

Americans Pulling Deeper to Northeast Beachhead; Air Opposition Increasing

Dec. 14 (AP)—Allied forces pulled deeper into their northeast Korean beachhead the menace of an estimated 100,000 Chinese rods massed on an arc around the peninsula in the northwest near Manchuria.

The biggest jet-against-jet air battles ever fought were waged during the day. The jet dogfights rendered no clear-cut decisions.

In the United Nations air force spokesman said the growing red jet fighter activities indicated the communist air force is starting to mount an all-out air war in Korea.

Increasing tempo may reveal a steady increasing tempo of the communist air force as it seeks to break a U. S. third division abandoned the town of On, six miles north of Hamhung, and withdrew into the slender perimeter strip extending another 10 miles to the east coast port of Zhanjiang.

It is the United Nations' last foothold in the northeast.

Puerto Rican troops attached to the 3rd Division from three spans of a 500-foot concrete bridge spanning the Chongjin river at On were abandoned. About 200 of the bridge and two other spans on the outer edge of the beachhead were destroyed.

These were the first reported large demolitions on the outskirts of the beachhead since the communist pre-dawn fighting. This was believed to be the scene of a light Chinese probing attempt earlier but not pinpointed. Enemy reconnaissance planes scoured the beachhead Wednesday.

U. N. Assembly OK's Plan for Cease-Fire

NEW YORK, Dec. 14 (AP)—The United Nations assembly today approved an Asian-Arab plan for a Korean cease-fire despite Soviet bloc warnings that this would not end the fighting.

The vote was 42 to 5 with nationalist China abstaining. The Soviet bloc countries cast the negative votes.

The proposal creates a three-man committee, headed by assembly President Nasrallah Entezam, Iran, and directed to seek a basis for a truce.

Chinese Red Radio Blasts Peace Pleas

HONG KONG, Dec. 14 (AP)—The Chinese Communist radio, rejected the peace bid of President Truman and British Prime Minister Clement Attlee today and blasted the peace proposals of the Chinese Communist Party.

The radio said that the Chinese Communist Party would not accept the proposal unless the United Nations assembly would accept the proposal.

Korean War Toll Boosted Near 34,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The defense department announced today that 33,878 American casualties, including 5,870 dead, were officially reported in the Korean fighting through last Friday.

This casualty summary, 16th in a series, also showed 1,035 casualties for the U. S. This was approximately the same as the number of deaths in the three years of the war.

Emergency Decree Signed Saturday, Say Russians After Talks

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—President Truman definitely has decided to declare a national emergency, before the end of the week.

He now plans to do so on Saturday after explaining in a nationwide broadcast tomorrow night (8:30 p.m., MST) that this—and other—action is necessary to meet the grave crisis facing the country and the world. This was the word circulated after Mr. Truman held a second day of conferences today with Democratic and Republican congressional leaders on steps to meet the emergency.

The emergency plans contemplate a faster build-up of the nation's armed forces, mobilization of the home front, and perhaps some price-wage controls.

Russ Charge of Jap Rearing Called Lie

General Calls For Unity of U.S. in Crisis

NEW YORK, Dec. 14 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower pleaded for national unity yesterday to "lessen the risks that threaten us" in the present world crisis.

"We're frightened," he said. "... There can be only one reason—because we know that the opposing group moves at the will of one man or small group of men. We're frightened because we know we are not united."

Eisenhower, now president of Columbia university, said he was "not pleading for blank checks for those in authority" but he declared critics should be "better-informed than the persons criticized."

The former supreme allied commander in Europe spoke at the annual luncheon of the Salvation Army association. He received the association's 1950 citation as a "great American patriot deeply devoted to the time-honored fundamental values of our beloved country."

"Each of us in this country," Eisenhower said, "has to inform ourselves to the absolute limit and on that basis achieve that unity which will lessen, diminish and finally defeat every danger that threatens us."

4,500 Idahoans To Share Bank's Stock Dividends

More than 4,500 Idaho farmers and ranchers will share a \$242,200 dividend declared by the Federal Land bank of Spokane, Henry Matthews, president, announced.

This seven per cent dividend, payable to all stockholders of record as of Nov. 30, 1950, brings to almost \$1,450,000 the total dividends declared by the bank in the past seven years.

Matthew said approximately 65,000 of the 14 local, cooperative national farm loan associations in Idaho which make and service loans for the bank and which own 658,000 of the bank's capital stock. These 14 associations, in turn, will pass the

dividend on to their 458 member-stockholders, less only the small portion needed to assure a long-time, sound business operation.

