

## N. Cease-Fire Sought; Cavalry Testing Defenses

Dec. 12 (UP)—Some 27 Chinese communist divisions are moving 8,000 to 14,000 Chinese communist cavalry units across the border from North Korea into South Korea, according to a statement today from the bulk of the United Nations forces from the eastern Irian.

The two resolutions provided: 1. That the general assembly President Marshal Izrael, Iran, President a group of three persons including the United States, the Soviet Union and the United Kingdom, be authorized to determine the basis on which a satisfactory cease-fire can be arranged and to make recommendations to the general assembly as soon as possible.

2. That the assembly recommend that representatives of the United States and the Soviet Union be authorized to make recommendations for the peaceful settlement of existing issues which carry on accretions to the purposes and principles of the U. N.

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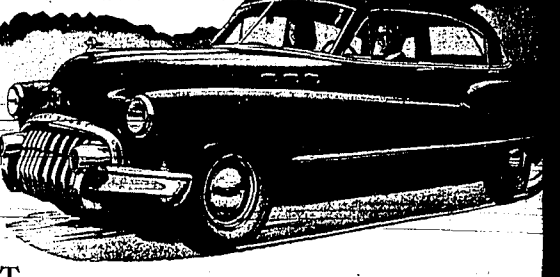

**3 Subpoenaed In Hearing on Marshall Aide**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—The senate armed services committee has subpoenaed three more witnesses in its investigation into the fitness of Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg to be assistant secretary of defense. Justice Chairman Russell, D. C., made the announcement to reporters after the committee spent three hours and 45 minutes behind closed doors listening to the testimony of Benjamin Freedman, retired New York businessman.

The committee unanimously recommended her confirmation, but senate action had been delayed while the committee looked into the charges raised against her.

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON**—All plans for financing future government and treatment costs on a pay-as-you-go basis have been discarded on Capitol Hill. The House Ways and Means committee today announced a program would practically bankrupt the nation's economy and make every citizen a taxpayer for working only for the government.

While this decision gives a small reprieve to the nation's taxpayers, it does not solve the problem of borrowing from the banks. The deficit is almost as gloomy for tomorrow's stockholders in the United States as for the government.

Borrowing will mean the addition of approximately \$300,000,000 to the public debt each year, which will boost the national mortgage to about \$400,000,000 in five years if the current plan cannot be revised by diplomatic legislation based on a "negotiated surrender" in Korea and China, generally.

DET.—Should the public debt ever get to peak, the annual interest charge alone will be \$100,000,000, or one cent for every dollar in the public debt.

Although there is no guarantee that this figure will not increase under inflation, the interest only on the present \$100,000,000 in public debt is about \$10 million.

To dramatize this prospect and terrify the taxpayers, the government has set up a "debt clock" which measures the nation's debt and foreign situation, here is a comparison of the financial situation between 1931 and 1951:

	1939	1951
Budget	\$4,100,000,000	\$7,500,000,000
Public debt	\$1,500,000,000	\$200,000,000,000

To make matters worse, these figures are based on more than 50 years of government participation in another global conflict. If a World War II should be upon us, even these astronomical statistics must be tossed into the wastebasket.

# WHAT A PRETTY PICTURE

Those who have not been too pre-occupied with their Christmas shopping probably are viewing the Korean situation with serious concern.

One thing for sure, when one does try to figure out the whole mess becomes all the more frightening.

We overheard one substantial Twin Falls resident sum it all up in the following manner:

"No matter how you try to figure out our predicament in Korea, there is no escape that we are possibly all in our favor. We're caught with our pants down and we're afraid to admit it."

In any street corner discussion, one change in public attitude is becoming more and more apparent. Call it a return to isolationism or what you like, this business of being all loused up in a lot of entangling alliances against which we were warned a long time ago, is losing its popularity.

"Characterizing the world" might have been noble in purpose and it may have had its political advantages for those who have been trying to sell us this big bill of goods for years. But we have been warned for a second time that it doesn't work.

