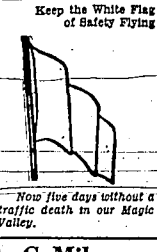

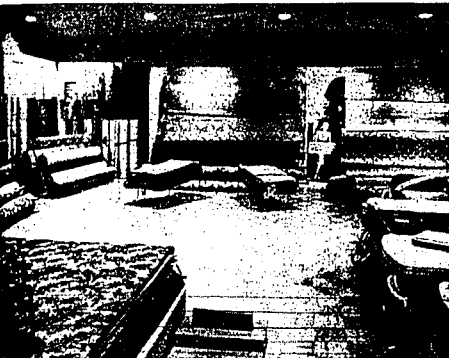

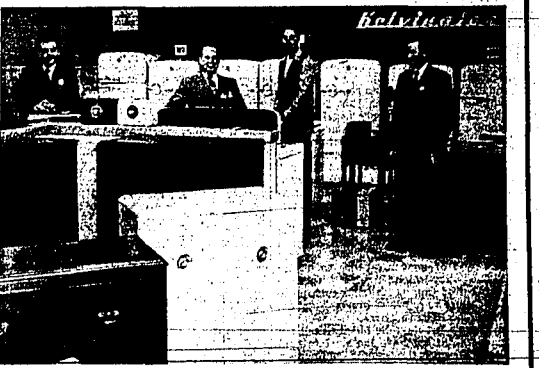

WASHINGTON—Through all the ups and downs of the diplomatic situation with red China, one American official has kept a determined hold on fundamental realities. He is Joe Foster.

If the outcome of the Truman-Attlee talks is possible, Dulles will try to Japan probably before Christmas. He will be expected to change in the situation of Japan in the development of the Pacific war.

Japan is menaced immediately, especially in view of the fact that most of the American forces stationed in Japan were committed in Korea. In view of what is happening, it is in some respects correct to say that Japan now becomes a major target of Chinese communist ambition.

Foreign Minister Chen En-lai's latest propaganda attack on Peking was devoted to American intentions with respect to Japan, coupled with the insistence that Japan must remain isolated.

This is one reason why a tentative decision has been taken to delay at this hour. They will follow Dulles' lead, but the situation in the light of the devastating changes occurring from hour to hour.

If the Republicans show wisdom at this hour, they will follow Dulles' lead. They will not allow themselves to be misled by the propaganda of the Chinese.

It is significant that before the present change Dulles conferred in Washington first with Acheson and others in the department and then with Secretary Acheson and Mr. Truman. It is a sign of the importance of Dulles' role in Asia, these two Republic leaders could hold the bulk of the members of their party in the senate for cooperation on Asian policy.

The past played by Dulles in the whole Korean matter sometimes is forgotten. Within three days before the North Korean attack occurred, he told the Korean leaders that if the communists launched an invasion, the republic Korea would not have to stand alone.

In Tokyo at the time of the assault, he laid his batter the truth and the United States and the United Nations would resist the unprovoked aggression, across the 38th parallel.

This was a bold thing to do since as Dulles well knew, many military men believed Korea to be infeasible in the event of an communist attack.

It has been reported frequently that the national security council concluded more than two years ago, with both military and diplomatic members agreed that American troops should be withdrawn from Korea since a limited force could not possibly hold the peninsula.

Dulles has admitted that in the plan on the way back from Tokyo he had some bad hours wondering whether the decision would be feasible to defend the Korean republic.

Dulles never has minimized the threat of Chinese intervention. He has stressed the need to try to meet the realities of communist China.

