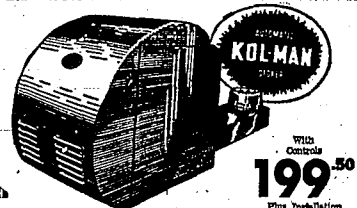

WASHINGTON—President Truman's request for congressional approval of direct financial aid to Russia and other communist states is a novel and more aggressive offensive in our war with Russia, which can no longer be described as a mere "war of attrition."

On the advice of realistic statesmen and experts on recent Russian operations in Korea, Indo-China, Thailand and the Philippines, the president is urged to tread the "red" carpet rather than "red" communism.

Members of the American government will emphasize that the distinction is not based on "ideological" differences between Russia and the United States, but on the fact that Russia is a Soviet grab for material power, territory, trade supremacy and world dominance along old-fashioned imperialistic lines dating back to Peter the Great and successor czarist dynasties.

BRANDING. This analysis of the future conflict is designed to remove it from the realm of vague and abstract theories of Karl Marx and Alexander Hamilton, Josef Stalin and Harry S. Truman, which are complex and obscure.

In the new diplomatic picture Stalin will be likened to such brutal dictators as Napoleon and Hitler. Nobody can misunderstand a branding of the Moscow Dictator as anything but a brutal approval of the most elementary freedoms.

ADVANTAGES. Such a clarification of the struggle is believed to give all Americans the right to know and to act. In the case of the United States, we have been losing prestige among friendly nations, and are being griped on strategic matters along Russian borders, notably Iran and Turkey.

It may mean a "re-orientation" of the American position in the Balkans, the Mediterranean and the Middle East. It may mean a change in our attitude toward Russia, which has shown a determination to make sacrifices for rearmament against possible Russian aggression.

ALLIES. Many elements in these areas, as recent parliamentary and political demonstrations show, have considerable sympathy with the professed ideas and aims of international communism, as expounded at Moscow and Lake Success.

But they are also virile nationalists, who would not stand idly by while their own countries are being gripped on strategic matters along Russian borders, notably Iran, Turkey and Asia.

ITTO. Both the White House and the State Department are in a hurry to get the word out to the public for a straight-out grant to ITTO to relieve family hunger and to strengthen his following five-year program of economic and social reconstruction.

FACTORY. It is to be commended that Moscow only recently refused to break with Moscow only because it refused to swallow political and economic orders that would have made him a permanent slave.

PROBATION. We have kept him on probation since 1948, when he broke with Stalin. At first we thought it was a mere probationary measure. But now we know it is obvious the two have become enemies, and now we know he will side with us against Russian attack in the Balkans, the Mediterranean and the Middle East.

Although it is not generally known, we have loaned him \$121,000,000 in an indirect way in the last 18 months. This money has been used to buy raw materials, and we would look him over more cautiously.

U. S. Is Using Food to Prop Tito's Regime

The United States is using food to prop up the best army in western Europe against Russia.

President Truman has allocated some \$30,000,000 for aid to Yugoslavia and other Balkan states. Tito's regime will need at least another \$10,000,000 to live if it stays until the end of the year.

Additional help for Tito will come from Great Britain.

It is a graphic example of the scope of our fight against the encroachment of world communism—the fight in Greece, Yugoslavia, and elsewhere. And it is a recognition of the vast strategic and prestige value attached to Yugoslavia, a country of some 65,000 square miles and 16,000,000 people.

Control Point

Yugoslavia is a control point on the historic invasion routes to western Europe. In peacetime the Danube is a lifeline extending all the way from the Black sea to Germany's Black port.

During World War II the Germans made heavy use of it for shipment of war supplies. Today it is a source of supply for the Russians in the Balkan states, Austria and Germany.

Control over Yugoslavia is Albania, Greece, Rumania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Austria and Italy.

Location Strategic

Because of its location and depending on whose side it is on, Yugoslavia may become a cannon's mouth—situated at Russia's Balkan satellites or at Italy and all of western Europe.