We have been let down so completely, in fact, that it amounts to the United States finding itself in the position of being virtually trapped.

General Bradley has said, almost all of our fighting men are in Korea. We have called up, on paper, about 200,000 men since September, but the majority have not gone to camp. The reason for this is that there are no camps and no veterans on hand to drill or instruct them. The camps either have been torn down or allowed to fall apart.

Prisoners happened on the Farguau railroad station in north Idaho serves as a good example.

The defense department recently awarded a \$2,000,000 contract for reconstruction of a new training station in northern New York. It will be many months before that station can receive or train its complement, especially in view of the winter weather prevailing in that area.

Prisoners and the weather are the same, although we have been kidding ourselves about the support they could or would give us in the event of a United Nations showdown. Their main forces are committed to the Red Chinese, Manchus, Russians and wherever else the globe. They have allowed their domestic defenses to go to pieces, as we did.

So, there would seem to be only two alternatives: both disastrous.

Try, as we are now doing, to evacuate MacArthur's force, if the diplomats cannot arrange for a "political settlement" which would amount to a "negotiated surrender." This means that we are to fight a foreign war.

Or, on the instance of British and French statesmen, we must sit down with Stalin, if he will condescend to sit, and try to persuade him to let us off easily. For in such a game he would win through the American Red.

What a pretty picture we have dashed up for ourselves!

# AN APPEAL FOR BLOOD

The people of Twin Falls county will have a real opportunity this coming Friday to attend a helping hand to the wounded soldiers in Korea.

A mobile blood donor unit, working in cooperation with the Twin Falls county chapter of the American Legion, will be set up in the American Legion Hall in Twin Falls Dec. 15 for the sole purpose of procuring whole blood which will be flown directly to our troops in Korea.

The unit will be set up in the Legion hall and a schedule arranged to take care of six donors every 15 minutes.

The appeal for blood has the whole-hearted support of James McGilvray, superintendent of the Magic Valley Memorial hospital, and Dr. J. Woodson Reed, pathologist at the hospital. They have expressed their support in the following joint statement:

### Detail OK'd On Laying of 30-Inch Pipe

### Bitter Korea School Teaching U. S. Army Valuable Lessons, Boyle Finds

BY HAL BOYLE  
WITTS U. S. BROTHERS ARMY COVER-UPS—What has the American army learned from the South and bitter campaign to police Korea?  
It has been no heart-breaking and frustrating half-year ride on a military merry-go-round that circled from defeat to victory and again—that many a soldier might rapidly capitulate.



"We have learned nothing new except how to lose a war."  
But tonight the American losses have been and grim that the United Nations

Mal sets appears in this wilderness of hopelessness as madding horde of half-year ride of push back the outnumbered U. S. forces.

It is a bitter-sweet hope at best, however, and capuled by one professional soldier in this way:  
"The Korean campaign has not been worthwhile if only because it has served as a laboratory for a third World War—if it is done."

Stephen is a former soldier and to his exploits the American professional army at the front. If I had to name the most outstanding combat officer of the Korean campaign it would have to be Stephen. Many correspondents feel that way about him and so do many staff officers.

Stephen commands a regiment of the 24th Infantry division. He is blunt, honest, able, courageous and deeply sentimental about his troops. To them in many battles he has seemed more like a quarterback snark plugging a team play than a distant commander ordering them to their deaths. For he has shared their danger all the long, weary way since he first took them into action early last July.

Like most regular army officers, Stephen feels the world political situation made the campaign here necessary but Korea was strategically poor place to commit our troops.  
"I felt Uncle Joe was laughing up his sleeve at the chance to tie us in a land where no final military decision could be reached," he said.  
"But we did get a lot of experience here. Except for the heavy lack of air power this is just the way we

would have to fight if we ever do league with the Russians.

"The road difficulties are the same, the tactics will be the same, and the type of people we will have to fight will be the same. They are tough cookies. They aren't afraid to die and they are willing to be killed in large quantities to accomplish their mission."