The Federal Land bank of Spokane is owned by its borrowers through 66 national farm loan associations in Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana, said Matthews.

"These associations own all the bank's capital stock and approximately 10,000 farmers and ranchers own all the stock of the associations. As members of the cooperative land bank system, the bank and the associations, after providing for necessary reserves, distribute their earnings to stockholders in the form of dividends."

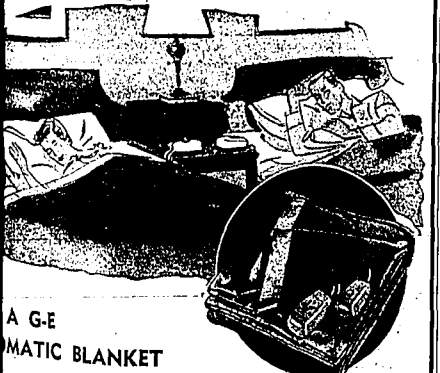

The refusal of Lynch and Longano to answer questions on the ground it might tend to incriminate them also prompted Tobey to shout:

"I think it's a damned outrage to have these witnesses come up here and refuse to answer the questions."

John E. Seiler, Hackensack, N. J., lawyer for Lynch and Longano, said he had advised them to refuse answering the questions because it would amount to forcing them to testify against themselves.

Army Announces Plans for Large Textile Purchase

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The army quartermaster corps yesterday announced tentative plans for buying 155,000,000 yards of textiles for the army and air force, most of it to be delivered during the first six months of next year.

Deliveries under that program, authorized separately by congress, may extend to June, 1953. Deliveries under the current fabric procurement program will be completed by Oct. 1, 1951.

Under the wool reserve program, congress authorized the purchase of 100,000,000 pounds of raw wool or its equivalent in harmonia, fabrics and knitting yarns for use of all the armed services, as a military wool reserve.

Famed Buddy System to Use Korean Troops Proves Dud, Boyle Discovers

By HAL BOYLE
WITH A KOREAN ARMY, Korea (AP)—The "buddy system" has been a failure in the opinion of most frontline commanders in Korea.

This attempt to integrate South Korean soldiers with American front line outfits was begun in August. It was supposed to be an emergency measure.

In those desperate days of defense along the Nakdong River, an American soldier was not to be without a Korean buddy. The idea was to give the Korean soldier a friend and protector in the field. It was a thoroughly good-hearted program, launched with the best of intentions. It was sternly ordered that the Korean volunteers be treated as equals of the American soldiers. They were to be given no more than their fair share of such unwelcome and unpalatable duties as digging latrines or unloading supplies.

And the program got off to a good start. A Korean who signed up as Kim Who Bond quickly was nicknamed "Fido" or "Black-foot" or "Underlunge." He quickly picked up a few solid soldier phrases such as "take it easy."

Everything was pally wally—as long as the outfit were refitting in camp.

Some units that enthusiastically adopted the buddy system soon were in for a rude awakening.

When the mixed Korean and American outfit went into combat, the buddy system began to fall apart. Under the stress of battle the differences of language and loyalty between the two nationalities became more vitally important than their desire to understand and work with one another.

The Koreans haven't had time to learn army technique. An American buddy hated to have his life dependent on whether his oriental buddy knew enough to give him covering at the right moment.

There were numerous cases of outstanding stubborn and heroic fighting by these Korean volunteers. There were other cases where they broke and ran—and thus created bitterness.

"They largely have just taken up and said one veteran commander who had been among the first to welcome the buddy system.

"We have tried to get these Koreans to fight with American equipment and most of them just don't have enough mechanical sense yet."

"To try to integrate them with an American army is a waste of time."

BOISE, Dec. 14 (AP)—There'll be plenty of liquor stocks on hand for the expected Christmas rush at state liquor stores, Seth F. Harper, superintendent of the state liquor dispensary, said yesterday.

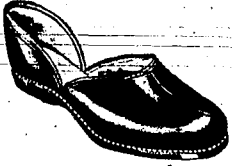

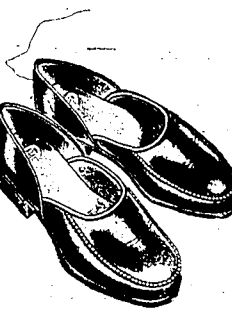

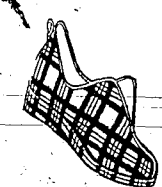

Federal Levy Harvest Will Begin Friday

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The government, faced with mounting defense cost, starts its biggest tax harvest season tomorrow.

Expectations indicate a intake of \$16,000,000,000 or more—about 40 per cent of annual revenue—over the next three months.