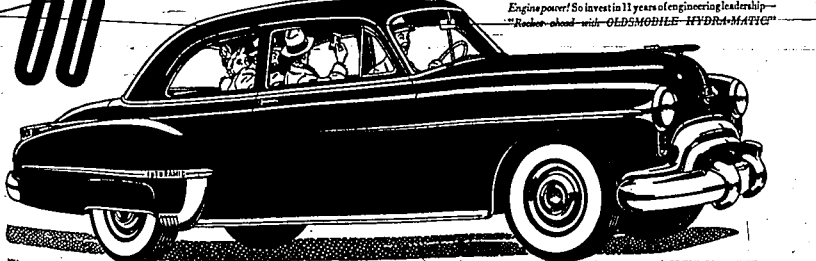

Educator Finds Little Good About Schools in Minidoka

RUPERT, Dec. 9.—Dr. Ray M. Berry of the University of Idaho department of education, who recently made a survey of school buildings in the county, rates all but two school buildings in Minidoka county as below average.

The ratings show that all the elementary schools except Pioneer are below average and that those at

Minidoka, Heyburn and Arco are so poor it "is questionable if any great amount of money should be spent on them." The educator rates the schools as Minidoka, poor; Lincoln, poor; Paul, poor; Arco, unsatisfactory; Heyburn, poor; Pioneer, average; and Peshawar, poor.

The ratings for high school buildings in the county show Rupert just over average and Heyburn just under average. The ratings are as follows: Rupert, poor; Pioneer, poor; Paul, poor; Heyburn, poor; Tully, poor; and Ripper, average.

Dr. Berry said the high school plant in Arco rates low because of the waste space in the building and poor planning used in the original construction. "Because of his heavy indebtedness to Louis' former manager, Billy Conn, Roxborough said Mike Jacobs is the man behind the eight-ball and was the start of his troubles, Roxborough said.

"Several times I told Jacobs I did not want him to advance Joe any money because it would hurt him in the end," said Roxborough. "But Mike said he just couldn't say 'no' to Joe when he asked for money."

The former manager of the Brown Bomber said Louis received \$200,000 from Jacobs while serving in the army.

Roxborough is particularly heated at an interview made in a national magazine that his former partner, Julian Black, managed Louis' finances poorly.