We want it on our side.

During the coming months there will be a great deal of argument about Yugoslavia. The center of the premise that we are in a sometimes hot, sometimes cold war against communism. Tito, an avowed communist, even though his policies don't agree with the Kremlin.

Opportunistic Policies

Each our own policies and Tito's are frankly opportunistic.

And so long as Tito and his army stand as bulwark against Russia, we are likely to overlook the fact that in his comings and goings, communist guerrillas struck from Yugoslavia's mountains into Greece in an attempt to add that hold-out nation to the Russian sphere.

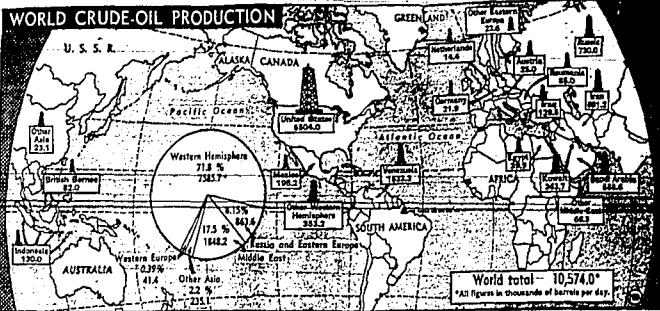

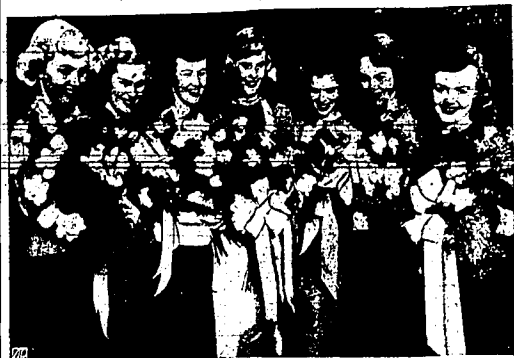

Or if you want variety, you may eat in a Chinese room with Chinese waitresses and old China hands at tables around you and get Virginia-style ham and eggs prepared by a Japanese waitress in American dress.

This international whomp-up is the product of a 28-year-old restaurant-keeper named William E. Harris. Two years ago he was stationed at Kimpoo airport in Korea with the air force, talking airplanes down onto the runway in muggy weather with the aid of a round control approach radar set.

The change to the job as caterer was the result of an idea Harris says he got "way back when." It probably started in 1948 when he probably started in 1948 when he but he claims his present American home town is Long Beach, Calif., where his parents live.

He was stationed from the air force in Tokyo in 1945. A little over a month ago, he opened his place in the heart of Tokyo. For the Chi-

RICHMOND, Wash., Nov. 30 (AP)—Russia's progress in developing the atomic bomb has been more rapid than expected, Rep. Henry M. Jackson, D. Wash., told a news conference here. Therefore America is stepping up its production of A-bombs in an all-out effort to stay on top of the atomic stockpile," he said.

Jackson, here for a special check on atomic metal production and its use in the production of the billion-dollar Hanford works, said the output of plutonium has been increased greatly here. Plutonium is the explosive metal used in atom bombs.

Top Defense Priority
Hanford's air defenses have the highest priority of any such force in the nation, the congressman said. He also stressed that the unit cost of producing A-bomb materials is growing as production climbs.

"All-weather fighter planes are replacing older aircraft to maintain a complete all-weather alert over Hanford," the member of the joint congressional atomic energy committee said.

No Absolute Defense
"Although there is no absolute air defense and Hanford also can use more of the latest type jet planes, the defense force here is getting all such credit available in view of the general international situation."

Jackson also said \$145,000,000 will be spent at Hanford to bring the far flung plants to their presently scheduled production level. He said today's operation and maintenance of \$700 million will be increased to \$1,000 million in 1951, when all fabrication facilities are completed.
