U. N. Forced to Abandon Pyongyang as China Red Tide Sweeping Forward

TOKYO, (Tuesday) Dec. 5 (UP)—United Nations forces abandoned Pyongyang and left it a city of terror Monday before a surging Chinese invasion army expected soon to total more than 1,000,000 men.

In northeastern Korea, smelted troops of the U. S. first marine division and two regiments of the army seventh regrouped for a final, 50-mile smash through the walls of a Chinese trap barring their way to Hamhung on the east coast. A marine spokesman estimated the marines had killed 15,000 of an estimated 60,000 Chinese in the Chosin reservoir area, and was confident the loathebacks would break through the enemy encirclement.

The estimate of a 1,000,000-man Chinese invasion army came in a new estimate from Gen. Douglas MacArthur. A communique said that Chinese already had driven 1,000 troops into the Chosin reservoir area, had burned 100,000 more in rear areas and were bringing up 20,000 more.

BERLIN, Dec. 4 (AP)—West Berlin, anti-red political fortress 100 miles behind the iron curtain, knocked out communists again yesterday with a record 90.4 per cent vote in municipal elections.

Disparaging red threats and a 1949-50 eligible Berlin voters cast their ballots, complete official returns showed.

The dominant socialists lost a third of their previous strength and free democrats. The socialists polled 62,978 votes, the free democrats 37,177.

But leaders of all three parties, headed by Socialist Mayor Ernst Reuter, pledged they would continue their three-faction city coalition as a united front against Russian aggression.

Reuter said he considered a three-party coalition necessary.

Montana Asks Basin Project Income Share

HELENA, Mont., Dec. 4 (AP)—Gov. John W. Bonner has announced he will fight to get Montana her full share of money from government projects along the Columbia river.

The Montana governor said C. H. Raymond, Hamilton, state water board member, will represent him at a meeting of the Columbia basin interagency committee in Portland, Ore., Dec. 11.

He wrote Raymond, commenting on a bill introduced in congress by Sen. Warren Magnuson, D. Wash. "I favor the creation of a Columbia basin account for the purpose of aiding in the future construction of projects for irrigation."

A revision of the Magnuson bill would set aside one per cent of the interest from revenues earned by irrigation and power projects along the Columbia for distribution to the states.

Wildlife Group Asks Higher Hunting, Fishing Licenses

McCALL, Dec. 4 (AP)—The Idaho Wildlife Federation wants increased fishing and hunting license fees.

The federation took this action in the form of resolutions at its annual convention Sunday. The group also elected delegates to the National Wildlife Federation convention at Milwaukee in March.

The 200 delegates also re-elected Harold T. Jones, Boise, as secretary and selected 11 directors from five districts in the state.

An increase to the combination fishing and hunting license from \$5 to \$6 was urged. Also recommended was a \$20 license for children under 12 but now have a hunting license. A \$10 term license is required of any one over 14.

The federation favored a hike in non-resident fishing licenses from \$10 to \$15 and from \$3 to \$5 for short-term non-resident fishing licenses. It also urged that if fees are increased, however, the delegates suggested it be good for seven days in the year.

Speakers at the meeting had earlier proposed the license fee increases and the meeting higher game management costs.

In other resolutions, the federation urged legislation setting limits and increasing the number of licenses, continued prohibition against poaching and pheasants and restoration of special big game areas.

The group also asked that the three-year restriction in special big game areas be lifted so that a hunter successful in one hunt cannot re-apply to participate that year. The federation suggested a longer duck season and small bag limit also be recommended. The open season for trout, fish and wildlife service be petitioned to set a duck season from Oct. 6 through Dec. 1, with the bag limit reduced from the present limit of six ducks a day. A lower limit was also suggested.

Action against stream pollution was taken in the form of stronger control. The federation suggested adoption of a California law which requires a permit for any discharge of pollutants into any stream through pipe or dredge operations to restore stream beds.

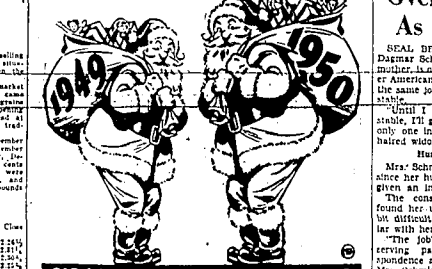

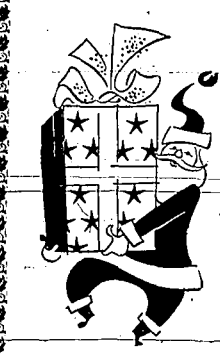

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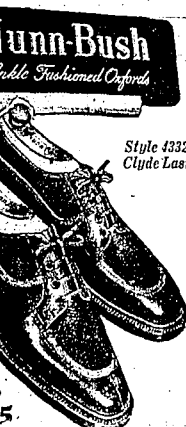