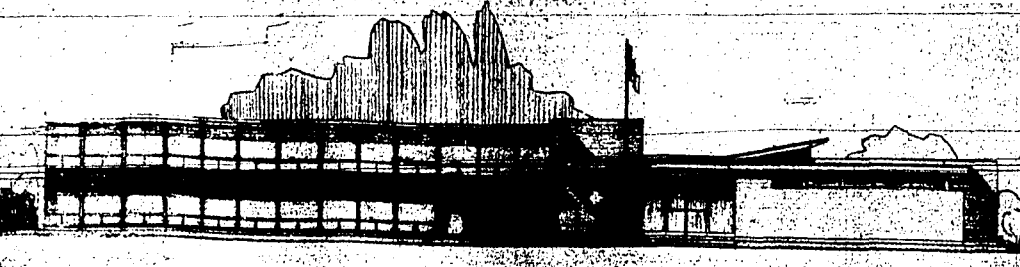

Sketch Gives Appearance of Proposed New City Hall for Twin Falls

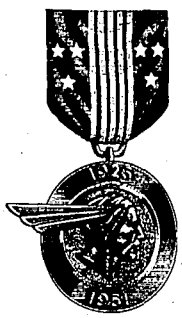

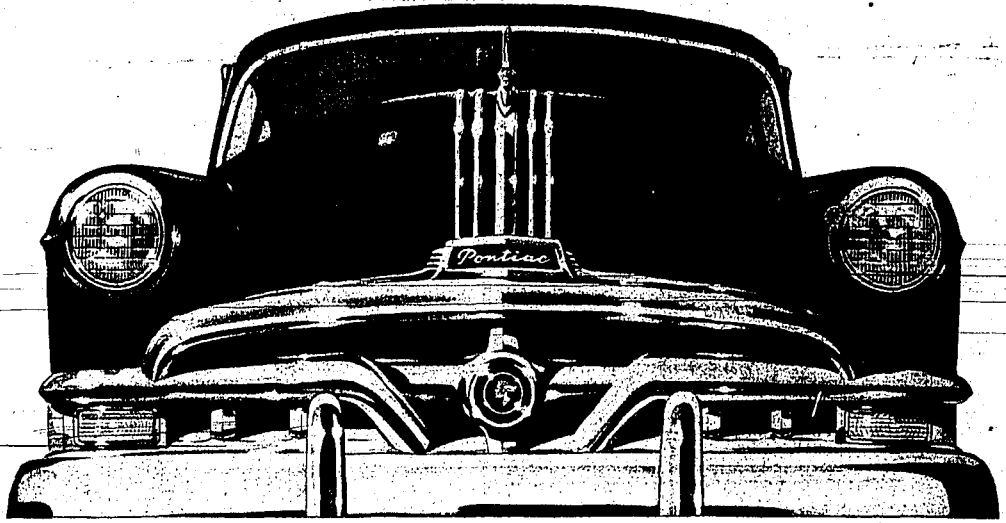

Checks Give New Data on Planet Pluto

By J. HUGH FRUETT
Astronomer, Education Division,
Oregon Higher Education System
Scientific examination of the
professional astronomers and the
interested public on March 15, 1930.
Newspaper headlines proclaimed
the finding by Clyde Tombaugh of
the Lowell observatory at Flag-
staff, Ariz. of "a new planet."
This was announced as another
planet, traveling in its orbit far
more distant from the sun than
that of Neptune.

Since its discovery, 64 years
earlier, Neptune had held the hon-
or of being the most distant mem-
ber of the familiar solar family.

Names Varied
The new object for some time
was designated by such names as
Planet X, the Plutish object and
the Neptune-like planet. Some
suggested it should be called Lowell
after the late director of the ob-
servatory. It had called Pluto
and that another planet must lie beyond
Neptune and seemingly had pro-
vided location fairly accurately.
Finally an 11-year old girl, Ven-
etia Burney, Oxford, England, sug-
gested the name Pluto.

The new planet observed and the
name was adopted at once.
Pluto's average distance from the
sun is so great, 39.5 times that of
the earth, or nearly four billion
miles out in the regions of night,
that the most powerful telescopes
can make out nothing regarding its
surface features.

Until quite recently its size was
estimated by little more than mere
guesses. It was thought to have
about the diameter of the earth,
or only slightly less. Brower at Yale
recently estimated Pluto's
mass as 0.8 times that of the earth.

Expert Tries
In 1925 and 1927, Dr. Gerard
Kuiper of the University of Cali-
fornia attempted to measure fairly
accurately the diameter of Pluto
with the 84-inch telescope at
McDonald observatory. In spite of
very careful manipulations he felt
that for theoretical reasons the in-
strument was not delicate enough
to measure such a small angular
diameter.

On one occasion when the ac-
curacy was especially good he and an
assistant obtained a diameter of 0.4
second of arc, but he stated "the
measurement was on the very
threshold of the capabilities of the
telescope—if not beyond it."

Trued Biggest Telescope
Early this year Dr. Kuiper ar-
ranged with the director of the 300-
inch Hale telescope in California
for attempted measurements. It is
the largest such instrument in op-
eration. With the help of Mr. Hu-
manson of the Palomar staff, he was
certain he obtained a close result
the night of March 19, 1930.

In the August issue, Publications
of the Astronomical Society of the
Pacific, Dr. Kuiper says his results
give Pluto a diameter between that
of Mars and Mercury, 0.46 times
that of the earth, or about 3,000
miles. Pluto's volume then is 0.1
earth and its mass slightly less than
that of earth.