The government can use it. Since this fiscal year began last July 1, the red, it expects to be twice as bad off by next June 30.

Compliance Hit
The big tax season begins with the deadline tomorrow for corporations to make final tax payments on 1944 income. It will mark their last payments at the old 30 per cent maximum rate. A 45 per cent top will prevail on 1950's record-size profits.

After tomorrow, the tax spotlight will shift to individuals. They finished 1949 income tax payments last March but in many instances will have something to do about 1950 income taxes ahead of the general deadline for paying them next March 15.

Calendar Given
A calendar of dates to remember: Jan. 1—Time for housewives to begin withholding social security taxes from the pay of servants (and farmers to withhold from their workers) if they are going to make the servant pay her half of the 3 per cent-of-pay tax.

Jan. 15—Last day for filing 1950 income tax declarations (initials), or amending declarations (filed earlier to avert a penalty in case the original estimate was too low than 20 per cent.

First Contact
For farmers, who occupy a unique position among taxpayers, this will be the first contact with 1950 income tax. All farmers whose 1950 income exceeded \$400 will be required to declare the amount they took in.

Jan. 31—Deadline for "information returns," which up the tax collection on various income payments not covered by withholding taxes.

March 15—The deadline not only for 1950 individual income tax payments, but also for initial 1951 income tax payments, but also for initial 1951 income declarations and first tax payments by individuals subject to declaration requirements.

Limited War In Korea Is Eyed by U.N.

Despite all the resolutions at Lake Zurich, the U.N. Security Council appears today to increase around the possibilities of continuing a limited war in Korea.

This is the intention of the United States, and presumably of Great Britain, whose prime minister said he was in agreement with President Truman on the subject. Mr. Acheson told parliament yesterday that he had "good hopes" that U. N. forces would be able to maintain themselves on the disputed peninsula.

He spoke only a day after General MacArthur had reported that the Chinese, despite the withdrawals forced by overwhelming numbers, had not been able to break the U. N. ability to fight.

Estimates of the situation from reporters at MacArthur's headquarters suggest that further withdrawals will be necessary, however, and that if anything like a permanent defense line can be established, it will be around Seoul or somewhere in the south where the allied commanders can anchor both their present line from which the 6th Army now awaits further attack orders and their future defense line. The Chinese and the Communists apparently bent on turning this unauthorized withdrawal into a precedent, however, the U. N. should not do any panic trading just yet.

Many ways are being considered to be gained by continuing a war south of the 38th parallel, even if a temporary armistice can be obtained, and what has been gained at all by the Korean episode if North Korea is not freed from communist control.

Probably the greatest gain has been the revelation of the extent to which the Imperialist communists are prepared to go; that it is ready to use military aggression, ready to start a world war. That broad united reaction from 33 nations, 16 of which actually contributed military strength as evidence of their determination to resist such aggression, is a great asset in the future against future experiments of this kind, even though communist force proves a temporary winner. It certainly has built a fire under the preparedness programs of the non-communist world.

It has given the United Nations a new lease on life, through demonstration of its determination to act promptly and with force to meet force. It produced a method by which the general assembly can bypass the Security Council vote to carry out the spirit of the charter, if the fight can be continued in that world as constant evidence that the world is determined to help those who are willing to fight for their own liberties. It will encourage other countries to hold until armistice can arrive.

Korea is a hard price to pay for these things, just as Pearl Harbor was a hard price to pay for American unity and the realization that she had to take her place in line against the dictators in 1941. But the American willingness to fight for a country where she has no selfish interest should be a warning to the aggressors of what she will do in areas which are more truly a part of her own defense perimeter. Allied reaction in Korea, and the resulting impetus given preparedness, may yet prove to have been the saving of the non-communist world.

Senator Maybank, D. S. C., chairman of the senate banking and currency committee, told a reporter, however, that he understood \$400,000,000 will be sought initially to provide liberal federal insured building loans.

Housing authorities said the new bill will restrict construction to designated defense areas.

In statistical data sent to members of the Idaho legislature, the chamber said appropriations exclusive of the building fund, had risen from \$18,731,153 for the 1945-47 biennium to \$20,820,023 for the 1949-1951 period. Tax receipts in the past six years have just about doubled, the chamber said. Revenue has increased from \$27,747,755 in 1945 to \$15,204,977 in 1950.

Small Need of Food Ceilings Is Seen Now

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The bulk of the items in the family food market basket appeared lower today to escape government price controls for some time to come.

With the exception of some meats, rice and cottonseed oil, farm prices of food commodities still are below price ceiling levels set by law.

