

Truman's Blast at Hoover Man Sets Stage for Huge Debate; Dulles Slates Talk

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—President Truman's comment that the nation is going to a state of isolationism set the stage today for Republican John Foster Dulles to join in a national debate on foreign policy. Mr. Truman at his news conference late yesterday said the isolationist label on former President Truman's proposal to concentrate on western hemisphere affairs until western Europe demonstrates it has the ability to meet communist aggression.

Announcing in advance that he agrees with much of what he said, is scheduled to state his own views tonight in an address at New York to the American Society for the United Nations. Dulles, acting secretary of state, said, however, he would express a "somewhat different" view from Hoover's.

Truman to Hoover, Dulles said he regretted his speech in advance as a reply to the former president.

He explained his purpose was to make a contribution to the "great national debate" upon the "grave issues of our time."

The state department has made plans to support what it expects Dulles to support, which includes the policy of collective security through the North Atlantic pact.

PARIS, Dec. 29 (AP)—The national assembly today voted to endorse a record arms bill.

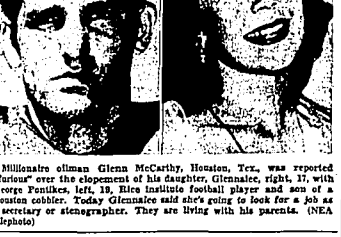
The bill provides for the production of 1,000,000 rifles in 1951 to equip the French army.

Don't Hoard; It Is Useless; USDA Avers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—The department of agriculture has today advised for housewives today: Don't hoard. It is indicated hoarding would be a waste of time.

Officials said the national cupboard is full and there is plenty of food everywhere. They predicted conditions of rationing would be needed next year if the present chapter on food supplies would carry the nation over until the 1935 crop is harvested.

Figures shown A dependent survey showed food should be ample to fill domestic and foreign needs. It shows the nation has and will have shortly:

A surplus of 1,477,000,000 bushels of wheat, domestic consumption averages about 800,000,000 bushels a year.

A near record supply of 2,938,000,000 bushels of corn which guarantees big crops of meat and poultry.

A 1931 pig crop of about 100,000,000 head.

More than 2,000,000 more cattle next year.

Poultry, milk, butter and cheese in abundance.

Marketing Pointless In the face of this abundance, a food rationing program would be pointless at this time, an official said.

There certainly is a need to start rationing food supplies until reserves stocks dwindle to a point where they endanger national security.

The department already has said there is more sugar than the nation needs. It fixed the amount of sugar to be sold domestically at 8,000,000 tons.

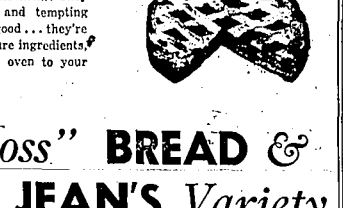
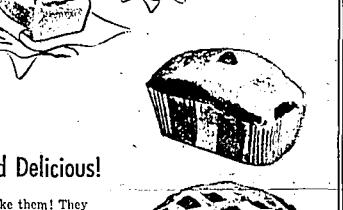
