### County Residents Asked to Give Blood Dec. 15 for Use of Soldiers in Korea

Whole blood for soldiers wounded in Korea will be asked of Twin Falls county residents Friday, Dec. 15, Leonard Jacob, chairman of the Twin Falls county American Red Cross chapter, announced Tuesday.

A mobile blood donor unit will be set up at the Twin Falls American Legion hall on that day. The Red Cross, official blood procurement

agency for the armed forces, received a request on July 23 from former secretary of Defense Louis Johnson to supply whole blood to the wounded in Korea.

Medical and technical personnel will be supplied by the blood unit in Boise and by the local Red Cross chapter. The unit for the Boise unit in Idaho and eastern Oregon is 400 pints. It is expected about 200 pints will be donated in the Twin Falls area.

Ten beds will be set up in the Legion hall and a schedule will be arranged for the facilities to take all donors each 15 minutes.

Residents who wish to give blood may volunteer on cards which will be distributed by the local Red Cross chapter. Those who volunteer will be contacted the day before the mobile unit arrives so they can be scheduled for the donation.

The appeal for blood has been endorsed by James Clifford McCullivry, superintendent of the Twin Falls county hospital, and Dr. J. Woodson Creed, pathologist at the hospital. "The 'Joint' statement said: "Having heard of the appeal made by military authorities through the American Red Cross for whole blood to be used for our troops in Korea, the hospital staff wishes to endorse the urgent need for donors and is anxious to cooperate in every way in

### Russ Believe U. S. War Is Unavoidable

**BOCA RATON, Fla., Dec. 8 (AP)—**An editorial in the Moscow Times of analyzing world conditions and their effects on trade held the National Coffee association Monday that Russia considers war with the United States unavoidable.

"A real peace agreement with the United States is no longer possible. "But a direct attack against the United States, or a move which would lead to open warfare with the United States, is to be avoided for a period of at least two or three years."

"In the meantime 'little wars' will absorb American forces and will weaken America's will to fight in a final conflict. . . . "Earlier dispatches said coffee may cost even more next year than now. W. 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### Annual Basin Snow Survey Opens Jan. 1

Dec. 4 (AP)—The federal snow survey will begin collecting data on the Columbia basin today. It will be the first time during the winter season that the survey is conducted throughout the basin.

The survey is conducted by the U. S. Geological Survey, and is one of the most important in the world. It provides data on the amount of snow that falls in the basin, and on the amount of water that is stored in the snow.

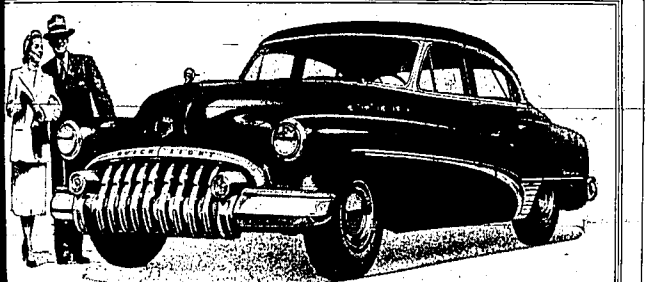

### Bid to Seize 11 Racketeer Chiefs Flops

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Senator Kefauver, D. Tenn., tried unsuccessfully yesterday to get the senate to issue warrants for the arrest of 11 men he described as "principal racketeers of the country."

Kefauver, chairman of the senate crime investigating committee, named the 11 and asked for their arrest—by the police—without warrants or any deputies he might appoint. He said they are in hiding from his committee and let no doubt be hoped by means of his resolution to put the FBI on their trail.

The move, without known precedent in the senate, was blocked at least temporarily when Democratic Leader Lucas, D. Tenn., asked that Kefauver's resolution be referred to the judiciary committee for study. The senate agreed by a voice vote.

Kefauver served notice he will try to get that decision overturned today.

Kefauver listed the men he wants arrested:

Patrick J. Burns, Murray L. Humphreys, Hocco Pischetti (alias Ralph Palmer) and Charles Pischetti (alias Dr. Charles Fisher), all Chicago; Anthony "Tony" Accardo, River Forest, Ill.; John Patton, Burnham Park, Ill. and Earl Park, Ind.; Ben Hardin and Morris Rosen, New York City; Martin M. Hartmann, San Francisco; Joseph Sica, Los Angeles; and Elmer (Don) Remmer, Piedmont, Calif.