For that reason, establishment of ceilings might now would have little or no effect on bidding down food prices. In most cases, the ceilings would be above current market prices so far as farm products are concerned.

The law says ceilings on farm products must not be below parity or below prices which prevailed during the 10 day preceding start of the Korean war on June 30.

Some products were bringing less than two-thirds of their minimum ceiling prices at the last report.

Other commodities selling for less than minimum ceilings included wheat, corn, sorghum, butterfat, milk, barley, dry beans, oats, rye, sorghum, apples, chickens, eggs, hogs and turkeys.

The law permits establishment of ceilings on processed food products but not at levels which would hold farm prices below their minimum ceilings.

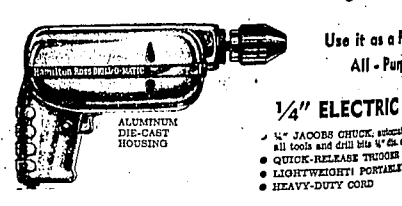

Marines Say Last Goodbye To Comrades

HONGNAM, Korea, Dec. 14 (AP)—The marines said their last goodbye to the men who didn't make it out of the Crown trap alive.

They stood in the warm sunshine looking out over the new cemetery at Hwang and prayed, while heavy trucks rumbled in the distance. Corairstrip overhead, and a machinegun had its hollow popping in the distance.

The white crosses which stood in straight rows at the heads of mounds of red clay marked the graves of American soldiers and marines, British marines, and South Korean soldiers who died in a hopeless fight to turn back the Chinese north of here.

The flag follows.

At one end of the cemetery an American flag followed at half-mast. At the other end, up a gentle slope from the cemetery, a Korean couple looked down on the solemn military of three faiths offered prayers. His white hair beared and his lean face solemn, Maj. Gen. Silver P. Smith, commander of the marines, stood in the shadow of the flag. He spoke only three sentences in farewell:

Words inadequate to express our feelings for the men who have fought and died here in support of a principle.

It is regrettable that their last resting place for the time being should be in foreign soil.

But the memory of what they did here will remain with us always.

Hittles barked three times in salute. A marine bugler walked stiffly to the top of the slope. The timeless melancholy of taps floated out over the graves. A group of Chinese prisoners moved back into the cemetery and continued their work of hauling away piles of red clay.

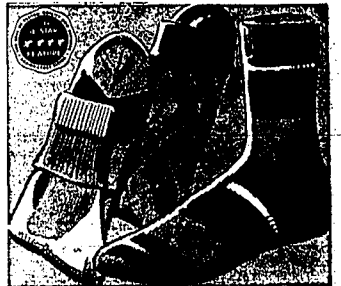

Plan for High Defense Levy Is Fading Out

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Little more than a whisper is left here of pay-as-we-go national defense effort last month.

Estimates of what may be spent for arms and more munitions next year range up to \$400,000,000. Estimates of what will be spent for post-defense purposes vary up to \$30,000,000,000.

Could Reach \$90,000,000,000

During a full-scale war, it is not likely these maximum figures will be reached, if they were, the spending figure for fiscal year 1952 would be around \$40,000,000,000. But the figure will be very high.

Secretary of Defense, general counsel of the national production board, made the defense spending estimate on Nov. 11, sometimes before the weakness of United States and United Nations military forces became spectacular in the Korean disaster.

May Revive Plan

Mr. Truman will have an opportunity to revive pay-as-we-go philosophy when he addresses the nation Friday on the national emergency.

But congress is not likely to impose taxes sufficient to raise \$90,000,000,000 or even \$40,000,000,000 annually.

The alternative will be an increase in the national debt which the government must borrow when tax revenue falls short of expenses. The government already has addressed an awesome total of \$23,000,000,000.

It costs the treasury more than \$3,000,000,000 just to pay interest on the bonds sold over the years to raise that sum.

LEWISTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Ruth Mudd, 18, and Clyde Kestley, 17, both Pasco, made good their elopement on Monday. They were married at 4 p. m. by the Rev. Cyril Conner, pastor of the Trinity Lutheran church here—four hours before Lewiston police were asked to halt the wedding plans.

The young people were back in Pasco ready to face their parents, officers said. In obtaining a marriage license at the county recorder's office here, Miss Mudd said she was 16 and Kestley listed his age as 21.

Raleigh Halstrom, Lewiston, will announce the marriage license. The Rev. Mr. Conner told officers the young couple appeared to be of legal age when they asked him to marry them.

Sheriff Hayes said the newweds spent Monday night at Cour d'Alens before heading back to Pasco.
