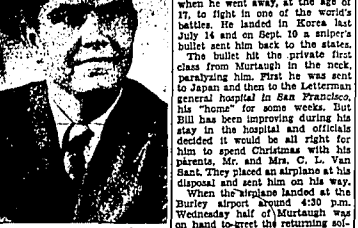

WHY ONE-SIDED CONTROLS?

Government in denying a plea by General Motors for relaxation of the mandatory price "freeze" on new cars at Dec. 1 levels, revealed once more the arrogance of its bureaucratic spirit.

Who is detaching the price control of our economy—GM or this agency? This particular spokesman's choice of a word betrayed not only an attitude which is all too prevalent in government nowadays.

General Motors was "appealing" and "urging" that the government terminate the corporation's price increases until it had been definitely determined whether or not these price advances were justified.

It would be a little different if the government had frozen all prices and all wage scales at the same time. But the freeze applied only to the automobile industry for a period which the PSA so far has failed to explain.

To assume that the auto manufacturers alone control our economy and that their prices alone would be out of line in a deflationary period, the industry was angled out to be placed under a great disadvantage.

The speech in which President Truman announced the price freeze on automobiles, nearby every American had a right to feel that the order virtually freezing all prices and wages at a uniform scale. Instead, the President slapped such a restriction on the automobile manufacturers only.

That doesn't make much sense to any open-minded person. Everyone knows that wages are a major overhead item for any firm building automobiles. With the demands that labor has been making in recent years there is no assurance that the auto manufacturer's price would be subjected to further wage increases unless they, too, were frozen.

General Motors to play a major role in pulling this country out of a bad hole. Only the supreme court stands between Alger Hiss and a federal appeals court upheld unanimously his conviction for perjury in connection with alleged espionage activities for Russia in the 1930's.

Discriminatory action such as this has been characteristic of the present administration all along. No matter how serious a situation may be, the White House mania resist the temptation to play a little politics.

South Korea Leaders Stop All Execution

SEOUL, Korea, Dec. 21 (AP)—The South Korean government suspended executions by its firing squads today pending a review of death sentences.

Justice Minister Kim Joon Yun announced the suspension and at the same time denied reports that prisoners had been executed without trial and that those killed included children.

He said President Syngman Rhee was setting up a special review board to pass on all death sentences. The board also will study the question of amnesty, he said.

14 Executed
From Oct. 1 to Dec. 15, he said, 201 persons had been tried under the government's emergency decrees and 243 of them had been executed. Crimes punishable by death under the emergency decrees include murder, arson, rape, destruction or sabotage of military transportation, communications, water supply and electric and gas facilities, destruction or robbery of military supplies in quantity, and jailbreak.

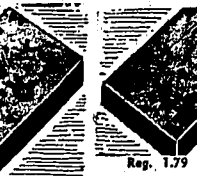

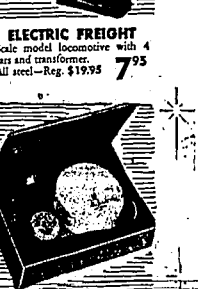

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21 (AP)—The nine-year-old coaching career of Jeff Cravath at the University of Southern California Wednesday, torpedoed by powerful old grad alumni sharpshooters. Cravath abandoned the stricken ship, effective Jan. 1, climbing an anti-Cravath, old grad offensive that mounted with intensity as the Trojan grid fortunes waned and pitched during the past few weeks.

Resigns



Cravath, senior coach in point of service in the Pacific Coast conference, stepped down with nothing but good words for the university, athletic officials and his players.

As adviser, he will be paid an estimated \$30,000 which the wealthy alumni agreed to dig up to buy off the two remaining years on his contract. Cravath, 47, made no direct mention of the pressure brought against him by the alumni, but it is no secret that a series of secret sessions ended with one night in which it was agreed to demand the coach's resignation and buy up his contract. Athletic Director Willis O. Hunter, chief supervisor at the withdrawal of the coach, the head coach crusade, said no thoughts have been given to a new coach.