Some officers feel the war here has shown that the American army needs to be streamlined—that it has too few riflemen at the front and too many headquarters and rear area personnel. They believe it would be more efficient in battle if it had less equipment and a higher percentage of foot troops to throw on

the actual battalions—as oriental armies do.

But Stephens contends the campaign here has proved that the American army's tactical organization is basically superior—considering the difference between the oriental and the American soldier.

"Our doctrine is sound," he said. "If the North Koreans had had the supporting elements we had here, they would have been over more than five months ago. They are not middle class to exploit breakthrough. We are."

"Their communications are too limited. One fellow doesn't know what the other fellow is doing. They have to adhere to a single plan be-

cause they aren't flexible. They can't switch quickly to another battle plan if something goes wrong. They just don't have the communications to do it. If they did have them they would have won the war in the first six months."

It was this advantage in mobility and communications that enabled the American eighth army to cooperate being completely destroyed by the slower moving masses of Chinese red infantry.

Stephens says one of the lessons we learned here was that the American army's policy of dealing fairly with enemy civilians pays off militarily.

"What is why we have so little prisoners?" he asks. "The Communists in Russia being they mistreated and butchered the people in their rear areas and lost any hope of getting their cooperation. We haven't done that. And I believe that most

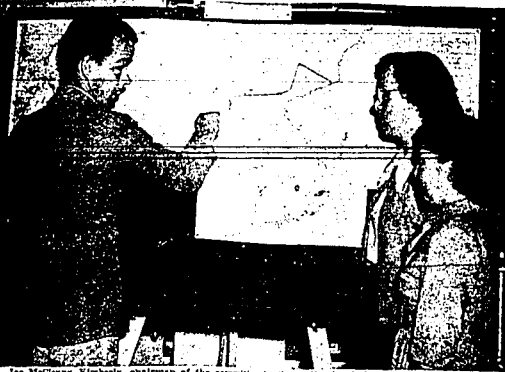

### Indian Finds Rich Uranium Ore Deposits

ATOMIC GRANTS, N. M., Dec. 12 (AP)—What may be one of the nation's biggest uranium deposits has been found by a 50-year-old Navaho Indian.

The Los Angeles Times said today that a geologist's survey indicates that the uranium ore in the Navaho mountains may be in a belt 5 to 10 miles wide and extending 50 miles between here and Gallup to the west.

**Halfway Land**  
The Indian, who made the find on land owned by the Santa Fe railroad, is Paddy Martinez. The Times said Martinez heard some men discussing the government's \$1000 offer for finding certain types of uranium and decided to keep his eyes open.

The Navaho told Times Science Editor William S. Barton that last July while riding on the slopes of Navajo mountain 20 miles northeast of here he noticed yellow streaks in the grey rock. He and his sons dug samples.

**Experts Take Over**  
Then the Santa Fe's engineers and geologists took over.

Thomas Evans, chief mining engineer for the railroad, told Martinez some exceptionally rich scattered deposits are in the area. Evans added that "a more conservative estimate is known, is that in the six-mile stretch of mountain ore sampled, the rock will run from a tenth to a quarter of one percent in uranium oxide, or from 45 to something over 100 a ton."

Some ore will run to 1 per cent or 100 a ton, Evans added.  
Several representatives of the atomic energy commission have examined the area.

### Yet Bonus Rapped At Farm Meeting

DALLAS, Dec. 12 (AP)—A lanky World War II veteran Monday told an American Farm Bureau Federation group considering veterans' bonuses that such money should be used instead to buy arms.

Joy Clayton, Waxahatchee, Tex., spoke up at the tax and legislative conference.

"Why don't we use this bonus money more wisely and decrease the number of heirs in the next war?" Clayton asked. There was applause from the approximately 25 people in the room.

Another Texan, Ernest Barrow, Eola, charged both bonuses and on-farm training money encourage idleness.

### Ada County Sued For School Funds

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Canyon county today filed a \$720,000 suit in district court charging it wants that amount for tuition for school children from neighboring Ada county.

 "Very often you will find yourself playing a dramatic scene face to face with some gaping tourist visiting the studio. How can you be normal and do that?"

