Lower Sugar Market Limit Set for 1951

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan has issued an order limiting to 8,000,000 tons the amount of sugar which can be marketed in the United States in 1951. Next year's quota is 7,000,000 tons less than the revised quota for 1950. 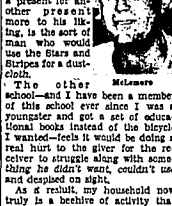

WHICH COURSE TO FOLLOW?

The final communique from President Truman and Premier Mao Tse Tung gives no specific clue as to the course we shall follow in Korea should the Chinese reds try to drive us into the sea.

All the two leaders say is that "the forces of our own countries will continue to discharge their responsibilities" toward resisting aggression in accord with United Nations resolutions. The big question is: What are those responsibilities?

Four courses are open to us:

All-out war against China. Mr. Truman and Mr. Acheson do not favor this, declaring their belief that nothing must deter the build-up of military strength in Europe.

A "limited" war against China which is generally taken to mean a war of naval blockade and aerial bombardment. Some U. S. officials are reported as favoring such action, but the British do not. It is recognized that this, too, involves risk of deep involvement in Asia, since no one can be sure how Russia and China would respond to a limited war.

The effort to devise a stable defense line somewhere in Korea, and thus to create a military stalemate which would permit us to breathe, though short of our final objective.

This approach plainly means less risk of general war. Yet how do we know it would not suit the communist purposes admirably? It would not compel us to commit all our strength, to be sure, but it would drain off much more men and material than we should like to see expended in Korea in the light of our burdens elsewhere. It is a certain way of avoiding a steady state in this respect.

A complete abandonment of Korea to the reds. Since we do not choose to go all-out against China, this course may be forced upon us. China has the power to throw us out if we do not stand in this respect.

Some people, including a number of congressmen in this country, believe this outcome really would be best. They argue it would free us of a war which adds strength to the badly needed for other areas of the world. They see no dishonor in defeat inflicted by armies that outnumber us overwhelmingly. They believe, too, that we have really lost face among Asiatic nations and can do better "without us" in this respect.

Of these four courses, all-out war already seems ruled out. With support for limited war so scanty, this too appears an unlikely prospect. The passage of time and the disclosure of red intentions will show us whether it is to be a stalemate or thorough defeat for our forces in Korea.

What a beautiful city Twin Falls would be during the holiday season if residents in all parts of town demonstrated a similar interest! We'd be the talk of all the western country and spectators would drive for hundreds of miles to witness the spectacle.

There is only one discouraging note in our Christmas lighting this year, and that's in downtown Twin Falls. Here, for several years the tendency has been to do away with lights as much as possible in the business district, and to create the Christmas spirit with ornamentation alone.

It is not intended as criticism, but more as a suggestion for next year, that we call attention to this year's downtown decorations. Outside of the lighted Christmas tree and the intersection of Main and Fillmore, our decorations in the business district were quite ineffective, although they may have represented a lot of hard work.

Let's all make a note on our new calendars for next year. When the Christmas season rolls around, let's try harder to get our lights to make Twin Falls the real Christmas City—not only in the residential areas, but in downtown Twin Falls as well.

Let's decorate our business districts with garlands, Christmas lights, so it fairly radiates the happiest and lightest.

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Views of Others

PULLETS ALWAYS HAVE There's one factor that will take care of the rising price of eggs. Poultrymen call her the Puller and she's been with us this time of the year, as we recall—for we used to keep a few chickens—the pullet began getting a dreamy look in her eyes, and she went talking sofly in her throat. And the first thing we knew, that pullet would be on the nest. What elation it was to discover the warm, shapely egg in the hollow straw in which you never have experienced it. Have missed one of life's memorable gratifications.

And when the first pullet had laid an egg, then her gentle, interested sisters began to emulate her, until presently all the pullets were laying. It was this the way we recall it, nor do we suppose that pullets have changed their nature materially since we fathered a last small warm egg. We use better on the pullet to abolish the egg crisis, as she always has.

Why did we get keeping chickens. If we liked to so we'd have had a lot of the habit, and we'd be figuring that there was no money in a small back-and-forth operation such as ours. We discovered that when a pullet began to lay, the transaction is not clear profit, as we used to imagine. The fact is that you've bought that egg as surely as if you had purchased it in the grocery, and if you considered your time to be worth anything, etc. The time went up and that clinched it. We quit keeping chickens.

But we've never gotten over a hankering to keep chickens, though we do not suppose that we shall. We'll admit that it's a little difficult not to try it, along about this time of year, when the pullets begin to dream of the first egg, and we most certainly have the appearance of dear demure. Anyhow, we predict as Drew Pearson might say—that the pullets will soon begin laying eggs.

THE HIGH COST OF POLITICS

Inflation has hit political campaign expenditures, like everything else, but it is a special kind of inflation; the money that has come for congress to take a long look at the high cost of political activity.

Democratic Chairman William M. Boyle estimated that the cost of the campaign for the senate is about \$2-million through its congressional, state, and national committees. The Republicans had spent more than \$1 million on their campaign in the October days of the campaign.

But the national committees tell only part of the story. There are other expenditures in every state, and these are by numerous special groups. The CIO expenditures in the campaign between the state and AFL pulled a million this year. Medical groups also were active at places this year.

The Hatch act places a limit of \$2-million on spending by any political committee, but this is meaningless because you can always get around it. Similar expenditures of \$2,000,000, but the cost of printing and mailing bills, and other political expenditures is exempt from the limitation.

Country needs a complete, realistic survey of campaign expenditures if it is to be able to control the aggregate, where the money comes from, just what kind of interest groups are the basis of these facts, and how to control them. For unlimited campaign spending can become a threat to democracy.

26 Plans for Schools Due 1951 Session

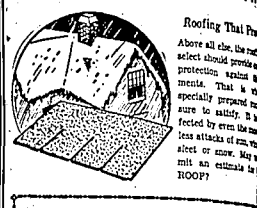

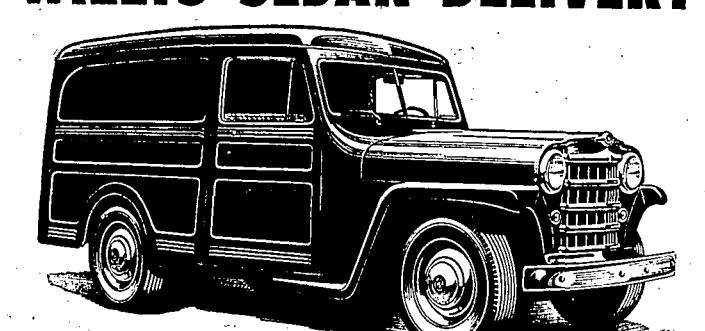