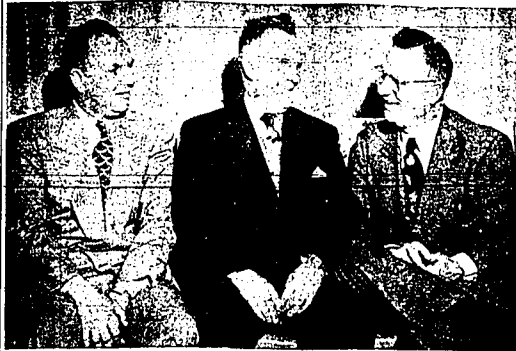

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

When RUPERT's postoffice was moved into its new building last month many old-time residents turned back the pages of their memories to the days when Rupert had its first postoffice.

And when those yellowed pages had been turned the name of Watson N. Shilling, the city's first postmaster, stood out prominently. Many old timers claim Shilling, who died in 1924 in Portland, Ore., was one of the most colorful pioneers on the Minidoka project.

Shilling was a Civil war veteran but he spent a part of his time in the army "sweating it out" as a prisoner of war at Richmond, Va., during the Civil war.

Shilling was married to Mrs. M. M. Shilling, nee - born in Ohio. Shilling emigrated in the 1840's to the famous Gen. George A. Custer at the beginning of the war between the states.

Shilling's taste for adventure was not dampened by his term in prison camp and shortly after the Civil war he headed for the West. The Western Union Telegraph company was paying operation good salaries so Shilling took a job at operator at Echo, Utah, in 1862.

He didn't stay long in Echo, however, and in 1875 he was operating a trading post at Fort Hall. The log building in which he and his family lived served as a store, home and postoffice. In addition, Shilling acted as a telegrapher for the Wells Fargo Express company.

Shilling and his family stayed 10 years at Fort Hall. In his own words he admitted "there was danger, very real and very serious."

With the coming of the railroad, however, more settlers began coming and much of the old life was gone. The freight wagon trains and the profits derived from driver's passenger became a thing of the past.

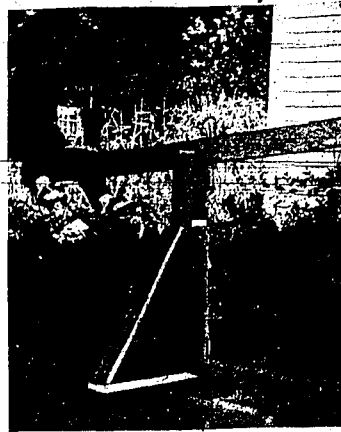
Despite poor business, Shilling stayed at Fort Hall but the Democrats came to power in 1884. President Cleveland, the oldtimer recounted more than once, thought someone of his own political faith could do better in administering to the needs of the Indians at Fort Hall than Shilling could.

The opening of the Minidoka project in 1900 appealed to the pioneer so he headed for the area and erected a log paper-mill back on the railroad right-of-way for Rupert's first mercantile establishment. His motto was "first in the field and here to stay."

Shilling became postmaster when the postoffice was established in July, 1903, a post he held until 1914. When the railroad was under construction all the mail received in Rupert was brought in by the train brakeman in a mail pouch.

His daughter, Mrs. Lucile LaBee, still lives in Rupert. Two other daughters still are living. They are:

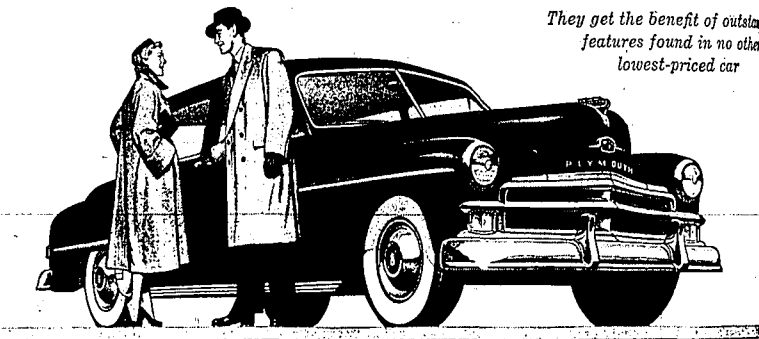