Cravath, one of the greatest line-men in Trojan history and the only alumni ever to hold a coaching post, took over at USC in 1941. He added USC to four Pacific Coast conference championships and four Rose bowl games. He won the Heisman trophy last year, to Alabama and Michigan.

The 1950 campaign was the most successful since 1944 at the five games, led two and won two. Disappointing losses were to Navy, California and UCLA. The final game was a big victory, 9-7 over traditional rival Notre Dame, and many felt that it might quiet the wolves howl.

Cravath's overall record at USC was 47-22-3. He coached at Denver university and San Francisco university.

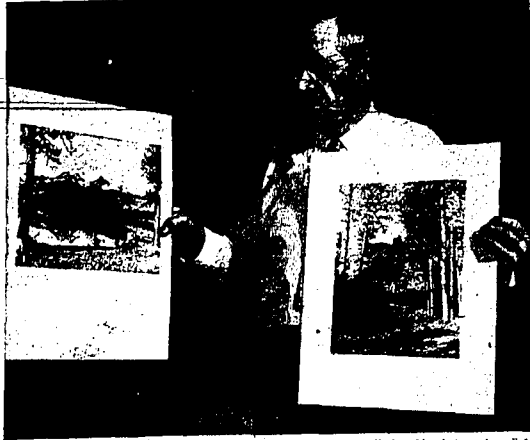

Experts Aver Russians Are Short of Oil

By SIGRID ARNE

Some experts on Russia in Washington think the Kremlin is several million barrels of oil away from touching off World War III.

The Russian position on oil appears to them not too different from Hitler's when he gambled on World War II, hoping that he either had, or would win, enough supplies to carry him through.

Tanks Burn Plenty

Tanks get two miles to the gallon of gas.

On a trip to Europe a B-36 uses more than a tank car of gasoline and 10,000 gallons of lubricating oil.

For that kind of warfare the west is set up to carry on indefinitely. But, according to these men's belief, is only supplied for a lightning war. But that lightning war could grab the middle east oil fields and supply enough air protection to keep them in production.

Iran Alarmed

Apprehension concerning the possibility of such a coup was evidenced in Tehran today when Iranian Foreign Minister Amir-Abbas Ghalibaf said that the Russians are in a "state of alert" because of the critical world situation. Iran is one of the middle east's largest oil producers.

The only known important Russian supply line in the Baku oil fields, north of the Caspian sea, is one of the heaviest in the world since 1945 that the Russians call some fields "second Baku."

Whether "first" or second Baku all of these fields are within range of western military planes flying from the Mediterranean, keeping a close watch on the fields.

Supply in Romania

There is a second Russian oil supply line in Romania, in the Ploesti oil fields, but that oil is so low grade that it takes a good deal of fancy refining.

The Russians might probe a way for grabbing the middle east fields, but they are even more vulnerable to western bombing than their Baku fields.

The west would like to keep the middle east fields for its own use, but there would be little tendency in Washington for the area if held by the Russians.

So it is felt that the middle east fields would be canceled out if both the east and the west fought for them.

If the experts quoted are correct, the Russians have so little oil margin that if they had to go into a prolonged war they would be up against a serious choice between oil for planes and oil for their tremendous mechanized attack forces.

This choice brings a wry smile to the faces of Washington military supply people. They know they have to have both oil for machines and food for fighting men in any prolonged war.

- End to wage increases and price increases.

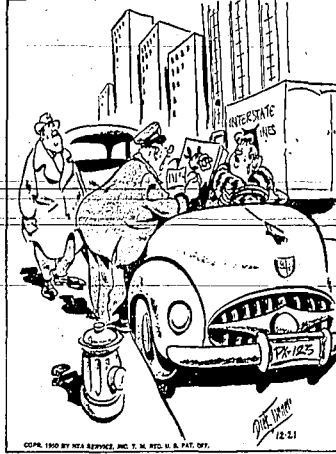

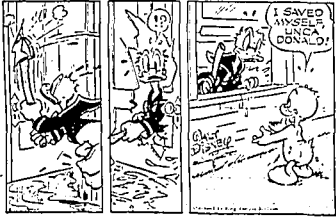