"Also, you have to be a little nuts to get up at 6 o'clock every morning to go to work."

"The look," as she was known in her earlier film days, admitted that acting people can be hard to live with. She is married to one, a guy named Humphrey Bogart.

**Not Temperamental**  
 "But you can get along with them, if you know enough to keep quiet at the right time," she added. "For temperamental actors I know, so we don't have too much trouble."

"It's also hazardous marrying an actress," she remarked frankly. "They're inclined to high and low moods," she observed. "Boggy's father told him never to marry an actress, but he went ahead and married four of them."

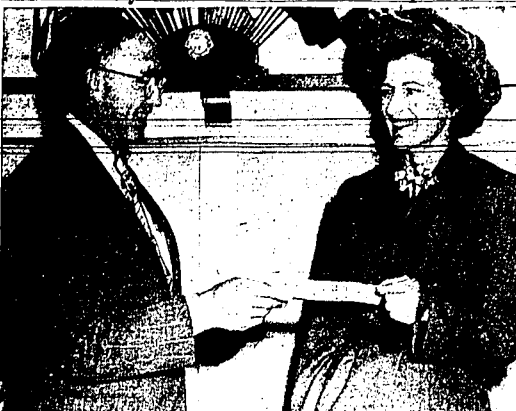
### Museum Opening Set for Saturday

### U. S. Workers Gain in Idaho

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—Government workers—the people whose wages are paid by your taxes—have nearly doubled in Idaho since 1929.

That's the information contained in the report on long-range unemployment costs in Idaho as compiled by the state employment security agency and the University of Idaho.

Purhormer, the report discloses that government employment, particularly federal, will continue to increase.

Government workers during 1933 comprised 19.3 per cent of the total non-agricultural labor force. The employment security report adds that the greatest increases for Idaho were in the years 1919-1926. In 1919, the index was below that of the United States as a whole, but once more it is on the rise.

Meantime, the report points out that government employees are not covered by the state unemployment compensation program.

### Panel Asks Four States to Enact River Pact Laws

PORTLAND, Dec. 12 (AP)—Four western states were urged Monday to pass bills allowing them to enter river compacts with their neighbors.

The Columbia river compact committee asked Idaho, Washington, Utah and Nevada to pass the enabling legislation. Members pointed out Montana, Wyoming and Oregon already had done so.

The group is urging an interstate compact to assure fair benefits of Columbia river water for reclamation and irrigation.

Chairman Jack Rogers, Washington director of resources and conservation, said the committee plans to hold another meeting in the first quarter of next year.

The Columbia basin commission, a group urging a single accounting system for basin development, met here tonight to discuss proposed legislation to make such an accounting system possible.

The Columbia basin inter-agency committee, a group of government agencies concerned with basin development, is scheduled to meet tomorrow.

### Washington Plan For Defense OK'd

OLYMPIA, Dec. 12 (AP)—A basic plan for civil defense in the state of Washington was approved by the state defense council Monday.

It outlines the responsibilities at all levels of government in event of an enemy attack or a natural disaster such as an earthquake or flood.

A proposed law has been drafted to cover provisions of the basic plan. It also would only the present draft for civil defense.

Under existing laws the state has an organization for dealing with disasters such as earthquakes and floods and a separate one for action in times of enemy attack.

When the final bill is drafted, it will be submitted to the 1935 legislature for action.

### State Awards Oil Supply Contracts

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—The state purchasing office yesterday announced award of contracts to service all companies to supply state departments with gasoline, diesel oil and stove fuel.

The contracts, amounts of which weren't announced, went to the Phillips Petroleum company, Spokane; Petroleum company, Boise; Standard Oil company, San Francisco; Union Oil company, Seattle; H. E. Clark company, Hare, Mont.; Texas Oil company, Butte, Mont.; and the Utah Oil Refining company, Salt Lake City.

The state also purchased 24 sand spreaders from the Olson Manufacturing company, Boise, for the state highway department. Contract price was \$7,253.
